Citizens Work Toward New Library

On Thursday night, April 7 the Library Fact-Finding Committee held a town meeting. At this gathering, they announced that almost \$200,000 had been pledged to build a new library.

Citizens in attendance asked questions about alternative sites and future plans. The members of the committee stated that they had investigated all possibilities

and had determined that building a new structure was the plan that they intended to present to the County Commissioners.

The highlight of the evening was a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Lane. The letter is printed here in its entirety.

"To the fellow interested citizens of Sutton County:

Please permit us to participate in this way. A

personal emergency requires our attention tonight.

Sonora is a wonderful place to live because the citizens and their School, County and City officials have made wise, long range decisions for the public good. We have come to expect no less. As thirty year residents of this community, we urge all in attendance to carefully consider what our library contributes to this community.

We are not associated with the Rodeo except as spectators but the excellent Rodeo facilities make Sonora a more enjoyable place to live. Neither of us is a golfer nor do we fly airplanes but we can't imagine Sonora without our beautiful Golf Course or our airport. Our children were gone before the new school facilities were complete, but that does not change the fact that those facilities are the finest and we would want no less for your children.

Through the untiring efforts of a dedicated board and the full support of this community, Hudspeth Hospital has survived. Fortunately, we have never been patients there, but we're grateful the Hospital is still here should we need it. Our City Park, our beautiful churches, our paved streets, our public buildings, the many volunteer organizations---all these contribute to a quality of life for a DIVERSE SOCIETY.

The Sonora Library represents a 68 year investment available to the entire citizenry of Sonora. It matters not that every resident of Sonora does not choose to utilize that investment. Can you think of

a single enhancement to this community that is put to its highest and best use by every citizen? Citizens banded together to provide the 4-H Center. Some of you were probably here to participate in the citizen upgrading of our track and stadium facilities some 26-28 years ago. We joined hands to make the Depot Building into something special. We supported efforts to provide superior equipment for our volunteer fire fighters - equipment the envy of surrounding communities.

The EMS asked for and received community support for their equipment and building. The Harrell Maintenance building, the County Annex and even the jail add to our quality of life in this place.

A Library, the depository of the written word, deserves no less recognition for its contribution to our quality of life. It deserves a quality facility. Please use your influence so we may remain faithful to a long heritage of QUALITY in Sonora.

Thank you for allowing us to speak in this way - another quality of Sonora life.

On Monday morning, A.W. Bishop presented a report to the County Court. Commissioner John Wade made a motion to extend to the committee adequate time to complete their fund-raising campaign. The Court passed the motion and the committee is continuing fund-raising activities. Several Sonora organizations are presently raising funds for the new library.

Sonora Schools Praised For Excellence

Educators from Austin and San Angelo met with the Sutton County School Board on Wednesday, April 6th. Texas State School Board member Mary Perkins, Melody Johnson, TEA representative, who heads up the middle school initiative program for the state, Janice Guerra, TEA representative, Melody Johnson's assistant, Jim Coffee, who represents region 15 service center and Susan Carpenter, representative of the service center met with the board at a noon meeting.

They commended the board for the fine work being done in this school system and especially commended the work being done with the middle school mentor program. The Carnegie foundation is funded of reach training for teachers in the mentor program. Only four schools in Texas have been funded for curriculum training by the Carnegie foundation. The emphasis on the training is for interdisciplinary units or the combining of subjects with teachers working together in different disciplines to further enhance the education of the children. There are only 75 schools in the United States being funded for this project.

They also commended the school board for supporting the restructuring, not only of the middle school, but of the high school and elementary schools as well. Mrs. Perkins enthusiastically endorsed the program and stressed how important this program was. Sonora is the only rural district in the State of Texas that is

being funded by the Carnegie foundation.

Melody Johnson stressed the importance that of the over 800 rural schools in Texas, Sonora was the only one to receive this recognition. She also stated that Sonora was being used as an example of exceptional rural schools.

Mrs. Perkins stated that change in educational systems is always slow and that the key

word for this and all programs for educational development in Texas should be *patience*.

These people stated that ages 10-14 were critical ages in education and that these were the transitional, volatile years and that students must be understood and challenged to remain in the educational system. She stated that this was the most critical time to prevent drop-outs.

