Sonora To Become Street Smart

Names of certain streets in Sonora will be changed in the near future. According to Jim Garrett, Director of Public Works, for the City of Sonora, these changes are being made to improve 911 services, including Fire, Police and Ambulance.

Several streets currently have names that could be confused with others or names that are the same as other streets.

Streets that will be affected are...

1. Hightower to Hilltop (Castlehill annex subdivision)
2. A portion of Crockett to Carver (undeveloped portion that runs by Schlumberger)
3. The omission of City Street. (This will be a continuation of Draw Street)
4. The omission of Hutcherson (This will be a continuation of Santa Clara)
5. There is a Calle de Castillo and a Castillo Avenue. Castillo Avenue will be changed to Solis Street.
6. Airport Road will be

added to the City map.

7. East 3rd to Amistade (In the South Heights Addition)

8. East 2nd to Cedar (West of Crockett)

9. East 1st to Cactus (West of Crockett)

10. King's Court Drive to King's Court and Queen's Court Drive to Queen's Court

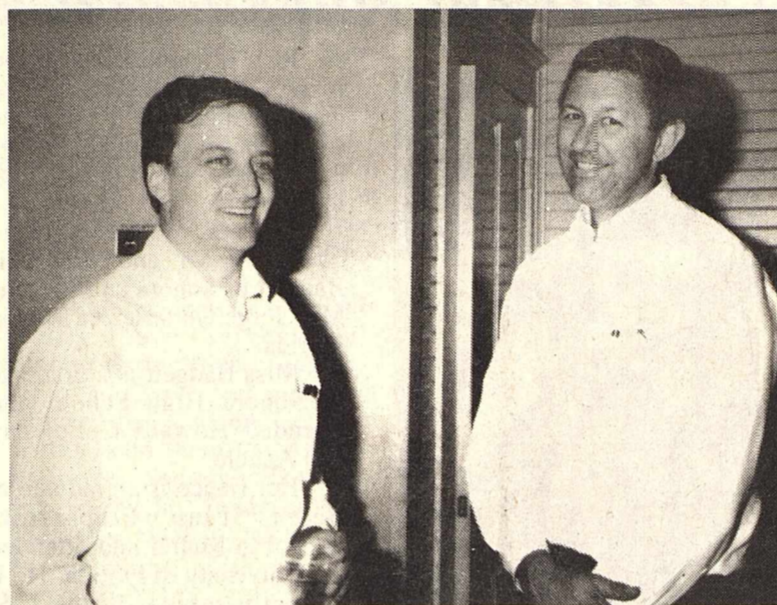
11. Castle Hill to Castlehill

12. Change addresses on St. Anne's in Loma Alta to relate to addresses across the street and not be redundant with addresses connecting with Poplar and Plum.

Said Garrett, "Making these changes now could very likely save somebody's life in the future. This will also make deliveries to addresses much less confusing. A uniform addressing code also helps visitors to Sonora locate addresses.

Mayor Lemuel Lopez asks that the citizens of Sonora show consideration and patience during this time of change.

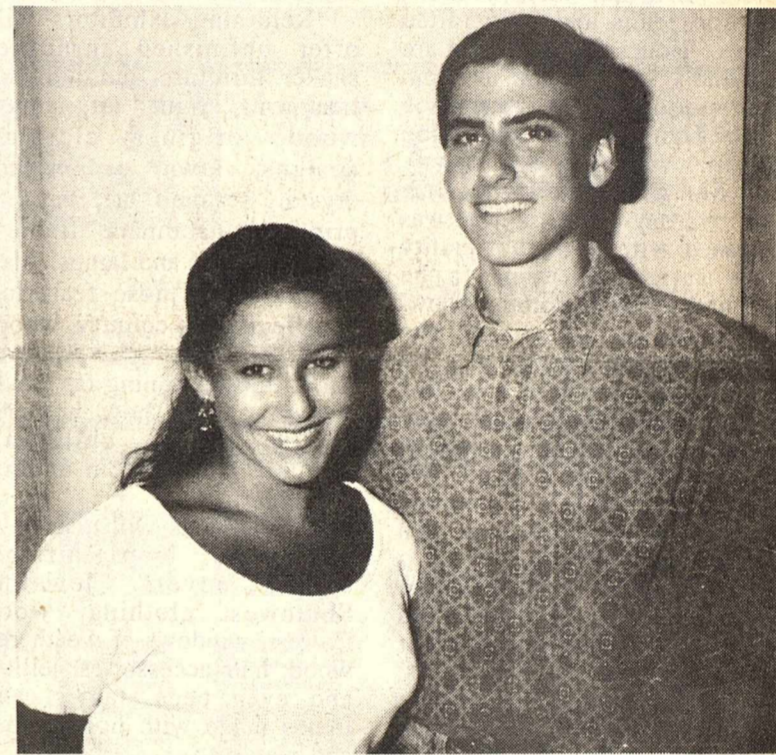
Melett Rowland, Main Street Manager, suggested that a merchant's organization be formed. The purpose of this organization would be to assist in the coordination of efforts

