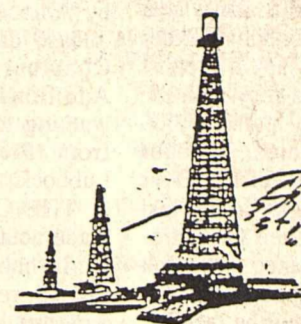
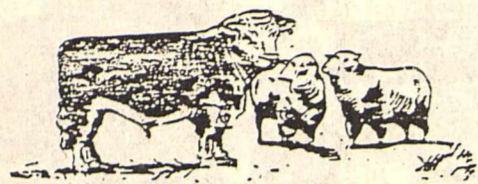

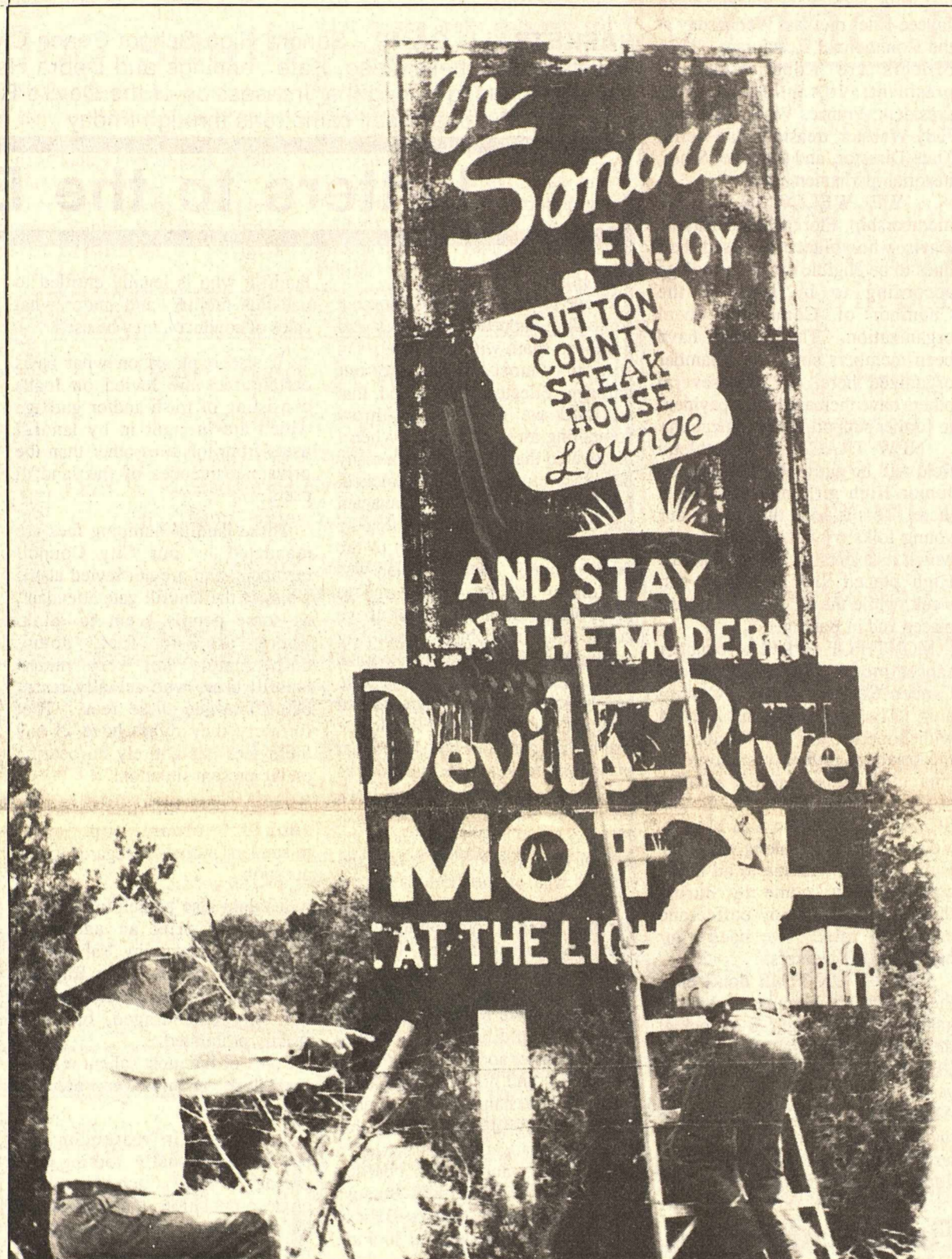

Landowner removes sign to comply with law

L.P. Bloodworth was recently forced to tear down a sign that has been on his property for more than ten years. The sign, promoting a local restaurant and motel, had to be taken down because he did not qualify for an outdoor advertising license and permit. Among the criteria that would have to be met to obtain the permit, the sign would have to be placed within 800 feet of two adjoining businesses, according to Carol Martinet, with the Texas Highway Department in San Angelo. Rabies remain a danger in Public Health Region 3

Through the first five months of this year, 64 rabid animals have been reported from 10 of the 36 counties in Public Health Region 3. From January through May of last year, these same counties had reported 48 rabies cases.

Nearly one-half of this year's rabies cases have been skunks. Other reported wild animals with

rabies have been foxes, bobcats, raccoons, a ringtail and a bat. Twelve rabies have been reported in domestic pets and livestock.

Sutton County reported 8 skunks, 2 foxes, 1 goat and 1 llama with rabies.

Crockett County reported 1 skunk and 1 bobcat and Schleicher County reported 3 skunks, 2

bobcats, 1 raccoon, 1 cat and 1 bovine testing positive for rabies.

In the preceding 10 year period, rabies in these counties occurred most frequently during April and May. The number of rabies cases rapidly decrease beginning in June and continuing through September.

Travel tips to "save" by

Even when you are traveling on vacation you can practice conservation. People Against Waste passes on some ideas: Before leaving home

- Plan ahead for your trip. Don't drive more than you want. In determining your primary vacation spot, if your choices are about equal, choose the vacation closest to home.

- Do your "homework." You can understand the value of conservation more when you know more about the nature you're trying to protect. Read up on the wildlife of the areas you plan to visit.

- Turn down the water heater when you go.

