Her mother needs help to pay for living away from home. Please help in anyway you can.

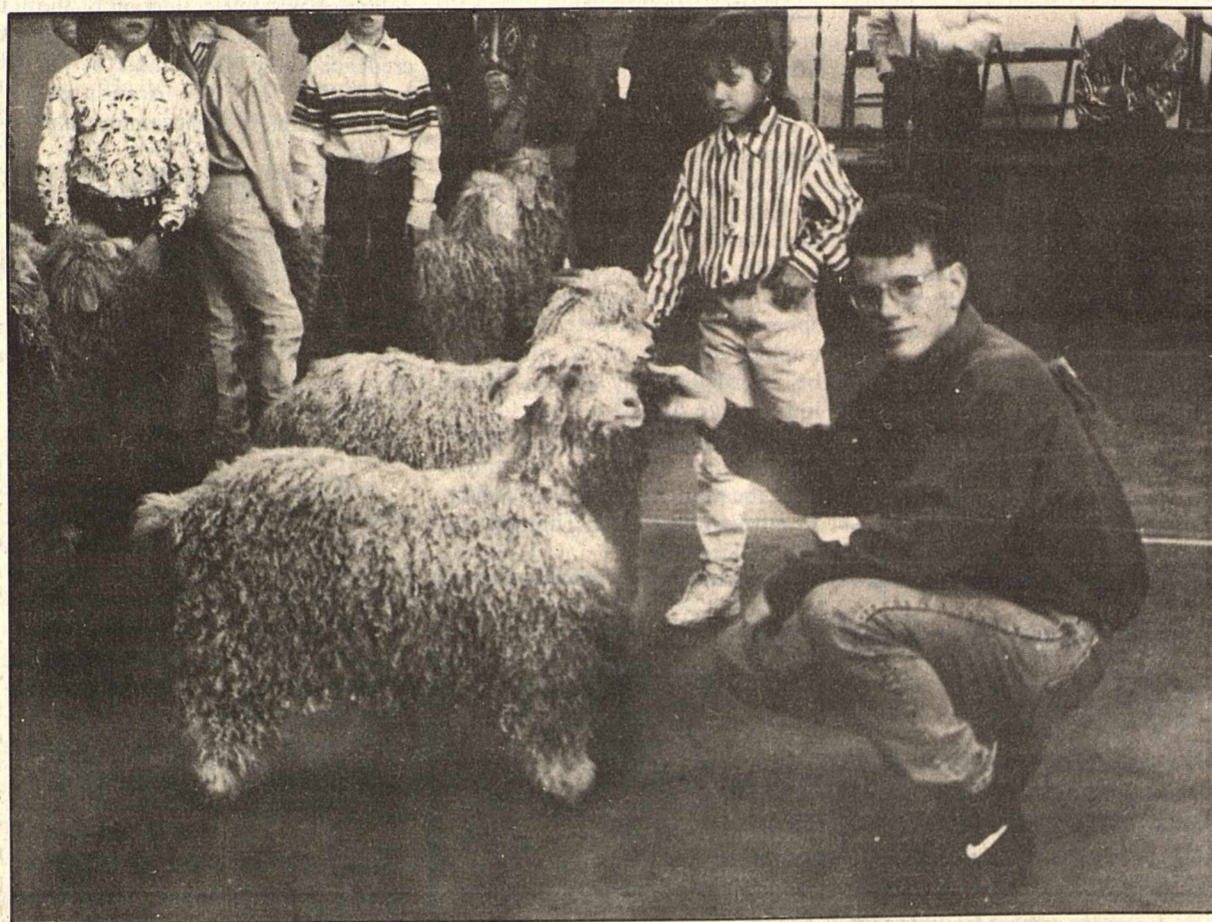

Angora goat test to begin February 26

Angora goats will be delivered to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Sonora February 26 through March 1 to begin the annual performance test. To be eligible animals must be born in the spring of 1992.

The Sonora Experiment Station is located on Highway 55, approximately halfway between Sonora and Rocksprings.