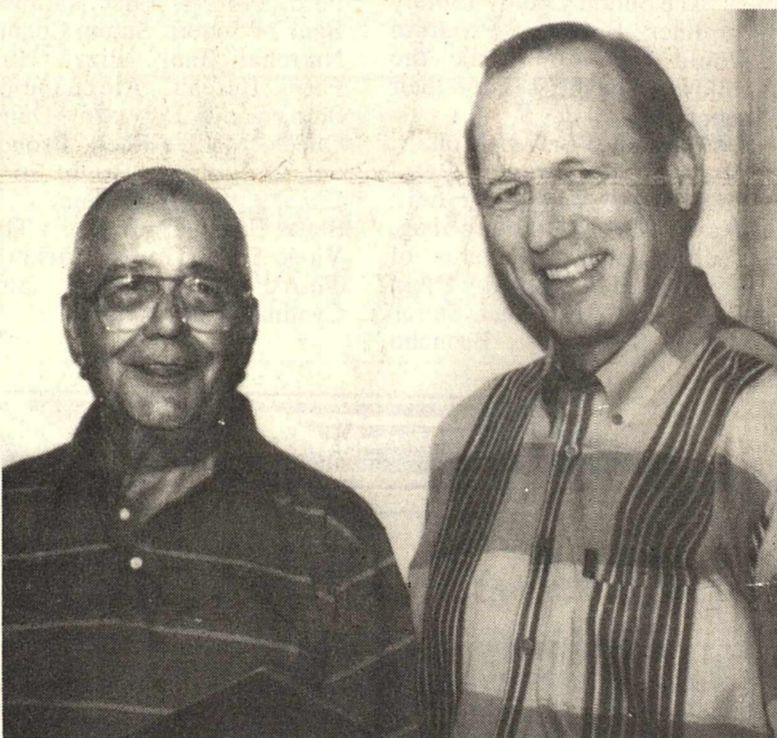

The Alcohol & Drug Abuse Council for the Concho Valley is treating chemical dependency through education, prevention, and rehabilitation, and serves the 13 counties around and including Tom Green Co. A Council representative is in the Sutton County Courthouse on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month between 3:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. We are here to perform screenings, answer questions, and to assist you in this area.

The Council operates 3 Alcohol and Drug treatment facilities in San Angelo. The Detox Center, Williams House residential treatment facility, and Adult & Adolescent Outpatient treatment programs, all are licensed by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. We offer crisis counseling, screening and referral services, to identify alcohol and drug abuse problems, and provide options to deal with those problems. Informed speakers

are available to speak to groups about issues relating to drugs and alcohol, as well as providing a variety of educational literature.

Short-term crisis counseling is available for anyone affected in any way by alcohol or other drug abuse. Call the Crisis Hotline Number 655-9641 or 1-800-880-9641 anytime night, or day.

Alcohol & Drug Abuse Council for the Concho Valley is funded by many organizations, businesses and individuals. For many years, the Council has received funding from the United Way of the Concho Valley. All American Arts & Crafts Festival Set

The second annual All American Summer Arts and Crafts Festival will be held July 23rd and 24th in the San Angelo Coliseum. Exhibitors from throughout the Southwest will again fill the ramp, entrance and main exhibit hall with original art, limited edition prints and handcrafted items. Hours for the show are Saturday from 10 am to 6 pm and Sunday from noon to 5 pm. There is no admission charge.

Mel Prather, organizer for the two-day event, said he was pleased with both the quality and variety of items to be offered at the upcoming show. "Due to the success of the 1993 show, we received a lot more requests for booths this year, allowing us to be more selective in the various categories to be offered. We were also able to expand categories that have proven popular in the past."

Categories expanded for the show include florals and wreaths, dried flower arrangements, quilted items, woodwork and clocks. Other areas that have improved over 1994 include miniatures,

ceramics, lamps, soft sculpture, dolls and handmade purses. Rounding out the list of expanded categories include bird houses, scented items, tole painted furniture, lawn and porch furniture, handmade luggage, wind chimes, and handpainting on collectables.

