Cocaine seized in two routine stops

On July 10th Texas State Trooper Norbert Ortiz was on routine patrol 19 miles east of Sonora. Trooper Ortiz stopped a 1993 Chevrolet pickup for an equipment violation. The driver, a white female, was identified as April Camille Sepeda of El Paso. The passenger was identified as Ronda Ann Palmer, also of El Paso.

After talking to the pair, Ortiz determined a search of the vehicle would be necessary. Both Sepeda and Palmer refused to sign a written consent to search the vehicle.

Both Sepeda and Palmer were brought back to Sonora. They were released and the vehicle was held in order for the U. S. Customs drug detection dog to arrive from Del Rio. After the dog was alerted to the vehicle, Sutton County Justice of the Peace Adelita Smalling issued a search and seizure warrant of the 1993 Chevrolet pickup.

Once inside the vehicle, 50.5 grams of powdered cocaine, 2 rocks of "crack" and a small amount of marijuana, as well as drug paraphernalia were found. Since the subjects were released earlier on July 10th, Ortiz stated warrants had been issued for their arrest for possession of a controlled substance. The 1993 Chevrolet pickup was seized along with \$112 in U. S. currency.

The following day, July 11, Trooper Ortiz and Trooper Ruben Terrones were working four miles east of Sonora. Ortiz stopped a 1991 Nissan driven by Steve Estrada Vargas of Ozona.

Upon speaking to Vargas, written consent to search the Vargas vehicle was received. The search revealed 5 grams of powdered cocaine and less than 2 ounces of marijuana. Also seized was \$289 in U. S. currency.

Vargas was booked into the Sutton County Jail and released the following day on \$22,000 bond.

1993 football season set to begin Aug. 4

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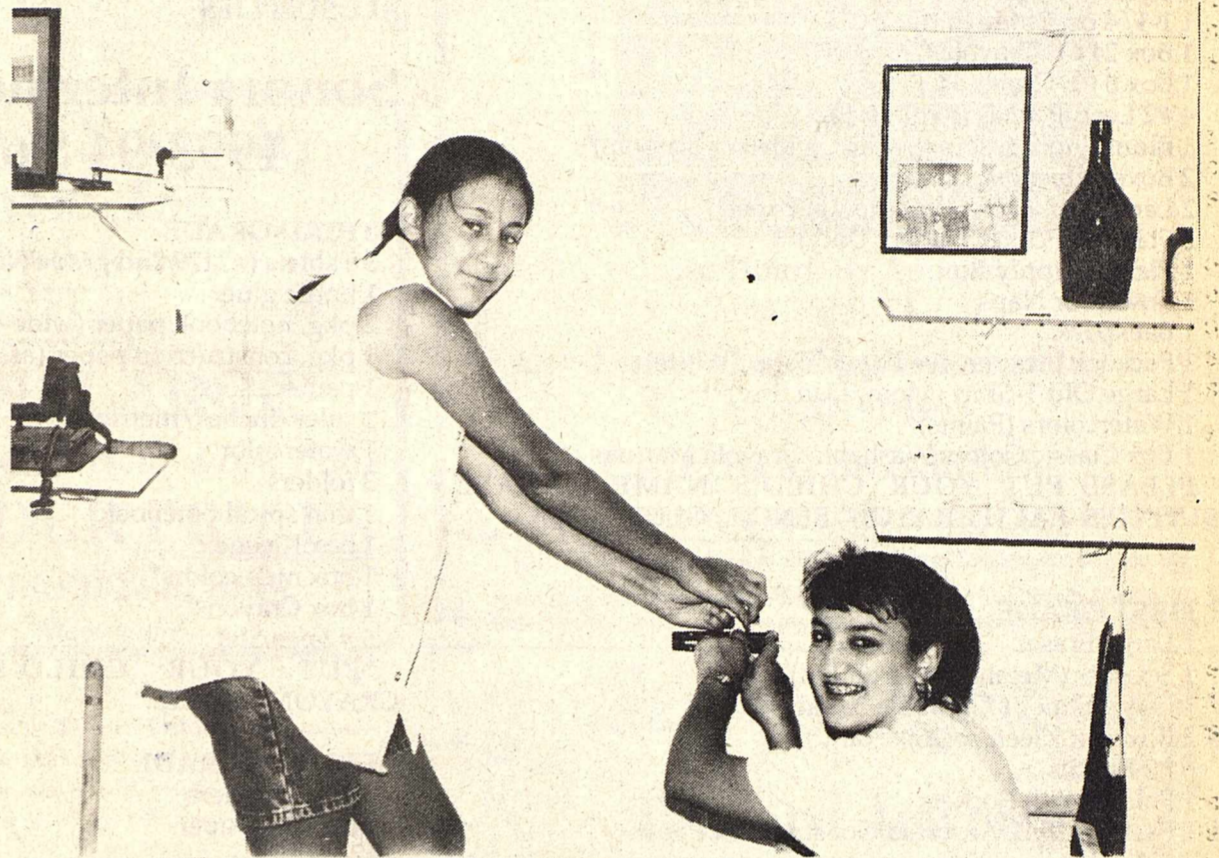
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All high school players should have received a letter with some paperwork that should be filled out and turned in on August 4, 1993. If you plan on playing this year and did not get a letter,

