

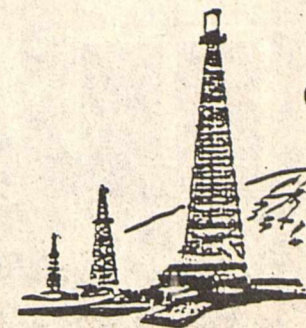

City Council holds monthly meeting

During the City Council meeting held July 21, 1992, Jim Garrett informed the City Council of the clean up project for the "Liberty Park" located on the corner of Gonzales and Galindo Streets. Due to rainy weather in Sonora the "Street Seal Coating Project" has been temporarily stopped, and park renovation is being done. The council had approved a program to seal coat every street in Sonora within six years. Garrett requested an additional \$10,000 to cover unexpected costs. Funds were granted.

RexAnn Friess informed the council that for the end of June 1991 Sonora was 95% collected and this year the Appraisal District has collected 1% more. Last year Sonora taxes were 100% collected. She is expecting the same this year.

NEW ADDRESSES IN SONORA
Because Sonora has adopted 911 many Sonora locations will be re-issued new address numbers and names. Sonora has never had a scheme of addressing. Many entities, such as the Post Office, Utilities Companies, etc., have issued address in the past leaving some confusion as to who is really what address number or name. At present Sonora has 103 named streets. Fifteen of the named streets are 1st, 2nd and 3rd Street.

Focus on education SISD receives recognition

We have always believed that we have a quality school system in Sonora and recent events have garnered us recognition on a statewide level. Sonora Intermediate School and Sonora High School received awards last week in Austin for their performance on the 1991 TAAS Test. Sonora Intermediate received a monetary award while the High School received a certificate of merit. We were also notified that Sonora Junior High was selected as a Mentor School in the Texas Middle School Network. These types of statewide recognition reinforce our belief that our students are experiencing success in our school.

Sonora has had a reputation as being a good school for many years. The one factor that will maintain quality education over a period of years is a nucleus of outstanding teachers. A school can

Ken Nelson has started and almost completed an address Data Base. Sonora will soon have a book with an index of names and numbers of all streets and locations in town as well as interfaced into suburban areas. The Data Base will help to develop a systematic numbering system giving every street or location an individual name or number. This will help emergency teams as well as visitors find desired locations.

As a result of this research for organizing an "Address Scheme" much mapping and documenting has been done making Sonora ready for growth. Some addresses presently being used may be changed in order to get in order.

WE WANT WINN'S

Sonora's new city manager, John Pape, reported on some ideas and hopes he had for Sonora. Among the new ideas mentioned was the campaign for recruiting Winn's Department Store to Sonora. He assured the council that there seemed to be a strong enough market to support Winn's and Perry's both.

Two hundred and fifty cards were prepared to be filled out by the people of Sonora and sent to Winn's Department Store. These cards were part of the campaign to encourage Winn's to come to

Sonora. It has been reported that two hundred and twenty cards have been returned to the Winn's Store.

John Pape highlighted some of the items to be discussed in the August Economic Development Plan meeting.

Pape expressed his hopes for the Angelo State University Small Business Development Council to come to Sonora and compile a community assessment of Sonora. Hopefully this assessment would help Sonora plan for expansion and growth without hurting existing businesses.

Pape said he had some ideas that he will present in August pertaining to: Shop Sonora, Community Image, Tourism Promotion, Business Parks, and possibly converting city vehicles to Compressed Natural Gas.

CLOSING THE LANDFILL

The City Manager briefly informed the council of the up and coming decisions that will have to be confronted concerning the Sonora Landfill. Soon Sonora will have to make changes to comply

Askew receives Earwood award

Vestel Askew was awarded the Fred Earwood Memorial Award recently at the 77th annual convention of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association held in Kerrville.

The award, established in honor of Fred Earwood of Sonora, is the most prestigious award given by the TS&GRA. It is given annually to a person whose commitment and dedication to the industry is exemplary.

