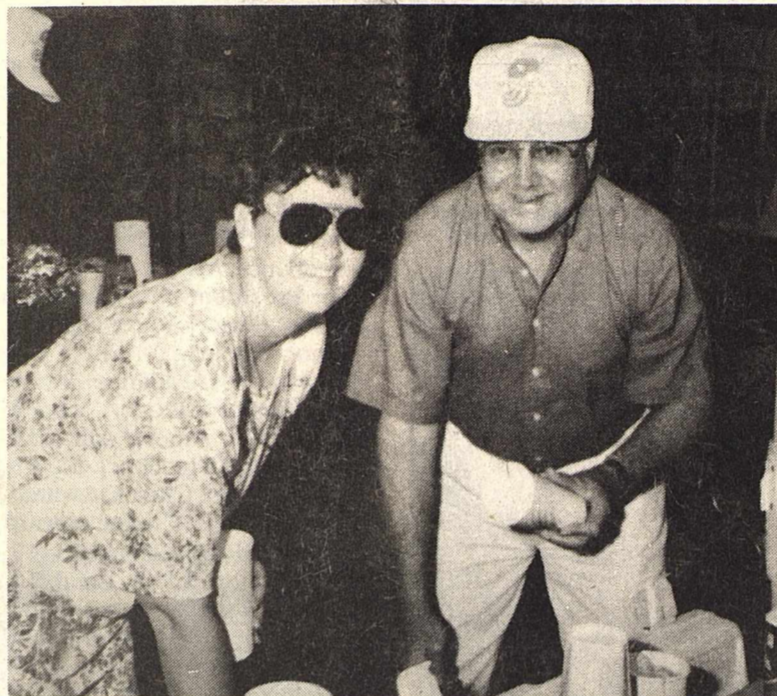

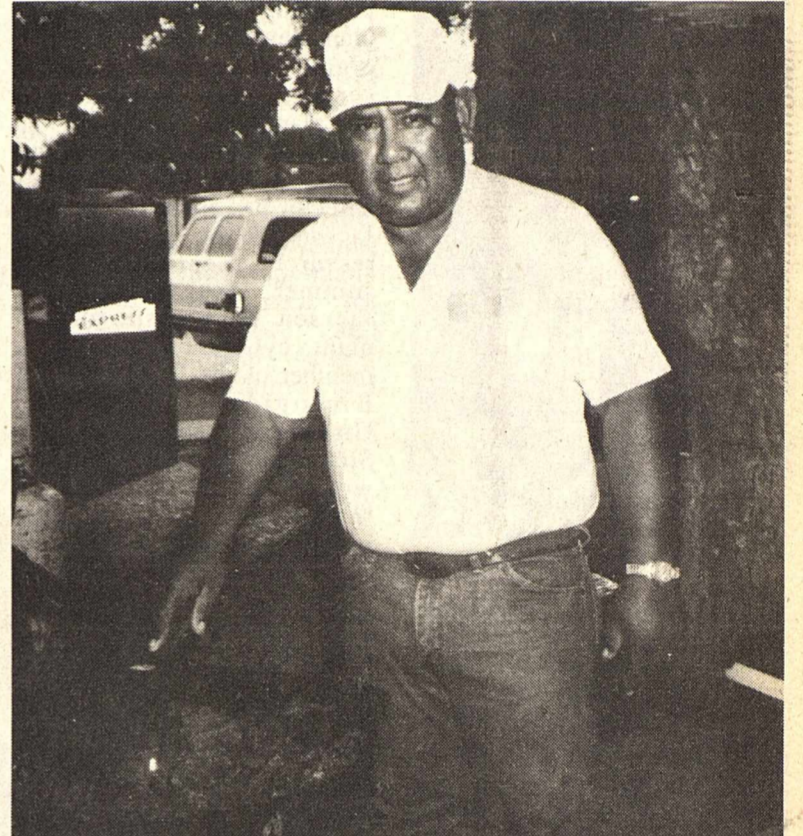
Chamber Of Commerce Mixer Held

Christie Adkins, daughter of Jack and Nellie Adkins has been awarded a fellowship grant from the National Science Foundation/Howard Hughes Medical Institutes Summer Undergraduate Research program in Plant Biology at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas.

The NSF/REU Plant Biology program gives motivated undergraduates the opportunity to work in active research laboratories in an intense summer research experience. The undergraduate research fellows work independently or as part of research teams on problems in plant

Biology. Faculty Mentor research areas include plant physiology, plant cell biology, plant developmental biology, plant systematics, plant genetics, plant biochemistry, and plant gene expression.

Dr. Richard L. Blanton, PH.D., NSF/REU Project Director has assigned Dr. Ray Jackson to be her Faculty research mentor for the summer program.

