## Plane Crashes At Sonora Golf Course

A single engine Cessna 175 airplane crashed at the Sonora Golf Club, Monday at approximately 8:30 p.m. The plane was being flown by Alvin Lewis Stewart, 41, of Sonora. One passenger, Alvis Junior Rudolf was aboard the flight.

The plane hit some trees and crashed just west of the seventh tee box.

There were several witnesses to the crash, including Brian Rhodes, Sonora Golf Club greenskeeper. Rhodes gave a report to Douglas Wigington, air safety investigator with the National Transportation Safety Board. Rhodes stated in his report that approximately 15 minutes before the crash he "saw the plane circling around the golf course and airport at a very low altitude."

Tony Torres, Rhodes coworker, witnessed the plane circle and crash. Stated Torres, "It (the airplane) was tilted way over making the turn too low and the left wing hit the trees."

Rhodes, Torres and golfers, Savell and Shelly Shannon assisted the two injured men. Both men were transported to Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial hospital and from there to San Angelo. Mr. Stewart was released. Mr. Rudolf remains hospitalized in

stable condition.

The investigation caused the golf course to be closed most of Tuesday.

Said investigator

Wigington, "Any time people walk away from an airplane crash, they are very fortunate. This airplane attained substantial damage."

Sonora police officers worked through the night and most of Tuesday attempting to keep interested spectators from the sight.

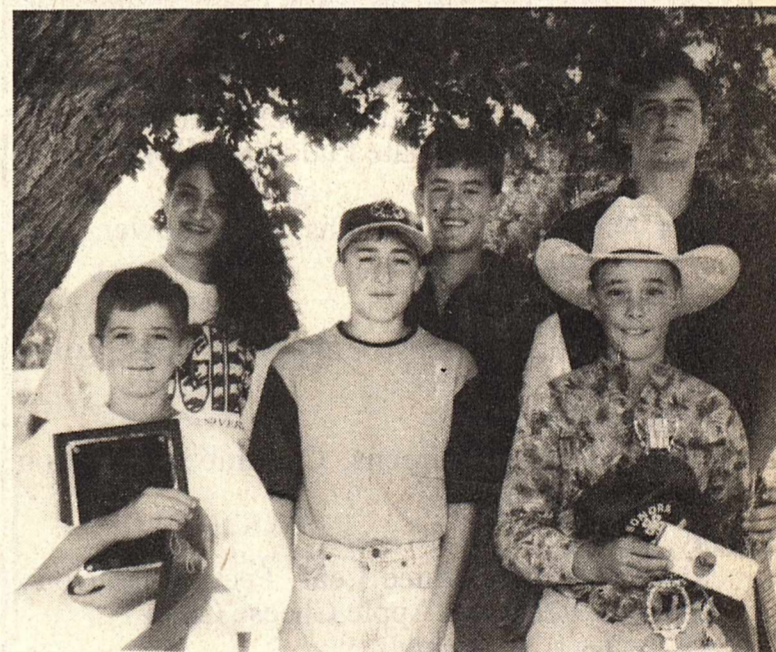

# Ask The Historical Society

**Q. When was the Sonora Police Department Building built?**

A. Devil's River News, January 11, 1935, Municipal Building To Be Completed by Last of March

Work on the municipal building for the city of Sonora was started Thursday morning. Ground-breaking at 10:45 was done by W. C. Gilmore, mayor, and commissioners, Alfred Schwiening and Vernon Hamilton. Others who were present were: George E. Wynn, city attorney; George E. Smith, city manager; John G. Becker, San Angelo, architect for the structure; A. E. Suggs and Grover C. Dunlap of Suggs Construction Co., Abilene,

contractors for the building. The total expenditure for the building will be approximately \$5700. Thirty percent of this sum is an outright Public Works Administration Grant. Completion according to the contract, must be within sixty working days. The building will be of tile and stucco and have a tar and gravel roof. It will house the city's fire equipment and provide a building for the transaction of city business.

**Note:** This building has been greatly changed through the years with additions and major interior changes.

A work order for construction of a \$28,100 Mexican School was issued.

