Bronco's kick off football season

Coach Bob Bellard enters his fourth year as head coach of the Sonora Broncos with several nagging questions that will only be answered when the Broncos kick off the 1993 season at Wall Friday night at 7:30.

Can the Broncos return to the playoffs for the fourth straight time?

Will Joey Guerra be able to build on an excellent 1992 season?

Who will emerge as a replacement for departed quarterback Brian Ferris?

Can the young defense stand up to the challenges they will face in the always tough District 6-3A?

"We can have an excellent season if we are able to work together as a team," said coach Bellard. The Broncos have been picked to finish 5th in the 6 team district by the coaches and second, third or fourth by writers in various preseason publications. "We have a wide open district in which any team can emerge as the favorites."

A key for the Broncos will be the play of running back junior, Joey Guerra. Joey is a quiet and hard working back who is willing to do whatever

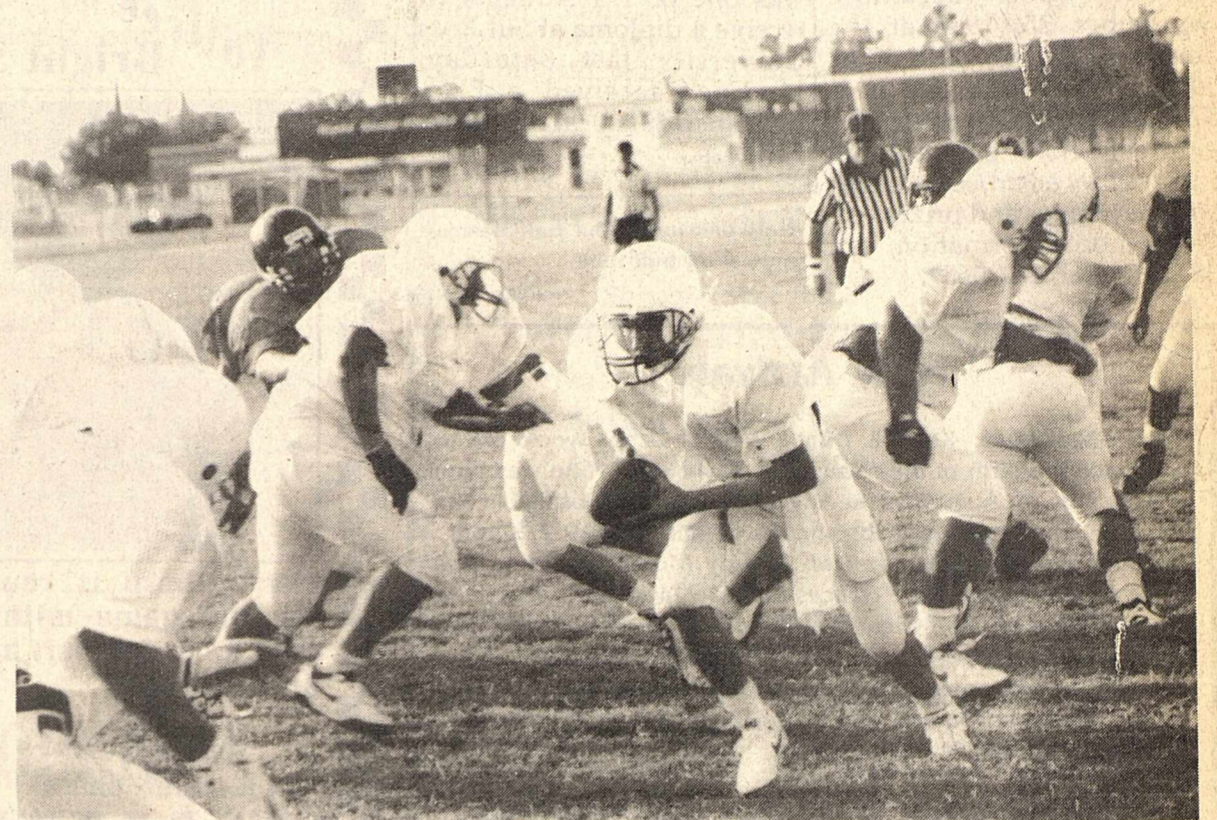
it takes to win. He is reluctant to accept the accolades that come with being a thousand yard plus rusher. After every solid performance last year he bent over backwards in making sure that the Lions' share of the credit went to his offensive line. Not that Joey is afraid to step up and take responsibility for the offense. He likes carrying the football.

