SONORA GOLF COURSE AMONG TEXAS BEST NINE-HOLE COURSES

The Sonora Golf Course ranked number 20 this year in the 25 Best Nine-Hole Golf Courses, according to the February 26th issue of *The Dallas Morning News*. This is an improvement over last year's rank of #25. The Sonora Golf Course competed with nearly 300 nine-hole courses state-wide.

Laird, Kilgore; 15th - Alice, Alice; 16th - Sand Hills, Campbell; 17th - Oak Ridge, Madisonville; 18th - San Felipe, Del Rio; 19th - Mount Pleasant, Mount Pleasant; 20th - Sonora, Sonora; 21st - Jacksboro, Jacksboro; 22nd - Mineola, Mineola; 23rd - Tomball, Tomball; 24th - Sundown, Sundown; 25th - Breckenridge, Breckenridge.

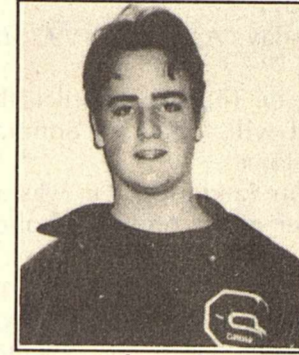

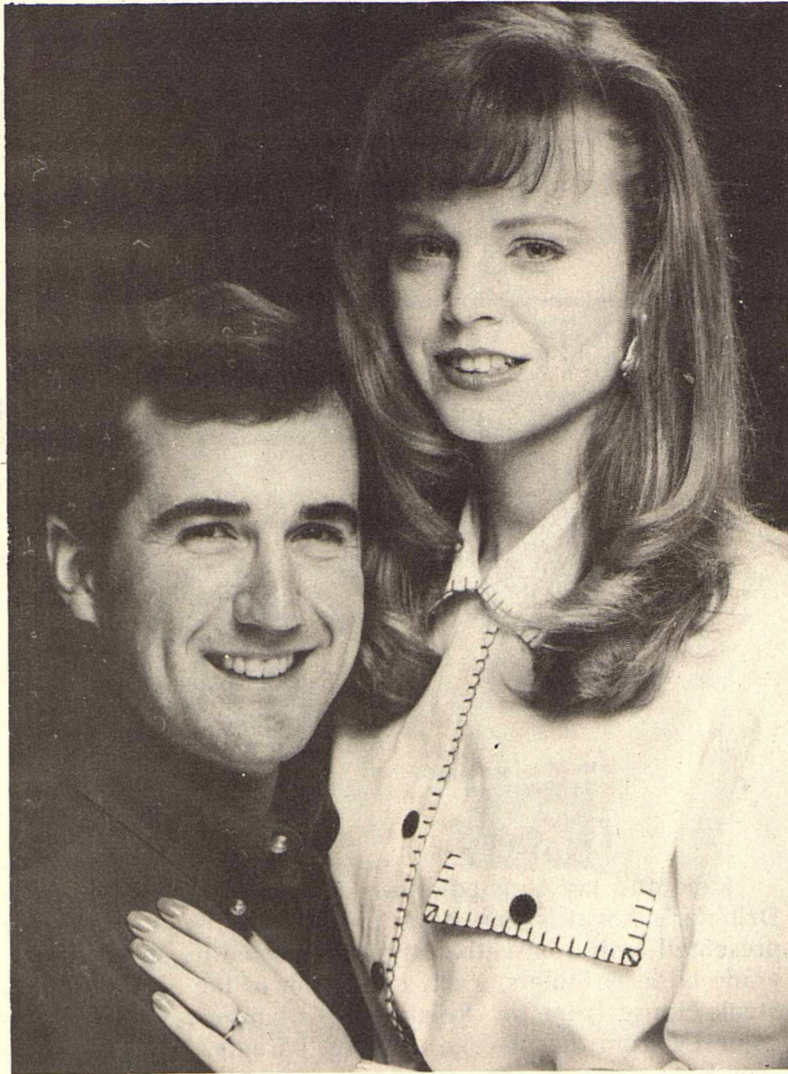

Sonora Golf Course received at least one Number 1 vote from the judges.