The library was to be closed for a month to try to check the spread of contagious diseases

Mae Cauthorn became Mrs. Rip Ward, Ruth Tipton became Mrs. Edgar D. Shurley and Ada Word became Mrs. Ralph H. Winton.

Lea Roy Adwell, John Hull and Edwin Sawyer left Sunday for College Station where they were students at A&M College. They had been home visiting their parents for the holidays.

The last day of deer season proved a fortunate one for Alfred Schwiening when he secured a ten point flagtail on his lower ranch.

Orion Brown Boot Shop is charging 50 cents for rubber heels and 25 cents with any half sole job.

The Piggly Wiggly had the following specials: one pound can of pork and beans for 5 cents; gallon of apricots for 53 cents; tuna fish 14 cents a can; one pound package of bacon 28 cents; Washington apples for 1 cent each; Yams at 3 pounds for 11 cents; a bunch of carrots for 2 cents and a head of lettuce 4 cents; No 1 potatoes were 10 pounds for 18 cents and picnic hams were being sold for 15 cents a pound.

E. F. Vander Stucken Co. had a large advertisement stressing that people should eat more fresh fruits and vegetables. Physicians stressed the health giving qualities of fruits and vegetables and state people eat too little of both. (Some things don't charge.)

## World War II Veteran Gus Eustace

Gus Eustace entered into the Army on December 8, 1941 at Houston, Texas. He participated in the following campaigns: Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Central Europe and Tunisia. Gus received the following citations and decorations: EAME Campaign Medal with 6 Bronze Stars & Bronze Arrowhead, Good Conduct Medal, Purple Heart for wounds received in action March 29, 1943, and the American Defense Service Medal.

On July 21, 1945, First Sergeant Gus Eustace received an Honorable Discharge from the military at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

