City Hosts Elected Officials

The City of Sonora played host to over sixty elected and appointed officials last week when the Texas Municipal League (TML) Region 6 Conference was held at the Clint Langford Memorial 4-H Center. Participants came from throughout the Concho Valley region, as well as the Big Country region around Abilene.

Susan Horton, State Executive Counsel for the Texas Municipal League, delivered the keynote address at the conference. Ms. Horton discussed recent legislation affecting Texas cities and towns, as well as upcoming issues concerning municipal governments. Mayor H. L. "Bud" Gober of Brady, current Region 6 President, was presiding officer for the meeting.

"Attracting this kind of conference to Sonora is part of our overall plan to increase tourism and stimulate the local

economy," explained Sonora Mayor Lemuel Lopez. "This kind of event not only brings revenue into the community, but gives us a chance to show others what Sonora has to offer."

Lopez and City Manager John Pape presented Sonora's bid to host the conference at the organization's Spring meeting in Eastland. Region 6 of the TML includes a twenty-county region extending from Sutton County to Haskell County. A total of fifty-seven cities, serving a population of over 310,000 people, belong to the regional association.

While at the conference, many of the attendees took advantage of local attractions, including tours of the Caverns of Sonora, golf outings, and other activities. At the conclusion of the conference, delegates selected the City of Coleman as the site for their Spring meeting.

Broncos Face Kermit

The Sonora Bronco Varsity Football team was stung 34 to 14 by the Yellowjackets of Kermit. Though they played well for the first half, Sonora looked on in horror as Kermit ran off 20 straight points in the second half.

Kermit was led by the play of quarterback Devalon Bryant who led the Jackets with 125 rushing yards and was 5 of 9 passing for 54 yards. Sonora had some excellent individual plays on offense and at times was solid on defense but for the fifth time this season the Broncos were consistent for only one half and were unable to do much in the other half.

The Yellowjackets kicked the opening kickoff to Sonora and the first disaster of the evening struck against the Broncos on just the second play of the game, when Sonora fumbled the ball. The ball was recovered by Wesley Jamison. It took just 5 plays for the Jackets to score on a 10 yard run by Bryant. Lamont Weaver's kick was good.

Sonora and Kermit then traded punts. Sonora's defense looked strong on this series. Freshman Justin House, Trini Banda and Casey Fitzgerald all did well on the series. On Sonora's offensive possession, Joey Guerra had a fantastic 65 yard run for an apparent touchdown, called back by a holding penalty.

Sonora's first score for the half came as the buzzer sounded, ending the first quarter. The drive was highlighted by the running of Gilbert Vara and Guerra, and a 25 yard pass play from Jason Morely to Wade Spain. The score came, following two Vara runs of 10 yards each, on a one yard dive by Guerra. Trini Banda's kick tied the score.

The second quarter was also close. Sonora was able to pin the Jackets back at the 7 yard line on the ensuing kickoff. House and Adam Esquivel tackled Garron Halterman at the 14 and a holding penalty moved the ball to the 7. It was then that the Jackets offense went to work. On an 11 play 93 yard drive, Kermit kept the ball on the ground. Bryant and Edward Draughan combined for most of the yards. The score came on a 5 yard run by Draughan. The PAT was good and Kermit was leading 14 to 7.

It took Sonora just 2 plays to tie the game up once again, following an excellent kickoff return by Lewis Massey to the 38. On the first play from scrimmage, Marcus Montez made a 2 yard gain. Then the Jackets were hit for 2 penalties on the same play, a five yard inadvertent face mask penalty was followed by a 15 yard



unsportsman-like conduct penalty. On the next play, Joey Guerra sprinted down the right sideline for 40 yards and the touchdown. He followed some outstanding blocks and ran over Draughan at the 10. Again Banda hit the extra point to knot the game up at 14.

Neither team was able to generate any offense for the rest of the half.

Sonora kicked to Kermit to start the second half. On its first possession Kermit began to move the ball, but the drive was stopped when the Jackets fumbled at the Sonora 30. Montez made the recovery of the fumble. Sonora was unable to move the ball and was forced to punt the ball back to Kermit at the 6:03 mark. After the Sonora punt by Rhett Johnson, the Yellowjackets took the ball 53 yards on 6 plays, and for a score with 3:33 left in the quarter. The touchdown came on a 21 yard pass from Bryant to Bubba Bowerman. The point after kick by Weaver was good.