Dr. Jackson is a distinguished plant cytogeneticist and a member of the Department of Biological Sciences. Undergraduate research students in his laboratory work on a variety of independent projects that involve cytogenetic analysis of wild and green house populations of plants. Undergraduates explore the effects of anticancer compounds upon chromosomes of Haploppus, investigate cytogenetically the cause of sterility in hybrid plants.

Christie is a member of the Alpha Lambda Delta National Honor Society, the Epsilon Sigma Chapter of Tri-Beta Biological Honor Society, on the Dean's list for students with a 3.5 or above and a candidate for graduation in December 1994 with a degree in Biology from Angelo State University, San Angelo, Texas.

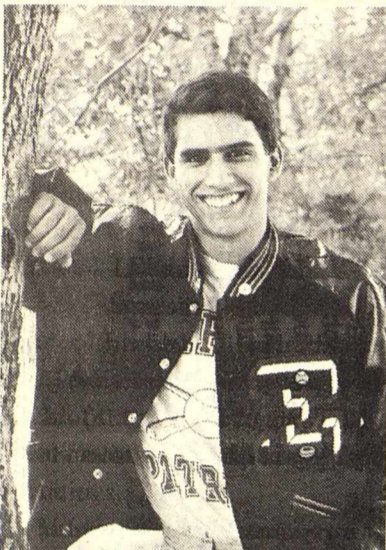

UMC Announces New Appointments

Eleven United Methodist churches from San Angelo to Sonora are to welcome new ministers next week.

The remaining 31 congregations in the United Methodist Church's San Angelo District-which covers Coke, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Kimble, Kinney, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Tom Green, Upton and Val Verde counties-are to have the same pastors for the coming year.

Bishop Raymond H. Owen of San Antonio announced the ministerial appointments in Corpus Christi during the June 1-4 session of the church's Southwest Texas Annual Conference. Pastors with new assignments are to lead their new congregations in worship for the first time June 12.

United Methodist bishops assign ordained ministers under their supervision to post annually. A pastor may serve a congregation for more than one year if the bishop reappoints him or her to that post.

The Southwest Texas Conference includes more than 365 United Methodist congregations with 107,000 members in southern and southwestern Texas. Besides

San Angelo and Ozona, the conference area encompasses Austin, Corpus Christi, Kerrville, McAllen, San Antonio and Victoria.

More United Methodists live in Texas than in any other state-some 800,000 in more than 2,200 congregations.

All About Ice Cream

FUN FACTS:

*U.S. ice cream consumption is highest in June and July.

*Ice cream and related frozen desserts are consumed by over 98% of the households in the United States.

*The top five flavors of ice cream in the U.S. are: vanilla, chocolate, strawberry, butter pecan and Neapolitan.

*The most popular ice cream toppings are: hot fudge, chocolate fudge, butterscotch, caramel and strawberry.

STORAGE AND HANDLING TIPS:

*Store ice cream tightly covered at 0° F or colder.

*To avoid any drying out after the carton has been partially used, cover the surface of the ice cream with plastic wrap before reclosing and return to freezer immediately. For longer

storage, enclose the carton in freezer wrap.

*Partially melted, ice cream can develop a coarse texture when refrozen. Partial melting also may cause the ice cream to shrink in volume.

SERVING HINTS:

*Transfer ice cream to the refrigerator before serving to soften. Allow about 10 minutes for pints and 20 minutes for half-gallons.

*When using half-gallon containers, scoop ice cream from the center to the side of the carton.

*To prevent ice cream from sticking to the scoop, rinse the scoop in running water.

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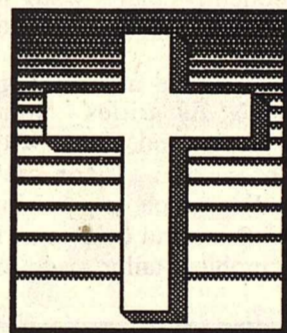

Q. When were the stock pens south of town built?

A. Devil's River News, May 21, 1964

The Sonora Stockyards south of Sonora were opened in style May 12 as close to 10,000 Angora goats were placed in the all-steel pens, consigned for sale at the opening day auction. The grounds boast a newly remodeled building housing the offices, snack bar, conference room, 20,000 pound capacity scales, and sales arena. The sale followed a barbecue dinner served to an estimated 2,000 visitors from throughout the West Texas area. Among the special guests for the day was state Senator Dorsey Hardeman.

Visitors heaped their plates with barbecue, beans, and all the trimmings. The meat was contributed by Sutton County ranchmen, and the serving line was manned by Sonora businessmen.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Schwartz will operate the Sonora Stockyards and John Lockett is Resident Manager.