Editor's Note: The following is a Sports Editor's Memo that was printed in The Dallas Morning News "The Best of Texas Golf section" on February 26, 1995.

We know "The Best of Texas Golf section" has become standard reference material for golfers throughout the Lone Star State. There are posted signs at more than a half-dozen courses showing golfers they are teeing it up at one of the best courses or they are on one of the best, toughest or most beautiful holes.

At another club, an applicant for the superintendent position was shown one of the rankings in the section and told his mission would be to get that course in such condition that it would have to be rated near the top.

So in an effort to give golfers the best possible section, we've enlisted the help of the Northern and Southern Texas Professional Golfer's Associations. First, we expanded our lists of panelists to 30. We consulted with James McAfee, executive director of the NTPGA, for 10 panel members and Mike Ray, executive director of the STPGA, for another 10. Harless Wade, who retired from The Dallas Morning News in the past year, recruited the others, as the veteran golf writer had done for the previous six golf sections.

Then we changed how the rankings were determined, dropping a cumulative-voting system we had been using for six years for a new list of top courses. We felt it had become too difficult for newer courses to break into our ratings.

We also wanted to keep some continuity with the rankings, so we have decided to use panelists for two years, rotating 15 new panelists in each year. We hope all the changes make for a better section.

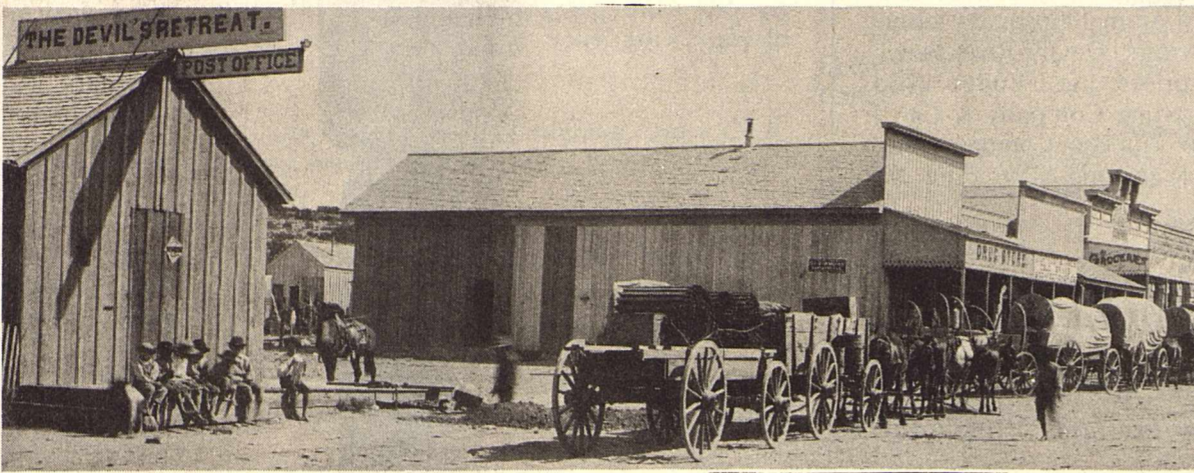

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Ask The Historical Society

Q. Can you explain the meaning of "Thunder in February, frost in April"?

A. This expression has been around for a long time and many of the old timers still firmly stand behind it. The theory is that on whatever day it thunders in February the corresponding day in April there will be a frost. We found this mentioned in the papers through the years. The Devil's River News of Saturday, April 16, 1921 had this to say in support of the theory:

Thunder in February, frost in April, will be remembered by those who had their gardens well advanced. The frost Monday morning left its mark on many unprotected gardens and it is said the pecan crop on the North Llano was seriously damaged, but as pecans were slower in "putting out" than other forms of vegetation, it is not thought that the crop will be an entire failure. Those who observe the "thunder in February frost in April" theory advise gardeners to watch out for more frost on April 17, 18, 27, and 28.

