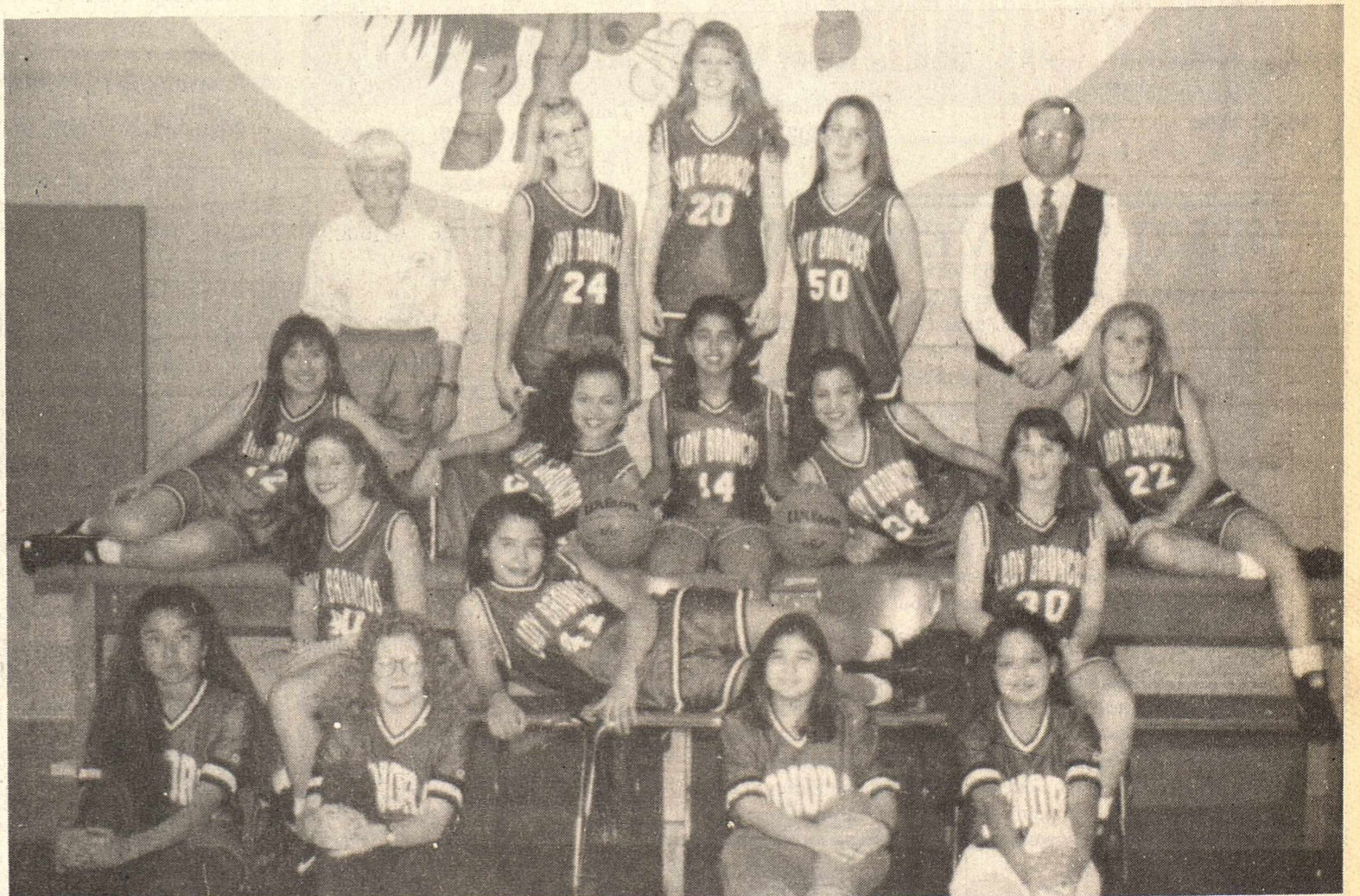

Kelly's Column



Delicious food is often a special part of Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday events. Entertaining for family or friends on a small or large scale is fun, but often demanding, and definitely needs to be done with food safety in mind.