A field day and sale of the top animals is set for July 29 at the test's end.

First shearing is March 8-9. The first weigh day is March 10 and the final weigh day is June 30. Final shearing will be July 1-2.

Animal may be delivered as individuals or in sire groups, according to Dr. Frank Craddock Texas Agricultural Extension Service sheep and goat specialist at San Angelo and sale coordinator.

"It's not necessary that the animals be registered," said Craddock, but sale and use values would be better on registered animals. We ask that producers inspect their bucks to see that they are healthy, have two normal testicles and that the scrotum is not divided more than one-third the length of the testicles. The animals will be checked on arrival. Any showing evidence of scab or other contagious malady will not be accepted."

The bucks will be fed first in large groups sorted by size. Between the final weigh day and field day they will be separated into sire or ownership groups so prospective buyers can inspect them individually.

Limit per individual breeder is 12 animals unless special permission is granted. Test officials recommend a minimum of four animals per owner and sire group.

"Ideally, the bucks should be in full fleece upon arrival," said Craddock. "We'll accept shorn animals but they'll be re-sheared them and the short mohair will be worthless. Mohair from animals in full fleece will be returned to the owner following both the first and second shearing unless the buck is sold in the sale. Buyers of sale animals will receive the second fleece.

Participants will be asked to deposit \$135.00 per animal to cover feed cost, shearing and lab work on

the fleeces. Any unused funds will be refunded at the end of the test.

Since there is a respectable cost involved, owners are urged to be sure their animals are free of internal and external parasites and that they have been vaccinated against Exterotoxemia and soremouth.

Council hears proposal for new youth center

The Youth Center was one of the topics of discussion at this month's city council meeting.

Barbara Stroud presented the council with an outline of by-laws for the youth center. The city council also discussed the possibility of appointing board members to head up the center. A director would need to be hired. Stroud also presented a letter from the Junior High Student Council stating that they are in full support of a youth center and they would help in any way they could.

A building is being considered on the corner of Glasscock and 277 south, there has been no final decision made. It was recommended that Beth Wallace look over the by-laws and at the next city council meeting the subject of the youth center will be discussed again.

The Sonora Golf Club requested assistance for construction of a new maintenance building. The council discussed the possible financial assistance to the golf course and recommended that the golf club set up a committee to determine how much money would be needed to maintain the property.

Bids were also discussed for computer hardware and software for the Public Works Department. A bid for \$10,374 was approved by the council. A bid for two vehicles for the city was also approved.

City Manager, John Pape stated that he would be traveling to Austin to attend a solid waste management seminar to hopefully get ideas or see what options Sonora has with its disposal of solid waste material. Pape stated

Sonorans injured in one car rollover

An accident that occurred last Sunday morning 18 miles out of town was reported after the wrecked vehicle had been driven into the city.

Alfredo Valdez Gomez, 23, of Sonora was driving a 1989 Chevrolet when he lost control and rolled the vehicle 17.7 miles out on Miers Rd. The vehicle rolled through a fence and landed upright.

A passenger in the vehicle, Valerie Badillo, 26, also of Sonora, assisted Gomez back into the car and drove an 1/8 of a mile through the pasture before driving through the fence and entering the highway. Badillo then drove the wrecked vehicle into town.

As she entered the Water Street draw the left front wheel fell off the vehicle. Badillo then walked to the Sheriff's Office to report the accident.

Badillo told Officer Don Van Zandt that she was trying to get Gomez to the hospital when the car broke down.

Gomez and Badillo were taken by ambulance to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

Neither occupant was wearing seat belts at the time of the accident and alcohol was a factor.

Annual ram performance field day and sale nears

The annual Ram Performance Test Field day and Sale will be March 18 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) here. The station is 28 miles south of Sonora on U. S. Highway 55.

Over 250 rams from 41 of the nations top Rambouillet breeders are on the test.