Sonora was unable to hold the ball as they fumbled on the second play, following the kick at the 30. Justin House again showed a lot of promise for the future with a great tackle for a 5 yard loss on the first play from scrimmage. On the next play,

House and Davis Hale combined to throw Bryant for another 5 yard loss. The next play Bryant threw a pass too strong, intended for Halterman. The Brent Mitchell punt was for only 22 yards.

Sonora took the ball and began to march the ball down the field moving the ball 30 yards. Just as it seemed that Sonora would drive the ball to score, disaster struck again. As Sonora began an option sweep with 12 seconds left in the half, Halterman intercepted the option pitch and returned the ball 60 yards for a touchdown. The point after kick was stopped by Casey Fitzgerald and Montez. Sonora was unable to mount another drive during the half. Kermit's final score came at the 3:17 point, following a 25 yard drive. Kermit blocked a Sonora punt and they recovered the ball at the 25. The score, which came on a seven yard run by Halterman, took just six plays to come. The PAT was good. The final score was Kermit 34, Sonora 14.

Sonora will play the Greenwood Rangers in Midland Friday night at 7:30. Greenwood is also 1 and 1 in district play and is coming off a 33 to 14 loss to state ranked and District 6-3A defending Champ Reagan County.

In recognition of the importance of private property rights in Texas, the FLBA of Sonora is commemorating the first annual Landowner's Rights Week. "As agricultural lenders, our objective is to improve the income and well being of American farmers and ranchers," said Association President Jack B. Smith, Jr. "We support the rights of property owners to be able to produce and make a living on their land. Laws such as the Endangered Species Act and Clean Water Act are lowering land values, impacting tax bases and creating compulsory land use situations which are not in the best interest of our stockholders or the rural communities in which they live. "These detrimental laws and regulations in turn affect financial institutions' ability to serve the credit needs of agriculture," he added. "If these issues are not addressed properly and fairly, the very fabric and economy of this nation will suffer." Of the 130 million acres of land in Texas, 97 percent is privately owned. JV Broncos VS. Lake View Chiefs

The Sonora High School Junior Varsity Football team traveled to San Angelo and faced class AAAA Lakeview Thursday. Though they played well, and were in the ball game until the end, the Broncos came up the losing side by a score of 17-16.
"We played our guts out and left them on the field, the only thing that would have been sweeter would have been a win. As it was, we are proud of each and every player," said JV assistant coach, Drew Cox.
The Broncos were not

able to move the ball on their first possession. On the first Chief's possession, they were able to move down the field. In fact, they had moved the ball to the 10 yard line and seemed to be moving for a score when John Jones stepped up to make a crunching tackle, separating the ball from the ball carrier. Caleb Barker jumped on the loose ball giving the ball back to the Broncos. "That was an awesome hit," said John Creek, Sonora head JV coach. "It really got us up, stopping them like that, it gave our defense some confidence."

Sonora was unable to move the ball on its second possession, and again the ball went to the chiefs. It was another opportunity for the JV defense to shine. This time it was Frankie Vagara who stepped up to make the play when he intercepted a Lakeview pass at the 25.
Sonora again had trouble moving the ball on offense, and again, the chiefs got the ball. On the second consecutive possession, Vagara stopped the Chiefs with an interception.
Both defenses continued to dominate the game until

Lakeview was able to score on a fourth and fifteen play at the 22 with 42 seconds left in the half and converted the two point try, giving them an 8-0 lead that appeared to be safe at the half. The only problem was that no one told the Broncos, who took the ball and drove for a score in just 42 seconds.
After covering the kickoff at the 46, Sonora Quarterback Caleb Barker hit Coley Thompson on a 20 yard fly pattern. On the next play, Barker again completed an excellent pass play. This time it was Chad Bruns who made the catch for plus seven yards. With 12 seconds left, Barker dropped back and threw the ball this time to Raymond Rainer for 8 yards. With just four seconds left on the clock, Barker hit Rainer once again. This time give him six! Touchdown Sonora. Barker converted the two point try bringing the score to 8-8 as the half ended.

