Now's the time to plan your prescribed burn by Tom W. Pay Soil Conservation Service Believe it or not, this is the time of the year to begin
planning for your prescribed planning for your prescribed falls in the period of DecemberMarch, but the previous growing season may be one of the mos critical times of the burning
The amount of fuel present is critical in determining how well a
fire will perform and if it will fire will perform and if it wil recommended that at least 1500 to 2000 pounds of fine fuels (mostly grasses) be available. If you are planning to burn and you deferment during the next growing season is necessary to produce the fuel required.
As part of the overall brush

When and inexpensive tool. When used properly, undesirable plants such as junipers and mesquite, pricklypear and tasajillo can be suppressed or controlled. Suppression of these and the development of a more open canopy where more desirable vegetation can grow will cut down the number of dollars spent on other, more expensive
measures.
There are two other advantages to prescribed burning. One is quality. Plants such as to foge grass become coarse and unpalatable after a short time. Periodic fires will maintain the palatability of this plant for a
longer period and therefore longer period and therefore increase utilization. The other resprouting of desirable browse
plants such as liveoak and elbow
bush. Most liveoak motts in this bush. Most liveoak motts in this
part of the state have very little no resprouting because of the grazing by goats and deer, but with proper stocking in conjunction with a fire and deferment, desirable woody plants will come back and provide additional forage. Prescribed burns are not
wildfires. Prescribed burns are wildfires. Prescribed burns are
well planned and carried out under specific conditions. Proper planning before and adherance to the plan after the burn are essential. Deferment of pastures, proper grazing use and
correct stock numbers are all part of the planning process. For more information or assistance, contact the local Soil Conservation Service. Programs
