## Sutton County Library Receives Books On Grants

The Sutton County Library has just received a number of books pertaining to available grants due to a cooperative effort of the Sutton County Commissioners Court, and the Sonora Independent School District. These books have a wealth of information on the individual and corporate foundations awarding grants; the dollar amounts generally awarded by each foundation; types of grants funded; when and how to apply; contact person(s); general geographical area of giving; and other specific guidelines for each grant.

There are no guarantees that a grant proposal will be funded; however, the chances of acceptance and funding are greatly increased when the proper procedure for a specific grant is followed. These books provide the necessary information for insuring that a grant proposal meets the criteria for a specific grant. Last year nine billion dollars given by 6,785 Tier One Foundations (those with over 2 billion in assets or at least \$200,000 in grant funds).

## Carl Teaff - Fireman Of The Year

Carl H. Teaff, a lifelong resident of Sonora, was named Firefighter of the Year for the State of Texas at the 118th annual training conference and convention held in Beaumont in June.

Teaff, fire marshal for both the City of Sonora and for Sutton County, is also the fire chief for the city. He is the successful nominee of the Hill Country Firemen's Association, of which he is past-president. He has been an active volunteer fireman since 1971, and has served in almost all offices of the Sonora Volunteer Fire Department, some more than once.

An easy-going, affable man, Teaff nevertheless demands -- and gets -- close attention when presenting fire prevention programs in Sonora and surrounding areas. In his ongoing effort to stay up with current firefighting and control techniques as they are developed, he has attended the Texas A&M Firefighting School for more than fifteen years. He also took part in the activities of the San Angelo Firefighting School for years when it was in operation. Having been an active firefighter for so many years, he has unavoidably witnessed some loss of life in fire, and feels strongly that if his and the department's efforts to educate the public in fire safety measures result in saving just one child's life, all the time and work involved will be well spent.

Carl and his wife of twenty-five years, Melissa, are the parents of three -- Traci, a resident of San Angelo; Anna, a freshman at Angelo State University; and Robert Carl, a freshman at Sonora High School. Fire department service has been something of a family experience over the years. Melissa has served in all offices of the local auxiliary, plus being both president and vice-president of the Hill Country Auxiliary. She has also been actively involved with school fire prevention programs for the past twelve years. Son Robert Carl was named mascot of the Hill Country Firefighters when he

was seven years old, continuing the tradition begun by maternal grandfather Fred Ross, who served as a fireman in San Antonio for thirty-five years.

This amiable man who lives life to the fullest operates the business his father founded more than fifty years ago, and somehow makes time for extensive civic duties in addition to the many hours spent on fire department duties. He is a member of the Lions' Club, a Jaycee, a Little League sponsor, and has served two

terms on the Board of Trustees for the Sonora Independent School District. His rare moments of leisure are spent enjoying all sports, hunting, fishing and vegetating at his cabin on the Devil's River.

Teaff's basic common sense, his honesty, his generosity, and above all, his dedication to the well-being of

his community and his multitude of friends, have made him one of the biggest assets of this area of West Texas, whose citizens are extremely proud to have him recognized state-wide for the man he is, and for what he has done in the area of fire prevention and education.

# Dear Editor,

Dear Editor,  
Since my first real encounter with city politics, my brain has been racing overtime. I have some concerns about our city government and I feel that it is my civic duty to voice these concerns.

1. The City Manager was recently given a 5% salary increase.

2. Although the City Manager told the people of Sonora that he would be out and about, many people with whom I visit say that they've never met the City Manager.

3. At the last City Council meeting, Mr. Pape joked about the plane crash at the golf course. The City Council thought that this was extremely funny. I thought that it was tasteless.

4. The Main Street Coordinator is paid almost \$30,000 a year. (This is paid by the city, not by a grant from Main Street.) The Senior Center Manager is paid only \$13,000. (I have no complaints about the Main Street Coordinator, who seems like a bright, enthusiastic person. It's just that my impression, and the impressions of others with whom I have spoken, was that the Main Street program was going to be a real boon to our community, but so far, it seems to be a rather expensive frill at a time when we are already sorely burdened with taxes.)