"The rams are doing well," said Dr. Carl Menzies, TAES Resident Director at San Angelo. "They completed their first weigh day in excellent shape; really better than average."

By field day, data will have been collected on each ram including scrotal circumference, rate of gain and wool characteristics. The top 30 percent of the animals completing the test will be offered for sale at the owners discretion.

Gloria was taken to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital by Sutton County Ambulance.

"All sale rams will be tested free of brucella ovis which causes epididymitis, a leading cause of sterility among rams" said Menzies. The final weigh day will be February 17 followed on the 18th with the final shearing. Producers wanting to view the rams in the wool should do so prior to the final shearing date. Visitors are welcome to inspect the animals at any time.

You've heard something linking suntanning booths to cancer. Could this be true?

Your husband has recently been diagnosed as having colon cancer. What's known about this disease?

For answers to questions like these, you can call the American Cancer Society (ACS) toll free at 1-800-ACS-2345 from anywhere in the country.

This number will connect you with the American Cancer Society's CANCER RESPONSE SYSTEM (CRS).

You won't get an audiotape or a prerecorded message, but a one-to-one contact with an ACS staff member or trained volunteer who will begin tracking the answers from a computer with a data bank containing the equivalent of approximately 2,000 pages of text.

The data bank continuously receives its information from sources all over the world; leading cancer scientists, physicians, medical and research centers, plus the Society's own library of resources.

The CRS operator will search through one of the main categories of information listed on the main menu, including:

- Cause and Prevention
- Detection and Diagnosis
- Cancer Sites
- Cancer Treatment
- Rehabilitation and Supportive Care
- ACS Organizations
- Unproven Methods
- Other Agencies
- General Topics

After your question has been answered, you might also be offered ACS or National Institute literature about the subject, or a list of sources if you want to pursue the topic in greater depth. The literature is sent only to those who call or request it, not to second parties.

For more information on these services to cancer patients, education programs or how you may protect yourself and others against this disease, the American Cancer Society urges you to call 1-800-ACS-2345. The help you need may be as close as your telephone.

Whether volunteer or staff, all CRS operators take part in a training program that covers the structure and basic programs of the ACS, reviews general information about cancer, its cause and prevention, detection and diagnosis, sites, treatment, rehabilitation and supportive care, unproven methods of treatment, and psychosocial aspects. The operators also learn to refine their communication skills by role-playing, practicing telephone conversation techniques, and considering problems operators might face. They also get practice in learning to use the computer and accessing the national and local data banks.

What does the future hold for the Cancer Response System?

"We're already seeing how very dynamic the CRS is," says Dakutis. "For example we're now including information on new forms of cancer detection like tumor markers, and as the research findings come in, we're adding information about how the immune system works. We're also finding much more general awareness of prevention. In the future the data bank will reflect calls about these discoveries and this new awareness. The system is flexible—it's a good instrument for adapting to the needs of the people who use it."

