

## Guild to display artwork at Theater

West Texas Art Guild members are displaying their artwork at the Covered Wagon Dinner Theatre each Saturday night from June 12 through August 14.

The artwork can be viewed from 6:15 p. m. and throughout the performances at the Caverns of Sonora.

Artists who are participating are David Carraway, Jeanne Davenport, Barbara Earwood, Mary L. Gilly, Charlotte Higdon, Ron Nicholas, Jo Ann Pape, Pauline Ringgold, Susie Schneider, Elvie Turney and Lucy Ward.

The first artist to display works on June 12 are Barbara Earwood and Elvie Turney.

Life on the Texas ranch where the Earwoods raise some of the finest wool and mohair in the world is depicted in watercolors and drawings by Barbara Earwood. "The antics of the lambs and kids are always exciting to me," she says.

Born in New England, and a graduate of Woodward School of Quincy, Massachusetts and the Washington School of Art, Port Washington, NY, she has continued studies at Angelo State and with many notable artists.

Her 12x5-1/2 foot montage, portraying the simultaneous growth of Sonora and the bank, hangs permanently in the Founder's Room of the First National Bank of Sonora. She designed the Sutton County Logo that was used extensively for the sesquicentennial state celebration.

Earwood's favorite medium is watercolor with its "tremendous challenge." She is included in the 1981-82 American Artist of Renown, the 1984-85 edition of Notable Women of Texas and the New Historical Encyclopedia of Texas. Her work has been selected for numerous juried shows and been awarded top honors. These include: Texas Fine Arts Association, Texas Watercolor Society, Museum of the Southwest, Abilene Fine Arts Association, Southwestern Watercolor Society, and Laguna Gloria Museum in Austin.

Earwood is a charter member of the West Texas Art Guild and serves on the Board of Directors.

Elvie Turney was raised on her family's ranch near Loma Alta, Texas. She graduated from Del Rio High School and furthered her education at the University of Texas an Fairmount Junior College in Washington, D. C. She married Jack Turney, a rancher from Sonora, Texas, and was an accomplished cook, seamstress,

cub scout leader, and private pilot before taking on the job of mother to their two children. While living near Quemado, Texas Elvie served as a school trustee for the Eagle Pass Independent School District and was involved in many other civic organizations that included being an officer of the PTA and a leader for 4-H activities.

Through the years she dabbled in art when she could, taking from various artists that included: Lou McNealy, Rocksprings, Texas; Paul Kim, Rusty Horseshoe Gallery, Alpine, Texas; Jim Shafer, formerly of Cuero, now of Lamesa, Texas; Billie Barnes, Houston, Texas; Janice Porter Walden formerly of Uvalde, Texas; and Robert Abbett, wildlife artist from Connecticut and Arizona. Most recently she traveled from Colorado to Kentucky and all over Texas to learn the art of portraiture from Frank Covino, who graduated from the Pratt Institute of Art in New York City with a Masters degree in teaching art. Frank had a studio in Fairfield, Connecticut for many years, but now makes his home in Waitsfield, Vermont. Elvie is the coordinator for Frank Covino workshops in Sonora, and his religious workshops in Hunt, Texas.

## Sonora to continue solid waste management

At a special meeting held last week, the Sonora City Council voted to keep the city's landfill open, as well as continuing to provide solid waste collection. The city had been considering closing the landfill, as well as a proposal from Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) to take over city garbage collection.

Stringent new state and federal regulations, scheduled to take effect in October, will significantly increase operating costs for the landfill. However, after evaluating the cost of implementing the new regulations, as well as the BFI proposal, the city opted to retain solid waste services as a city

The solid waste issue has been a topic at numerous city council meetings over the past few months, as well as a recent town meeting. During the lengthy discussions, it was noted that the city has evaluated numerous alternatives, including incineration, compaction, and shredding to reduce the waste stream and extend the life of the landfill.

"The cost of solid waste collection is going to increase whether the city continues to provide the service, or whether we contract with a private vendor," explained Sonora City Manager John Pape. "The city has worked hard to keep our rates low. Unfortunately, meeting these new state and federal mandates is going to be extremely expensive."

Pape explained that part of the reasoning to retain solid waste disposal as a city function was a concern by the Council over the ability of low-income and elderly residents to pay higher bills. The city hopes to be able to "phase in" cost increases over a period of time, allowing local residents to adjust to the additional costs.

It was stressed that city garbage fees will not be immediately affected. Any increase will be considered by the city council as a part of the city's budget preparation process for the 1994 fiscal year.

## etters to the Editor

In March of this year, we onducted our annual monitor well testing program. Our monitor well program consists of approximately sixty (60) wells. We test approximately one-third of these on a rotational basis every three years. This year we tested 21 wells of which 2 were private tests.

As a cost-savings measure to the District, the manager collected and prepared all the samples to be sent to a commercial laboratory in College Station, Texas. These samples were analyzed for over thirty (30) constituents each.

## **Ask the Historical Society**

What was happening around here in June of 1919?

Devil's River News, June 7, 1919 contained the following stories:

June opens cool. A fifth of an inch of rain Monday opened the June precipitation. It was accompanied by north wind and a noticeable drop in temperature. Thirty miles east sleet was reported.

Oil wells are being drilled on all sides of Sutton County but Sutton County is being neglected. It is possible that large oil interests have been holding this county as a reserve.

Miss Marie Lawrey graduated this session of the College of Industrial Arts at Deaton.

Ed Mayfield returned from San Antonio this week where he had his tonsils cut out.

J. G. Barton returned from Marfa Saturday, where he left Mrs. Barton and the bosy who will visit Mrs. Barton's parents Mr. and Mrs. Jim Green for a few weeks.

L. O. Farris, of Company M. 144th Infantry, arrived home arrived in New York May 9th and was discharged at Fort Sam Houston on June 3rd. He says Jack Skaggs who went from Sonora with him, was killed in France, but as far as he knows the others who joined Company M came out alive. Farris was only 17 when he volunteered nearly two years ago.

W. B. Adams, the North Llano stockman-farmer, received a wire Tuesday announcing the arrival of his son Earl Adams at New York. Earl Adams was a member of Company A 343 Machine gun Battalion, 99th Division and may be expected

home in a few weeks. William Jackson Wilkinson, the oldest of Menard's surviving pioneers left this life on May 15th, 1919. Mr. Wilkinson was born in Mississippi, November 29, 1828, came to Coleman County, Texas in 1860, there engaged in the cattle business. In 1868 he married Martha Spiller and shortly thereafter they moved to Menard County and established the old Wilkinson

ranch on the San Saba river below Menard. Here Mrs. Wilkinson died. Of this union were born two children, Neal and Carrie. In 1875 he married Nannie Myres, there being born to them nine children: Emma, Alice, Willie, Lamar, Frank, Arch, Charlie, Earnest and Edgar. The three daughters are married. Carrie to J. E. Eisenwein of Pecos, Emma to Ed. L. Mears of Menard and Alice to Max Russell of Talpa. In 1879 the family moved to Clear Creek the present Wilkinson home. Menard Messenger.

He served three years during the Civil War under Morgan's command in the Southern Army.