Askew, a longtime friend of Earwood, was responsible for the idea of the award. He never dreamed he would one day be the recipient of this award, when he created the drive to raise funds for the memorial. He once said that raising money to honor Earwood was the easiest money he ever raised because "Mr. Fred" was so highly respected.

Askew was instrumental in getting mohair included in the Wool Act in 1954. The industry has been tremendously helped by the incentive program ever since.

Askew helped organize the American Sheep Producers Council as well as the American Wool

Commissioners hold special meeting July 27

A Special meeting of the Commissioner's Court of Sutton County was held Monday, July 27, 1992. An examination of Accounts Payable was presented for consideration by Charlie Graves. Graves expressed great satisfaction with the new NTS telephone service. The service has actually cut the phone bill by one half. Graves reported that the County Jail bill was even less than half. The commissioners approved the Accounts Payable report.

Other business approved was the authorizing of bids for Health Insurance.

Later in the meeting Mike Villanueva suggested that street name signs be placed on existing stop signs. Hopefully the street signs would be less easily defaced and more helpful for visitors and emergency teams.

Villanueva also reminded the commissioners that the two alleys and the new street which were incorporated needed names and signs.

Following on the agenda, the County Judge, Carla Garner, presented the budget for review and discussion. Most of the budgeted line items will have little to no changes. Among some of the small changes were increases in traveling expenses as schools and convention expenses have gone up.

The Justice of the Peace's budget remained fairly unchanged. Adelita Smallin has qualified her office as part of a pilot program which has allotted her money for computer upgrading.

The District Attorney's budget was considered next on the agenda. A \$3,500 increase was granted for an assistant. A request was made for \$12,300 for an added secretary but only \$9,900 was approved. A ten thousand dollar request for an Appellate Assistant Attorney was denied. Commissioners discussed the possibility of going to a 4-Day Work Week for the County Road Crew.

Lenora Pool reported to the Commissioners that OSHA is pushing to require county employees and officials to take the Hepatitis inoculation. This will be a series of three shots. She estimated the total cost of inoculation to be \$4,000.

with Subtitle D of the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) pertaining to Municipal Solid Waste Landfills. Subtitle D was put into effect by the United States Environmental Protection Agency on October 9, 1991 and will become effective October 9, 1993.

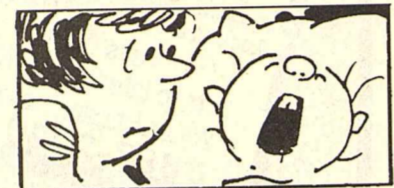

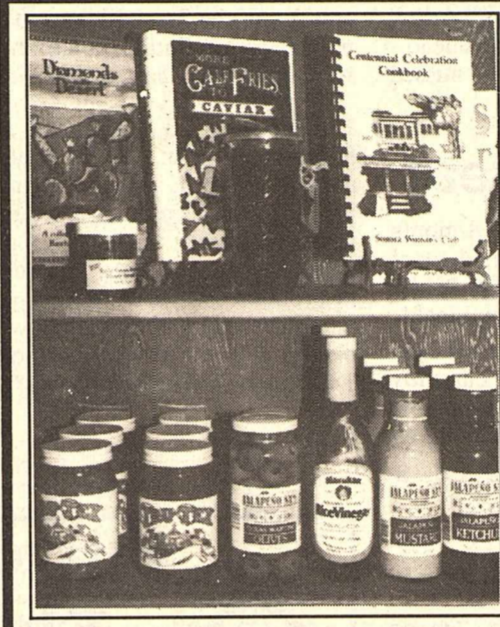

Ask the Historical Society

by Sutton Co. Historical Society

What year was the town of Sonora started? Some people have told me 1889 and some have said 1890. Which is correct?

To settle this once and for all, we hope, we will use newspaper articles of the day.

The San Angelo Standard had the following articles:

February 2, 1889 Charley Hobbs says that a new town that will probably be named Sutton is being started in that country near its center, about 65 miles from San Angelo.

February 9, 1889, Messrs. C. F. Adams, C. Meinecke, P. Hurst and A. S. Prescott, sheepman, etc., from Sutton, Sutton County paid us a pleasant visit yesterday. They are in town to obtain lumber for the erection of the first buildings in the new town of Sutton, mention of which was in our last issue.