CWDT to feature country music recording artist, Steven Fromholz

The entertainment for Saturday's performance of the Covered Wagon Dinner Theater will include Steven Fromholz, country music recording artist, and Biscuits O'Bryan, chuckwagon storyteller and cowboy poet.

Steven Fromholz is a singer, songwriter, storyteller, actor, comedian, playwright and white water river guide in pursuit of a fulfilling career in any of the above. Steven has been around since the mountains were small and there weren't many stars.

As a songwriter, Fromholz stands with the best. Michael Murphy calls Steven "Texas' finest songwriter." In Kirk Dooley's "Book of Texas' Best", he names Steven's "Texas Trilogy" the best song ever written about Texas. His songs have been recorded by John Denver, Michael Murphy, Hoyt Axton, Jerry Jeff Walker and Willie Nelson. Steven has received two platinum records for his

efforts. Steven has recorded eight albums of his music for ABS, Capitol, Lone Star and his own, Felicity Records.

Steven Fromholz, the actor, has appeared in four stage plays in Austin, Texas and is a regular performer with Esther's Traveling Follies (an Austin based musical comedy group). His film appearances include a co-starring role opposite Stephanie Rasco in the critically acclaimed physcho-drama thriller, "Positive I.D."

"Bosque County, Texas," a play written by Steven and his partner, Don Toner, opened March 27, 1992 at the Live Oak Theater in Austin. The play based upon Steven's song "Texas Trilogy" is Steven's first and certainly not his last. "Bosque County, Texas" broke all box office records for the Live Oak Theater.

An evening in a club with Fromholz on stage presents at least as much of his bawdy, bodacious humor as it does his remarkable singing and song writing talents. Steven's humor is a quick-witted, ad lib, comeback style of funny that makes his audience really feel a part of the evenings entertainment. He sings songs in a rich baritone; sort of a blend of honey, rum, and pipe tobacco and can be big and boisterous on one tune and tender and touching on

the next. He has a knack for the ballads.

Since 1985, Steven has become a trained professional river guide on the white water rivers of Mexico, New Mexico, Arizona, Wyoming and the Big Bend of Texas. He can be found, five or six times a year, on a river bank in a canyon, sitting with his guitar on a beer cooler near a camp fire pickin' and singin' and tellin' stories for fifteen or twenty people who would rather hear Fromholz on a river bank in a canyon than any place else on earth.

The Rev. Monte Jones of Sonora said he created Biscuits O'Bryan - a cowboy campfire cook character - on stage during the first Covered Wagon Dinner Theater (amphitheater located at the Caverns of Sonora grounds) using costumes, make-up and his voice. Actually, he was a "real" life campfire cook in his early days and what knowledge he didn't retain from experience, some recipes come from research.

Jones admits to never completely taking off his priest's "hat" even when he's wearing the cowboy felt hat.

Jones says the two characters of his life have given him the opportunity to cross over between his storytelling Biscuits and his role as an Episcopal priest.