Returning exhibitors will offer unfinished furniture, shaker furniture and window treatments, original art, painted wood, original clothing designs, lawn ornaments, crystal, seashell art, antique prints in handmade frames, and trash cans and lamps. Also returning are those featuring chenille items, country wood, hand loomed rugs, wooden barrel people, ceiling fan pulls, growth charts, bow holders, switch plates, children's furniture and dolls in antique clothing.

Participants will also have hair bows, loop earrings, button covers, jewelry, Southwest clothing, wood flowers, windows of weathered wood, hair accessories, jellies, and even beds, tables, and lamps made with horse shoes and metal.

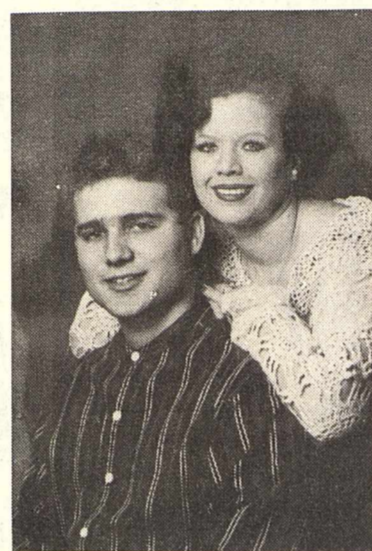
The ring bearer was Meghan Krieg.

While researching one WWII veteran recently I came across a whole family of military history to share with our readers.

Sam Merck Odom was inducted into the Army on November 19, 1940 at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. He was 19 years old, 5' 9" tall and only weighed 126 pounds. The Devil's River News shows him serving in Texas and able to get home quite a bit at first. Then he was shipped off to the Pacific on May 17, 1943 and arrived there on June 4, 1943. Sam stayed overseas until September 27, 1945 when he was shipped back stateside. Tec 5 Sam Odom arrived back in the USA on October 19, 1945 and was discharged at Fort Sam Houston on October 27, 1945.

Sam Merck Odom received the American Defense Service Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with 2 Bronze Stars, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with 2 Bronze Stars, 4 Overseas Service Bars, 1 Service Stripe and was qualified as Marksman with a Rifle. He is listed as serving in the following battles or campaigns, New Guinea and Luzon.

Sam's father, Bannister Odom, 31 1/2 years old, enlisted in the Army on June

15, 1918 in Sonora Texas. He left the United States on September 29, 1918 and arrived in France on October 16, 1918. He was a member of the M.T.C. 541. He left Europe on July 1, 1919 and arrived in the United States on July 11, 1919. He was discharged at Camp Travis, Texas on July 23, 1919.

Sam's son, Sam Merck Odom, Jr. enlisted in the Army on March 28, 1968 at San Antonio. He was sent to Fort Polk, Louisiana, then to Ft. Bragg, North Carolina for basic. Then Sam Jr. went to Ft. Sill, Oklahoma for canon and howitzer training and Ft. Riley, Kansas to join up with the 24th Infantry Division. Sam Jr. then was put on a C130 Cargo Jump Master where he and six rows of other men were sitting on webbed seats, packed like sardines. The only way to stretch was to climb onto the baggage in the baggage area,

otherwise you were knee to knee with your neighbor. They flew all the way to NATO Command in Germany this way. They did not complain too much though because Germany was a lot better than going to Vietnam. Sam Jr. spent every other six months in Germany and he attained the rank of SP4. Sam Jr. came back to the USA and was transferred into the U.S. Army Reserve at Fort Riley Kansas on March 27, 1970. His term of active service expired on that date. Like his Grandfather, Ban Odom, Sam Jr. qualified as expert with a rifle.

Three generations of this family have served their country during time of war.

Trust Fund Established

The Manuel Lujan Fund has been established through the Sutton County Community Trust.

Mr. Lujan died on Tuesday, June 21, 1994. His wife will not be eligible for Social Security for 3 more years. She has a disabled son who is paralyzed from the waist down and has to stay home to take care of him, so she cannot work.

All monies from this fund

will be used for the purpose of medical, funeral and other debts.

Plea For Sonora Area Host Families

Foreign high school students will be arriving soon into the Sonora area for academic semester and year homestays, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) Executive Director, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and are anxious to share their cultural experiences with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local high schools.

P.I.E. area representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it be a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.

Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Spain, Germany, Poland, Russia, Finland, Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Paraguay, Australia, New Zealand, Croatia and many other countries. P.I.E. has also been invited to participate in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet

Union to the United States. P.I.E. is a nonprofit educational organization that has sponsored more than 18,000 students from 23 countries since its founding in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Information Agency and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in CSIET's Standards for International Educational

Travel Programs. Sonora area families interested in learning more about student exchange or arranging for a meeting with a community representative may call P.I.E., toll-free, at 1-800-631-1818. The agency also has travel/study program opportunities available for American high school students as well as possibilities for community volunteers to assist and work with area host families, students and schools.

Second Call For Transportation Enhancement Nominees

In 1994, the city of Midland received \$160,000 from a special transportation funds program to develop a hike-and-bike trail. Fort Stockton got \$240,000 to restore a historic railroad depot as a tourist center and San Angelo received \$864,000 to complete restoration of the historic Sante Fe Depot.


A second call is being issued for Transportation Enhancement Project nominations, according to Mark Tomlinson, Director of Transportation Planning & Development for the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

As part of its statewide transportation enhancements program TxDOT will accept nominations for proposed projects until 5 p.m. on August 16 (a 90-day period that began May 18), said Tomlinson.

Brochures, rules, nomination forms and instructions are available at the San Angelo District Office, 4502 Knickerbocker Road.

Federal legislation in 1991 requires states to spend 10% of Surface Transportation Program funds on transportation enhancements -- an estimated \$35 million a year -- during the six year life of the program. Because the program calls for federal funding of up to 80% of any project, project sponsors must negotiate with a public authority (such as city council or county commissioners' court) to commit the remaining 20%.

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Weaver Assisted In D-Day Commemoration In Normandy

The rocky, wind-swept beaches called Omaha and Utah on the coast of Normandy are quiet now.

However, the scars of a battle that swept over this coastal farm and pasture land 50 years ago still remain, as concrete bunkers, rusting artillery guns, and huge craters from exploding shells remind the visitor of the pivotal battle that was the beginning of the end for Nazi Germany, but cost the U.S. over 3,000 dead and wounded on the first day alone.

Fifty years later, the son of a Sonora man joined thousands of veterans of Operation Overlord, known today as the D-Day invasion,

who returned to pay tribute to the service and sacrifice of those who died, as well as those who survived one of the most bloody and desperate battles of World War II.

Army Pfc. Donald M. Weaver, son of Carl G. and Nora E. Weaver, 203 Hudspeth Ave., Sonora, is a multiple launch rocket system crew member who provided essential support to a multiservice task force composed of over 2,300 Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine, and Coast Guard members.

The task force provided a myriad of services for the commemoration.

Weaver, as well as everyone involved in the event's preparations, took his duties

seriously.

"I drove people, from D-Day veterans to high ranking officers and officials, around to the different sites," said Weaver.

For Weaver, however, the work he was doing was different to what he does at his home station.

"Back in Bamberg, Germany, I work in supply, but most of my time is spent as the armorer for my unit. I make sure all of our weapons are in good condition and make repairs as necessary," said Weaver.

Many task force members heard fascinating accounts of

the D-Day invasion from veterans on the streets and in local taverns in villages like Ste. Mere Eglise, where the U.S. Army's 82nd Airborne Division landed and subsequently captured the city.

A replica of U.S. paratrooper Private John Steele still hangs from the church in Ste. Mere Eglise town square where he originally was entangled while attempting to land on D-Day and later captured by the Germans.

For many of the soldiers the experience of being in Normandy and taking part in the commemoration, as well as the friendship displayed by the

French people, left a profound impression. And because they train to do what the soldiers of D-Day did, they could relate to the men who landed and fought here in 1944.

"I think the veterans were glad to be back, not only for the commemoration, but for the remembrance of their buddies who were killed during the invasion. Also, the French people gave these veterans and present soldiers, a very heartwarming welcome. I'm sure the veterans felt great knowing that they haven't been forgotten," said Weaver.

"I volunteered to come to France because I have always been very interested in history and I saw this as an opportunity of a lifetime," commented Weaver. "I have read many things about the

invasion and seeing it in person brings it all to life."

World War II ended nearly 50 years ago, at a cost of millions of lives. However, for Weaver, the veterans of that war, and the French citizens who have erected monuments to the Americans and France's liberation, the event will prove to be an ongoing reminder that freedom and peace are precious gifts no people or nation can afford to lose.