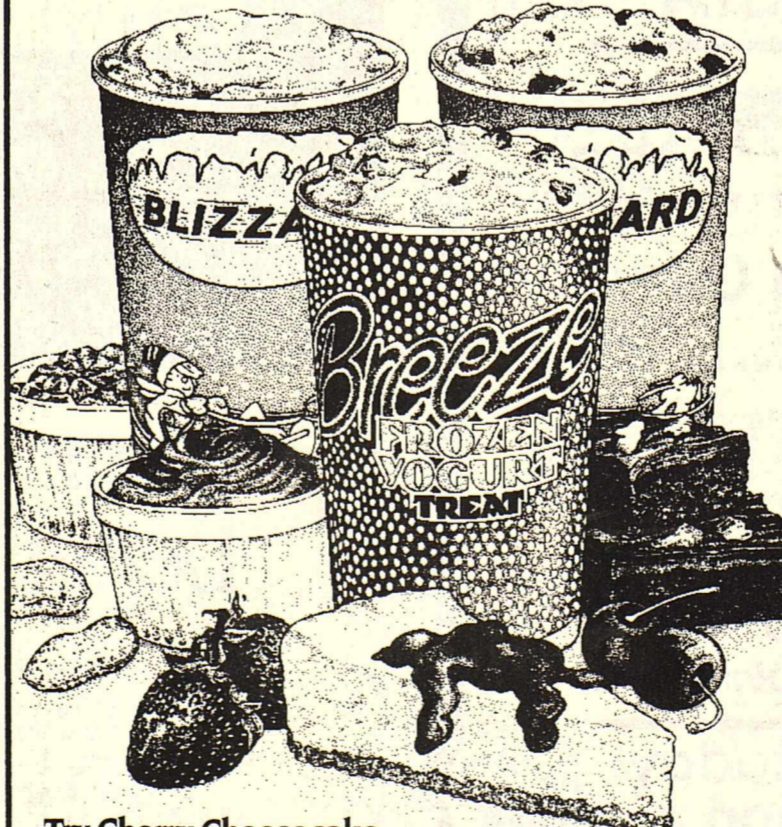

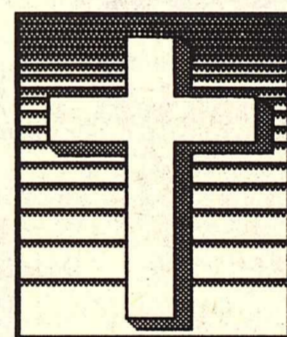

The theme for the younger students is Come Along with JESUS. Pupils in

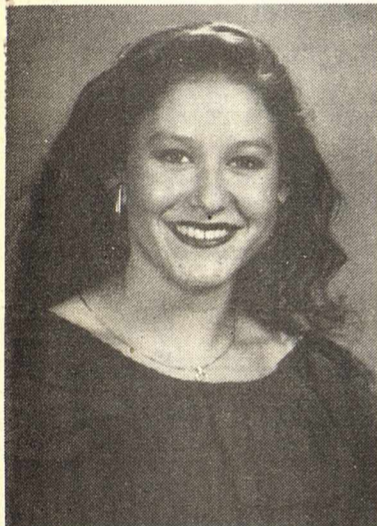
grades 3-5 will learn more about a relationship with GOD. Christian love and service, prayer, and the Bible will be emphasized through lessons, music, recreation and crafts.

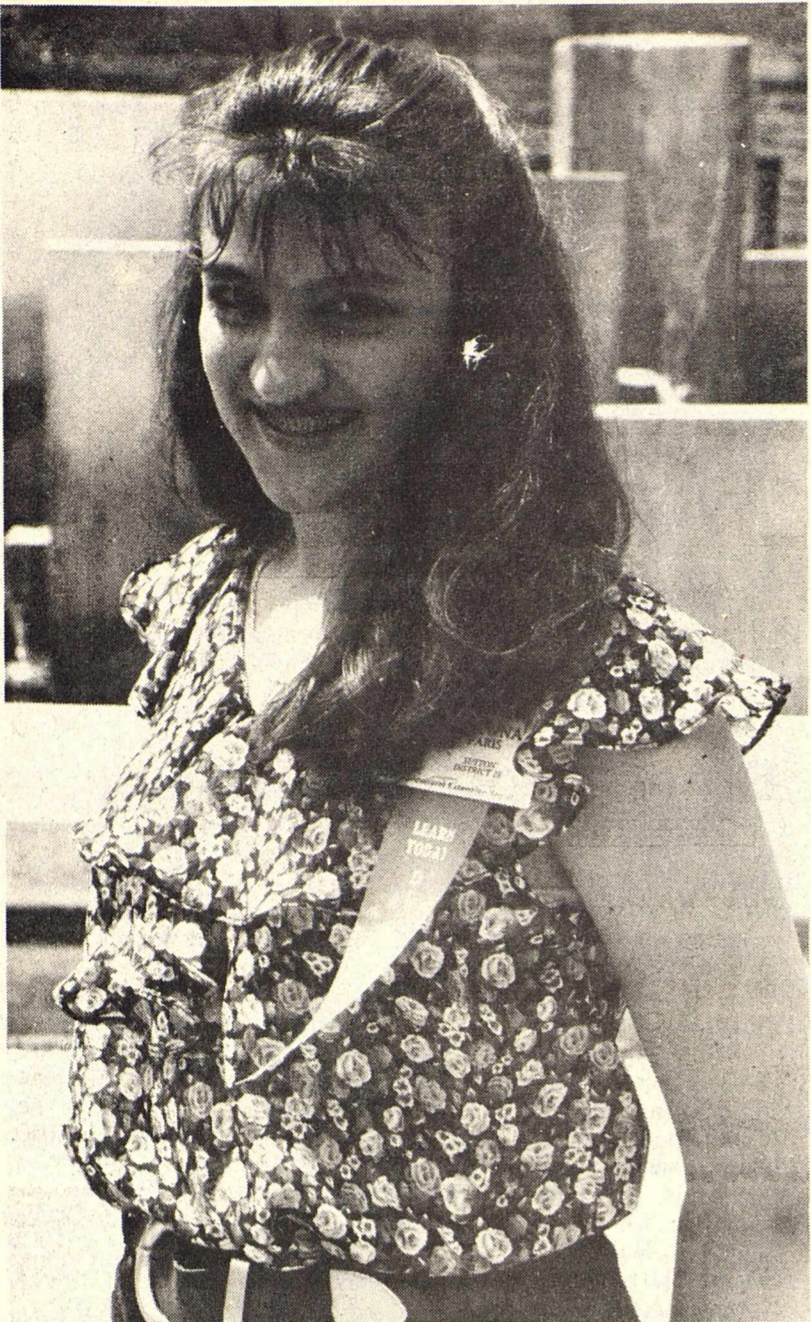

## Natural Gas Safety Tips

School's out once again, and it's that time of year for parents and kids to learn their summer safety do's and don'ts.