February 23, 1889 had the following article: C. F. Adams, the moving spirit in the location of the new town in Sutton County writes to messrs. Gwin, Allen and Co., as follows: "Gents; According to promise I write to inform you that the well is completed with plenty of water at 180 feet deep. The new town is named Sonora."

Devil's River News of June 27, 1891 stated the following:

Sonora Will Celebrate
A grand barbecue will be given at Sonora, the Metropolis of the Devil's River Country, on July Fourth, in honor of the day itself and because it is the second anniversary of the birth of Sonora, the Pride of the West.

These articles seem to pinpoint 1889 as the year the town of Sonora was started. The birthday celebrated in July of 1891 seems to have been a belated birthday party. We feel that the San Angelo Standard articles establish January or February as the correct month.

City Hall tells us that Sonora was officially incorporated on February 17, 1917.

According to the records held in Austin, Sutton County was created April 1, 1887 and organized November 4, 1890.

We acknowledge the fact that there were people in residence in Sutton County before these dates but they were not in officially towns but on scattered ranches.

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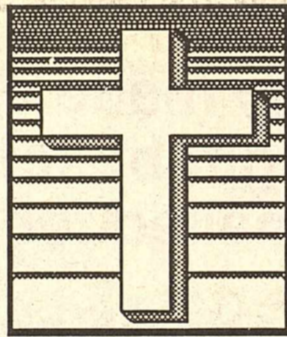
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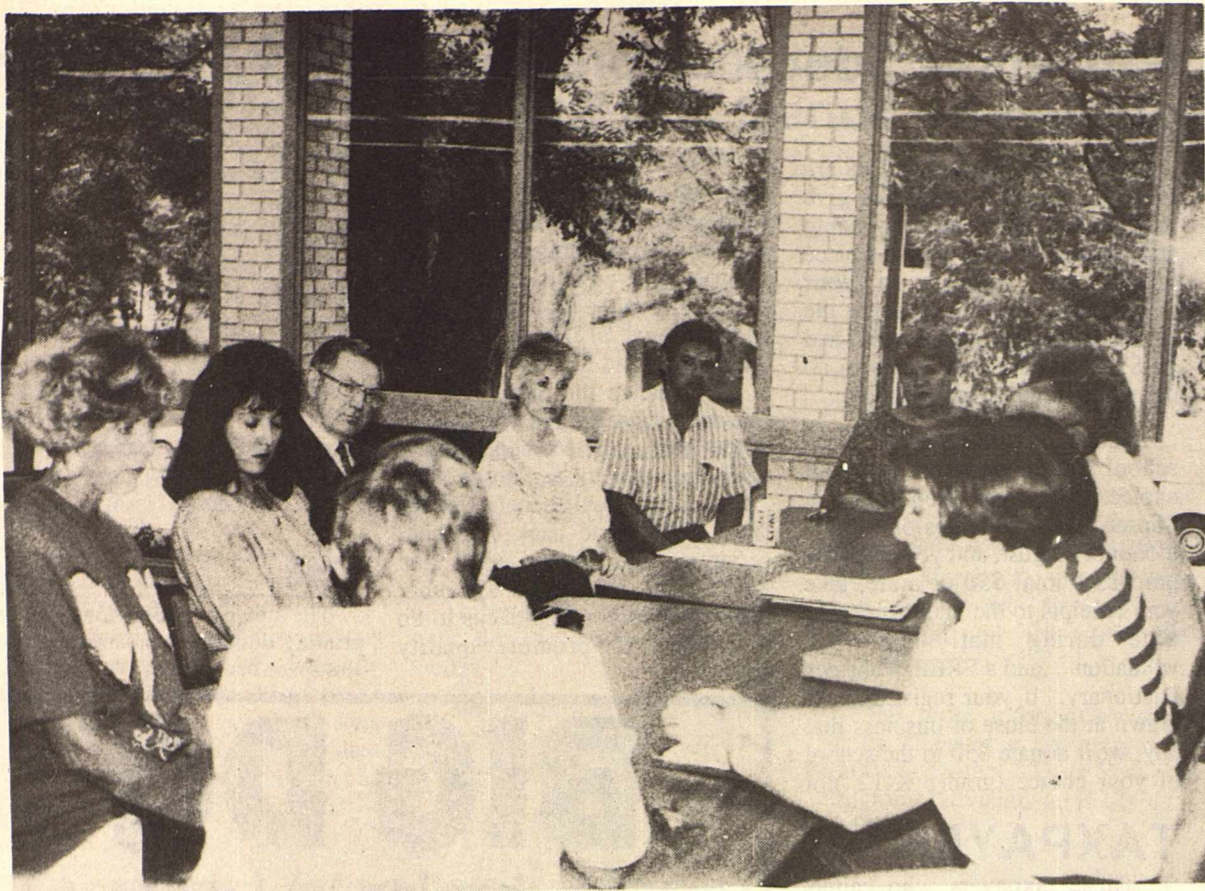