When planning a large scale event, keep in mind that preparing and handling large amounts of food will take planning ahead of time for safe preparation, storage and serving. If large quantities of food will be prepared ahead of time, quickly cool and refrigerate them. Divide into portions and store in shallow containers. Deep containers increase the time the center of a pot of food stays warm, encouraging bacterial growth. Consider the amount of refrigerator space available.

If perishable foods are picked up from a deli or purchased from a caterer, transport them quickly, and serve immediately; or if purchased ahead of time, transport them quickly to your refrigerator where they should remain until serving time. If you're purchasing a large quantity of food items such as meat trays or any perishable foods, ask that they be packaged in small portions, or do this when you get home. By doing this, you can replace trays often at the party event and not leave one large tray out for too long.

If holiday meals are served buffet style, this may mean that the food remains on the table as guests come and go. This is not the safest situation as foods left at warm room temperatures are susceptible to bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness. Plan serving times so that perishable foods do not remain at room temperature for more than two hours. Use smaller portions on the serving table, and replace them often from the heat source in the kitchen or from the refrigerator.

On the serving table, or in the kitchen, keep hot foods hot. Chafing dishes may or may not keep foods at the necessary temperature of 140 degrees F. or above. Keep cold foods cold on the table by nestling serving containers in beds of ice.

When replenishing foods on the buffet, it is best to replace containers, rather than putting fresh food in a container that contains food that has been sitting out, especially if the food has been at room temperature.

Make your holiday events special and food safe by following safe food handling practices. If it is an event to remember, make it a pleasant one. Protect you and your guests from foodborne illness.

Wool & Mohair Price Review

A review of the wool and mohair price support payment programs for marketing year 1992 indicated that some producers, marketing agencies, and other buyers of wool and mohair do not have a clear understanding of program requirements as they relate to bona fide marketing. We would like to take this opportunity to explain what actions must take place before a marketing is considered bona fide.

Wool and mohair price support payments are made to producers based on the year that the wool or mohair is marketed. The wool and mohair "regulations" (7 CFR Part 1468) provides that marketings shall be considered to have taken place when the following four events have been completed:

1. Title passed to the buyer;
2. The wool or mohair was delivered to the buyer physically or through documents that transfer control to the buyer;
3. The information needed to determine the total purchase price payable by the

buyer is known to the producer, and the producer's marketing agency; and

4. The full amount due the producer in connection with the marketing of the wool or mohair has been paid to and received by the producer.

The marketing year is the period beginning January 1 and ending December 31, both dates inclusive, and is determined by the date the last event mentioned above is completed.

We wish to remind you that the issuance of a false sales document or the making of a false statement in an application for payment or other documents, for the purpose of enabling the producer to obtain a payment will subject the person issuing the document or making such statement to liability under applicable Federal civil and criminal status. Backdating a sales document or check is considered a false statement. If you have any questions regarding program eligibility requirements, please feel free to contact our office: Sutton Co. Carter briefed the ICA members on several current issues impacting the agricultural industry including a discussion on the tuberculosis outbreak which has been confirmed in two separate herds, one in Karnes County and one in Comanche County.

Animal Health Commission.

Ballots To Be Mailed

Application may be made by coming to the ASCS office. Applications received in the County Office by January 15, 1994 will be reviewed for possible cost sharing at the February Committee meeting. Ballots will be canvassed December 9, 1993. Producers are urged to follow instructions on the ballot to be sure the ballot will be eligible to be counted.



Q. Do you have any record of how Thanksgiving was celebrated around the turn of the century in Sonora?

A. We found this announcement of a Thanksgiving Programme in the Devil's River News of November 18, 1899

Thanksgiving programme Thursday, Nov. 30, at 10 o'clock, at the Courthouse. Everybody invited to attend.