Typically, summertime prompts parents to remind the kids to look both ways before crossing the street, to wear sunscreen while playing in the sun and to drink plenty of liquids.

include the Senior Roping, 40 & Over Roping, Ladies Goat Tying and the Open Roping. Awards for the Finals will be presented after the roping.

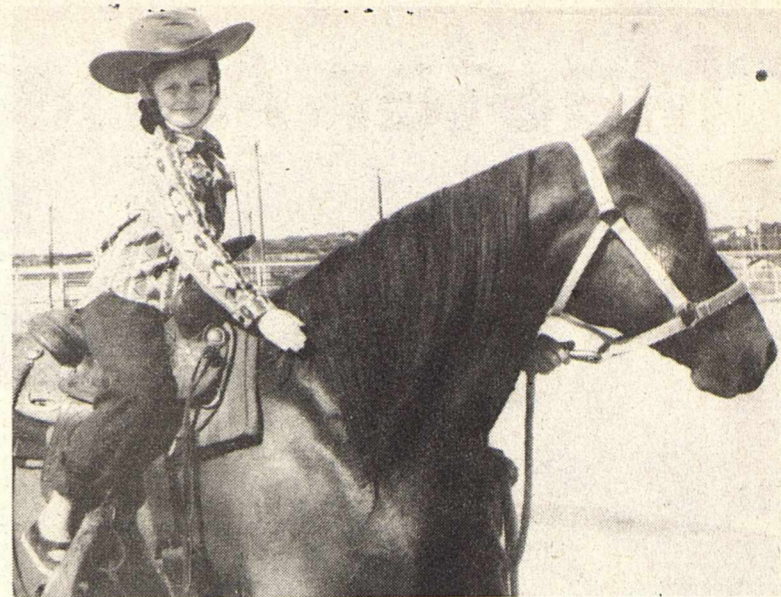

**Good declarer play requires good planning from start to finish.** Any declarer who believes he can play now and think later is sure to run into trouble from time to time.

**Here is a typical case.** South got to six hearts as shown and West led the king of spades. Declarer won with dummy's ace and cashed the A-K of diamonds. Declarer won with dummy's ace and cashed the A-K of diamonds and ruffed a diamond, hoping the missing diamonds were divided 3-3.

**But East showed out on the third diamond and South could no longer make the slam.** He could ruff a club in dummy but he would then have to lose two spade tricks later on. Alternatively, he could establish dummy's fifth diamond and then

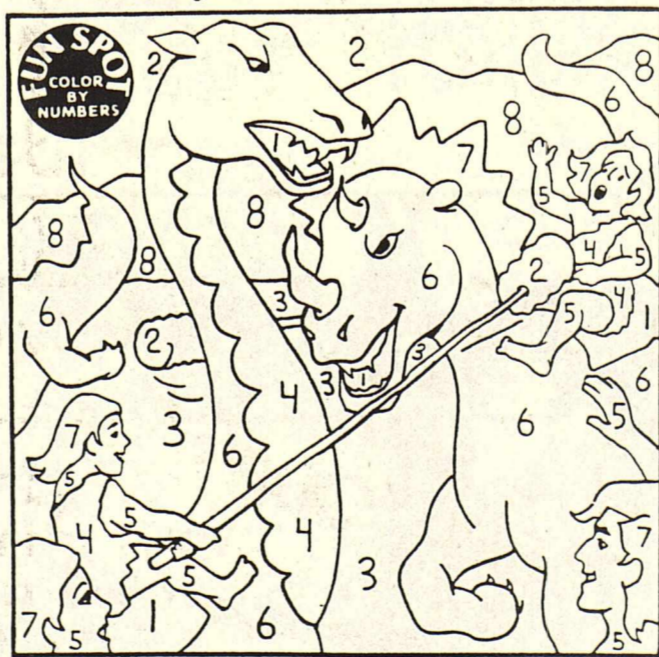
draw trumps, ending in dummy, but he would still have to lose two tricks in the black suit for down one.

