Intermediate School Hosts Balloon Bust

The students at Sonora Intermediate (grades 3, 4, and 5) celebrated a great year of reading with a Balloon Bust, Tuesday, May 24. Each student selected a balloon from the bin and burst it by sitting or stomping on it. The balloon held a square of colored paper. The student was then given a grab bag of surprises according to that colored square.

The students enjoyed opening their bags, drinking a coke, and visiting with their friends. Some students were heard discussing the Balloon Bust being as much fun as Christmas. Numerous sponsors from Sonora and San Angelo made the party possible.

Sonora Intermediate participates in the Accelerated Reader program where students earn points (to be spent on prizes) for each book

they read. Books (with a passed computer test) read by each grade level are as follows: third grade - 1,395 books; fourth grade - 1,939 books; and fifth grade - 1,877 books. Points earned by each grade are as follows: third grade - 2,700.2 points; fourth grade - 4,388.7 points; and fifth grade - 6,864.9 points. The grand totals are 5,211 books and 13,953.8 points. There was an average of 200 students participating during the school year.

Several programs and contests enticed the students to read. During February the students wanted to treat their principal, Mrs. Donna Hill, to a day of leisure reading. They built the Yellow Brick Road brick by brick by reading over 600 books in four weeks. The yellow brick road stretched

from the library doors, through the hallway, down the stairwell, down the carpeted aisle of the auditorium, up the stage steps, and halfway across the stage. She found a special place on the stage with a comfortable chair and lamp to relax and leisurely read for the day. The students knew that Mrs. Hill works very hard to give them the best education possible - and that she very rarely took a day off to relax. So, they decided to give her a special treat for Valentine's Day! The students shared this special day with her by going into the auditorium and silently reading during their reading classes. (Actually, they were there to make sure that she rested and leisurely read!)

During the Winter Olympics, Sonora Intermediate participated in a reading competition. This was a team event with each homeroom participating as a team against each homeroom in its grade level. Each team kept record of the books they read in an official olympic folder that was judged at the end of competition. 561 books were read during the three week competition.

Students at Sonora Intermediate enjoy playing

games and working puzzles, so, our next reading program was to build a 640 piece jigsaw puzzle on a large bulletin board in the hall. It took the students only a month to solve it. "The more you read, the more you know. The more you know, the smarter you grow." Illustrations of assorted books finished the puzzle.

Each class had a Pig-Out Party in the library during National Library Week. They oinked like pigs, feasted on popcorn and pretzels, watched the video "Perfect the Pig", and worked word puzzles. Each book read during a two-week period was listed on a Pig-Out Menu that was kept in the AR folders. Each book listed entitled the students to enter a game of estimation - how many books were read by students at Sonora Intermediate so far this year? Each entry was shaped like a piece of corn that was fed to the library's pet pig - a mailbox decorated to look like a pig.

Other estimation contests were enjoyed by the students during the fall, at Christmas, and at Valentines.

The students, teachers and

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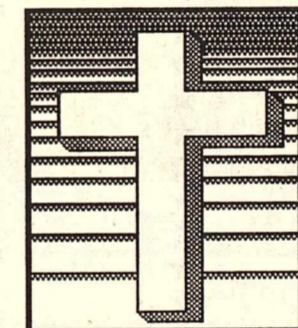
Jordan's Market Report May 26, 1994

Receipts totaled 1538 head. A good crowd was on hand to bid on several special consignments of replacement females in addition to the regular run of cattle. The uniform groups of young cow calf pairs saw a real strong demand with prices being \$50 to \$100 per pair higher than our last special a couple of weeks ago. The old and single pairs sold about steady. Bred cows and heifers sold mostly steady with recent weeks trends. The calf calving females are equally as strong as the longbred are maybe a little higher than the summer calves. Open and exposed replacements were lightly tested at steady to lower prices. The stocker and feeder market is certainly uneven to say the least with future trades down the limit one day and up the limit the next. Some of the big feeder steers sold mostly steady while the big feeder heifers were definitely lower to the tune of \$3. Light weight steer and heifer calves were seeing a big \$15 to \$20 dollar spread in the sexes and almost that much spread in quality and flesh trends. The heavier steer and heifer new crop calves have leveled off over the last couple of weeks to a \$5 to \$10 spread of flesh. The calves and yearlings with some build in gaining ability and performance possibilities are still out selling the real fat kinds. Packer cows and bulls sold \$1 to \$3 lower.

GTE Southwest Incorporated (GTE) filed revisions to its General Exchange Tariff which address Charges Applicable Under Special Conditions. These revisions apply only to new rural applicants for service in locations where no facilities exist. In this application, GTE seeks approval to change the line facility construction charges from \$90 per 1/10 mile to \$150 per 1/10 mile or 10 percent of the total construction costs, whichever is less. In addition, GTE proposes a charge for the construction of rural radio facilities of 10 percent of the difference in costs between a standard 45-foot pole and the pole constructed to provide telephone service. In addition, cable/drop facilities from the pole to the customer premises in excess of 100 feet will be constructed at \$150 per 1/10 mile or 10 percent of the total construction costs in excess of 100 feet of cable, whichever is less. This application will not result in any change to current monthly charges of existing customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or comment upon these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Ask The Historical Society



This picture of an event held on the courthouse lawn is dated June 1916, unfortunately we don't have any newspapers for 1916. Can any of our readers tell us what the celebration was for?

