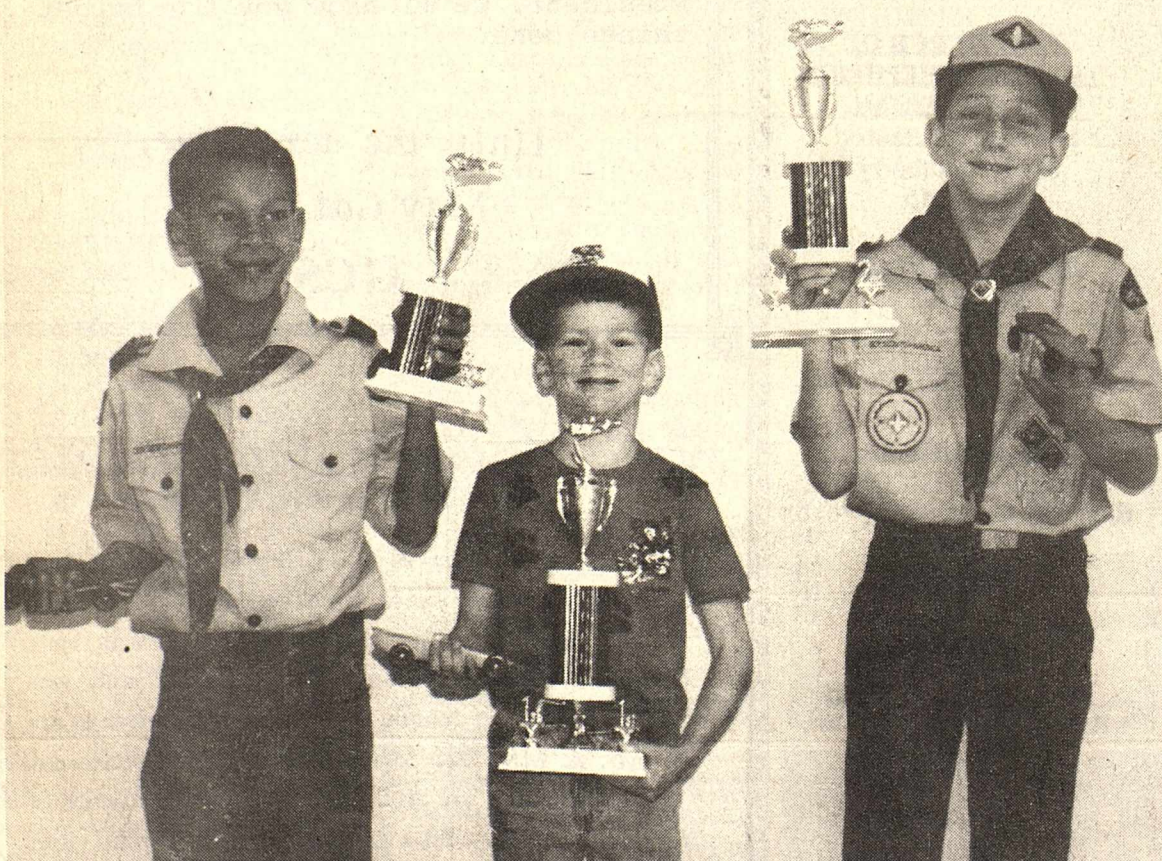

Hufstedler was recognized for developing the "Little Dribblers" program for 3rd through 6th graders in cooperation with the Sonora Independent School District. 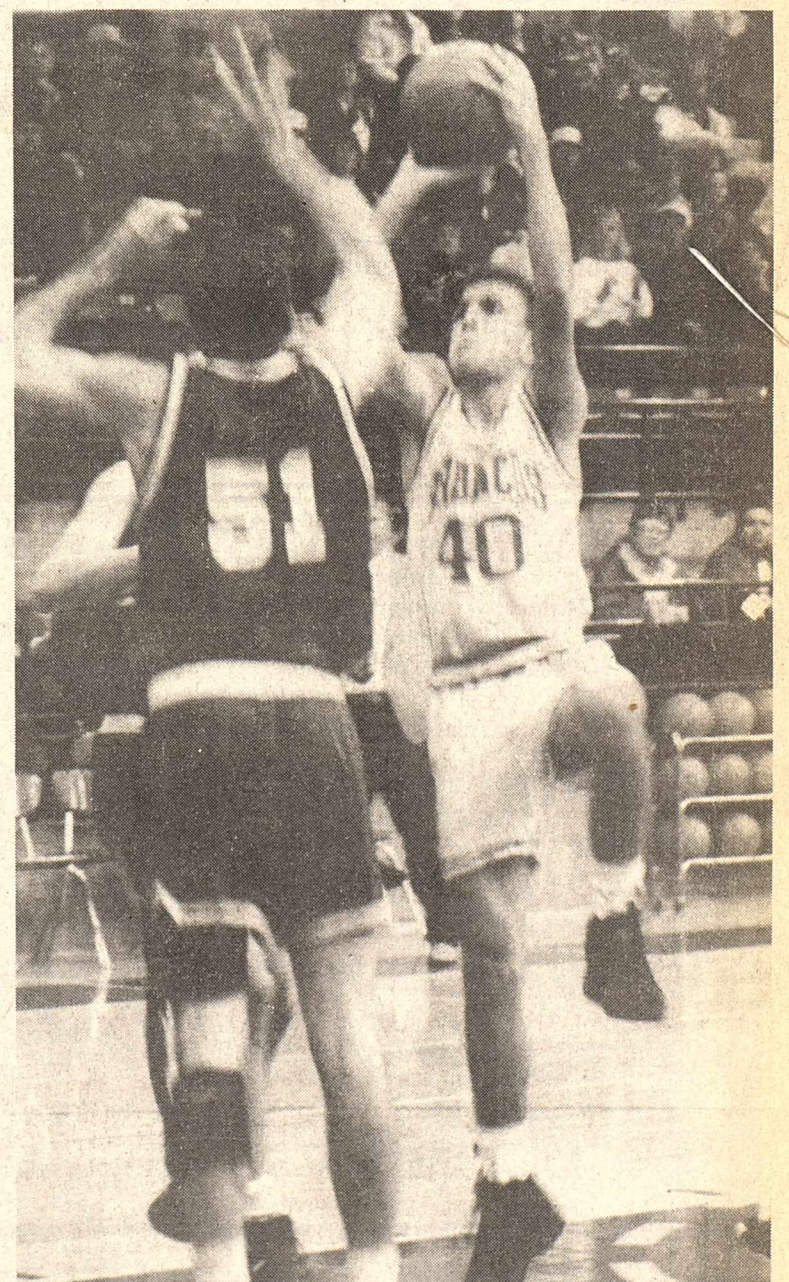
Broncos Battle Kermit

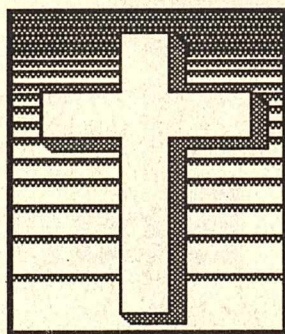

Sonora City Council Meeting Minutes

On this the 18th day of January, 1994 the City Council of Sonora, Texas, convened in the usual meeting place for a Regular Meeting, thereof, being in the council chambers at City Hall with the following to wit:

Lemuel Lopez, Mayor; Margaret Cascadden, Council Member; Butch Campbell, Council Member; Fred Perez, Council Member; John Pape, City Manager; Beth Wallace, City Attorney; and Becky Covington, City Secretary.

Others attending all or parts of the meeting were Glenda Barton, Kathy Davis, Melett Rowland, Jim Garrett, Judy Edmondson, Ms. Batchelor, James McLaughlin, Lisa Lipham, Jay and Kay Hufstедler, Maxine Locklin, and Brent Gesch.

Mayor Lopez opened the meeting at 2:00 p.m. with the first order of business being the presentation of the "Mayor's Award of Excellence" to Kay Hufstедler for her devotion to the youth of the community. Mayor Lopez commended Mrs. Hufstедler for the development of the basketball programs for the elementary students, her active involvement with the youth at her church and tutoring of high school students.

