Sonora Broncos Defeat Golden Cranes

The Sonora Bronco Football Team ended its difficult 1993 season on a positive note with a convincing 34-7 victory against the "Purple Rage" of Crane.

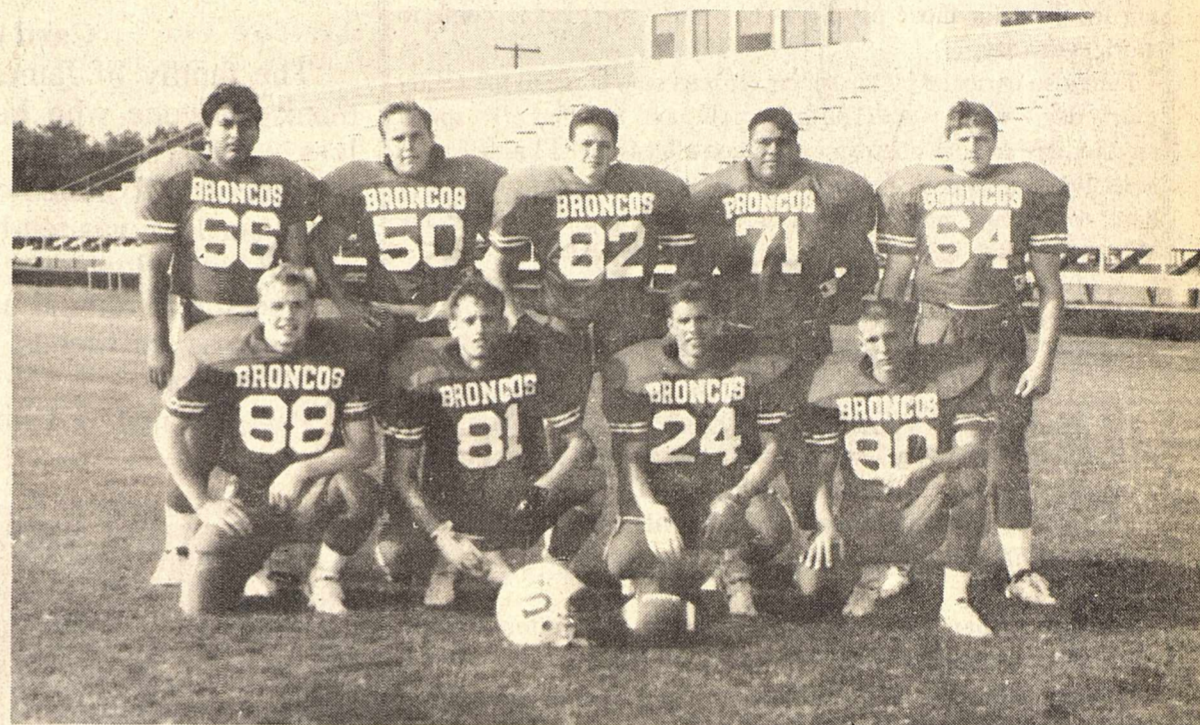
The road victory was Sonora's second win of the year, both wins coming in district 6-3A play. Sonora ends its season with a 2 and 7 record.

"I am extremely proud of our players, they stayed with it through it all during this season. They kept their heads up," said Sonora headcoach, Bob Bellard. "I'm glad we could end the season on a positive note."

Sonora received the opening kickoff and was unable to move the ball. Crane appeared to score on its first possession when 5' 9", 140 pound, senior Jamie Garza sprinted through the Bronco defense for 70 yards. The play was called back because of a holding call. The Bronco defense seemed to take the scoring threat as a challenge. The defense played for the most part a very solid game from this point on.

On Sonora's second possession of the night it took just four plays for the Broncos to score. The drive was highlighted by a 25 yard scramble by quarterback Jason Morely and a 33 yard touchdown run by Joey Guerra. Guerra would gain 92 yards on just 5 carries in the first half.

Crane took the ball on its second possession and seemed to be driving well down the field. The Bronco defense was playing well but the Cranes offense was still able to move the ball. The drive was stopped by a fumble at the 36 which was recovered by Shane Deel.

The Sonora offense moved the ball to the Crane 20 where the drive stalled. Trini Banda came on to the field to attempt a 37 yard field goal. Before the snap Sonora was called for illegal procedure. So Banda was forced to try from 43. The snap was high and the ball was free. In one of the most unusual plays of the year Banda picked up the ball, all 235 pounds of him, and ran 9 yards to the right side before being pushed out of bounds.

