Schools Adopt New Grading System

If your child attends Sonora Primary or Intermediate School, don't expect to see "A's", "B's" or "C's" on their report card this year. It's not going to happen.

On Tuesday, July 12th the Sonora Independent School Board voted to adopt for the Primary and Intermediate school a program of authentic assessment.

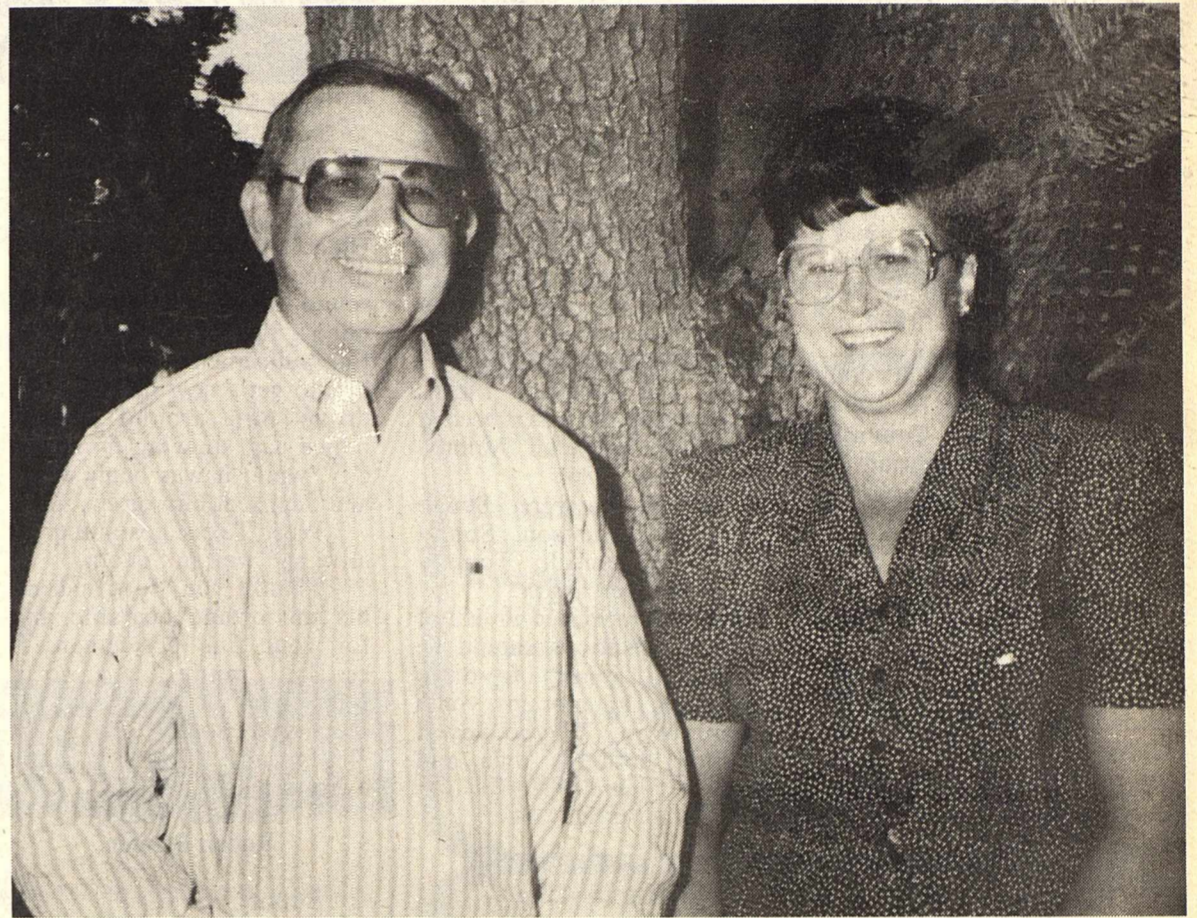
Authentic assessment is a program that works directly with the parent through written and verbal communication with the teacher to more completely assess the student's learning level.

This is a system that is very well organized. The teachers will keep portfolios on the children which will contain samples of their work to show progress from beginning to end.

There will be many parent-teacher conferences. The teachers will write a narrative to the parent discussing what has been done in the classroom and how their particular child is performing.