Gabriel Perez will be the fullback. Do not be surprised to see Perez carry the ball more than previous Bronco fullbacks. He has quickness and is not afraid to get into the mix of things.

At quarterback converted wide-out Hadley Smith, a junior, has been competing for the starting job with last year's JV quarterback, Jason Morley. Both will probably see a lot of snaps.

Wade Spain returns as a likely target for whoever emerges as the "QB". Spain, an all district candidate, has experience and sure hands.

One of the strengths of the Broncos offense will be the "big three", the center of the line. Joel Cox will return at center and be surrounded by Jamie Espinosa and Trini Banda as the guards. This

senior trio can be counted on to provide more than adequate support for both the running and passing games.

The defense was decimated with the loss of 9 players to graduation. The strength of

the defense will be in the secondary where Guerra, Spain and Smith return. The line and the linebackers will be inexperienced. The coaches believe, though, that by the time that the district

schedule arrives, they will be battle tested and ready.

"We're ready to go. This will be an exciting team and season. We look forward to our great fan support." Bellard said.

County taxes to see a decrease

Sutton County Commissioner's Court met in special session on Monday, August 23, 1993, to approve the county budget and set the tax rate for the upcoming tax year. After hearing reports on fund balances and approving various expenditure requests for the upcoming fiscal year, the Court, comprised of Commissioners Miguel Villanueva, John Wade, Bill Keel, Ernest Barrera, and County Judge Carla Garner, voted unanimously to lower the county's tax rate for the upcoming tax year. The taxing rate for 1992 was set

at a total of .38706 per \$100 valuation of property. The 1993 tax rate was set at a total of .37435 per \$100 property valuation. This amount, due to an increase in total value, should bring the county the same amount of money as it received in taxes last year. The Commissioners commended the various department heads in the county for holding their expenditures down, and for cooperating fully in the effort to keep the tax rate down, and provide some relief to the tax-payers in Sutton County. Several budget employees (who have

not had a pay increase in some 3 years) were turned down by the Commissioners in order to keep expenditures at a lower level. The Court expressed the sentiment that, due to the increase in the value of many people's property, these taxpayers would feel an even greater burden if the tax rate were not lowered by Commissioners' Court, especially in light of the fact that school taxes most likely will be forced to increase due to state formulas and mandating, all of which are beyond the control of the local officials.

City to get new pool

Meeting in Austin last Thursday, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) approved a grant in the amount of \$269,000 for the construction of a new municipal swimming pool for the City of Sonora. Because of the timing of the grant, construction of the new facility will not be scheduled until after the pool closes for the 1994 season.

"The City Council and I are all very excited about receiving this grant," Sonora Mayor Lemuel Lopez said upon receiving word of the funding approval. "Our municipal swimming pool is the only public-access swimming facility in the county, and is a vital part of this community's summer recreation."

Over thirty grant applications were submitted to the TPWD, with the Sonora municipal pool being one of the few projects ultimately funded. TPWD staff had high praise for the city staff

members who prepared the grant, at one point noting that the application was one of the "best submitted in the past nine years." Those involved in the application included City Manager John Pape, Public Works Director Jim Garrett, City Secretary Becky Covington, Pool Manager Melissa Teaff, and Consulting Engineer Scott D. Hay.

"The current pool was built in 1964 and is experiencing some serious leakage problems," City Manager John Pape explained. "We have been working on this project since last November, and it is gratifying to see this funding come through."