Work started in January after Northern Natural Gas agreed to relinquish their lease on land south of the railroad pens south of Sonora and sell their building to Sonora Stockpens, and the Santa Fe agreed to lease the land to the Stockpens. R. M. McCarver supervised the building of a three tiered loader. It is estimated that the pens will hold 25,000 sheep or 3,500 cattle.

Edwin Sawyer was elected president of Sonora Stockpens, Robert Halbert was named vice-president, and Harold Schertz, secretary-

treasurer. The executive committee is composed of Fred Earwood, Lea Allison, Rex Cusenbary, and Sawyer, Halbert and Schertz.

Directors are Allison, Vestel Askew, Bundy, Cusenbary, Dan Cauthorn, Earwood, Bryan Hunt, Halbert, C.T. Jones, Ralph Mayer, W. L. Miers, Stanley Mayfield, Sawyer, Bill Savell, Sears Sentell, Bill Tittle, and Joe M. VanderStucken.

In April plans were formulated for a grand opening, and Schwartz announced that he would provide free transportation anywhere in the United States for the first carload of goats purchased on opening day and shipped by rail. (Sonora had a railroad at that time.) Highest price of the day was \$13.50 for yearling muttons.

Q. Why do we have four time zones across the U.S.A.?

A. Reader's Digest, Discovering America's Past

When the ball dropped in New York City at noon on Sunday, November 18, 1883, it signaled not a new year, but a new way of keeping time. Until that day the nation had run on solar time - from coast to coast each town marked noon at the moment when the sun hit its zenith at that area. Consequently there were at least 80 time zones in North America.

In the horse and carriage era such disparities were easily tolerated, but with advent of inter-city railroading, such imprecision caused chaos and collisions. It was a problem tailor made for

the fastidious imagination of Charles F. Dowd, who in the late 1860's began tinkering with time. He ultimately concluded that the nation should be divided into four one hour time zones, using meridians 15 degrees apart, and published his proposal in 1870.

Shortly afterward William F. Allen, editor of two railroad guides, took up the study of standardizing time for the American Railroad Association. After much investigation he recommended Dowd's plan, and railroad leaders made it official in 1883.

Across the nation time stood still while clocks caught up with the new decree. Crowds gathered in train stations, watches in hand, making subtle yet profound shift in the way things were done. Dissenters vowed they would continue to live on "God's time, not Vanderbilt's," but the benefits of the new were swiftly apparent. Dowd however, did not live to see Congress finally pass the Standard Time Act in 1918. In 1904, at age 79, he was run over by a train.

The original time zone plan used straight meridians to delimit the regions. Late plans, based on geography and local custom created the now familiar bends.

The most important aim when you are declarer is to make the contract if it can be made, and the most important aim when you are a defender is to beat the contract if it can be beaten.

These goals may be achieved by following a fundamental principle. You always assume that the cards lie in a way that will enable you to meet your goal, rather than in a way that will prevent your achieving it. Very often, this assumption will prove false, but there is little to be lost by adopting the more optimistic view.

Here is a typical case. West leads the king of spades against four hearts and is faced with the problem of how to continue at trick two. His correct play is a low club, which defeats the contract after East takes the ace,

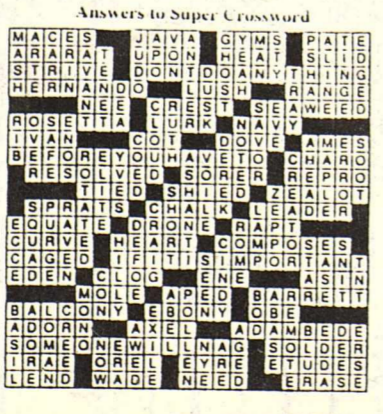

These revisions apply only to new rural applicants for service in locations where no facilities exist. In this application, GTESW seeks approval to change the line facility construction charges from \$90 per 1/10 mile to \$150 per 1/10 mile or 10 percent of the total construction costs, whichever is less. In addition, GTESW proposes a charge for the construction of rural radio facilities of 10 percent of the difference in costs between a standard 45-foot pole and the pole constructed to provide telephone service. In addition, cable/drop facilities from the pole to the customer premises in excess of 100 feet will be constructed at \$150 per 1/10 mile or 10 percent of the total construction costs in excess of 100 feet of cable, whichever is less. This application will not result in any change to current monthly charges of existing customers.

Public Notice

On March 23, 1994, GTE and Contel ("The Companies") filed applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") to restructure the Companies' Switched Transport rate category and reduce the Carrier Common Line (CCL) charge of its Switched Access Service. The tariff sheets in GTE and Contel's applications, if approved, will bring the Companies' state access tariffs into structural parity with their interstate tariffs for the Local Transport rate category, which became effective on December 30, 1993.