Mrs. Perkins stated that The Commissioner of Education, Skip Meno, had proposed to the legislature to increase the number of staff

development days for teachers. She stated that if these staff development days were not approved by the legislature that Dr. Meno intended to reduce the number of instructional school days from 180 to 160 for staff development.






PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) is a blood test which will be offered at the Health Fair, May 11, 1994 at the Clint Langford Memorial Building.

Joseph & Mabel Vanderstucken "Citizens of the Year"

The recipients of the CITIZENS OF THE YEAR award given by the Chamber of Commerce for 1994 are Joseph and Mabel Vanderstucken.

Joseph M. Vanderstucken was born in Sonora on February 15, 1901. His parents were E. F. Vanderstucken and Bessie Wyatt Vanderstucken, who both came to Sonora in the early 1880's. He entered the ranching business in 1923, when he purchased a ranch from his parents, raising cattle, sheep and goats. Joseph was the vice-president of the First National Bank of Sonora, where he was on the board since March 25, 1929. His was a director of Sonora Wool & Mohair Company, and a member of the board of Concho Valley Boy Scouts and El Camino Girl Scouts and on the advisory board of Concho Valley Home for Girls. He is past supervisor and chairman of Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District, past president of West Texas Boy's Ranch, and a life member of the executive committee and was on the board of directors. Joseph was also the first president of Edwards Plateau Wildlife Association, a pioneer in the fight against bitterweed here in the area, a member of the State Land Use Planning Board and chairman of the board of the Lillian M. Hudspeth Hospital board for twenty years. He has served as senior warden of St. John's Episcopal Church, on the Bishop's Committee, and on the Vestry for many years. Joseph was selected as Senior Citizen of Sutton County in 1975.

Joseph married Miss Mabel Mears in Menard April 27, 1925. Her parents were Edward L. Mears and Emma Wilkinson both pioneer families in Menard County. She attended Menard schools, and graduated from the Hockaday School in Dallas and attended St. Mary's College in Dallas. She has been active in community affairs, serving on the local school board for many years and was a member of the Hudspeth Hospital board. Mabel is past president of the Hudspeth Memorial Auxiliary, and was a member of that organization. She was a member of the Sutton County Historical Society, has been a member of the Sonora Women's Club, and also past president of the Episcopal Women of the Church, and was a member of the Eastern Star. Like her husband, she has been a member of the El Camino Girl Scout Council and on the advisory board of the Concho Valley Home for Girls. She has served as president of the Sonora Girl Scouts and vice-president of the El Camino Girl Scout Council. In January of 1978, she was elected to serve on St. John's Episcopal Church Vestry. Joseph and Mabel Vanderstucken donated land in Real County to the El Camino Girl Scout Council where a camp was established and named Jo Jan Van after their daughters, Jan and Jo Bess. They have donated a chapel to the local hospital in memory of their parents, Mr. & Mrs. Vanderstucken and Mr. & Mrs. Mears.

Joseph and Mabel have done countless things for the citizens of Sonora. They have donated buildings to organizations, donated time and help to anyone that has needed it, and given of themselves completely. They are very deserving of the award they received at the banquet. (information given by Sutton County Historical Society)





Lori Solis is the recipient of 1994's EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR award given by the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Solis has made quite a name for herself in Sonora. She has received numerous awards for her achievements with the Sonora Independent School district. Among her awards are: the Ginevra Wood Carson Educator of the Year Award (January 14th), the Mayor's Award of Excellence (February 15th), and The Who's Who in American Education (Oct. 1993).

Lori brings not only a superior basis of knowledge but also a dignity, poise and graciousness to her workplace. She serves as an excellent role model for all students - Hispanic and Anglo alike - and by her position attitude, she is instrumental in developing the self esteem of each child she touches.

Mrs. Solis has been with the Sonora Independent School District for 22 years. While working in Sonora, she has developed three very important projects. The ACTS program was developed as a high school program aimed at addressing the needs of At-Risk students. She wrote a grant proposal and was awarded funds through the Concho Valley Council of Government to implement the program. The HARP program is an early childhood education program aimed at early intervention for 3 and 4 year olds who are limited English proficient and /or economically disadvantaged. The program also provides parenting skills to enable these children to receive additional support from the home. The ELKS program is an after school program aimed at meeting the needs of latch key children. Lori wrote proposals to two major companies (Enron and Meridian) requesting monies to fund this program.