Q. What year did Sonora start fogging mosquitoes?

A. Devil's River News, June 3, 1955 "Sonora was one of the first Texas cities to inaugurate a fogging program, when the city, county, and the Sonora Lions Club jointly financed and purchased a machine in 1947."

Q. How long has goat hair been used to make fabric?

A. After a great deal of searching through history books and talking with the Mohair Council in San Angelo, the following is the earliest reference I could find to the use of goat hair: The Bible.

Exodus 35:6 Violet, purple and scarlet yarn, fine linen and goat hair.

Exodus 35:36 All the women who possessed the skill, spun goat hair.

Exodus 36:14 And he made curtains of goats' hair for the tent over the tabernacle; eleven curtains he made them.

Historians say this would be approximately 967 B.C. If anyone can give us an earlier reference please give us a call and we will be happy to print a

correction in our next column.

Q. What is a Merino?

A. Readers Digest "Discovering America's Past" Few animals were in such demand in the early 1800's as merino sheep, a Spanish breed prized for the quality and abundance of its fleece. Since Spain forbade their sale to foreigners, any American who got hold of contraband sheep was quick to breed them.

What began as a businesslike interest burgeoned into a national mania in 1807: an embargo on British textiles made everyone eager to get into wool production, and prices for merinos soared as high as \$1,000 each. In 1810 the Spanish king was unseated just long enough to lose some 20,000 sheep to export, causing a dip in the value of American merinos. But the madness persisted until 1815, when the effect of influx of Spanish sheep was finally felt, leaving American farmers with flocks of sorely devalued sheep. note: According to several local ranchers the Merino is raised mainly in Australia now. In our area most of the sheep are raised for mutton and the primary

breed is Rambouillet. Webster's Dictionary defines Rambouillet as a variety of merino sheep originally bred in France, now raised in the western United States for both its wool and mutton.

Q. When did they start making SPAM?

A. George Hormel, Minnesota meat packer introduced to the American people, in 1937, a canned minced pork and ham loaf that needed no refrigeration. He gave a \$100 prize to the person who thought up the catchy name SPAM. Today Hormel boasts that Americans use nearly four 7-ounce cans of SPAM a second.

I would like to thank the students who submitted this weeks questions. We went a little out of Sutton County history, but I think it is important that we answer questions for children whenever we can.

It isn't easy to see how to make four spades on this deal. With the A-Q of diamonds and king of clubs offside and the hearts not dividing evenly, it seems South must sooner or later lose a heart, two diamonds and a club and go down one. But when the deal arose in the semifinals of the 1992 Spingold Team Championship, Peter Boyd of Silver Spring, Md., found the way to make ten tricks.

Boyd reached four spades on the bidding shown. North's redouble of West's takeout double promised precisely three-card spade support, and the auction proceeded normally thereafter.

Boyd won the opening spade lead in his hand and cashed a second trump. He was sure West had at least four hearts for his takeout double,

power of his mind?

leaving East with no more than two hearts.

Not unreasonably, Boyd decided he should try to find East with the doubleton nine or ten of hearts. In that case, after the nine or ten fell on the second round of the suit, a third-round finesse of dummy's eight would permit a club or diamond discard on the queen.

Accordingly, Boyd played the king of hearts at trick three. When West won and shifted to a club, declarer put up dummy's ace and cashed the heart jack, hoping to fetch the nine or ten from East. East did not oblige, but Boyd had yet another string to his bow.

At trick six, he led a heart to West's nine and dummy's queen, then played the heart eight from dummy and on it discarded the jack of clubs! West won with the ten and was endplayed. If he returned a diamond, declarer would score the king, so West exited with a low club. Boyd covered with dummy's nine, ruffed East's king, crossed to dummy's six of spades and discarded a diamond on the club queen to bring home his game.

At the other table, West led a club against the same contract, leaving declarer no chance, but that should in no way detract from Boyd's superlative effort in finding the winning route to ten tricks at his table.

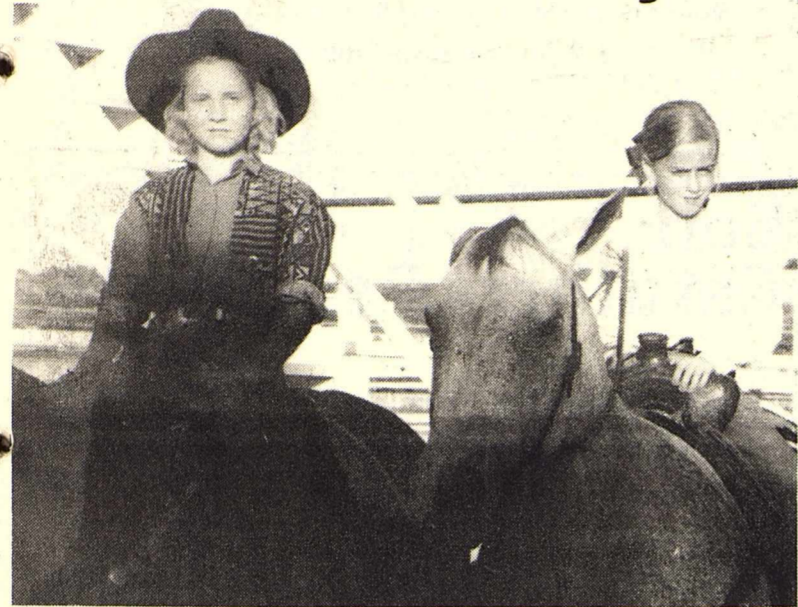

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