Mills, Chris Wyatt, Misses Sallie and Dana Barksdale, Olivia and Lula Causey, Mollie Fivash, Alma Miers, Mona and Montie Rountree, Zora Martin, Abby Miller, Florence Felton, Mattie Palmer, Pearl Haley, Julia Putnam, Pearl Mills, Belle Birtrong, Lucella, Susie and Annie Adams, Lillie Heflin, Kate Sharp, Minnie Bean, Lottie Stephenson, Dona Allison, Mattie Brotherton, Lena Marshall, Bertie Taylor, Vivia Carson.

A delightful and interesting apron party was given Thanksgiving night at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bell, at which the following were present: Judge and Mrs. J. M. Bell, Rev. and Mrs. H. Q. Kendall, Hattie Beaver, Annie Dunagan, Minnie Schubach, Janie and Emma Wyatt, Lula Causey, Mattie Palmer, Lillie Davis, Lula Holland, Mona Rountree, Hollie Davis, Messrs Jms Schubach, Herbert Palmer, Earl Duke, Mark Baugh, Lewis Mayfield, Van Fulcher, Orville Word, Montie Mills, Bob and Oscar Dunagan and James Taylor.

Someone asked us if there was horse racing during the Thanksgiving celebrations. We didn't find any mention of any organized racing in the 1890's newspapers except for Christmas and New Years Races and Spring Races.

Experts from throughout the state were invited to facilitate the workshop.

Representative Turner served as workshop moderator.

Seminar sessions were presented by Dennis Engelke of the Texas Rural Electric Cooperatives; David Scott of West Texas Utilities; Troy Williams of the Concho Valley Council of Governments; and Sonora City Manager John Pape. Also, Judy Wilhelm and Harlan Bruha of the Small Business Development Center at Angelo State University; Patty Tenorio of

Texas Rural Communities; Bob Melton with the Texas Department of Commerce; and K.T. McLeish of the State Comptroller's Office.

Presenting sessions from the Texas Extension Service were Ken Cook, District Extension Director; Joe Pena, Ag Economist; and Preston Faris, Extension Agent.

Attendees included business, financial, government, and chamber of commerce representatives from throughout the region.

City Council Meeting Minutes

Thursday, November 18, 1993, the City Council held a special meeting. The minutes of the meeting are:

Item #1 - The City Council considered a municipal tree/landscaping ordinance. City Manager John Pape advised the Council that the ordinance was needed to regulate the planting of trees and landscaping on public rights-of-way, and would resolve possible liability problems arising from needing to trim trees. The ordinance does not regulate any trees or landscaping on private property, just on public rights-of-way. The ordinance received its first reading.

Item #2 - The City Council considered hiring a temporary police officer. City Manager Pape explained that one of the police officers had been injured in the line of duty and had been off work since early July. Treatment and rehabilitation for the officer will continue for an undetermined length of time, and the police department is working short-handed as a result. The council approved the hiring of a police officer as a temporary replacement for the injured officer, and Mayor Lemuel Lopez directed the City Manager to monitor city expenditures to determine if the position might be made permanent in order to avoid manpower shortages in the future. The temporary officer will be required to meet all state

employment and licensing requirements as a regular officer.

Item #3 - City Attorney Beth Wallace presented the new cable television franchise ordinance. The ordinance endorses the terms of the cable television resolution passed at last month's meeting, which provides for a system upgrade and added channels. A six-month time frame was agreed upon for the construction to upgrade the system. The ordinance received its first reading.

Item #4 - The City Attorney also presented the new junked/abandoned vehicle ordinance. This new ordinance is an updated version of the existing law, and provides for quicker removal of junked or abandoned vehicles that constitute a health or safety hazard. The ordinance received its first reading.

Item #5 - Council Member Marie Barrera voiced her concerns over the manner in which trucks are unloaded at the Red Hoss Feed Store at Glasscock and Railroad Streets. Ms. Barrera indicated that citizens had complained to her about the situation. After extended discussion of the matter, no formal action was taken on the matter.