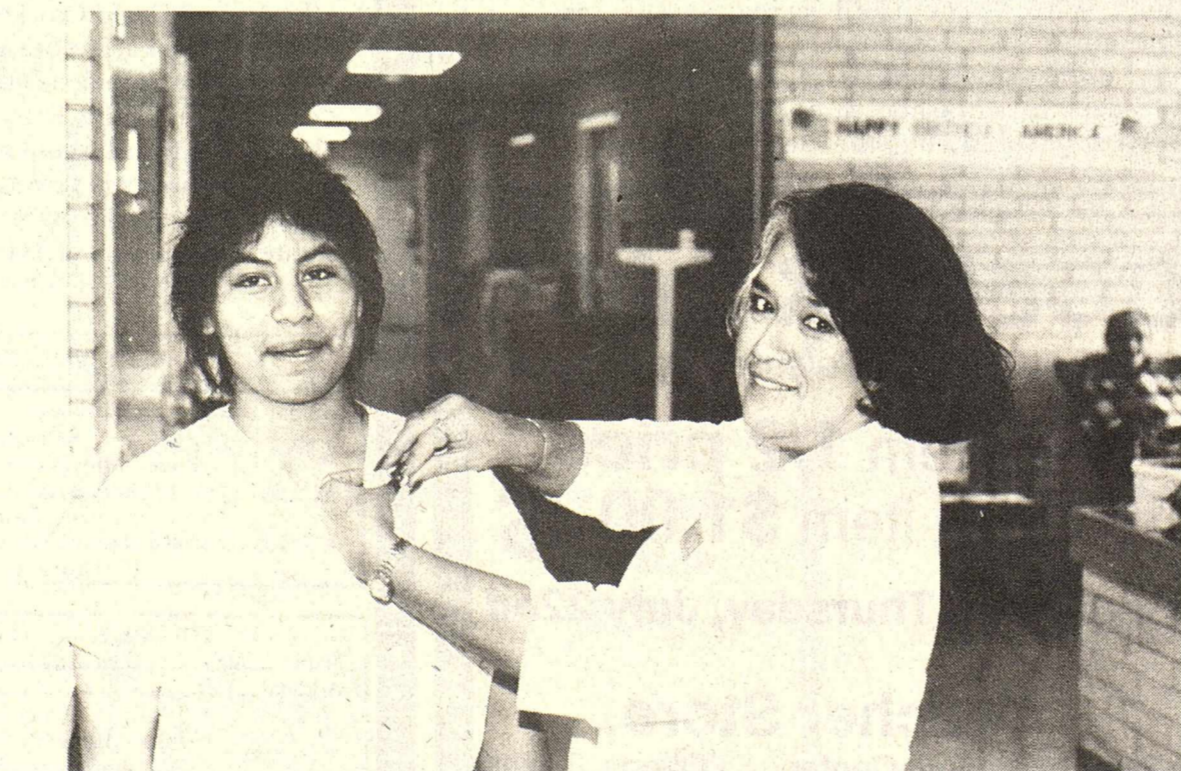
Nicholas/Carraway to show work at CWDT

USDA seeks comments on 1993 support prices for wool and mohair

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation is asking the public to comment on how to calculate the support price for wool on unshorn lambs and the level of support for mohair for the 1993 marketing year.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, provides that the support price for pulled wool -- the wool removed from the pelt of a slaughtered sheep -- be set at a level relative to the support price for shorn wool that will maintain pulled wool marketing practices. This provision was implemented in the past through payments based on the weight of live, unshorn lambs.

The law also provides that the mohair price supports be set at a level to maintain about the same percentage of parity

as for shorn wool and that the support price be set not more than 15 percent above or below the comparable percentage of parity for shorn wool.

The shorn wool support price is based on a formula prescribed in the law. Based on the current reported parity index, the 1993 shorn wool support price will be \$2.04 per pound (grease basis).

The complete proposed regulations were scheduled to be published in the July 14 Federal Register.

Public comments on the proposed regulations must be received by August 13, 1993, and should be sent to: Director, Fibers and Rice Analysis Division, USDA/ASCS, Room 3760-S, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C., Phone: (202) 720-6734.

A preliminary regulatory impact analysis on the options is also available from that office.

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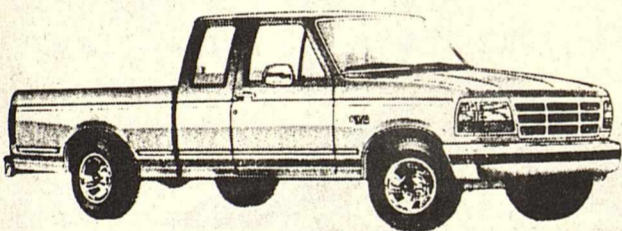
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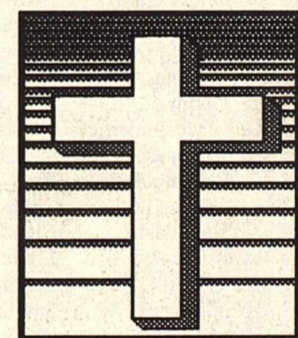

BOOK REVIEWS - LEGACY OF SECRETS by Elizabeth Adler

Mammography can save your life through early detection

MAMMOGRAPHY: Can save your life through early detection of breast cancer. Mammography, an X-ray of the breast, has become vital to the earlier diagnosis of breast cancer. It can detect extremely small breast cancers-ones that have usually not spread to regional lymph nodes. The earlier breast cancer is discovered, and the smaller it is at the time of discovery, the better the chance for cure. Such small cancers have a very high cure rate.

