

As a newly appointed member of the Sutton County Commission on Aging, I felt a need to inform myself as to the deliberations of City Government. I accordingly attended a City Council Meeting of Sonora on February 16, 1993.

I was able, during the open session, to observe the manner in which the numerous items on the agenda were handled. I, however, remain puzzled as to the action of the Council Members in the Executive Session. During this portion of the meeting the council in private without Citizen comment have apparently given approval to an employment contract with severance pay for the City Manager. Since such an agreement will ultimately cost tax payers money could you enlighten me as to the authority of the Council to bind the Citizens of Sonora to such an agreement without their comment or input. If such is the sole prerogative of the Council, to deal in Executive Session with such matters, so be it; however, must all items and persons discussed in the Executive Sessions first be

published on an open agenda and do those persons being discussed not have a right to be present?

To answer the questions set forth by Brigette Rogers in this weeks paper, I will attempt to explain the proceedings of the city council as factually as I possibly can.

The city council does in fact have the right to approve a severance agreement for City Manager John Pape. The agreement mentioned is one that was approved in February. Voting in approval of the agreement was Margaret Cascadden, Fred Perez, and Butch Campbell, while Maria Barrerra voted against said agreement.

According to the employment agreement if Pape was in fact relieved of his duties for reasons other than a felony crime or moral turpitude, the city has agreed to pay a lump sum cash payment equivalent to six months compensation. This amount would come to around \$19,000.

Additionally the city manager would be allowed the option of continuing residence in the city-owned city manager's residence for a period of three months following his termination.

After Pape has served a term of 24 months as city manager the cash amount would increase to the equivalent of nine months salary which would be roughly \$29,000. However, if the city manager resigns his position voluntarily the city would have no obligation to the severance

I contacted seven towns similar to Sonora in size so I might find out how this situation is handled with their respective city managers. Of the seven contacted, Big Lake, Winters, San Saba, Junction, Llano, Menard, and Mason, none had a severance agreement with their managers. Several of the towns have dropped the titles of city manager and have gone instead to city secretary or utility director.

Back to the question of the right of the city council to enter into such an agreement without public comment, yes, they can make this decision on behalf of the City of Sonora. When a public official is elected you are actually giving them your permission to do what they feel is in your best

In order to accurately answer your last question, I contacted an attorney with the Freedom of Information Foundation.

The Executive Session is a closed meeting used primarily for the purpose of discussing personnel or legal matters. If a specific employee matter is to be discussed the employee may request to be present in the meeting. If the request is refused the employee may demand the meeting be held in open session in order that they may attend.

Citizens of Sonora and Sutton County should make an extra effort to stay in touch with the activities of the local governments and notify elected officials if they have a question about the proceedings.

When you as citizens keep in touch with the actions of your elected officials there will be less reason for conflict. If you have questions...ask, and if you don't feel the questions are being answered properly please feel free to contact the newspaper office and we will make every effort to help you find out what you want to know.

sweet, are an important part of a healthy diet. According to surveys, most people eat fresh fruit for snacks; and the banana is the most popular fruit in America, followed by apples and seedless grapes.

The USDA Food Guide Pyramid recommends two to four servings of fruit each day. For most, that's easy to do because fruit is so popular and makes such a handy snack when eaten fresh. Because it's also naturally sweet, it can serve as a dessert, substituting for higher fat and calorie-laden desserts.

Fruit gives a quick source of energy in the form of carbohydrate. Fruits and fruit juices also provide important amounts of vitamins A and C and potassium. They are low in fat and sodium. Some fruits provide a good amount of fiber, including apples, berries, figs, pears, peaches and prunes.

Serving sizes are important when interpreting the Food Guide recommendations. A service size is a particular amount of a food, not just the number of times it is eaten per day. For example, a serving size of fruit would be a small to medium orange or banana, or half

Fruits, often called nature's of a large banana; one-half cup chopped, cooked or canned fruit; and three-fourths cup juice. When selecting juices, only 100 percent fruit juice products are considered a serving. Other products such as fruit punches, ades or sodas contain only a little juice and added sugar. Fruit jellos also do not qualify.

Other tips for including fruits in the diet follow:

• Include many forms. Choose fresh fruit, fruit juice and frozen, canned or dried fruit. Go easy on fruit canned or frozen in syrup or sugar. Read the labels for content.

· Include whole fruits. They are higher in fiber than fruit juices.

· Include citrus fruits, melons and berries because they are rich in Vitamin C. We need vitamin C each day because the body does not

 Always wash fresh fruits before preparing or eating it remove any surface dirt, residue or bacteria.

Capitalize on the richness and versatility of fruits including them in meals and snacks. For more information on specific fruits contact Kelly Lewis, your local County Extension Agent-Home Economics at 387-3604.

Dr. Rogers attends Cancer Update 1993 in San Antonio

by Gene Rogers, M. D., P. A. On March 13, 1993, I attended a Cancer Update 1993 sponsored by the Baptist Memorial Hospital Center at San Antonio, Texas.

Although the exact cause of Cancer is not clearly understood, new research points to a Genetic Dysfunction either inherited or environmentally acquired which leads to Tumor formation in select areas of the body. The genes of the body control growth and development of each cell in our body; however, when the genes lose control over the multiplication of cells, rapid cell growth takes place and tumor formation occurs.