Ms. Glenda Barton, Representative from the Texas Cashmere Association, presented appreciation awards to Mayor Lopez; City Manager John Pape; and the Sonora City Council for their support to the local association and the active recruitment of the Cashmere Association headquarters moving to Sonora.

MINUTES: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting held on December 21, 1993 as written. The motion was seconded by Council Member Campbell and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

S.C.A.D.: The monthly tax collection report from the Sutton County Appraisal District was reviewed. A 42.9 percent collection rate for the month of December was reported.

FIRE DEPARTMENT: The Sonora Volunteer Fire Department Quarterly Fire and Drill Report for the 4th quarter of 1993 was presented. Eight county fires and five city fires for a total of thirteen fires were reported.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE: The 4th quarter and 1993 year end financial report for the hotel/motel tax expended by the Chamber of Commerce was reviewed by the Council. Mayor Lopez reported that there was grant funding available through the Concho Valley Council of Government for the promotion of arts.

CITY ATTORNEY: City Attorney, Beth Wallace, reviewed the Council on the Open Records Act. She advised them that all departments of the city were under the act and unless expressly prohibited by law, the records, after written request, have to be made

available to the public or a request for an opinion from the Attorney General had to be made.

PLANNING AND ZONING CASE NO. 232: A

motion was made by Council Member Cascadden that a variance be granted to Barry Black, 1005 Glasscock Ave., Block 30A, Lot 9, with stipulation that rain gutters be installed to keep water from running on neighbors property, as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Board. The motion was seconded by Council Member Perez and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

PLANNING AND ZONING CASE NO. 233: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden that a special use permit be granted to Judy Edmondson, Block W 22, Lot 4, 209 W, 5th Street, to operate a small gift shop, as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Board. The motion was seconded by Council Member Campbell and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

COPIER: A motion was made by Council Member Campbell to approve the low bid from Xerox, Inc. for a Xerox 5322 Copier, with the optional features, to be used at City Hall for a cost of \$8,545.00. The motion was seconded by Council Member Cascadden and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

COMPUTER SOFTWARE: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden to approve the proposal for computer software for General Ledger/Budgetary, Budget Preparation, Accounts Payable, Payroll/Personnel, Check Reconciliation, and Work Orders from Incode, Inc. for \$10,500.00. The motion was seconded by Council Member Perez and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

COMMITTEE ON AGING: On recommendation from the nominating committee of the Sutton County Committee on Aging and submitted by Carole Thorp, Senior Center Director, the following names were submitted for approval to serve on the Sutton County Committee on Aging: Larry Finklea, Kelly Lewis, and Heraldo Martinez. After discussing all advisory boards of the city, the council asked staff to review the organization and authority of the council over the advisory boards. It was the consensus of the council that every board or commission of the city should maintain balance to insure proper representation from each segment of the city or ward. Action was postponed until the next meeting.

VAN DRIVER PART TIME: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden to approve a request for funding from the Concho Valley Council of

Government through the Thunderbird Rural Transportation Program for a part time van driver for the Senior Center. There would be no cost to the city, it would be 100 percent reimbursable. The motion was seconded by Council Member Campbell and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

BRIDGE: Mr. Pape presented financial data regarding the cost of a bridge and the procedure it would take to issue bonds. It was the unanimous consensus of the council that they should not obligate the city to such great expense for a bridge or street at this time until the decision has been made as to the direction of Interstate 27. It was their opinion that there was an excellent chance that Sonora would receive I-27, from San Angelo to Del Rio, and this would create a lot of major changes in traffic for Sonora. However, the council did instruct staff to continue actively pursuing grants for the bridge.

INTERSTATE 27: It was the consensus of the council that the city should focus direct efforts and make it a top priority in the acquisition of Interstate 27 through Sonora.

MUNICIPAL TREE ORDINANCE: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden to approve AN ORDINANCE TO PROMOTE AND PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY, AND GENERAL WELFARE BY PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF THE PLANTING, MAINTENANCE, AND REMOVAL OF TREES, SHRUBS, AND OTHER PLANTS WITHIN THE CITY OF SONORA. The motion was seconded by Council Member Perez and carried the following votes: AYES: All members shown present NOES: None

CLASSIC CABLE TELEVISION ORDINANCE: A motion was made by Council Member Cascadden to approve AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO CLASSIC CABLE, A FRANCHISE TO MAINTAIN AND OPERATE A CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF SONORA, TEXAS; SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THE GRANTING OF THIS FRANCHISE; PROVIDING FOR DURATION, CANCELLATION, PENALTY, OPTION AND RENEWAL; PROVIDING REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE USE OF PUBLIC PROPERTY BY GRANTEE; PROVIDING

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT: The public works report was combined with the City Manager's report for this month.