GTE and Contel propose to implement the new tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. The Local Transport category of GTE and Contel's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers.

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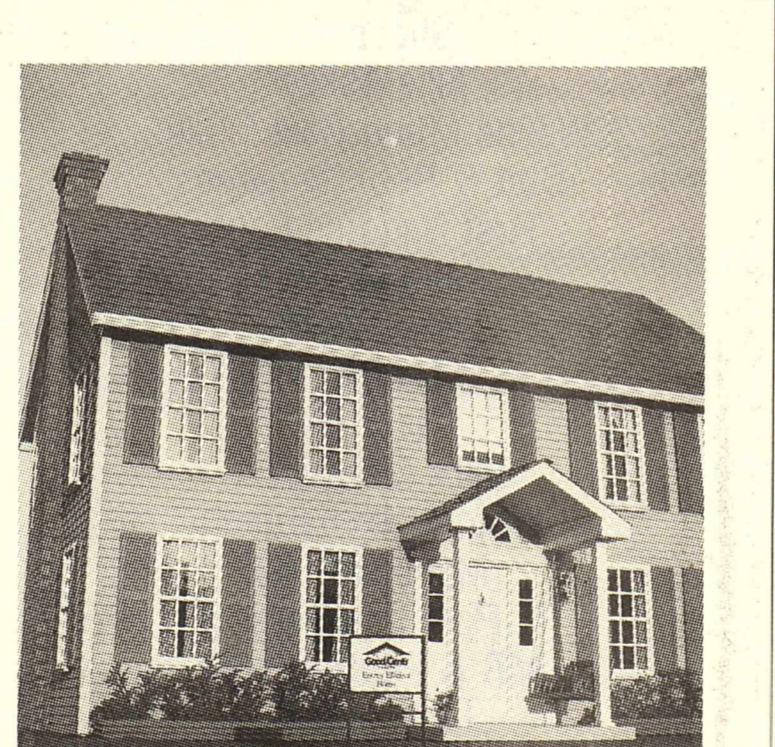

Dr. Johnson advised that .973% of the 1993 taxes had been collected as of April 30, 1994.

Mr. Hempel gave an update on the Nursing Home. Mr. Hempel presented a per room cost for redoing the rooms. (See exhibit B) The cost per bed will be \$541.31, including furnishings, with a total cost of approximately \$21,220.95. Discussion was held regarding the Cauthorn Trust. Dr. Johnson advised he had visited with two Board members of the Cauthorn Trust and they had suggested the Hospital District write a letter to the Trust with a formal request for a contribution.

Mr. Hempel advised that he had talked with a State Inspector concerning the exhaust fan for the smoking area in the Nursing Home. Mr. Hempel advised that this is allowed and it will be put in place soon.

Mr. Hempel advised that he will be advertising in the surrounding towns for temporary placement of Nursing Home residents in our facility that are waiting for a bed in the Nursing Home in their town.

There was no business for the executive session, but Dr. Johnson asked that the sessions continue to be put on the agenda. Discussion was held regarding physician recruitment. Mr. Hempel advised that head hunters range from \$10,000 to \$60,000, plus the cost of meals, travel, etc. for a physician to come and look

and visit the facility. Discussion was held regarding the different options in physician recruitment.

Mr. Hempel gave the financial report for March. The Hospital showed a loss of \$51,710 and the Nursing Home showed a loss of \$14,904.

Upon motion by Lewis Allen, seconded by Ben Solis, the Board approved the April expenditures. (See exhibit C)

With no further business, motion was made by Ray Smith to adjourn. Ben Solis seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

1. Invalid registration - Effective January 1, 1994, all vessels must be registered and titled, except vessels under 14 feet when paddled, oared, poled, or windblown.
2. Insufficient life jackets (Personal Floatation Device) -

one for every person in the boat.

3. Children under 13 years of age must have a PFD on while the boat is underway.

4. A fire extinguisher in serviceable condition.

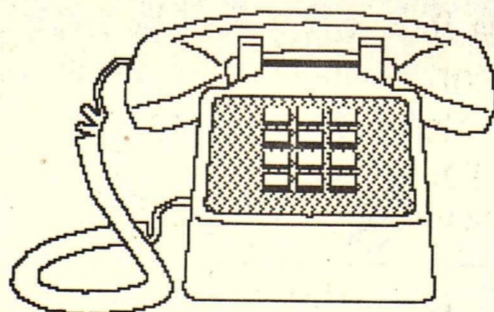
5. A vessel underway between sunset and sunrise must have the correct lights.

6. Reckless or negligent operation of a vessel.

7. Operation of a vessel while intoxicated (BWI).