Sonora took the ball on its next possession and scored. This time it was 65 yard, 1:03, 4 play drive. The score followed a wonderful 48 yard run by Joey Guerra on a delay. Gabriel Perez took the ball from the 17 to the eight. It was second and one at the eight when Gilbert Vara ran literally through the Crane defense for six more points. The point after by Banda was good.

On the ensuing kickoff Jamie Garza fumbled the kick which was recovered by Louis Massey at the 16.

Following a penalty and short gain the Broncos faced a second and 17 at the 23. This time it was Jason Morely who would set up the score on a great 20 yard run against the grain. Then in the most unusual play of the season Sonora would borrow a play from the old Chicago Bear play book. With the ball first and 3 at the 3 the ball was handed off to big Jamie Espinosa. Espinosa who normally plays offensive tackle barreled in for the score. Banda's first point after sailed wide right but a Crane penalty offered Trini another chance but this one sailed wider right but somehow the officials called it good. Score at the 8:32 mark of the second quarter, Sonora 21, the Purple Rage 0.

Sonora would score again following a good stand by the defense. The key play for the Bronco "D" came on a fourth down at the 46 when Banda slammed into Crane quarterback Chris Harbin for no gain. The Bronco offense this time would ride the arm

of Sophomore quarterback Josh Burnham. On the first play of the drive Burnham hit Massey for a 30 yard completion. Perez would score two plays later on a run set up by Banda. As Perez hit the line Banda threw a massive block that freed the fullback for the run. The PAT was good and the score at the half would be 28 to 0, Sonora.

In the second half, the only score for the Cranes came on their first possession. It was a 35 yard run by Garza at the 9:08 mark that would place six points on the board for the Golden Cranes. The point after by J Jones was good.

Sonora would play several young players in the second half. Though they were not able to mount much of a drive they played well. On defense Jeff Floyd showed particular promise. Senior's Rhett Johnson, Bobby Mogford, Brandon Locke and Brandon Gryder

Services Pay For Sonora Jail

In November of 1978 Sutton County Voters passed a bond election of \$700,000.00 to build a new jail. The county had been advised by the Texas Jail Commission that the old jail would not meet all of the safety requirements both for inmates and jailers.

The construction was begun in the spring of 1980. The Sutton County Sheriff's Office moved into its new building, directly across the street from the old jail.

Sheriff Webster hired a jail administrator in January of 1980. Bob Harris and his children lived in a jail apartment that was part of the new jail. That worked well until 1982 when the jail commission advised Sheriff Webster he was going to have to hire three additional jailers. The jail had to be supervised 24 hours a day. Looking for a way to offset the additional expenses Sheriff Webster contacted the U.S. Marshall's office in Dallas, Texas. In talking with Marshall Clint Peoples, Sheriff Webster was able to obtain a contract to hold federal bureau of prison inmates. The bureau of prisons would pay Sutton County \$25.00 a day per inmate plus all of the inmates' medical, dental,

and pharmacy bills. All of the inmates were to be low risk inmates and the longest term was to be 6 months. The bureau of prisons, in the past ten years, kept from ten to fifteen inmates in the Sutton County Jail per month. The current daily fee per inmates is \$35.00 per say.

Sheriff Webster stated that in the past ten years, Sutton County has been paid \$1,023,565.00, the cost per year for the past ten years for

holding these prisoners. Cost has been approximately \$22,000.00 per year. This is good for food, uniforms and hygiene items.

This has been a very good situation for Sutton County. It not only has paid for the jail, it has also paid for all the other inmates being held in the jail. Sheriff Webster feels the tax payers have benefited greatly from this program the past ten

years. The Sutton County Jail population has averaged 19.5 inmates daily for the year 1993. The jail has a capacity of 28 inmates.

According to Sheriff Webster this would not have been possible had he not had excellent help in the jail. "The jailers all do a great job every day. It is pretty much a thankless job, but I know what they have to put up with, and for that I am very grateful."

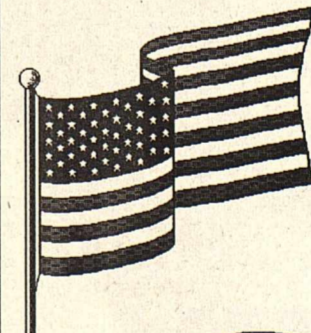
Think about our poor government. Think of the correlation between the caterpillars and our representatives.

