

Conducted as part of Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, this 14th annual Kimble County fundraiser is coordinated by Marc and David Dobbins and Larry and Diann Crenwelge, local CRCC community volunteers.

Individuals wanting to make donations of livestock, cash or miscellaneous items may contact Mrs. Dobbins at 446-3458 or the Crenwelges at 446-3378.

Dobbins notes the Rehab Center chuckwagon will be on hand with volunteers serving beans and cornbread at noon. Donors and buyers are encouraged to join in the activities and bring their branding irons and "brand" the wagon.

Round-up events throughout the Southwest annually generate treatment dollars for Rehab Center facilities in San Angelo and Abilene which serve 13,000 handicapped children and adults yearly.

In 1991, approximately 170 individuals from Kimble and neighboring counties received physical and occupational therapy, speech, audiology, orthotic and other assistance from Rehab. With an average cost of \$769 per patient, Hill Country residents received services which accounted for about \$130,000 worth of care.

"Every day Rehab treats people some of whom are our friends and neighbors," said Mrs. Dobbins. "Supporting the Round-Up is a good way for all of us to help Rehab help others."



Letters to the Editor

Almost a year ago, I picked up a flyer, either at the Post Office or at Thorps' Laundry, announcing the upcoming ECA course, sponsored by the Sutton County EMS. I was really interested in a basic first aid course, and maybe CPR. As a rancher, I was mostly concerned about what to do in the event of an illness or accident to an employee, guest, or hunter on the ranch. More than once through the years I've had to take someone to the emergency room for an injury, yet, I never really know how to deal with a true emergency.

The ECA course more than satisfied my desire for a first aid course and basic CPR. It was one of the most interesting courses I've ever taken. The course got into recognizing the signs and symptoms of almost every kind of medical emergency I could imagine, and how to deal with it until professional help is available.

At the time I had never considered joining the Sutton County EMS. This came as an afterthought, and my interest in learning more of what the ECA course offered. Several of my fellow students did, in fact, join the EMS, yet others simply walked away knowing more about how to deal with a true emergency.

Within 6-7 months after the course, I recognized the signs of a heart problem with someone on the ranch and was able to get this person to the emergency room, and alert a doctor of the impending emergency, giving him vital signs he would most certainly need to know. Had I not known how to recognize the signs and symptoms, I probably would have ignored what proved to be a real emergency! As it turned out, the person was transferred to San Angelo to a heart specialist, underwent a surgical procedure, and is now doing fine.

If you, or someone you know, is interested in learning CPR, or more about first aid, then I strongly urge you to contact the EMS personnel at 387-5132, or go by the EMS office at 211 E. 3rd and inquire about the upcoming ECA course to be offered October 7 through December 7. The classes are on Monday and Wednesday nights from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Preregistration is required. Pascal Allison, Rancher


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All-Region Choir tryout

Weatherford, Burleson, Cleburne "You call that an apology?!" and some other south Fort Worth "You call that an apology?!"




WASHINGTON - Producers applying for U.S. Department of Agriculture disaster payments under Phase II of the Disaster Assistance Program will be able to receive payments in a more timely manner. President George Bush had the

payments in a more timely manner. President George Bush had the USDA extend the disaster signup and ensure that producers who qualify for benefits under Phase II and Phase III of the Disaster Assistance Program will receive a payment rate of 50.04 percent of the payments for crop losses approved for coverage.

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm said, "This streamlined approach will immediately provide funds for losses suffered in recent years. This will enable producers to meet current obligations and prepare for the new crop year. The stability of

agriculture is important to every American."

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is extending the period for producers to file for benefits under Phase II of the program to Feb. 12, 1993, for those crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992. The original deadline was Oct. 2. Payment of benefits up to 50.04 percent will be made to producers as soon as they have furnished the required documentation and the application is approved by their local ASCS Committee. The extended signup period does not change the requirement for producers to purchase crop insurance on the same crop for 1993 if this year's crop loss was more than 65 percent, as required by the 1990 farm bill. The extension gives producers adequate time to file their claims under the disaster program.





Ask the Historical Society by the Sutton County Historical Society

Q. My name is Ann Ogle and I live at 835 S.E. Lambert Cir., Gresham, Oregon 97080. Can you give me any information on Dave graves are located. If anyone knows Ogle? Family stories are that Dave was killed by his brother. Where is he buried?

A. Dave Ogle was shot through the head with a bullet from a Winchester rifle fired by his brother Bob Ogle. This incident happened at the Ogle camp south of Rocksprings in August of 1901. Bob was arrested, found insane and committed to an asylum in Austin. Dave Ogle was 37 years old at the time of his death and left a widow, two step-children and five children from his first wife, a brother Will Ogle and sister Mrs. Bill Guest.

We found that Dave Ogle shot and killed George Rich at Grandstaff Springs near James River in around 1882. Rich, with his brother, a tubercular, and his mother, were stopping temporarily at Creed Taylor's. They hailed from Tennessee, and were traveling for the sick man's health. Ogle lived a few miles away. His sister had a camp at the Springs, and when Rich called there on a visit and made improper advances, a quarrel developed, and Ogle, who happened to be present, shot and killed him.

In the Junction Courthouse there are records of Dave Ogle being involved in a few other incidents through the years.

In the Sonora Cemetery we find the grave of Dave's first wife, Lieucinda Arbell Davis Ogle, who died in 1899. We also find the graves of Will, Maudie B. and Angeline. In the death records we find that a Mrs. Lore Vicie Ogle and Pete Ogle are supposed to be buried in the Sonora cemetery. Ann Ogle states that Dave and Luther Ogle are supposed to be buried there also.

We checked the Rocksprings Cemetery records and our records and can find nothing on where their where any of these people are buried, please contact the Sutton County Historical Society or Ann Ogle with the information.

We had several people question us about the location of the original well on our Courthouse Square. We have several pictures on file that we will be glad to show anyone if they would like to see where it stood. It was just about in the area where the little well was put up during the Centennial Celebration, not under the courthouse as several people have suggested.

Also, we have had several people ask us if there are going to be any more books written on Sutton County. We are happy to say, yes! We are currently researching a book on World War II, which will show stories on and letters from all the men who were written up in the Devil's River News. Also stories on rationing, Red Cross and other volunteer groups that aided the war effort. We have just started so this book will not be ready for at least another year. We still have a few copies of Sutton County 1889-1890, Sutton County Marriage Records 1890-1940, and "Bad Old Days" for sale. You can get the first two by calling us and "Bad Old Days" is carried by Westerman's Drug Store and the Ol' Sonora Trading Post.

WTU offers economic development service

Boosting the area economy just got a little easier. West Texas Utilities Company now has available a new economic development service designed to offer significant incentives to new or expanding businesses. The service option was approved September 30 by the Public Utilities commission of Texas.

The new rates will not mean higher costs for other customers. "Actually, other customers will benefit from improved economic opportunities which this service can help produce," Brower said.

The discount for a new or expanding business will gradually be phased out over a four year period, allowing time for the business to establish itself.

The boys will be going to Mason the shot put and Jimmy Galindo to compete this Friday. -SHS-