Before hitting the road

- Have your vehicle tuned up. A well tuned vehicle saves fuel and helps protect the environment.

- Check your tires. Make sure they have the proper air pressure; this saves fuel, too. If you need new tires, find out before you buy what the tire dealer does with the old tires. Old tires can be used in playgrounds and for building artificial reefs. They won't do anybody any good by helping to fill up a dump.

- Check your air conditioner. Have a service station make sure you're not leaking air conditioner coolant. If you are, get your system repaired. Find out what the station does to dispose of its

coolant properly.

- Check your oil. Anybody can do that, but if you constantly need to pour in more oil, you may have to take your vehicle to a professional to examine for an oil leak or other engine problems. When changing oil, make sure the old oil is disposed of properly. Some places take old oil. Also, you may find dealer who sells recycled oil that may be safe for your vehicle. But use only oil - and other fluids - recommended for your vehicle, or you won't be doing either your vehicle or nature any favors.

- Make sure your battery is charged. If you don't have a rechargeable battery, get one the next time you need a battery.

- Don't pack a lot of things you don't need.

- When you're trying to travel light, you may want to use disposable eating utensils, but you can still try to use recycled items. (Look for the "recycled" logo.) And you can still save your utensils for reuse if you remember to take along something to keep them in. This way you can cut down on garbage as well as expense.

- If you take food with you, utilize reusable food containers or biodegradable wax paper rather than aluminum foil or plastic wrap.

- Buy supplies in bulk to save in packaging as well as money. You don't have to take everything with you.

- Buy soft drinks in aluminum

cans, and save the cans.

On the road

- Slow down. Enjoy the view and save gasoline.

- Maintain a steady speed. Get to your desired speed, then keep it. When you know at a distance you need to stop, let your car coast before starting to use the brakes.