**It is not difficult to find the fault in South's line of play.** The malfeasance occurred at trick one, when he should have ducked West's king of spades lead (which marked West with the queen).

**Had declarer played low from dummy** — as he should have in order to retain the ace of spades as a subsequent entry to dummy — the slam could not have been defeated. West could not then afford to continue spades, since that would make South's jack a trick, so he would have been forced to shift to another suit.

**Let's assume West switches to a club at trick two.** Declarer wins with the ace, cashes dummy's A-K of diamonds, ruffs a diamond, plays the king of clubs and ruffs a club in dummy.

**Then, after ruffing another diamond, declarer draws trumps, crosses to dummy's ace of spades, and discards his last spade on dummy's last diamond.** All told, South scores one spade, five hearts, three diamonds, two clubs and a club ruff in dummy to finish with 12 tricks. He loses the first trick, but that's all.

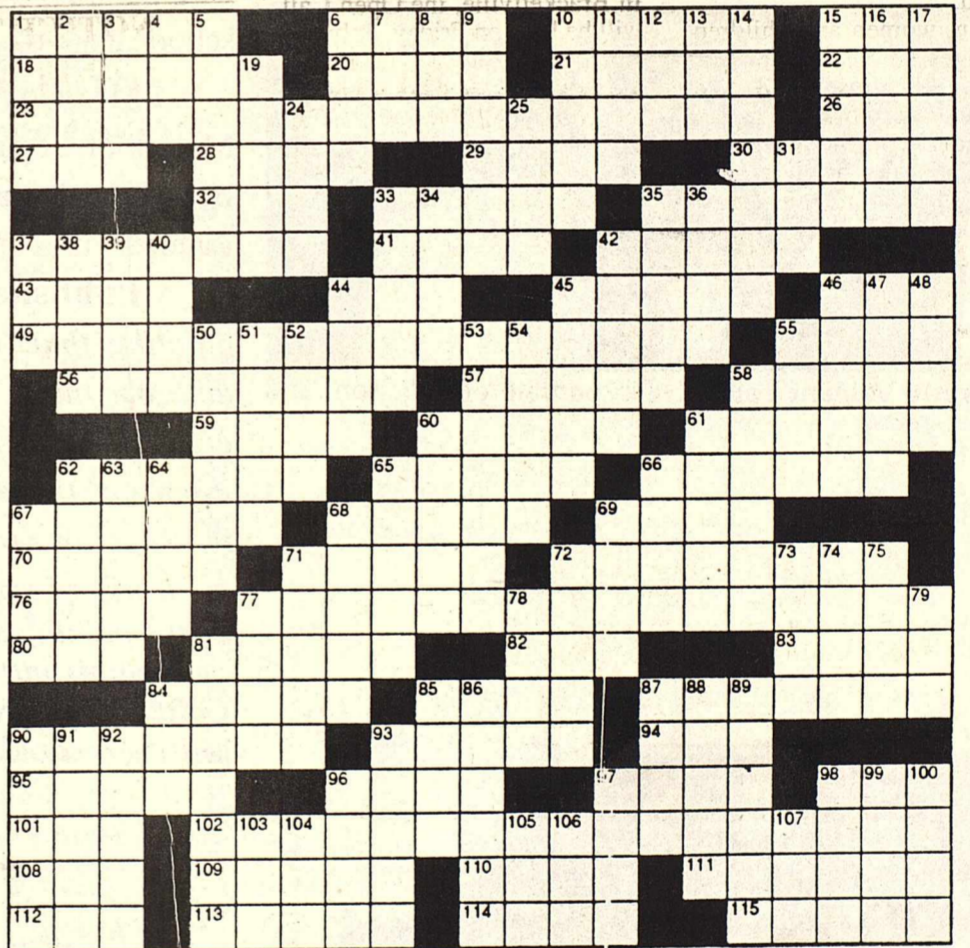