Domingo Recognized

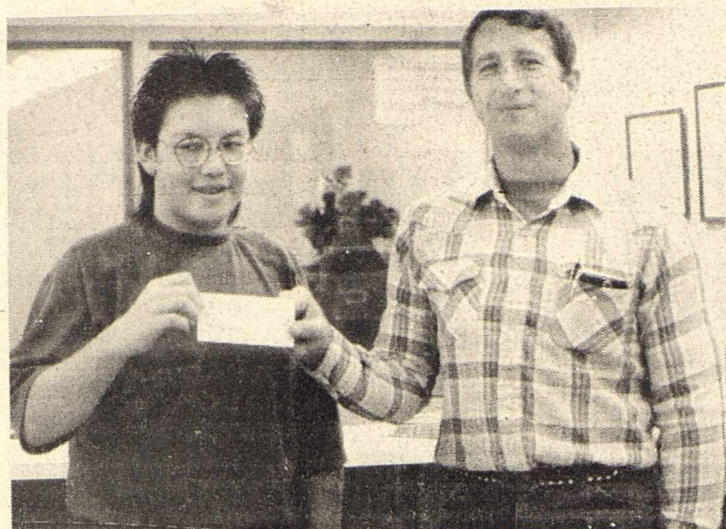

Here's My Card

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Ask The Historical Society

Q. Can you give me any information on John W. Potter who is buried in the Sonora Cemetery?

A. John William Potter, Sr., was born on February 8, 1825 in South Carolina. He was married to Mary Elizabeth Jeffries on January 5, 1854 in Bell County, Texas. They had six children, Newton Jasper, Abner Marion, Nancy Merilda, James David, Richard Ellis, and John William, Jr. Mary Elizabeth Jeffries Potter died April 30, 1884 in Sugar Loaf, Texas, John Potter married a widow, Samantha C. Fambrough. There were no children from this marriage but there was a step-son A. C. Fambrough and one foster child Ethel Bush. John William Potter, Sr. died on August 4, 1905 in Sonora, Texas.

John William Potter, Sr. was a blacksmith by trade. He bought the Sharp's Blacksmith Shop in 1899, which was located on Concho Street between the alley and Oak Street. He also owned a lot in West Sonora which is mentioned as having a well drilled on it in the September 12, 1891 issue of The Devil's River News.

According to family members in Louisiana there are four people buried in the Potter family lot. There is only one stone on the lot, that of John Potter, Sr. The others

buried there are Samantha C. Fambrough Potter, born October of 1839 and died November 28, 1915, Andrew Clarence Fambrough, born October 27, 1871 and died August 9, 1937, and his second wife Benenah Lena Balch Fambrough, who died on August 19, 1955.

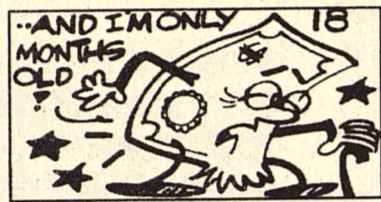

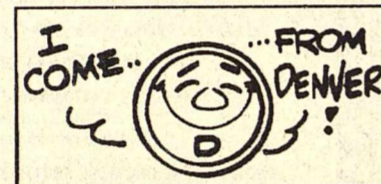

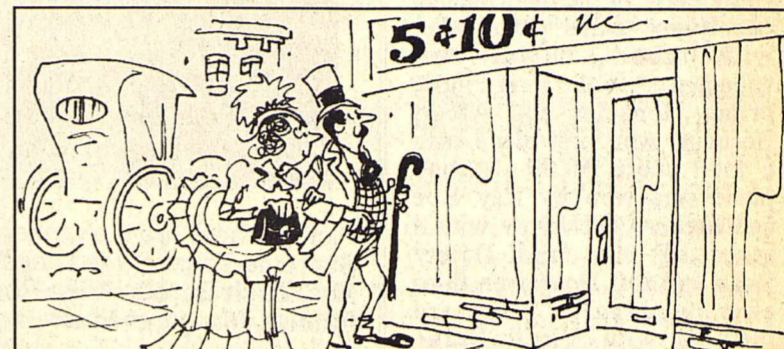
Whipff Named RMS

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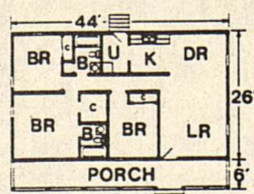

ELDERLY AND/OR DISABLED GRANTS TO ASSIST WITH PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Pursuant to Title 49, United States Code, Section 1612 of the Federal Transit Act, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) issues this notice for solicitation of proposals and/or applications from private and public nonprofit organizations serving elderly and/or disabled persons to utilize funds available under the Section 16 grant program, administered by TxDOT.

Notice of Invitation: The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing this request for applications for the Section 16 grant program. The Section 16 grant program provides capital assistance to nonprofit organizations which provide transportation services to elderly and/or disabled persons in Texas.