5. Very few of our city and county elected officials show up at the Covered Wagon Dinner Theater.

6. The last time I voiced my concerns about city government I was threatened with a lawsuit.

There seems to be an undercurrent of dis-ease in our community. I sense it in the management of city

government. I also sense it in the attempt to build a new (and much needed) library.

As I have said many times, I love living in Sonora. We have some of the most generous, caring, concerned people I would ever hope to meet. We have churches that work together, support each other and strive to meet needs. (Isn't it strange that the City refuses to give the Ministerial Alliance any kind of a break when we pay water bills and deposits for local folk who are having financial problems?) But something's afoot that really underscores our need to come together and reinforce what is good and discover and change those things that are undermining our unity.

If you agree with me, join me on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at City Hall to support those whom we have elected in keeping Sonora alive and well. Talk, write, phone elected officials and tell them when they do something that merits approval or disapproval. They can't know what you want or how you feel if you don't communicate with them. Be active in whatever ways you can. Even the home-bound can use the phone. I could easily get on my soap box about how government in this country was created to serve rather than to be served, but I hope you already know that and agree with it. The only way government, local or national, gets out of control is if we, the electorate, allow it to happen.

And finally, let me hear from you, whether you agree with me or not. I promise that even if you disagree with me, I will be more than willing to discuss these things with you.

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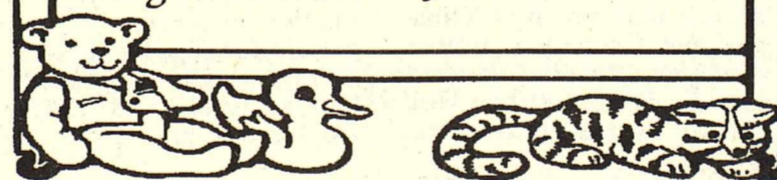

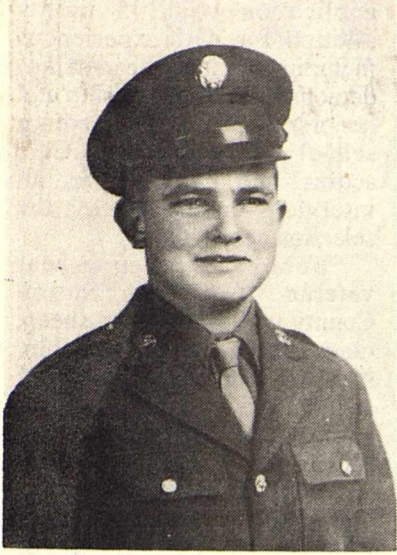

## Fifty Years Ago

June 4, 1944 Allies enter Rome.

The Purple Heart Medal, awarded to Staff Sergeant David G. Ramirez, who was killed in the invasion of the Admiralty Islands on March 16, was received this week by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Trinidad Ramirez.

S. Sgt. H. E. Speece is stationed at Randolph Field, Texas.

Lt. Alan Saunders, is stationed at Berry Field, Tennessee after returning from India. The trip back was 13,608 miles and took 69 hours and 45 minutes.

Edgar Reese has been promoted to the rank of First Lieutenant at Camp Claiborne, La., where he is stationed with

the Army Engineers.

Lt. Charles Berry was on his fourteenth mission flying a B-17 when he was shot down on February 4th. It has been reported that he was killed in action.

June 10, 1944 Bayeux liberated.

June 13, 1944 First V-bombs launched against Britain

June 14, 1944 DeGaulle returns to France

June 16, 1944 Battle of Montmouchet

Capt. Jack Long is stationed at Fort Henning, Georgia.

Petty Officer 1/c W. W. (Dick) Green is stationed somewhere in the Pacific.

Pat Carroll, of the Merchant Marines was home last week on furlough visiting his parents. He recently served overseas with the Merchant Marines in Australia.

Radioman 1/c Vernon Cook, who had been overseas with the Navy 2 years, most recently at Pearl Harbor, is home on furlough from the West Coast.

Devil's River News, June 23, 1944

Lt. Harold Saunders, who served 22 missions with the Air Corps in New Guinea has been in the hospital in New Guinea since March 4. He will soon be sent to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio for further treatment.

Ernest McClelland CM1, is stationed on the Marshall Islands.