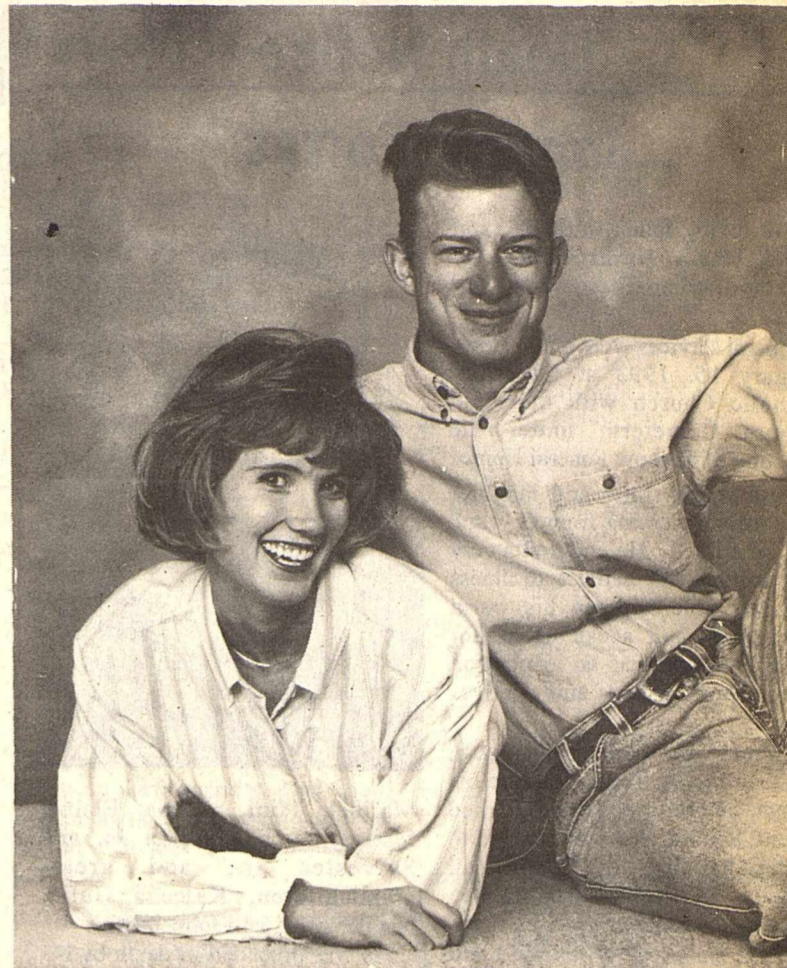

Natural Gas For Sonora Here's How You Can Help

Do you want natural gas brought to Sonora? If you do and are sufficiently interested in the progress of Sonora to put down your \$10 deposit for a meter, please drop in at one of the businesses listed below and fill out an application. We need 375 customers for natural gas before the Lone Star Gas Company will begin construction. The City of Sonora has already granted a charter to Lone Star, but if 375 subscribers have not been secured by June 1, the charter becomes null and void. Devil's River News, January 30, 1953

Natural Gas Assured As Goal Of 375 Customers Oversubscribed

Sonora went "over the top" Thursday afternoon on its quota of subscribers needed to bring natural gas here. Lea Roy Aldwell, chairman of the businessmen's committee, said they had 378, three over the required number of meter deposits and subscribers agreements were still coming in. He estimated

that at least 400 will be signed up before laying of the gas mains begins. Dick Morrison was the 375th signer.

Lone Star Gas employees Beulow and Perkins were spotting house locations on a map of the city Thursday. Pipe and other material is being ordered and construction will be underway as soon as possible.

Devil's River News, April 24, 1953 Lone Star to Start Construction On System Within Two Weeks

The Lone Star pipeline has reached the city limits and construction material has been shipped. It will reach Houston by ship and be sent on to Sonora by truck. Construction crews will move in within two weeks and installation of the distribution system should be completed in about six weeks.

Devil's River News, July 24, 1953 Gas Turned on Today

The Lone Star Gas Company will turn gas into the completed section of its distribution system this afternoon at 3 o'clock, E. L. Beulow, division superintendent, announced Wednesday.