MEASLES

Public Health clinics. People catch measles by breathing the measles virus that an infected person spreads by coughing, sneezing or simply talking. It takes from 10 to 14 days for a person to begin to show the symptoms of measles: high fever, rash, runny nose, watery eyes, or cough. Public Health Region 3 recommends that infants and children be immunized at 15 months of age, and again at 4 to 6 years (before entering school). Children will receive a combination vaccine, MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella). Adults born after 1957 who have not had the live measles virus vaccine on or after their first birthday, had a case of measles diagnosed by a doctor, or had a blood test for measles, should be immunized.

Texas Lottery adds new game

AUSTIN - "Texas Two Step", the next game from the Texas Lottery, offers a new twist—the chance to instantly double your winnings. More than one of every six winning tickets will automatically double the prize amount," Lottery Director Nora Linares announced at a State Capitol news conference.

The Lottery will sell 200 million of the green, blue, black, red and tan "Texas Two Step" tickets. They feature a close-up of two pair of boots two-steppin' on a Texas dance hall floor.

The first shipment of tickets is currently on sale at all licensed Lottery retail outlets this week.

Unemployment rate 2% higher than last year

"If the Texas economy is tied to jobs, we are in a downward spiral," Texas Employment commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said as the state's jobless statistics were released. "Last month's unemployment rate of 8.3 percent was almost two percentage points higher than this time last year, and we cannot really explain why," she said.

The number of jobless Texans rose over a one-month period by 97,800 people. "We now have approximately 742,600 individuals trying to find jobs, and this has pushed our statewide rate to the highest level we have seen in four years," Nabers said.

"While we can blame some of the rise in unemployment on summer job seekers entering the work force, we cannot explain why the rate is the highest it has been since March of 1988," Nabers said. The monthly rate is up almost a full percentage point in a 30-day period, and surpasses the 7.4 percent rate recorded for the last three months.

"Interestingly enough," Nabers pointed out, "more than \$40 million has been allocated to Texas for funding a jobs program for youth between the ages of 14 and 21. And, Congress has extended the emergency unemployment benefits for thousands. Both of these factors certainly impact the state's economy. It is sobering to realize how much money is circulating in Texas because of these two programs, and it is almost frightening to realize where our cash flow could be when the programs end."

Every region in this state has taken a major hit. Nabers said that major layoffs throughout the state impact the situation and continue to negate some encouraging signs of growth.

Sutton County unemployment rate is 10.5 percent.

Approximately 8,195,000 Texans were working during the month and a total of 7,266,100 jobs were listed, up by 75,800 from June of last year. However, the increases in almost all job sectors were lower than last year. In addition, a large loss was recorded in government jobs as school campuses ended their spring terms. Non-salaried jobs in Texas increased by 7,000 in June.

Since sales began May 28—seven weeks ahead of schedule—the Texas Lottery has sold more than \$421 million of the \$1 tickets.

TDA requires pesticide dealer licenses and user training

AUSTIN - Ensuring that pesticide mishaps do not occur involves proper training in their use. In Texas, dealers and users of pesticides that are restricted under state and federal laws must be licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture on a regular basis.