When completed, the new pool complex will include a greatly-enlarged swimming area, accessibility for physically-disabled persons, and a completely new bathhouse. It is estimated that the new pool will easily serve the community's water recreation needs for at least thirty years.

Sonora Junior High is grant recipient

Sonora Junior High is the recipient of the 1993-'95 grant award from Carnegie to facilitate fundamental systemic change in curriculum, instruction and assessment. SJHS is one of four Junior High Schools selected in Texas to participate in this project.

Participation in this project represents a two year commitment. Year 1 will consist of 11 days of intensive

staff development in Austin with Dr. Sandra Kaplan. Participants will develop high quality curriculum for use in their classrooms. Year 2 will involve providing inservice for the rest of the campus staff and participation in state wide training during the summer.

Sandra Kaplan, CEO of the National State Leadership Institute, Los Angeles, has consented to serve as

personal on-site consultant. Dr. Kaplan is widely

recognized as one of the leading authorities in the nation on thematic interdisciplinary curriculum.

The grant covers all travel, lodging, meals, substitutes, and training for the 12 academic teachers, Region XV consultants in Middle Grade and Gifted Education, and the campus principal.

HOTS students bury "I can't"

HOTS is a general thinking skills program for students that generates gains in basic skills while also improving thinking ability and social confidence.

HOTS combines the use of computers with a sophisticated curriculum and Socratic techniques - teaching by asking probing questions -- to produce a dramatic

improvement in the student's confidence, their problem -- solving strategies and their grades. Student scores on the state's achievement tests improve also because the

students are prepared to meet the challenge of the higher order thinking skills questions.

Educators believe the results of this approach will not slight the importance of

facts, but will actually help in their retention by enabling students to perceive useful patterns into which otherwise isolated facts fit. Students are challenged to link or relate facts to something in their own experience, and use them in problem solving.

I knew that look from volunteering on the ambulance when I was in high school here. Something was wrong - I could not take the anti-venom.

I was given a shot to numb the pain during the ambulance

Q. When was the Hotel McDonald built and how many years did it operate?

A. Devil's River News, September 12, 1891

Geo. H. McDonald late of Mills County bought the Steagall Ranch near Lost Lake for \$1500. (The McDonald family were engaged in ranching for several years after coming to Sutton County.)

Devil's River News, September 28, 1895

F.M. Wyatt bought the lumber for his new two story hotel, in Kerrville last week. The building will be built on the corner opposite the Devil's River News office (SE corner of Main and Concho). Although the plans are not yet prepared we can state that the building will be large, substantial and well built and will improve the appearance of Sonora.

Devil's River News, October 12, 1895

Four wagon loads of lumber for the Wyatt Hotel, came in from Kerrville this week.

Devil's River News, November 12, 1895

Lumber for the F.M. Wyatt Hotel has been delayed owing to the heavy roads. This building will cost between \$1500 and \$2000.

Devil's River News, February 29, 1896

S.W. Stephenson the well-known barber and painter, met with a serious accident Friday morning while painting the cornice of the Wyatt Hotel.. his ladder slipped and he fell to the ground breaching his right leg between the ankle and knee.

Devil's River News, April 25, 1896

Sonora Business Directory lists the Wyatt Hotel under Hotels and Geo. H. McDonald under General Merchandise.

Devil's River News, March 6, 1897

Stop at the Wyatt Hotel, Everything New and First Class, Charges Reasonable. F.M. Wyatt, Proprietor, Sonora, Texas.

Sutton County Deed Records, Vol. 4, page 47,

shows transfer of Lot 1 and 24 feet of Lot 2, Block I, from F.M. Wyatt to Mr. and Mrs. Geo. H. McDonald.

According to the Sutton County History 1887-1977, after the death of Mr. McDonald, Mrs. Josie McDonald continued to run the hotel until her death in 1956. The hotel was leased for a few years and was finally closed November 6, 1963 after being in business 67 years.

The empty old building quickly fell into disrepair from neglect and vandalism and was finally torn down to make way for the First National Bank.