At some point in time there will be a parent-teacher-pupil conference in which the child will conduct the conference and will show the parent what he or she has accomplished. There will be benchmarks established to determine the level at which the student should be.

This program places high expectations on students. Principals at both schools anticipate great things for their

students.

One of the highlights of this program is that a student's work is judged only by that child's abilities. If a child is doing the absolute best that he can do, he or she will be evaluated against him/herself.

Said Primary School Principal Clay Cade, "I feel

that this is an excellent program because it places the responsibility for learning directly on the child. He will have a large part in his planning and his evaluation. It just makes the child more responsible for what he does than for what he has been done in the past."

Said Intermediate School Principal Donna Hill, "I agree with what Mr. Cade has said and would like to add that this truly makes parents a partner in their child's education. The teacher, the student and the parent are a three-way partnership that is essential for each child."

Keese Named EMS Administrator

Donna Keese has been named administrator for the Sutton County Emergency Management Service. She has been an EMS volunteer for ten years. For the past 14 years, she worked for Johnny Fields at Sonora Animal Hospital.

She has been married to George Keese for 22 years. They have two children, Jimmy, 24 who works for AT&T in Midland and Dawn, 20 who is a student at Sul Ross State University in Alpine.

Before she took over this job, Donna's primary duties and responsibilities with the EMS included working with the Local Emergency Planning

Committee where she was the L.E.P.C. coordinator. She also worked with the ambulance service and helped with the emergency management program.

Donna says that she sees no foreseeable changes in the operation and management of the EMS service.

"I'm really happy to have this job. I have some great people backing me who will work with me," commented Donna. "I want to help continue the good job that has been done for our community in Emergency Management and in the EMS service."

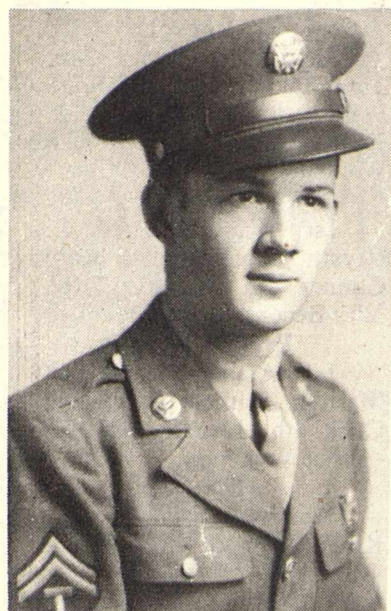

Ask The Historical Society

Q. My husband and brother served in WWII. How do I go about getting their stories in your column?

A. We need a picture of each person in uniform during the time of their service, a copy of their enlisted record and report of separation (many of these are on file in the courthouse annex) and a brief history of where they were stationed for training, duty, etc. Pictures will be returned. You can drop these off at the Devil's River News office and tell them they are for Jo-Ann Palmer or drop them by my house, 1205 Tayloe Ave. If you plan to come by the house give me a call at 387-2855 first to make sure I am home.

World War 11 Veteran

E. Nelson Stubblefield was born in San Angelo, Texas on August 4, 1923. He enlisted in and entered into active duty with the U.S. Army Air Force on July 9, 1942 at San

Antonio, Texas. He was sent to Camp Crowder, Missouri, then Midland Radio & TV School in Kansas City, Missouri. From there he was sent to Camp Murphy, Florida for radar school. Nelson got to spend one night at Will Rogers Field due to a mix-up in orders, then went on to Hattiesburg, Mississippi Army Air Base, Laurel Army Air Base in Camp Shanks, New York and off to Scotland and South Wales. On June 18, 1944 he went to France then on to Germany with Team "B" 84th.