To sell one of the 451 pesticides designated as restricted under federal law or state limited under Texas law, requires a dealer license that must be renewed annually. Dealer licenses cost \$100 each.

In addition, dealers are required to sell these pesticides only to licensed or certified pesticide applicators. Texas pesticide laws and regulations require that each sale of a federally restricted or state-limited pesticide or herbicide be documented and kept on file for two years. Regulated herbicide sales records also must be submitted to TDA every month.

To be licensed to use these products, private pesticide applicators, such as farmers and ranchers, must undergo training by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and pass a written test administered by TDA. A private five-year license costs \$50. Private

applicators must also earn 15 hours of continuing education during the five years before their licenses are renewed. Private applicators who hold a certificate issued prior to Jan. 10, 1989, do not have to pay the \$50 renewal fee, but are required to have the 15 continuing education credits.

Commercial agricultural pesticide users, such as cropdusters, and non-commercial users, such as county extension agents or chemical company representatives, are

required to pass category tests for the different types of pesticide applications that they make. Costs are \$20 per category test, \$150 for commercial licenses and \$100 for non-commercial licenses. Commercial and non-commercial applicators are required to obtain five continuing education credits each year and 20 credits in a three-year period in order to renew their licenses.

In Texas, 175,000 people are either certified or licensed to use federally restricted or state-limited pesticides for private use, and more than 7,600 are licensed for commercial and non-commercial pesticide use.

Q: I just bought a new set of tires and was charged an extra \$2 per tire. The dealer told me it goes to the Texas Water Commission. What are you doing with all that money?

A: Most of the money goes to safely recycle or dispose of the estimated 500 million waste tires stacked in illegal sites around the state. The Water Commission can use only up to 6 percent of your \$2 to run the cleanup program. Up to 2 percent goes to the State Comptroller. The dealer from whom you bought your tires gets 2 1/2 cents per tire when he or she sends your old tires to a processor. The remainder of the money pays for shredding tires to ready them for recycling into other products or for proper disposal. In the four months the program has operated, several of the state's estimated 350 illegal tire dumps have been cleaned up. We're hoping to prevent a recurrence of the illegal dumps.

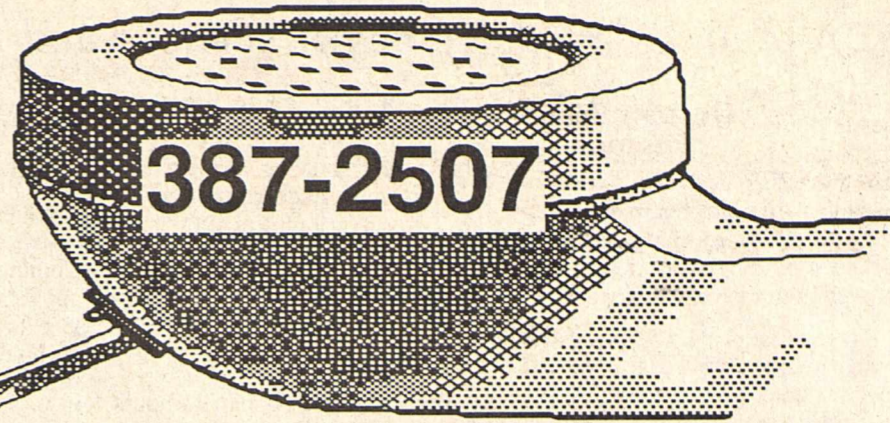
Q: I live in a small Panhandle town. To my knowledge, no one here accepts materials for recycling. I don't like throwing out materials that could be recycled if I lived in a city. What can I do?

A: The Texas Water Commission keeps a constantly changing list of recycling centers and businesses in every area of the state who buy or collect recycled materials. We will be happy to send you the latest list. We can also give you tips about how to organize recycling programs in your town or among your neighbors. We will also be glad to provide some ideas on ways to reduce the amount of disposable material you buy. Among our tips will be to encourage you to think of second-hand stores for your purchases and as a place to take still usable items that you no longer need.