Item #6 - The City Council considered a resolution establishing a fair market price for the acquisition of a water-line easement under the Texas Community Development Program. The easement will allow for the looping of water lines in the southwest section of the city, resulting in the improvement of water pressure. The Council approved the resolution.

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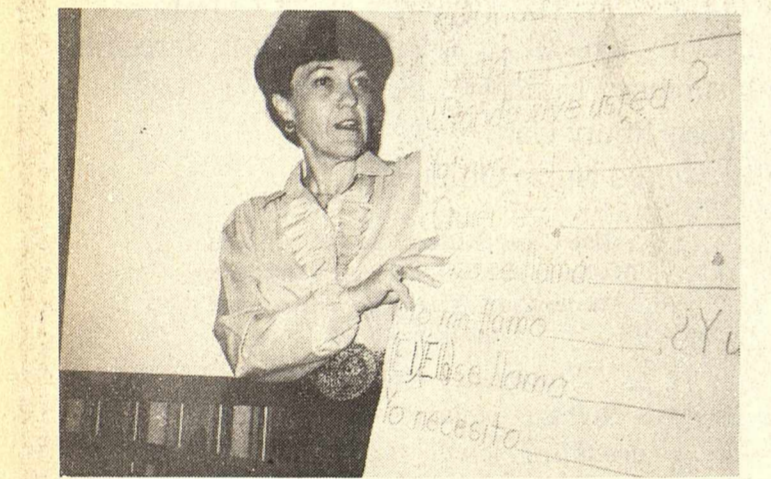

TIPS ON CARVING A TURKEY

TIP 1: Cutting beautiful slices depends on using a good, sharp, non-serrated carving knife. Serrated knives tend to tear tender meat, producing shreds instead of slices.

TIP 2: It's essential to keep your carving knife razor-sharp in order to carve with grace and ease.

TIP 3: After the turkey is roasted, remove it from the oven and let it cool for 10 to 12 minutes. This will make the meat easier to slice.

TIP 4: Start carving by removing the drumsticks and thighs. Next remove the wings; but only the tip and center sections. Leave the last section of the wing attached to the breast. This provides a good broad base to help prevent the bird from tilting when you slice the breast.

TIP 5: When carving the turkey breast, start by making a deep horizontal (parallel to the platter) "base cut" into the breast, just above the wing bone. Then you can release nice even slices by cutting in a vertical direction down through the breast to the base cut.

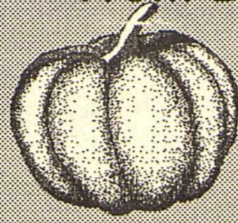

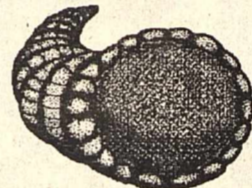

Grease a bundt pan. Pour the 3 tablespoons melted butter into bundt pan.

Sprinkle 1/4 c. of the brown sugar into the melted butter; add 2 T. chopped pecans, a bit of cinnamon & 1/3 of the pudding mix. Layer 1/2 of the frozen rolls onto the butter/sugar mixture. Repeat sugar, cinnamon, nuts, and 1/3 pudding mix.

Add half the butter pats. Layer the rest of the frozen rolls. Repeat sugar, nuts, cinnamon, and 1/3 pudding mix and butter pats.

Cover the bundt pan with foil. Refrigerate overnight, to allow the frozen rolls to thaw.

In the morning, pre-heat the oven to 200 degrees. TURN OFF OVEN. Place the bundt pan, uncovered, in the oven to rise, until doubled (about 1 hr. 15 mins.) Rising too much can cause the buns to overflow your bundt pan, too.

Remove from oven. Heat oven to 350°. Bake sticky buns for about 30-35 minutes. When done, turn pan over onto large serving platter.

In covered saucepan, with about 2 1/2 qts. water, cook turkey neck, heart, and gizzard til tender with half an onion and 2 celery stalks.

Place slices of bread in low oven until almost dry. Then tear into small pieces.