Funding for the Section 16 grant program is appropriated by the Federal government under the Federal Transit Act as described in FTA Circular 9070.1C, December 23, 1992. Fiscal year 1994 appropriations for Section 16 grant program are expected to be announced in October.

Eligible capital expenses under the Section 16 grant program include: (1) the replacement of vehicles such as buses, vans, trolleys, etc., currently used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles of this type; (2) the purchase of vehicles for service expansions and new services to elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles of this type; and (3) the purchase of radio equipment only, i.e. equipment that is not part of a vehicle allowed categories 1 and 2 of this paragraph. Section 16 funds must be used for transportation projects serving elderly and/or disabled persons.

Each project will be evaluated in the appropriate category in accordance with the stated selection criteria. However, TxDOT reserves the right to establish minimum

required scores.

Projects must meet Federal funding criteria included in Circular 9070.1C and must also comply with property management standards set out in Title 43, Chapter 31.57 of the Texas Administrative Code, relative to the replacement of vehicles. To be eligible for consideration, each 16 proposal must include the following documents and information:

(1) Successful completion of the pre-application interview and on-site visit with the District public transportation coordinator.

(2) A complete Section 16 grant application, copies of which are available at TxDOT District offices. Applicants requesting funds for multiple projects should group them within the application by funding category (replacement vehicles, expansion vehicles, new starts, and radios). The narrative should demonstrate the need for the equipment, the capability to maintain and operate the equipment, and the involvement of the applicant and the community in requesting funding for the equipment.

(3) A budget for each category of equipment which shows the unit cost of each item and total equipment costs. The federal dollars and local match dollars provided by the applicant should be noted.

(4) Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act to provide transportation services that are accessible to disabled persons.

(5) Provide proof of demonstrated coordination efforts with other transit systems within the applicant's immediate service area in the application.

(6) Proof of local match ability to pay a minimum of 20 percent of funding for said equipment. No federal dollars may be used as local match unless authorized by the federal agency that awards those monies.

(7) The latest annual one-way passenger trip figures for the applicant agency, with the source of the information shown (such as TxDOT reports, etc.).

(8) The latest annual administrative / operating budget for the transportation services provided by the applicant agency. Equipment

costs should not be included.

(9) The latest population estimates for the applicant's authorized service area and agency clientele served, with source of the information shown.

Agencies requesting Section 16 funds for the purchase of vehicles (replacement or expansion) must also submit the following information:

(a) A complete inventory of the current vehicle fleet, with the following information provided for each vehicle:

- type (bus, van, etc.)
- license of serial number
- size (length)
- passenger capacity
- special equipment on board (radio, lift, ramps, etc.)
- model year
- odometer reading, date of odometer reading, and whether vehicle is a spare of is used regularly to provide service.

Agency contact: Questions concerning the request for proposals should be referred to the Public Transportation Coordinator with the local TxDOT District Office.

Response date: Written proposals must be received by the Public Transportation Coordinator, Mr. Tommy Robinson, Texas Department of Transportation, at 4502 Knickerbocker Road in San Angelo, on or before January 18, 1994.

Selection criteria: TxDOT will select projects for Section 16 funding on quantitative measures such as demonstrated coordination efforts, ability to operate present equipment on an annual basis where applicable, local match ability, ability to meet service needs of elderly and/or disabled persons based on passenger trips per vehicle per month in urban or rural areas, hours of services, ability to maintain equipment, average fleet mileage where applicable, and average fleet age where applicable. Only those measures appropriate to a specific funding category will be used in evaluating projects within that category.

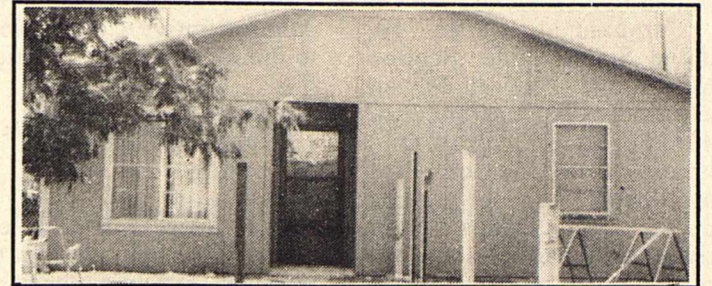

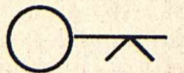

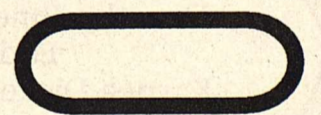