WHAT IS MAMMOGRAPHY? It is an X-ray that creates an image of the breast. The result is called a mammogram. The procedure usually consists of two views of each breast.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS? It can find cancers too small to be felt by the woman herself or by the most experienced physician. Mammography also shows other changes in breast tissue that could represent a sign of very early cancer. A baseline mammogram is of value because it can be referred to for later comparison. In combination with physical examination, mammography has been proven effective in saving lives--especially in women over the age of 50 who do not have symptoms. And, due to technical advances, it can be expected to improve the survival rates of breast cancer in younger women, particularly those 35 to 49.

ARE THERE RISKS? In the last few years, the amount of radiation needed to produce a high-quality mammogram has been lowered significantly. In trained hands, this low level places mammography in an acceptably safe range. While scientists do not know absolutely what the long-term effects of low radiation may be, it appears that the risk of causing cancer many years

later is exceedingly small; probably negligible. Also, evidence suggests that radiation exposure after the age of 35 has far less potential for harm than in younger age groups. The ACS believes that any risk, not matter how small, must be weighed against potential benefits. All valuable medical procedures carry some element of risk. Every day physicians weigh the benefits versus the risks of various medical procedures.

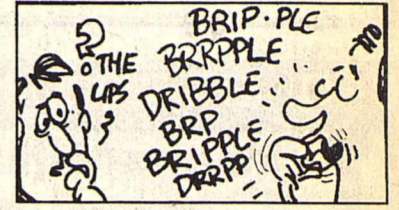
WHAT IF I HAVE SYMPTOMS? If you do, see your doctor soon. If your doctor says you need mammography, do it without hesitation. Important symptoms might include a lump or thickening; change in contour of the breasts; dimpling, scaling or puckering of the skin around the nipple, secretion from the nipples, or any other changes from what has been normal for you.

WHAT IF I DON'T HAVE SYMPTOMS? Mammography can be of special benefit to women as part of regular cancer-related checkups. For women with no symptoms, the ACS advises certain guidelines for the earlier detection of breast cancer: Women between the ages of 20-40 should perform breast self-examinations (BSE) every

month and have a breast examination by a physician every three years. Begin mammography by age 40. Those 40 or over should do BSE once a month, have a physical breast exam every year, and a mammogram every year routinely after age 50. Women age 40 to 49 should do BSE once a month, have a physical breast exam every year, and a mammogram every year routinely after age 50. Women age 40 to 49 should have one every one to two years.

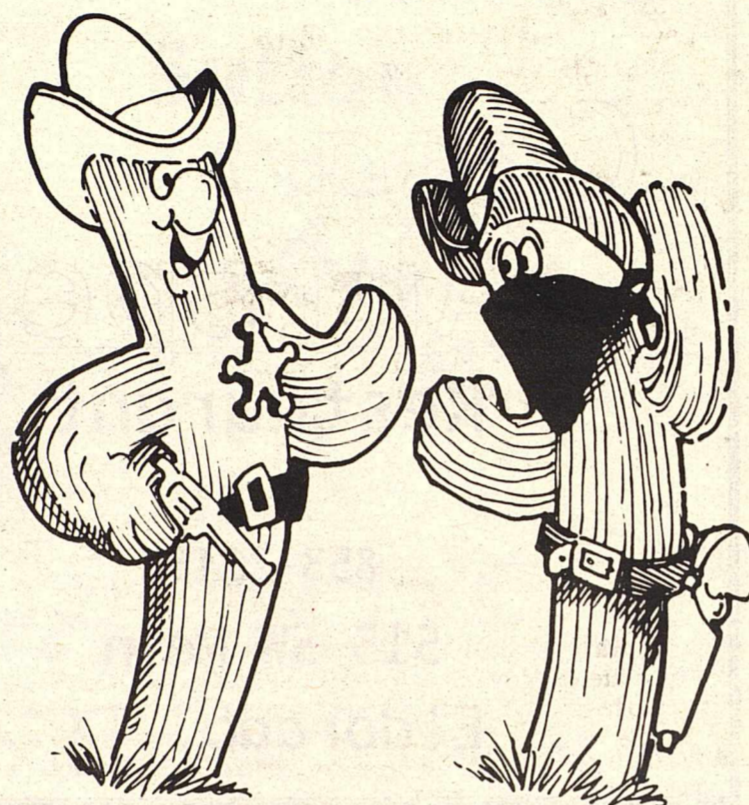
The pristine beauty of the Caverns of Sonora is beyond compare. This cavern is truly a photographers delight.