"I think that this commemoration was important to remember those brave soldiers who fell while trying to take the beaches. Also, this was the biggest amphibious assault in history and the accomplishment of this is in itself, a reason to remember. Most importantly, is the many soldiers who died while trying to take the beach.

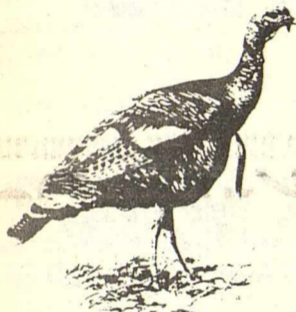

Texas Oil & Gas Statistics

June Permits To Drill

The Commission issued a total of 1,160 drilling permits in June compared to 1,149 in June 1993. The June total included 671 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 46 to re-enter existing well bores, 43 to deepen existing holes, 161 to plugback existing holes, and 88 for other wells. June amended drilling permits totaled 151.

Total drilling permits issued in 1994 year-to-date is 6,133, a two percent increase from the 6,011 issued during the same period of 1993.

Permits issued in June included 384 oil, 287 gas, 456 oil and gas, 12 injection, 11 disposal and 10 other permits.

crude oil production averaged 1,477,854 barrels daily, down from the 1,569,167 barrels daily average of April 1993.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for April is 44,335,609 barrels, down from the 47,075,609 barrels reported in April 1993.

April Natural Gas Production

Texas oil and gas wells produced 456,834,577 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for April, up 0.78 percent compared to April 1993's gas production total of 453,239,435 Mcf.

Texas gas production in April came from 170,655 oil, and 46,980 gas wells.

Total Gas Production For Sutton County

The Total Gas Production for Sutton County was 5,580,207 and Crude Oil Production was 2,375.

June Oil and Gas Completions

In June operators reported 338 gas, 327 oil, and 34 service completions, compared to 252 gas, 386 oil, and 36 service completions during the same period last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1994 year-to-date is 3,968, a seven percent decrease from the 4,255 recorded in 1993.

Operators reported 1,484 holes plugged and 126 dry holes in June, compared to 809 holes plugged and 171 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

There is a lot of luck in bridge, but there is also a lot of skill. Consider this deal where North-South got to six clubs. Both players overbid a trifle and reached a questionable slam, but in the end, their optimism paid off. South made the slam through a combination of good luck and skill — a hard combination to beat.

West led a heart, an aggressive choice. Declarer played low from

dummy, won the heart with the eight and expected to have clear sailing from then on.

He began by cashing the K-A of spades and ruffing the jack of spades in dummy. But when he next played the A-K of trumps and West showed out, it looked as though South would have to lose a trump trick as well as a diamond and go down one.

However, South was not the type of player who gives up easily. He led a heart to dummy's ace, ruffed a heart, then led a diamond to the ace and ruffed dummy's last heart.

As a result of these plays, South was left with the Q-9 of trumps and eight of diamonds. East's last three cards were the J-6 of trumps and queen of diamonds. Declarer now exited with a diamond and was certain to make the last two tricks and the slam regardless of who won the diamond.

While it is true that South was lucky to get a heart lead from West, he was also unlucky to run into a 4-1 trump division. But he overcame the bad luck by exercising his skill to the utmost — and thereby hangs this tale.