- Don't use your air conditioner if you don't have to.

While you're there

- When you indulge in "fast food," patronize places that use recycleable containers.

- When you "sight-see," walk - or maybe even bike - instead of drive if you can. Save fuel, avoid parking problems and stay in shape.

Take precautions when traveling south

Public Health Region 3 of the Texas Department of Health is issuing an advisory to persons anticipating traveling into Mexico, Central or South America. These areas are experiencing cases of cholera and travelers are advised to take special precautions to help avoid exposure to this disease.

Anyone who develops symptoms of cholera while traveling or within one week after returning to the United States should seek medical attention promptly.

Cholera is caused by bacteria which are transmitted to people by food or water which has been contaminated with the feces or vomitus of persons with the disease. Symptoms of cholera include large amounts of very watery diarrhea, vomiting, muscle cramps, shock, severe dehydration and, without prompt treatment, possibly death.

Travelers should take these precautions.

- 1) Use only boiled or properly chlorinated water for drinking, cooking or brushing teeth. Beverages containing water or ice cubes should be avoided. Carbonated beverages in clean dry containers are usually safer than drinking untreated or unboiled water.

- 2) Eat only well-cooked foods which are still hot when served. Do not eat raw or undercooked seafood or any food from a street vendor.

- 3) Wash hands after every trip to the bathroom.

Most cases of cholera in the current outbreak have been reported from Central and South America. A few cases have occurred in the United States.

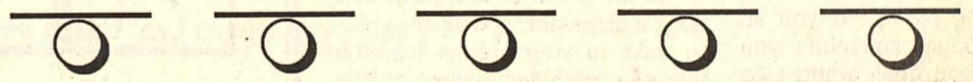

ASU to host 4,000

Over 4,000 out of town guest will be on the Angelo State University campus this summer attending an array of workshops, seminars and clinics.

The first of five cheerleading camps is currently being held with 200 participants in the Universal Cheerleaders Association camp. A second Universal camp is scheduled for July 7-10 with 400 participants. The National Cheerleaders Association will hold camps June 29-July 2 and July 28-31 with a total of 350 participants, and the International Cheerleading Foundation holds it camp for 150, June 23-26.

The Texas Association of Student Councils will hold three workshops on campus during the summer with a total of 720 students attending the events. The student council

workshops are scheduled for June 14-19, July 5-10, and July 26-31.

Other conferences scheduled for the summer months include the Region XV Education Service Center Workshop with 400 participants, June 25; Newsphoto Yearbook Workshop with 80 students, June 21-26; Angelo State University Band Camp, July 12-18; Preview ASU, July 24-August 1; and the Fredericksburg High School Band Camp with 200 participants, August 3-8.

TRAVEL TIPS

•Use such thing as suntan lotions and insect repellants made from "natural" or "alternative" ingredients.

In the Great Outdoors

•On the beach or in a park, take along a disposable container to pick up trash in your area-at least on your own trash-and dispose of it in the closest trash receptacle.

•Don't leave plastic six-pack yokes or fishing line lying-or floating-around. Animals can become entangled and choke. Cut or tear plastic loops apart even if you put them in a trash receptacle.

•Be friendly to wildlife. Sometimes you may have an opportunity to feed the animals, but do so only with the appropriate food and only when and where it is permitted.

TS&GRA files suit against aquifer takeover

SAN ANGELO - The Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association has filed suit against the Texas Water Commission on behalf of its members who ranch over the Edwards Aquifer. The suit challenges TWC's designation of the Edwards as an underground "river", which would allow the state agency to regulate its use.

TS&GRA's petition puts it in the same camp as the city of San Antonio, which also opposes the "underground river" ruling. The Association takes particular exception to the fact that TWC's action strips landowners of vested property rights in the water underlying their land; by law, Texas landowners have the "right to capture" of any water under their property, a tenet of English common law dating back centuries. The state, however, has taken control of surface water, and TWC's ruling, if not reversed, would have the ludicrous effect of equating the aquifer with surface water.