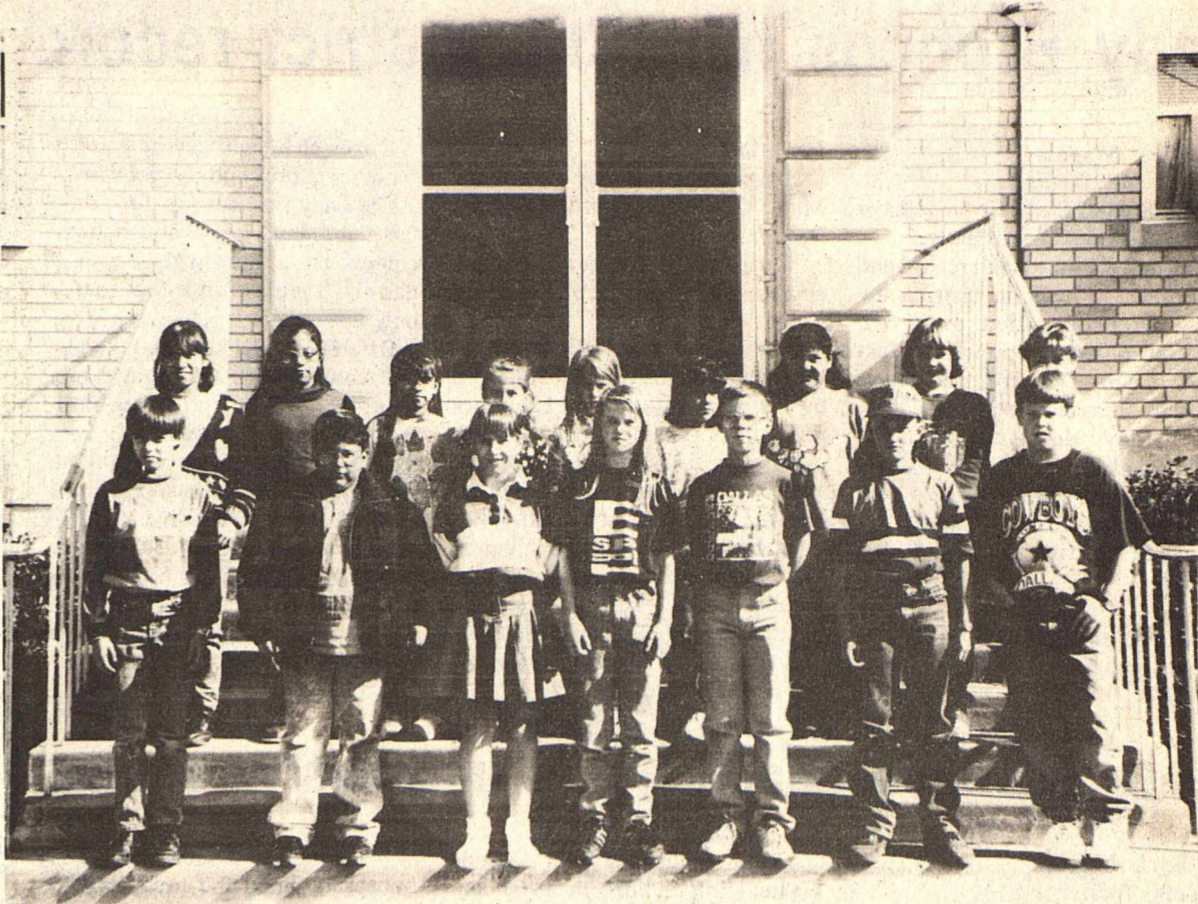
Opening Ceremonies, which will be attended by city and Lions Club officials, will take place at the recently completed control station a half mile east of town on the old McKavett road.

Mayor Alfred Schwiening will open the valve to officially inaugurate use of natural gas in Sonora. The first loop of the system will serve about 150 customers.

Devil's River News, July 31, 1953 Sonora Now Hooked on Lone Star System

First Customer of Lone Star is the Sonora Steam Laundry. Owners Cyle Clemens and Thomas B. Thorp look on as Local Lone Star manager Leon Neely turned on gas. Use of natural gas will save Clemens and Thorp sleep as well as money. A remote control now lights boiler fires at 7:30 o'clock each morning and plenty of steam is ready by opening time at 8 o'clock. Under old system, fires had to be lighted as early as 4 o'clock.

Supreme court indicates unwillingness to protect women

With the ruling in *Bray v. Alexandria Women's Health Clinic*, the United States Supreme Court has indicated its unwillingness to protect the welfare of millions of American women.

Without the possibility of federal intervention, anti-choice groups can now escalate their campaign of harassment against women seeking abortion - a legal medical procedure.

"The ruling in *Bray* leaves the door open to mob violence which will threaten the welfare of millions of American women," stated Karen-Pieper-Hildebrand, Executive

Director of Planned Parenthood of West Texas, Inc.