CITY MANAGER REPORT: Mr. Pape informed the council that a brochure was being designed by COG regarding the Public Transportation Program. The tire recycling project has been completed and is available for public use. Mr. Pape informed the council that he would be out of the office Thursday to attend a TML meeting in Austin. It was reported that the Concho Valley Council of Government Regional Review Committee had reviewed our 1993 Texas Community Development Project and we were ranked

next to last. However, the application will go to the State level for consideration and scoring.

Mr. Pape introduced Melett Rowland, the Main Street Manager, and informed them that they would be scheduling a Main Street Program for the City Council, the Economic Development Committee and other interested citizens in a few weeks and a welcoming reception for Ms. Rowland is being planned. Also, he explained that she was designing a brochure that explained the program. It was announced that the official kickoff of the Main Street Promotion, with the state dignitaries, has been scheduled for the afternoon of March 29.

It was announced that the Mayor and City Manager will attend a seminar presented by Perryman & Associates in San Antonio on January 24 and 24 regarding Economic Forecasting.

Mayor Lopez inquired about the usage of the pager system

The council discussed the swimming pool project and suggested that it be opened longer in the summer months.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, a motion was made by Council Member Cascadden, seconded by Council Member Campbell, and carried, the meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

Late filed documents can no longer be accepted by the County ASCS office. You will need to bring in head counts, shearing dates, grading charges, freight charges - if any, and any

unshorn lamb purchases. If you have purchased unshorn lambs we will need the sale sheet showing the number of head and weight of lambs you bought.

"Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, disability, marital status, or national origin."

City Council Approves Agreement With Classic Cable

After extensive deliberation and negotiation with Classic Cable, the Sonora City Council has approved a new franchise agreement with the cable television utility. The agreement was passed at last week's council meeting.

The contract included a binding agreement requiring Classic Cable to upgrade and expand local cable service. Additional channels, including such networks as Turner Network Television and Fox Television, will be added to the Sonora service as soon as construction on the Sonora site is completed.

"We took our time to ensure that Sonora cable subscribers get the best possible service at the most reasonable price possible," Mayor Lemuel Lopez explained. "We have been promised upgraded service for a number of years by the previous cable company, and they never delivered. The Council and I felt that it was time to compel the current company to fulfill their predecessor's promises."

Sonora has previously been served by Television Enterprises Incorporated (TVE). TVE was purchased

by Classic Cable of Austin last year.

The number of channels available on the Sonora cable system has been a bone of contention among local citizens for a number of years. While an upgrade of the system had been promised on previous occasions, additional channels had not been added at the time of the Classic Cable purchase.

"City Manager John Pape and City Attorney Elizabeth Wallace have been actively working to negotiate this contract over the past months," Lopez noted. "Our citizens felt that our cable service had been substandard for quite some time, and the City Council wanted to make absolutely certain that our interests were addressed in this new franchise."

Officials with Classic Cable indicated that construction on the local receiving station would begin within the next three weeks, with the upgrade being completed within six months. As service capacity is expanded, the new channels will be added.

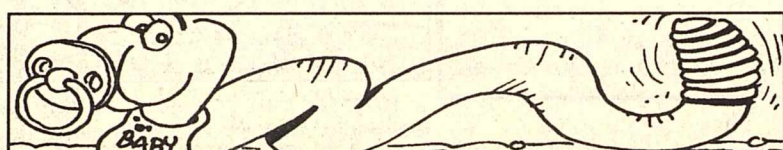

Ask The Historical Society

Q. I was told that you had newspapers dating back before 1900 in your files? I was trying to locate information on the death of Jim Davenport in Cotulla, TX in November of 1900, do you think your paper would have anything on this?