As the second half opened, the Broncos fumbled the opening kickoff, giving the Chiefs a chance to break back on top. Once more, though, the Bronco defense would have none of that. As the Chiefs began to try to move the ball, the Broncos defense, this time led by Mike House, pushed the Lakeview side back to its 31 and forced a punt.

The teams continued to battle again defensively. The good giving the Chiefs the lead and the game.

The Bronco JV are now 5 and 1 for the year and will face Wall this Thursday (today) at 5:00 (freshman) and 6:30 p.m.

Water District Sponsors Youth at Water Camp

The Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District sponsored a local youth for the third annual Texas State 4-H Water Camp held July 18-23, 1993 at Monahans, Texas. This Camp was limited to 15 boys and 15 girls entering their sophomore, junior or senior year of high school. Those interested in attending the camp were asked to submit an application along with a one-page essay stating why they would be interested in learning more about Water Resources. Ben Taylor, Sonora High School sophomore, was selected to attend, and the following was his essay that accompanied his application.

"If it were possible to travel through time and into the future, we might be shocked to see a major water shortage in Texas. Unfortunately, this will probably happen if we continue poor water conservation habits.

You may think this is exaggerated, but the average person uses 12,176 gallons of water a year. Texas alone used over 200 billion gallons of water in the year 1990, and this figure is increasing with population

growth. Studies show that the population between 1970 and 1990 increased 27.1 percent, and if population continues to grow at this rate, Texas will be the most populated state in the United States by the year 2000. Now it is easy to see Texas with a water shortage.

The key for stopping this problem is through education. That is why I want to attend this camp. We should do everything possible to maintain our high quality of life in Texas.

By the year 2000, urban water use is expected to be cut 21% and agricultural water use by 4.7 million acre-feet. This still may not be enough, for as you know, these percentages and numbers don't always come out like people expect them to. The only solution for this problem is to educate the people to stop poor water usage habits. For example, showering rather than bathing can significantly reduce water usage.

A solution for this water problem may be the same ingredient that is used for many diseases, and that is education."

Q. I found some old pictures with the name Feltons Cave on them. Is this an early name for the Caverns of Sonora?

A. NO! Feltons Cave is located south of Sonora on the Dunbar Ranch. In the 1890's it was the favorite place for young people to go on group picnics and explorations. Carbide lamps were used to explore the large chamber at the entrance which was about 150 by 150 feet.

In February of 1926, Clarence Frambrough, Leslie Frambrough and J. A. Kring while exploring a newly discovered section of the cave found a skeleton in the cave at least a half mile from the surface.

In 1959 the cave system was mapped and many of the passages and rooms named. Some of the names were the Pink and Purple Pit, Guano Slide, Danger Pit, Carlsbad Room, Dead Goat Pit, Subway, Bat Room and Babcock's Lost Passage. There are notations of Indian remains and artifacts, Christmas tree stalagmites and some 15 foot high rooms and

some pits over 40 feet deep. Feltons Cave is a very extensive and dangerous system of underground passages. It is located on private property and is no longer open to the public.

We are still looking for pictures of everyone buried in the Sonora Cemetery and anyone who has ever lived in Sutton County. We will not be able to complete this project without your help. Please check out those old albums and see if you can't give us a picture for our files. Sometimes when a loved one dies people go through old pictures and throw out ones that they don't want or

don't know. Please if they are from Sutton County give them to us and we will try to put a name to the face and add them to our files. Sometimes there are pictures of different areas of town in the early days that we desperately need. Does anyone have a picture of the business district on the western end of town or southern end of town before they were built up?

Here are examples of components and their purpose: Red Blood Cells -- surgery, platelets -- leukemia and cancer, plasma -- to promote clotting, and Cryoprecipitate -- hemophilia. When separating these components you can obtain Red Blood Cells, Platelets, and Plasma or Red Blood Cells, Platelets, and Cryoprecipitate. With 41 units of blood given at our recent blood drive, 123 people in desperate need will be helped.