Note: Anyone who wants to know about this year's frost dates should stop in Sonora True Value Hardware Store at 210 SW College and talk with Hershel Davenport. He is our local expert on this theory.

In the same issue we found mention of Fidelity Straw Hat Dye. Did you know that ladies didn't just go out and buy a new hat, they dyed their old straw hats and put new trim on them? The Sonora Drug

Company used to sell the dye and the local ladies had quite a time designing their own chapeaus. All you recycling specialists might get a kick out of doing this. Even if you didn't wear it you could hang it on the door or wall for a decoration.

A little further along we find that Joseph VanderStucken is one of the guests at a party given by Estelle McDonald honoring Miss Nell Sackett and Mr. Olie Curry of Coleman. He and Misses Violet Stanley, Elma Evans, Velma Savell, Willie May Winn, Ruby Martin and Messers Joe Spence, Carl Morrow, George H. Neill, Wade Grimland and Bobbie Hamilton all had a good time.

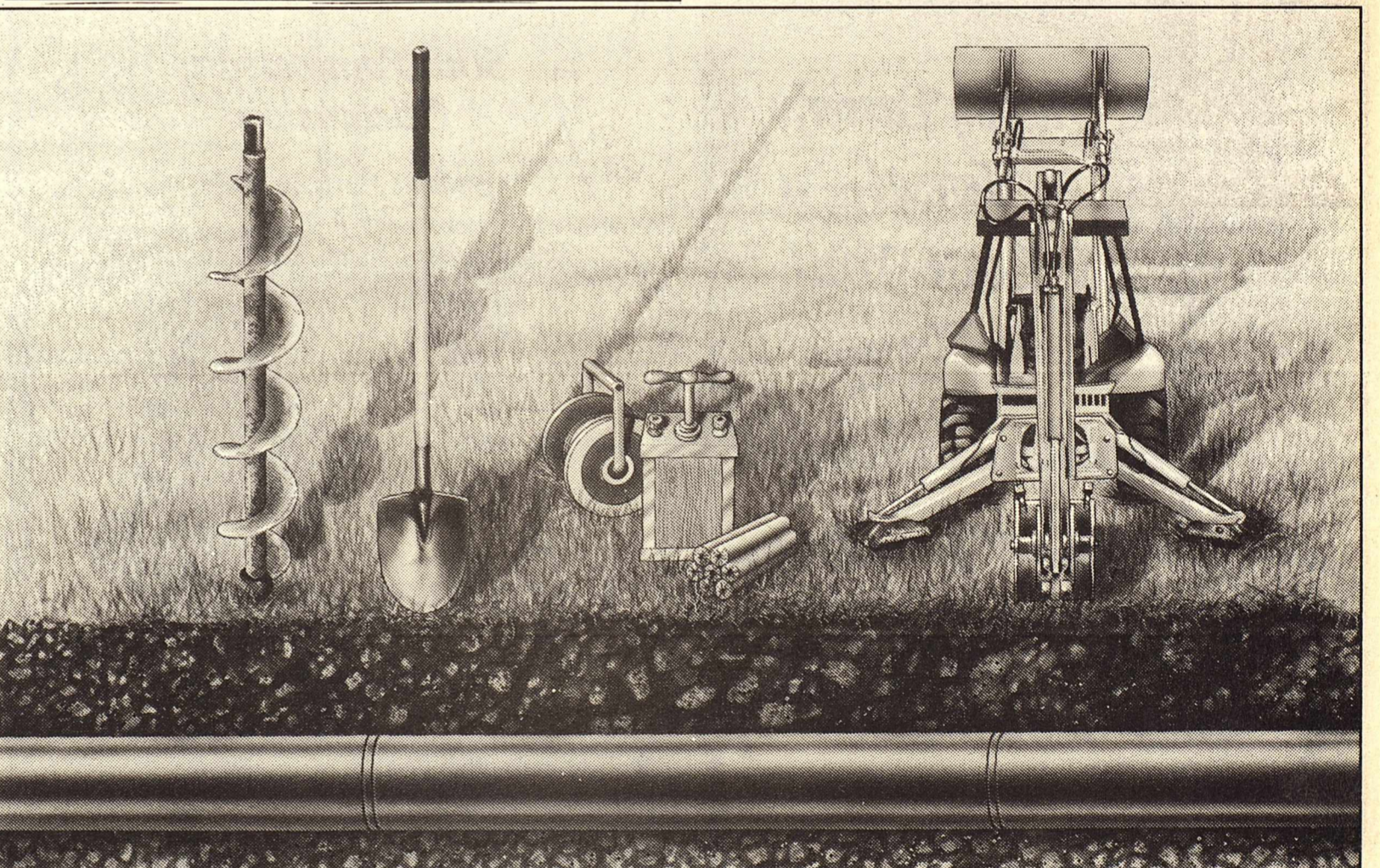

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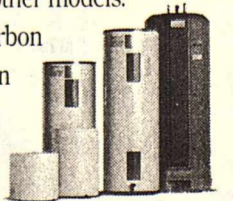
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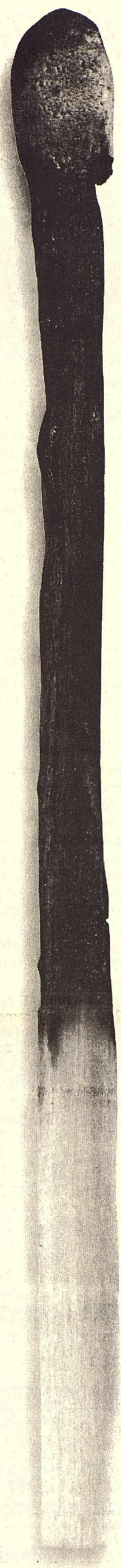

The women are mostly from Texas, with one member from Georgia. The Texas ladies are from Uvalde, Killgore, Gillmer, Dallas, Ft. Worth, Sonora, and two from Houston. This year each member was to bring a present for the others that was typical of her home area. They had pecans from Georgia, sweet potatoes from Gilmer, honey from Uvalde, and wool socks from Sonora. Everyone cooked and brought sweets. Mostly, the group sits in a circle and visits. Two years ago the president of Baylor University heard the story and honored the women with an elegant banquet at the Baylor homecoming. They were presented books with the history of Baylor through early pictures and beautiful glass lamps with alligators etched on