Nelson received the EAME Campaign Medal with 4 Bronze Stars, Good Conduct Medal, 1 Service Stripe, and 4 Overseas Service Bars. Nelson left Europe for the states on October 4, 1945 and arrived on October 14, 1945. He had spent 2 years, 2 months and 12 days in foreign service. On October 22, 1945 Sergeant E. Nelson Stubblefield was honorably discharged at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

First to Cross Channel

Team "B" 84th, was very

proud of being the first operational unit of the IX Air Force Service Command to cross the English Channel to set up for business in the Invasion of Normandy. Business was booming in Normandy; with no Air Depot Group in France, the Team extended itself to the utmost--the supply sections were serving both air and ground forces up and down the beachhead, the aircraft maintenance section topped off its regular maintenance by building a combat-worthy P-47 from spare and salvaged parts; the Signal Company perfected the tank to plane communications which paid off so richly in the battle across France and into Germany.

doctor or gets into a hospital. And don't think you can jump ahead in line. Under this plan, you are required to present a government-issued "Health Security" card before you can get medical care. And, if you try to buy health care from a doctor privately, you'll be committing a federal crime. Clinton's plan specifically prohibits spending your own money to pay for medical services outside the plan. The penalty - imprisonment for up to 15 years and fines up to \$50,000 for both you and your doctor. It gets worse. Under section 5432 of the plan, the Department of Justice will have the power to seize your home, bank accounts, business - anything you own - for health care crimes.

What about the privacy of your medical records? That will also be illegal. The plan requires any medical information that the government wants on you to be turned over by your doctor. Your doctor could be fined up to \$10,000 per violation for withholding that information. That means that

at least 200,000 bureaucrats will have access to your medical records!

And no matter what they tell you about less government, no new taxes, no price controls, it is all a lie. Look at the plan on pages 107, 131, 108, 32-73. No, they don't call it a new tax, they call it health care "premiums." If you're an employee, it will be a payroll tax, deducted from your paycheck. If you're self-employed, you will be billed by your regional health alliance. If you can't pay your mandatory premium because you have to buy food for your family or pay your mortgage, the government can seize your house and bank accounts, before any other creditors get a penny. How much will we pay? The initial "fee" will be 7.6% of your paycheck. That's plus whatever is already taken out for other taxes. That's just the beginning. These

"premiums" will be set, not by Congress or any elected body, they will be set by a 7 member, politically-appointed National Health Board, and your local health alliance, which means they can be easily changed (meaning raised).

Wake up people. This is only part of what's in the plan. The Clinton health care plan is total government control over your life! If you don't believe this, read the health care plan or a book called Lethal Compassion: Why national health care is the cure that kills" by Jarret Wollstein. Then write your congressman and senators! Now - there's no time to waste.

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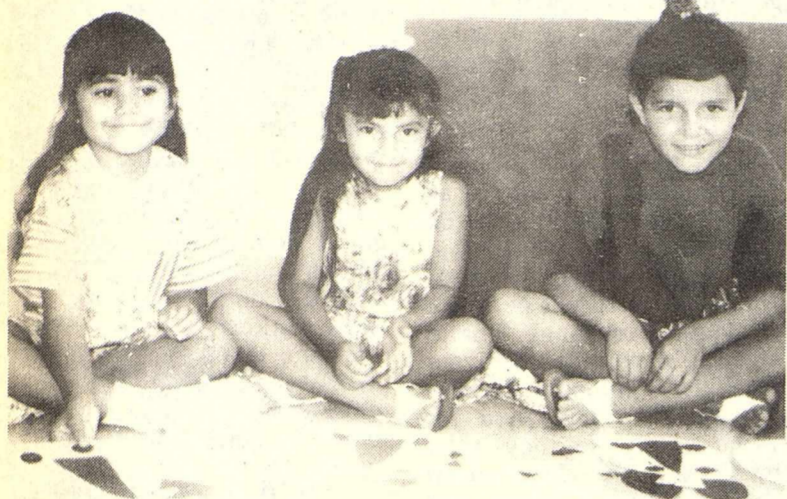
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S.C. Library Summer Reading Program