A special Congratulations to Matt Patterson. If ever it be said that someone had "gumption", it can be said about Matt! Matt works full time at Angelo Community Hospital and one of the Medi Centers in San Angelo. Simultaneously, he is pursuing his Paramedic license and an Assoc. 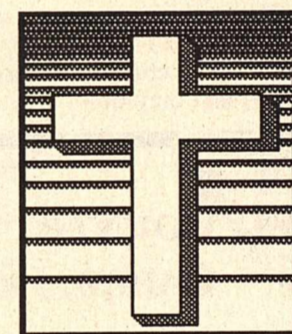

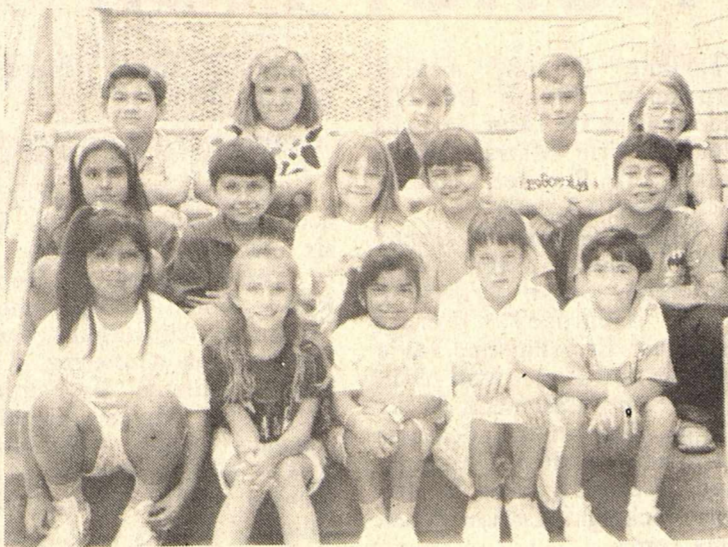

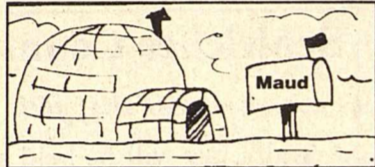

Tax Revenues Increase

Sales tax revenues for Sonora are showing a substantial increase over last years levels, according to statistics released last week by State Comptroller John Sharp's office. City officials enthusiastically greeted the good economic news as a strong sign that the local economy continues to improve.


According to the Comptroller's Office, Sonora sales tax revenues for the reporting period ending September 30, 1993, totaled \$22,302.02. During the same period last year, only \$15,329.24 was collected. This represents a 45.48% increase over last years totals.

Sonora's year-to-date revenues for 1993 show an equally impressive upturn. Sales tax collections thus far for 1993 total \$224,352.03. This is a 28.69% increase over last years year-to-date collection of \$174,324.67.

"Sales tax revenues are an excellent gauge of a community's economic health," explained City Manager John Pape. "Every reporting period this year, except one, has shown a strong increase. We take that as a very positive sign."

"I believe that this clearly shows that Sonora's slow-but-steady approach to boosting the local economy is paying off," said Mayor Lemuel Lopez. "These figures are particularly encouraging in view of the fact that hunting season and Christmas, the two most active times for our retailers, are still to come."

City Awarded Grant

The City of Sonora has been awarded a grant of \$505,350 by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to operate a public housing assistance program for a five-year period. Included in the grant is an annual allocation of twenty-three housing vouchers to assist low-income families under the Family Self-Sufficiency Program.

Mayor Lemuel Lopez was notified of the award by Joe R. Brinkley, Director of the HUD Technical Support Division, Fort Worth Regional Office. The mayor announced the grant at Tuesday evening's City Council meeting.

"This will mean not only additional affordable housing in Sonora, but a direct economic impact of over \$100,000 per year in the local economy," Mayor Lopez explained.

City Manager John Pape, who prepared the original grant application, will be preparing the city's Equal Housing Opportunity Plan and the program Administrative Plan over the next sixty days. When that is completed, it will be forwarded to the HUD Regional Office and funding will be made available.

The actual funding will be available shortly after the start of the new year, Pape explained. At that time, applications and criteria for assistance will be available at Sonora City Hall.

Voucher funding is earmarked for nine one-bedroom units, eleven two bedroom units, and three three-bedroom units for the first year of the program. Should sufficient need exist, the amount of funding can be increased during the period of the grant.