TS&GRA's suit contends that the TWC ruling was improper because, among other reasons, it represents an attempt to nullify a legislative action bureaucratically. The water board's predecessor, the Association points out, officially recognized the Edwards aquifer as far back as 1957, when it created the Barton Springs-Edwards Aquifer Conservation District. That order was later ratified by the Legislature, giving it the stamp of law and removing the issue from TWC's purview.

The lawsuit contends that, not only is TWC barred from arbitrarily changing such a statutory designation, it cannot even change its own rules and regulations in the "emergency" fashion it used to declare the Edwards a "river" on April 15.

Such actions require at least 30 days public notice, TS&GRA points out, unless the "emergency" is justified by "an imminent peril to the public health, safety or welfare." TWC claimed such "imminent peril" on the grounds that the inability of Edwards water users to agree on a regulatory plan suitable to the Commission itself threatened to invite federal regulation.

That, the suit says, would not constitute "imminent peril" even if it were true, because the federal takeover scare is simply "an imaginary threat" to TWC's "own jurisdiction" rather than a hazard to the "public health, safety and welfare."

Furthermore, the federal threat itself arises from a lawsuit filed by the Sierra Club seeking federal

control over the Edwards on behalf of several protected plants and animals. The TS&GRA suit points out that the aquifer today "is at the highest level in many years," spring flow is likewise at a peak, "and there is no current threat to any endangered species that might be dependent on such spring flow."

TS&GRA challenges as well TWC's power to "transfer by administrative fiat the property rights in underground water contained in the Edwards Aquifer from the owners of land overlying the aquifer to the State."

Again, the suit stresses, even if TWC had that authority -- which it does not -- it could not exercise it under any form of "emergency" ruling, as it has attempted to do.

TS&GRA is asking the Travis County state district court to reverse the TWC ruling and restore the Edward's rightful designation as an aquifer.

Summer is a time for fun and safety

Now that school is out, parents might want to remember the "summertime ABC's." Always Be Careful.

"Summer is a time for children to have fun, but there are certain dangers to be aware of," said Dr. Joan Shook, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Each year, we see a dramatic increase in the number of drownings--most of them preventable."

Drownings are common among children ages 1-5 and often result because parents fail to adequately observe their children in the water.

"Some parents think that if they give their young children 'water babies' lessons that they are waterproof," Shook said. "But these kinds of lessons only teach them how to swim; they do not teach them good judgement. You cannot expect 2-year-olds to know what to do if they fall in the water."

Shook suggests that parents place barriers around the family pool and visit and inspect other pools in the neighborhood likely to be used by their children. A portable phone for conducting business or answering calls can help keep parents by the poolside.

Other common summertime hazards include motor vehicle accidents, bicycle-related injuries, heat stroke and sunburn, fractures, insect, dog and snake bites, and jellyfish stings.

"Bicycles, in particular, are another big cause of injuries during the warmer months," Shook said.

"Kids are out more and taking more chances, and they often forget to wear helmets."

"Helmets do not prevent injuries, by they help reduce the number of serious head injuries which cause 80 percent of bicycle-related deaths," she said.

Approximately 600 children are killed in bicycle accidents each year. An estimated 400,000 children require hospitalization for bicycle-related injuries.

Car accidents among teenagers also increase during the summer months. Shook said she sees more and more cases of injuries caused by under-aged drivers. Car accidents account for almost half of all fatal childhood injuries.

Another potentially lethal

summer-related danger is heat exposure. Shook urges parents to be careful when taking infants outside on hot days.

"Babies do not sweat like adults," she said. "They do not perspire as efficiently and can dehydrate faster. Being left out in the hot sun uncovered or, worse, in a locked car with the windows up, can be fatal in a surprisingly short amount of time."

Other summer-related hazards and prevention tips include:

*Shook suggests teaching the children about sunscreen lotions early and making sure there is plenty on hand when playing outdoors. Sunscreens of sun protection factor (SPF) 15 or higher