Home Tips

STEP ON IT — Here's an easy way to make stepping stones:
Stir up a small amount of cement, following directions on the bag. Next, take an old plastic bucket that is wider at the top and fill it with the cement until it reaches a thickness of about two or three inches. Paint a line on the outside of the bucket so all of the stones will be the same thickness. 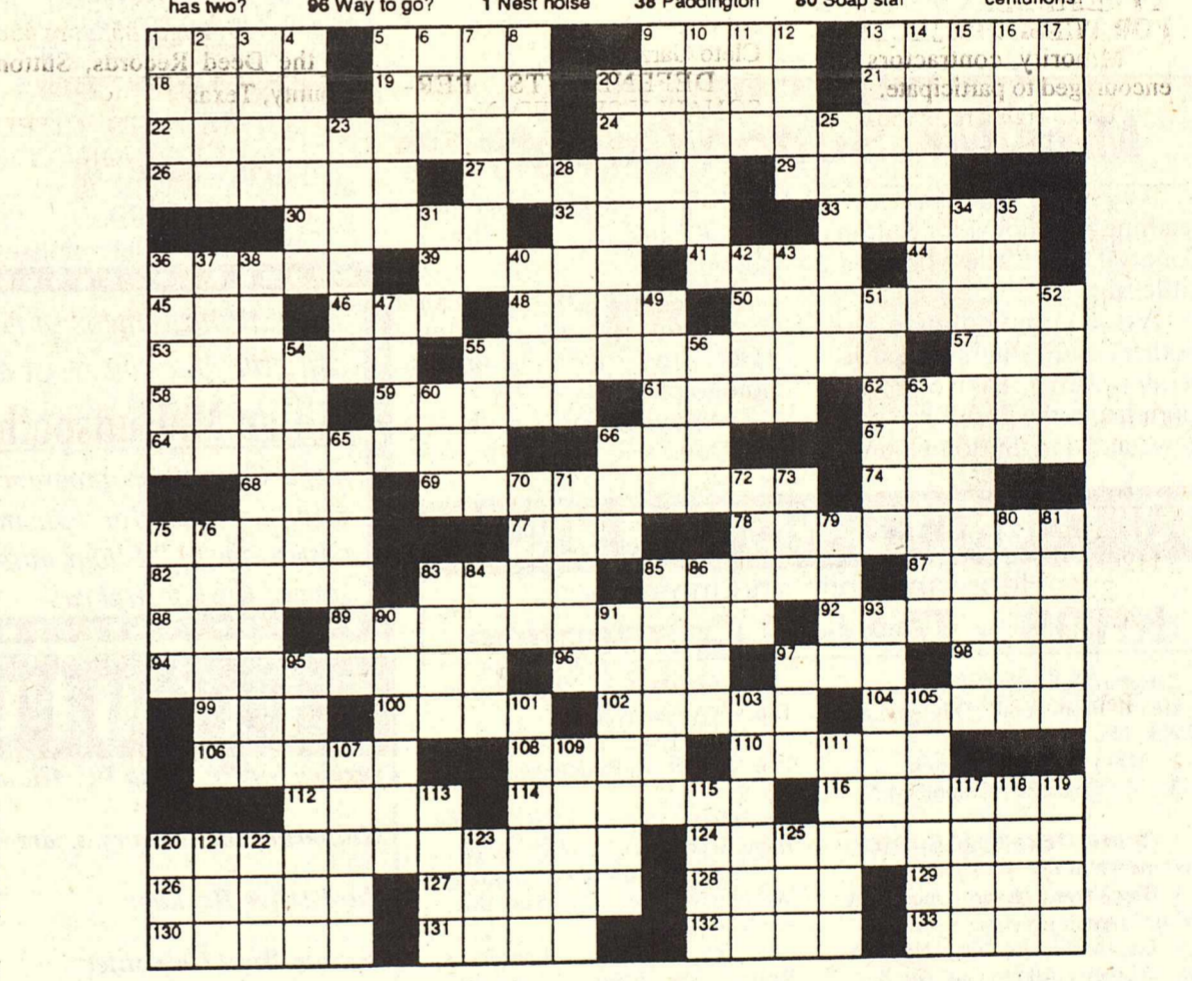

Household Help

Q. The slope of my yard pitches very sharply, causing a loss of soil every time it rains hard. This area of the yard is fenced in only without landscaping railroad ties. Fortunately, the rest of the yard has a solid wall of railroad ties and is holding the earth's bank very well. Since this is only the yard, I really don't want to build another wall of railroad ties due to the expense. However, I do have a good supply of large, flat stones behind my yard which I can use. Can you give me some tips?

A. Since you have a nice supply of flat stones in your yard, I suggest you start building a small wall. If you want this structure to remain intact for a long time, you should consider doing it properly. First, excavate the soil behind your fence to a depth of at least 18 inches and the width of the largest stones first as your base foundation. Place them in the hole flatly. Spread them all out and tamp the stones very hard into the ground while wearing gloves and using a large 4x4 board. Next, stagger the remaining courses of stone and try to match them in size, from large to small, as you progress. After you build as many courses as you need, the wall will take on a sturdy arrangement.

Finally, add the level of soil you had previously.

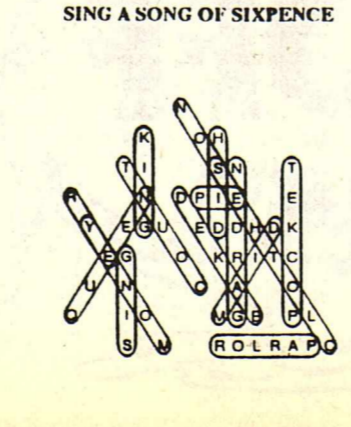