them. In our present day throw away society, where most people don't expect anything to last very long, it seems unbelievable that these women have friendships that have lasted more than 60 years. They all must have made an effort through the years to continue coming. Oh, by the way, the Green Alligator from Sonora is Mae Cauthorn Ward. She was accompanied to the meeting by her son and daughter-in-law, Albert and Cynthia Ward.

There is one sideline to the story that gave me a chuckle. A bride tried to book a large number of rooms for the same date as the Green Alligators. She was told that she was too late. Since she had tried to book the room months before her wedding, she asked just how early did someone have to be to get a large number of rooms. She was told that these rooms had been held for 60 years. The Green Alligators have standing reservations for the same time, same place, next year.

Sonora Woman's Club met Thursday at the Depot. Barbara Jennings was hostess chairman and her committee served a delicious lasagna with home made ice cream for dessert. It was wonderful. Tables were decorated by Janell Sparks with rabbits and Easter items from the Ol' Sonora Trading Company. The organization honored Marie Aldwell and thanked her for contributing the Aldwell home as housing for the library for the last ten years. She also asked the county to sell the house and apply the proceeds to the new library. It was announced that the children's program room will be named for Marie Aldwell or a member of the Aldwell family. A library funding project was announced. The Sutton County address books are almost ready and will go on sale soon. The books give the mailing addresses of Sutton County residents and businesses. It is an update on the books that have been done in the past. If you need a book, please call me at the numbers above or any member of Woman's Club. We want everyone to have them. The cost is \$5.00 and I will deliver.