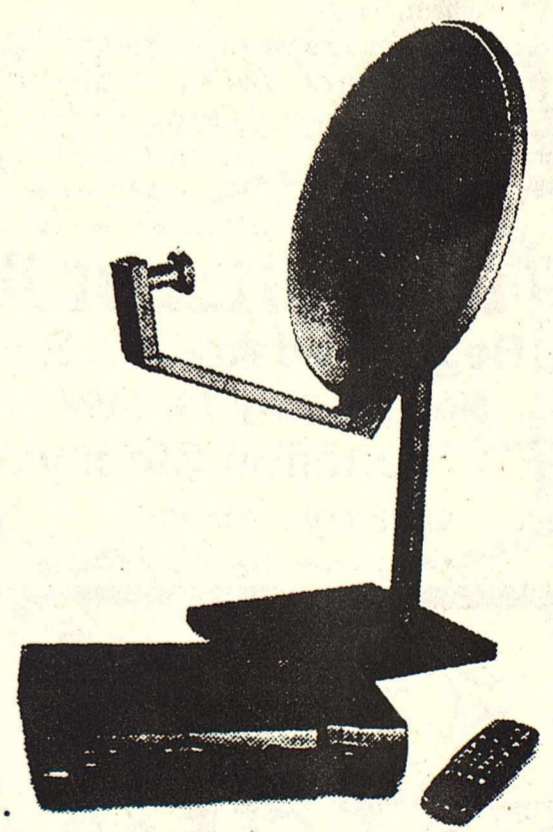

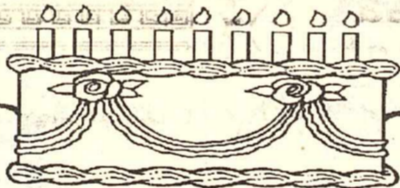
in.

Bridge played at the highest level can be fascinating indeed. Here is an extraordinary example of high-class defense from a match played in 1970

between Holland and England. With Holland North-South, the bidding went as shown. South's two club bid was conventional and indicated 5-5 or 6-5 distribution in the major suits.

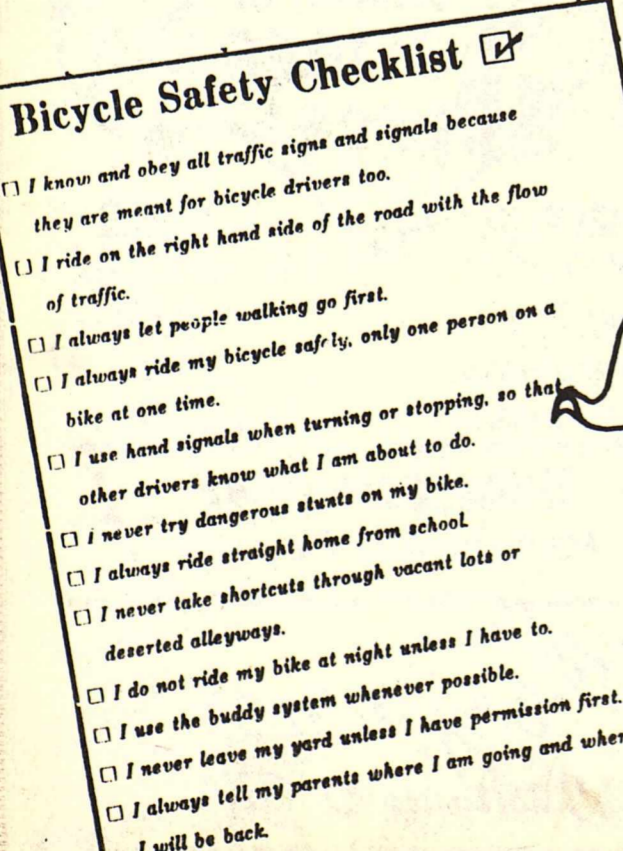
West, Jonathan Cansino, partnered by Jeremy Flint, elected to lead a trump against four hearts. Declarer took East's king with the ace, cashed the K-A of spades, and ruffed a spade with dummy's nine as Cansino discarded the deuce of clubs.

Next came the queen of diamonds, taken by East with the king. East then cashed the queen of spades, on which Cansino discarded his ace of clubs! East thereupon cashed the king of clubs and continued with a club, promoting a trump trick for West whether declarer ruffed high or low, and as a result, the contract went down one.

It was all very fancy, but it was all very logical too. Cansino could tell from South's bidding, as well as the play, that declarer had started with precisely a 5-6-1-1 distribution.

Cansino also realized that the contract could not be stopped unless the defense could somehow score a trump trick. Without it, there was no hope. He therefore had to assume that East had the jack or ten of trumps, as well as the king of clubs, in which case discarding the ace of clubs on East's queen of spades was the only way to defeat the contract.

Miraculously, everything worked out exactly as Cansino had planned. It just goes to show that if you think hard enough — and pray hard enough — some of your best-laid plans will occasionally come to pass.

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