Since we are at the stage of Cancer treatment with no ability to control Tumor development, we still rely on early diagnosis and treatment as a means of achieving a cure. Early detection of a possible cancer development needs patient assistance understanding and recognition of the Seven Warning Signals of Cancer. It is important to consult your Physician if you develop:

1. CHANGE IN BOWEL OR BLADDER HABITS.

2. A SORE THAT DOES NOT

3. UNUSUAL BLEEDING OR DISCHARGE.

4. THICKENING OR LUMP IN THE BREAST OR ELSEWHERE. 5. INDIGESTION OR DIFFICULTY IN SWALLOWING.

6. OBVIOUS CHANGE IN WART OR MOLE. 7. NAGGING COUGH OR HOARSENESS.

Lung Cancer, for the past two decades has been the leading cause of Cancer Death in the United States. Antismoking campaigns have reduced Cigarette smoking to about twenty-five percent of our adult population, and this has led to a decrease in Lung Cancer. With this reduction Cancer of the Prostate in men and Cancer of the Breast in females have been increasing at an alarming rate. While there is no proven ability with these Cancers to alterunhealthy life styles (such as cessation of smoking with Lung Cancer) we must again rely on early recognition of changes in these two

Currently one out of every nine females will develop Breast Cancer. In order to assist your Doctor each woman must learn the technique of Breast Self Examination. Such examination can be learned from health clinics, Physicians office, or pamphlets from the American Cancer Society. All females twenty years or older should conduct this Breast Self Examination once a month; and should have a doctors evaluation of the Breasts once a year when a Pap Smear to screen for Pelvic Cancer is done.

Mammography should be done every two years from 40 to 50 years of age and at least yearly after age 50. More frequent mammograms are recommended by physicians on patients who have a family history of breast Cancer.

In order to aid your Physician as regards Prostate Cancer every male over age 50 should have an annual digital Rectal exam by their Physician and a laboratory exam of their blood for a Prostatic Specific Antigen (PSA). If either of these tests are abnormal further evaluation should be considered.

Cancer of the Colon has been on the increase in both males and females in the United States. While it is not an absolute preventative some Medical evidence exists that a high fiber (25 grams per day) diet may be a deterrent to the development of such cancers.

Cancer Screening and early detection offers the Cancer patient the best chance of a cure. The cure rate for all cancers is 60% or better and can be improved upon even more if all individuals are educated as to the need of this early

Some of the topics covered were: exposure risk, identification of covered employees, and different types of protective equipment (gloves, masks, etc.)

Also during the program two video's were shown concerning Hepatitis B, HIV and AIDS. At the conclusion of the presentation the first in a series of three injections were given. Maria Carrasco, RN with the Department of Health gave the injections.

The seminar was given for the Sutton County Emergency Medical Service personnel, Sutton County Sheriff's Department and City of Sonora Police Department.


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

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
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Ask the Historical Society

St. John's Episcopal Church was remodeled around 1940. Do you have any information on the emodeling.

Devil's River News, Friday, September 10, 1937 under Sutton County Is Building! we find the

No more appropriate time will present itself for the picturing of the beautiful St. John's Episcopal Church building than today -- two days before the first service is held there.

Not many months ago it was a small frame building. Today it is one of the most attractive houses of worship in this section. The building was rock veneered and remodeled throughout.

The contractor was J. T. McClelland with rock work done by G. W. Archer.

Native stone was used in rock veneering the frame structure the church formerly used. Interior remodeling was done with a new floor laid, the altar and vestry room made larger and twisted weave rugs placed in the aisle. The front of the church was revamped with two arched windows and a center entrance built. Attractive indirect lighting fixtures hang from the beam ceiling. Other indirect fixtures are on the walls. Kneeling benches have leatherette covering.

Two memorial windows of stained glass have been given and these match the former three in the church. The new ones bear the inscriptions: "W. L. Aldwell -February 17, 1859 - April 14, 1931" and "D. J. Wyatt - 1863-1929."

A circular window, one of the three memorial ones in the church before the recent work is in memory of an early day rector of the church -- "Richard R. Mercer -October 31, 1857 - August 17, 1925." The other two are in memory of -- "E. R. Jackson --February 25, 1861 - December 23, 1911" and "Thomas Bond --December 19, 1850 - April 5,

Reredos, a wooden carving replacing the curtain behind the altar, given by Mrs. J. L. Nesbit and Mrs. T. A. Williams; prayer bench, given by Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Hunt; credence shelf, given by Young Woman's Guild.



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Protect your rights! "Render" your property by March 31st.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1992. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1993.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1993 renditions is Wednesday, March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing by the March 31 deadline.

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

Any trips made by the Thunderbird must be open to the public and advertised in advance Primary funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation and is supplemented by the Texas D. O. T. and the individual cities and counties where the vehicles are

Sonora' Thunderbird operates on a daily schedule, but is also available on a demand-response basis. Fares are as follows: 50 cents per 1-way trip within the city limits; \$1.00 per 1-way trip within Sutton County; and \$3.00 round trip outside Sutton County.

Senior citizens and people with disabilities are encouraged to make donations. The Thunderbird goes to San Angelo on the third Wednesday of each month. All trips are on a first come, first served basis.

Senior Center Director, Carole Thorp serves as supervisor for the local Thunderbird and is a back up driver along with Lesa Galindo. Thorp encourages folks to call a day in advance and by 10:00 a. m. to reserve a ride for the next day. You will receive response on demand for trips to the local doctor, dentist, health department, pharmacy or other medial destination. Westerman Drug Store will pay the fare for passengers filling prescriptions there.

The Thunderbird System operates like any business and does not make runs that are not cost effective. In other words, the more the merrier! Senior citizens are required to fill out an intake form prior to their first ride. That can even be done over the phone. There is no paper work necessary for public riders.

The Thunderbird operates Monday through Friday from 8:30 to 4:30 and has the following schedule:

M-F Daily: 8:45 a. m. - 9:00 a. m. Work Run; 10:30 a. m. - 11:00 a. m. Senior Center pick up; 1:00 p. m. Senior Center return and afternoon work run.

Monday & Friday ONLY: 1:00 p. m. Bill paying, shopping and

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
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