Pvt. D. J. Chavez is stationed in Italy.

S./Sgt. J. H. Brasher Jr. is stationed in the South Pacific.

Lt. Daphne Jungk is stationed at the Amarillo Air

Field.

June 26, 1944 Vitebsk liberated.

June 27, 1944 U.S. Forces take Cherbourg.

Sgt. Ramon G. Gutierrez, veteran of two years overseas service in Africa and Italy, decorated by both the American and Russian Governments, a recipient of the Order of the Purple Heart with two clusters, to signify three wounds received in action, the Silver Star for gallantry in action and the Order of the Patriotic War of the USSR, has just returned to Sonora and addressed the Lions Club.

### WWII Veteran

Gus Richard Redman, Jr. was born January 25, 1927 near Rowena, Runnels County, Texas.

Upon entering the U.S. Army, June 27, 1945, at Fort Sam Houston, Texas he was ordered to Fort Wood Texas for 16 weeks training. From Fort Hood Texas he was transferred to Fort Riley, Kansas and assigned to the Motor Pool as a truck driver. While at Fort Riley, Gus enlisted for another year and was reassigned to Camp Pickett, Virginia and received orders to ship out for Germany. During this period, ready for shipment, he was sent on emergency furlough

to Galveston John Sealy Hospital to his Mother who was terminally ill.

At the end of that furlough he returned to duty at Camp Pickett and his company had departed for Germany.

Gus then received orders to report to New Orleans, Louisiana by troop train and from there by ship to the Panama Canal zone via Cuba. At that time the Canal Zone was closely guarded against trespassing and sabotage.

Gus received Marksmanship Medals, the American Theater Campaign Ribbon and the Victory Ribbon.

On December 11, 1946 Gus received an Honorable Discharge at Fort Sam Houston, Texas from Company H, 330th Infantry, Canal Zone.

## Annual Street Paving Program

Sonora's annual street-paving program is underway, involving the re-surfacing of almost fifty city blocks. This is the third year of a five-year project to re-pave or rehabilitate all city streets. The process will be continued in ongoing five-year cycles in order to keep Sonora streets in good repair.

This year, major portions of the following streets will be re-surfaced: Glasscock, Mesquite, Orient, Savell, Lorene, Cornell, Martin, Wardlaw, Del Rio and W. College. Also involved are Menard Avenue, W. 4th, W. 3rd, W. 2nd, W. 1st, Mulberry

and W. Oak Streets. Additionally, small portions of Water Avenue, E. Pecan and Eaton Streets will be re-paved.

"The city is going to continue to be as aggressive as possible in our street maintenance program so that we can address problems before they become critical," noted City Manager John Pape.

The re-paving projects are being scheduled to create as little inconvenience or traffic congestion as possible; however, people with special needs that may be affected by temporary limited access to the affected areas are encouraged to call Sonora City Hall.

1. **Two notrump.** A jump to two notrump is the best way to indicate your values. It shows 18 or 19 high-card points, notrump distribution, and at least one stopper in each of the opponents' suits.

However, the best final contract is still uncertain. North may go along with notrump, or he may have a hand that he thinks is better for suit play. Wherever he leads, you follow, since your values are flexible enough to fit any hand pattern he may have.

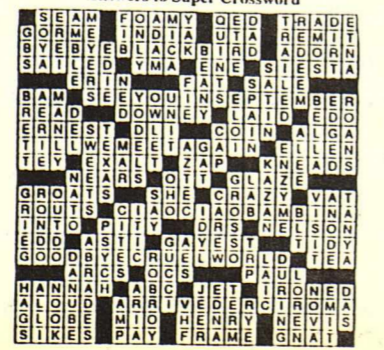
2. **Six spades.** Considering partner's jump to three spades and your unusually strong support for spades, there should be no doubt about making 12 tricks. The only real question is whether a grand slam can be made.

If you start by assuming that partner has six spades to the A-K and the ace of clubs, you are already on the verge of a grand slam. Any other feature North may have, such as the queen of hearts or king of diamonds, is almost sure to yield 13 tricks.

However, it's far from certain that North has the A-K of spades and ace of clubs, so the simplest thing to do is to jump to six spades and hope North has the values to bid a grand slam.

