U.S. 277/Mexico 57 Coalition Founded

The U.S. 277/Mexico 57 Coalition was born last Thursday afternoon at the Cauthorn Memorial Building. The purpose of the coalition is to encourage additional traffic through Eldorado, Sonora, Del Rio and on through Mexico.

Interested citizens from Big Springs, San Angelo, Eldorado, Sonora and Del Rio met to discuss prospects of I-27 being routed through San Angelo. Representatives of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce came to Sonora to encourage citizens of surrounding towns to support the San Angelo route for I-

If I-27 reaches San Angelo, it could then be routed to Sonora or Junction.

Some citizens of Sonora believe that a Sonora routing of I-27 would be detrimental to local commerce, while others believe that it would cause an increase in business

The 277/57 Coalition is dedicated to bringing additional traffic through the towns along this route, hoping that NAFTA will cause an upswing in U.S./Mexico traffic.

Bill Ferguson, manager of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company, has been selected as a spokesperson for this

endorsement and support to extend I-27 to I-10 at Sonora, assuming that Texas Department of Transportation approves the San Angelo route over Midland-Odessa


Sonora Golf Teams Compete

Rock Walls to Enclose School and Sutton County Property - WPA Projects

Construction is to begin Monday on a wall of native stone which will completely enclose high school, elementary school and superintendents residence of Sonora property Independent School District. Two hundred feet of 5

foot concrete sidewalk is also to be built. The sidewalk will be from the north entrance of the "campus," to and around the school superintendents residence. There will be 2.200 feet of the wall which will be reinforced and will have pillars, two feet square, every fifty feet. It will be built near the inside edge of the walk around the school football field.

Sutton county courtyard property is to be enclosed with an ornamental stone wall, built as Works Progress Administration project. Plans for the courthouse job call for a wall two and a half feet high on the upper side of the courthouse and one five feet high on the side nearest the

business district. The top of the wall will be level with the top of the steps leading to the

courthouse walk. Weather worn rocks secured on the Authur Simmons Ranch are to be used. Square pillars, twenty inches wide, will be erected at intervals in the wall. Openings will be left in the wall to provide for entrance at the Sonora Woman's Club, the municipal building, the county jail and probably at some place near the courthouse building.

Seven hundred ninety-two vards of rich dirt have been hauled to the courtyard recently for landscaping. The watering trough, little used in recent years, will have to go to make room for the work.

The rock walls also help us to date pictures. You know that a picture without the wall was taken before 1936.

We are still looking for pictures of everyone who has ever lived in Sutton County for our files. This is a huge project and we will not be able to complete it without you help.



For the fourth year in a row, Trash-Off sponsor Coco-Cola is providing volunteers with Texas-sized garbage bags. Last year marked the largest Great Texas Trash-Off in the history of the Don't

Mess with Texas campaign, with 85,000 volunteers picking up more than 7 million gallons of litter across the state. That's enough garbage to fill the beds of 17,000 pickup trucks.

MediVac I, Emergency Helicopter, To Land In Sonora March 31st

Medivac 1, Shannon Medical Center's emergency medical service helicopter, will visit Sonora Thursday, March 31, according to Paul Adams, assistant vice president.

The green and white aircraft is scheduled to land on the hospital grounds at 8:30 a.m. where the public is invited to see the air ambulance and visit with the pilot and medical

Medivac 1 is scheduled to leave at 9:15 a.m. to continue a two-day tour of Shannon's 16-county service area.

Shannon officials are finalizing coordination plans with local emergency medical service personnel, hospital staffs and law enforcement agencies. The new service will begin in April from its home base at Shannon's downtown San Angelo campus.

"As our referral area expands, we need the capability to transfer trauma and critical patients back to San Angelo," Tom Alexander, Shannon President/CEO, said. "The best and fastest way to do that is with a helicopter."

According to Shannon Senior Vice President Lawrence Leonard, Shannon has established a toll-free number area health care providers and law enforcement officials may use to send for the helicopter. That number is 1-800-277-HELI (1-800-277-4354). Leonard said the public should continue to call 911 in emergencies.

The aircraft is a singleengine American Eurocopter AS350 BA manufactured by American Eurocopter Corporation in Grand Prairie. It has a cruising speed of about 150 mph. "We'll be able to pick up patients within a 160-mile radius and return to San Angelo without refueling," he said.

According to Rod Gardner, director of Shannon's Emergency Department, the helicopter will not be used for routine cases. "We will follow specified criteria in dispatching the helicopter," he said. Such conditions include the determination that a patient is

critically ill or has suffered


severe trauma or conditions that would slow or prevent a ground ambulance from transporting a patient such as a situation involving a remote or difficult location within the service area.

Medivac 1's flight crew will include a pilot, a paramedic and a registered nurse. The helicopter accommodates various seating arrangements of up to three passengers. All paramedics and RNs will have Advanced Cardiac Life Support, trauma and pediatric emergency care

certification. Flight training is also required.

Wayne Williams, MD, medical director of Shannon Regional Health Services, said the new air service will be used to "augment the already excellent emergency services in the outlying areas," he said. "We'll need good people on the ground to stabilize and maintain until we can get there. It will be a full partnership, focused entirely on the patient, between Shannon's Medivac 1 and health care providers in our service area."