The majority of the court ruled that women are not entitled to federal protection from anti-choice terrorism, since federal courts can no longer police the actions of the mobs who victimize and intimidate these women.

Before the ruling, federal court judges used the law struck down by *Bray* to subject disruptive protestors to heavy fines and imprisonment. This will no longer be a deterrent to those intent on harassment.

Taxpayers will bear the brunt of

the costs of these terrorist activities in the cities where anti-choice group choose to become a public nuisance. The recent examples of Wichita, Kansas and Buffalo, New York, where the municipalities were forced to spend millions of taxpayers' dollars to protect citizens from mob violence will continue and escalate.

Ms. Hildebrand said, "By then abolishing of federal jurisdiction in the clinic protest arena, the Supreme Court has empowered a dangerous fringe element of society to impede the legal options of others."

Todo acerca del programa links opciones para una vida independiente

El Departamento de Texas sobre la Mayoria de Edad "Opciones para Vivir Independientemente" (conocido como el programa LINKS) fue establecido por la Legislatura #71, con decreto en la Ley del Senado 484 en Julio de 1985. Su proposito es ayudar a las personas mayores de edad a permanecer en casa a pesar de sus capacidades limitadas para cuidarse a si mismos, proporcionando SERVICIOS A CORTO-TIEMPO con el proposito de (a) restaurar las capacidades funcionales despues de una enfermedad o de haber estado hospitalizados; y (b) educando y preparando a las personas mayores de edad y sus ayudantes como cuidarse por si mismos. El programa local de Opciones llamado LINKS ha venido proporcionando servicios desde Mayo de 1990.

LINKS opera bajo la supervision del Senior Citizens Center del Condado Kimble y esta consolidado a traves del Concho Valley Council of Governments y la Agencia del Area sobre la Mayoria de Edad, el cual recibe concesiones directamente del Texas Department on Aging (TDOA). LINKS proporciona actualmente una amplia variedad de servicios basados en la comunidad de personas mayores de edad en los condados de Kimble, Menard, Schleicher, y Sutton. Algunas de las ventajas como los programas relacionados con el cuidado de la salud son las que se proporcionan a las personas mayores de edad en la region de los cuatro condados. De hecho, no existe hospital en Menard, uno de los condados en los cuales se proporciona el programa LINKS. Sin el sistema local de cuidado para la salud disponible a precios razonables, muchos de los ancianos debiles se verian forzados a recurrir al Asilo mucho antes del tiempo necesario. LINKS esta disenado para prevenir la reclusion en un Asilo proporcionando los SERVICIOS DE AYUDA A CORTO-TIEMPO.

Los servicios del programa LINKS estan disponibles para personas mayores de 60 años y que por recursos economicos esten descalificados para los programas regulares, pero que ademas sus recursos son insuficientes para obtener los servicios de ayuda necesaria.

SE LES OTORGARA PRIORIDAD A AQUELLOS QUE: (1) recientemente hayan sufrido de una enfermedad, esten pasando por una crisis de salud a hayan estado hospitalizados; (2) que vivan en areas rurales; (3) que no tengan quien los cuide; y (4) tengan impedimiento fisico parcial o total.

El programa LINKS es responsable de proporcionar y hacer los arreglos necesarios para los siguientes servicios: la administracion del caso, ayuda domestica (incluye ayuda personal), reparaciones y modificaciones residenciales, beneficios de consejero, conceder ayuda, ayuda de emergencia, educacion y entrenamiento para la persona que los va a cuidar, llevar comida a sus casas y proporcionar transportacion.

Los servicios de Homemaker II los cuales incluyen ayuda domestica y personal es proporcionada por dos agencias autorizadas en el cuidado del la salud en el hogar, Concepts

of Care en Abilene y TLC Registry en Eldorado. Estos no son "programas" en si mismos. Nosotros ocupamos cada agencia por medio de contratos basados en referencias y seleccionamos uno de sus trabajadores para enviarlos donde se necesite la ayuda.