This is not the right type of hand for Blackwood. Learning that partner has two aces and either one or two kings would not settle the issue of whether there's a grand slam in the cards.

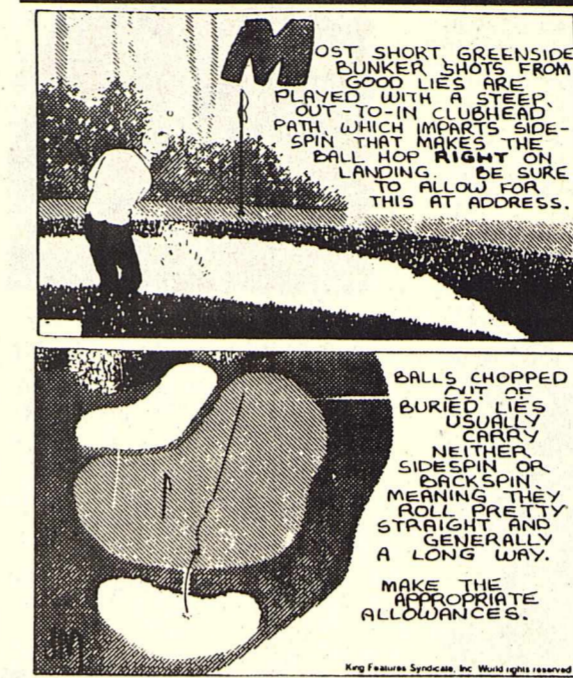
3. **Four spades.** Simplest is best. The probability of making ten tricks at spades is overwhelming, and you should make sure of getting there without running the risk of being dropped at a less-than-game contract. There is a difference of opinion among players as to whether a jump to three spades — after partner over-called with two diamonds — is forcing or merely invitational. Regardless of which school you come from, you should go directly to four spades in the present case rather than risk a partnership misunderstanding.



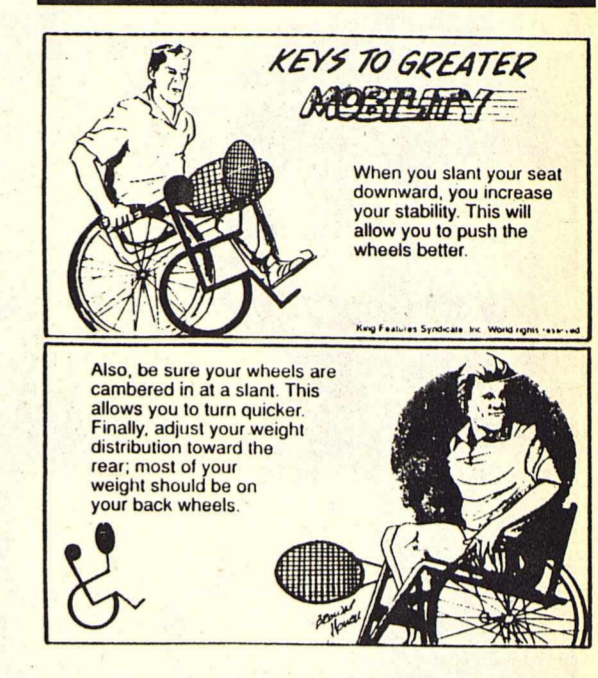

Receipts totaled 4209 head. Buyers attendance was good with an active trade on the packer cows and bulls. Stocker steer and heifer calves were selling steady to mixed. Quality overall was not very attractive accounting for the uneven trade. Feeder steer calves and yearlings sold steady while the feeder heifer calves and yearlings were going at steady to lower prices. A few replacement heifers remain in strong demand. On the replacement sale the big choice bred heifers that had good flesh quality sold steady to strong compared to our last replacement sale held in May. The balance of the bred heifers sold steady to \$25 lower. Demand on the open heifers were good to fair going at steady. Choice Tigerstripe and Brangus with a few groups of Red Baldies and Simbrah type bringing \$50 to \$100 over present feeder prices. There were some cow calf pairs that brought equally as much as they would have a month ago. There also were some pairs that sold form \$100 to \$150 per pair lower than a month ago. The uneven trend is typical of the most recent feeder market. There are still a lot of buyers that will pay top price for the right kinds.