Prepare cornbread: 2 c. cornmeal, 1 c. flour, 1 t. soda, 1 t. baking powder, 1 t. salt. Blend dry ingredients. Beat in 2 c. buttermilk, 1 egg, 1/4 c. oil until blended. Pour into greased 9x9" pan. Bake at 400° for 25 minutes.

Chop raw liver. Fry until almost cooked; add chopped onions and celery. Cover pan; saute' until onions are opaque.

In large bowl, crumble cornbread; add pieces of bread, seasonings, and eggs (just raw, not boiled). Mix gently. Pour 4-5 c. broth from giblets over all, and mix well. Mixture should be moist.

Place turkey on a trivet in a large roaster pan. Fill turkey cavities with dressing. Place remainder of dressing around the turkey. Place covered roaster at once in preheated oven at 325 degrees°.

Bake about 4 hours. (For dressing alone in a covered pan - bake at 325° for 1 hour; uncover for 15-30 minutes)

Giblet gravy; Thicken remaining broth with about 2 T. flour or cornstarch, which has been blended with a bit of broth to make a thin Mixture. Add chopped giblets and chopped boiled egg. Season to taste. Simmer 15 minutes.

In small saucepan, heat raspberry preserves and remaining 1/2 cup rum. Strain through sieve to remove seeds. Prick surface of cake with fork. Brush raspberry glaze evenly over cake, allowing cake to absorb glaze. Repeat until all glaze has been absorbed.

In bowl, combine remaining 1 cup chocolate pieces and shortening. Microwave on high 1 minute or until melted. Stir until smooth. Or heat mixture over hot (not boiling) water until chocolate melts and mixture is smooth. Spoon chocolate icing over cake. Let stand 10 minutes. In small bowl, stir 1 cup confectionery sugar or powdered sugar with a few drops of water and a teaspoon of vanilla extract. Drizzle on top of chocolate icing.

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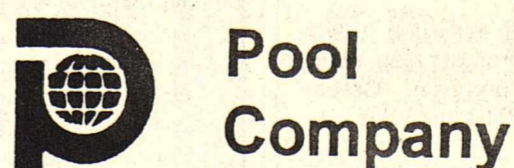

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Thorp Attends Conference

Sutton County Senior Center Director, Carole Thorp attended the Office of the Attorney General Senior Service Conference on Fraud Against Older Texans held November 17th & 18th in Austin. Mrs. Thorp joined hundreds of senior service providers, legal experts and law enforcement officers to learn essential information to help senior citizens reduce their risks of becoming a victim of fraud. The American Association of Retired Persons and the Texas Crime Prevention Institute joined the Attorney General's office in producing an operational manual, selecting topics, and providing informative materials.

Thorp had the opportunity to meet Dan Morales, Texas 48th Attorney General as well as a host of other crime fighting experts. As with most people, when they are victimized by crime or fraud, many senior citizens feel there is no solution except to accept the devastation. Attorney General Morales assured her that his office will prosecute those who swindle or

"con" our senior citizens. But they will need help. Anyone who feels they have been the victim of a con artist or some kind of fraud (have you won a "prize" lately?) needs to contact local authorities. Or you can contact the Attorney General's Office in Austin directly.

Mrs. Thorp was most impressed with the dedication of the law enforcement personnel at the conference and their goal of protecting senior citizens. As Mike Haines, Detective, Swindle Unit with the Dallas Police Department told one group, "After a senior citizens trust is betrayed, suicide is a viable option and many elderly die within two or three years after being swindled." The senior center will hold programs in the next few months that will show Sonora's Seniors what to be wary of and will reprint some of the materials gathered at the conference in upcoming newsletters.

In the mean time, remember, if something sounds too good to be true -- it probably

is! Don't give out any personal information to someone on the phone. And if someone comes to your house to sell you "home repairs" or other merchandise, write down their tag numbers and call local police or the sheriff's office immediately!

Sonora May Be Site For Movie

"Attracting film production of this kind is more than just a chance for community recognition," Pape explained. "This type of activity, even if it's just a second-unit location crew, brings revenue into town."