A. Devil's River News, November 17, 1900

The Killing Of Jim Davenport

Jim Davenport, who was killed at Cotulla, Tex., the other day, was a son of H.D. Davenport of this city, until recently proprietor of the Wall Street barbecue house. The deceased also has a brother living here -- C.P. Davenport, formerly engaged in the mining business in Mexico.

Jim Davenport, the victim of the Cotulla tragedy, was also known in this city. He was killed in Cotulla the other day by Ranger W.L. Wright. The Isonomy, of Cotulla, tells all about the shooting except giving the cause leading up to the killing.

The editor of the Isonomy, reporting the shooting, says himself and Davenport were entering a saloon to get a glass of beer and met Ranger Wright on the sidewalk. The latter, addressing Davenport, said, "Jim, let me see you a moment."

Davenport stopped and the Isonomy man stepped into the saloon and ordered beer for two and while the bartender was drawing the beer, shooting began outside.

According to the story of eye witnesses, when Davenport stopped to speak with Wright, the latter stepped up to him and



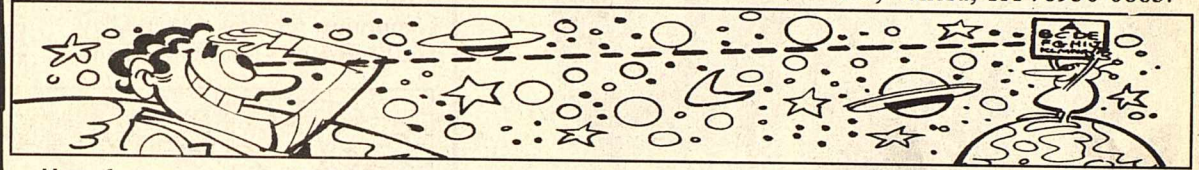

slapped his hand on Davenport's hip pocket with the intention of getting Davenport's pistol, and at the same time Wright drew his

own pistol. Davenport sprang back and reached for his gun. Ranger Wright instantly fired, sending a bullet clean through Davenport, who staggered and fell. But in the falling, Davenport drew his own gun and fired at Wright, the bullet cutting the ranger's coat but not touching his body. Wright fired three more shots into

Davenport, who expired in fifteen minutes without uttering a word. The Isonomy says Davenport died game, though he had no fair chance for his life.

Note: part of this article is a reprint from another paper as we did not have a Wall Street barbecue house in Sonora. C.P. Davenport did live in Sonora at one time. Women Urged To Have Mammograms

The older a woman gets, the greater her risk for developing breast cancer, yet studies show that women over 50 are less likely to get a mammogram. Reasons span from lack of physician referral to a woman's perception that she is not at risk.

The American Cancer Society has teamed up with the Advertising Council for this year's National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The campaign targets women in their 50's, 60's, and 70's with the message that although their risk of developing breast cancer increases with age, early detection through regular mammography can greatly improve the likelihood of successful treatment and extend quality of life. The campaign also addresses primary care providers to emphasize the critical role they play in influencing mammography use among older women. These professionals are asked to call the American Cancer Society for a publication that explains how they can work mammography recommendations into their patient-care routines.

Television producer David Lynch (Twin Peaks) worked with the ACS on the television public service announcement, which shows an older woman preparing for mammogram while Anne Bancroft's voice-over states the importance of mammography. Radio and print ads and a brochure have also been created to support the campaign. The Ad Council conducted the campaign nationwide, and ACS offices contacted their local media

outlets with campaign materials.

The Press Helps Teach: Late last August, half a continent away, more than 800

medical professionals met in Boston at the ACS's national conference on breast cancer to review the latest diagnostic techniques, treatment options, and support services available to women. The ACS focused on the meeting as a rallying point for a press conference and educational forum about breast cancer and to kick off publicity for their campaign, Making Strides Against Breast Cancer. "Since every woman is at risk for breast cancer, we owe it to ourselves and our communities to learn everything we can about fighting it," Mary Costanza, MD, told participants. "Whether it's signing a petition calling for more federal research dollars for breast cancer or organizing a team for the Division's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer, we're fighting for our lives." Dr. Costanza, who is chair of the ACS breast cancer task force in Massachusetts medical school.
