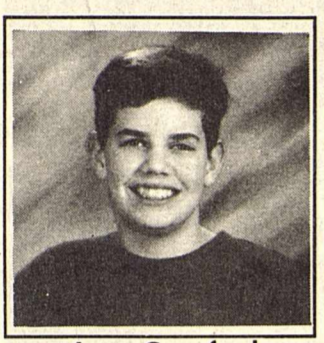

CRAWFORD PLACES 1ST AT STATE IN UIL PHYSICS

Jesse Crawford, son of Blane and Triska Crawford of Eldorado and Jenny and Bruce Swyter of Sonora, placed 1st in the State Academic UIL Physics Competition held Friday and Saturday, May 5th and 6th in Austin. Jesse, a 14 year-old freshman at Eldorado High School, had the top score in Physics in the Class 2A division. His sponsor was Schleicher County ISD Physics teacher Robert Jay.

Jesse's goal is to complete high school at the end of his Sophomore year to attend an advanced High School Math and Science school offered at University of North Texas. He is taking a full load at Eldorado this year in preparation, including Physics, Biology, Geometry, Algebra II, English I, World Geography, Band, and Typing I. There are 700 applicants for this school, out of which 200 are accepted. He cannot be interviewed until he is a Sophomore and has taken the SAT test.

Jesse should be in the 8th grade, but was allowed to advance in Sonora Junior High. "We have Janet Patton to thank," stated Mrs. Swyter. "She saw potential and did something about it." Jesse is the grandson of Robert and Sydonia Wilson and O.D. Crawford Spring, of Sonora.

NOTICE TO SONORA AND SUTTON COUNTY RESIDENTS

The enhanced 911 telephone system for emergency services response has now been established for the entire county.

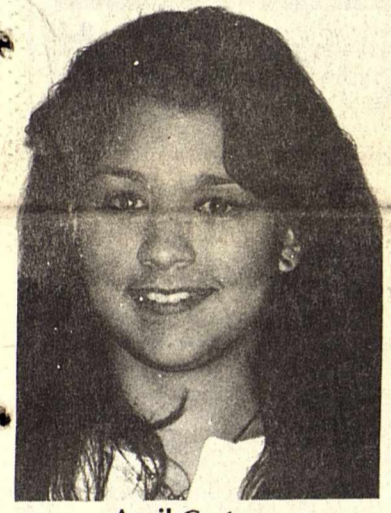
The conversion to this system requires street and house number identification. The 911 planning group for Sutton County has the responsibility for assigning addresses. You will receive notification of your address change (if applicable) in the city, or of our address change from rural route and box number to a house number and street/road number or name.

The addressing scheme for Sutton County is a linear continuation of city address numbers extending to the four boundaries of the county. Some addresses have been changed within the city limits to conform to this new requirement. Addresses have been assigned to all resident structures having a telephone number outside of city limits and located within Sutton County. All 387 prefixes located outside the county have been assigned address numbers extending from the Sutton County line. Until such time as Edwards and Val Verde Counties complete their E 911 addressing, Sutton County addresses are to be used. Now county residents will have an address similar in appearance to those you are used to using within city limits. Residents will start receiving address change notifications (where applicable) by mail within the next few weeks.

The Postal Service will fully cooperate with Sutton County in making the address changes necessary to support the E911 System. We are responsible to assure that the addresses assigned are unique and conform to proper convention.

As soon as processing of the addresses is completed by the U.S. Postal System, you will be notified by mail and you may begin using your new address to receive mail. The Postal Service will deliver mail bearing either address for an extended period. Please do not give your new address for receiving mail until notified by the Postmaster. You should, however, give your new address for the reporting of all 911 emergencies.

This was the fourth year that Sonora had advanced to the State meet, placing third in 1992, State Champions in 1993, and finalist in 1994.

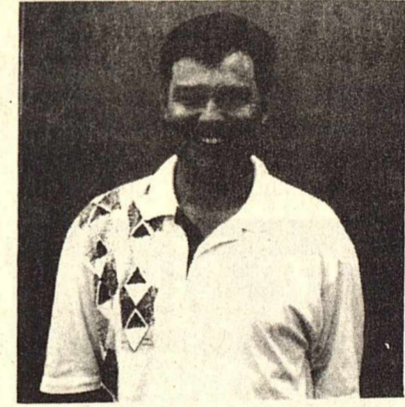
HOSPITAL BOARD HIRES ADMINISTRATOR

An Open Letter to Our Readers:

Q. In the Richardson article on Black Jack, she mentions the murder of a Jap Powers. Do you have any further information on this murder?

A. San Angelo Standard Times of December 14, 1895 ran the following article:

Murdered Near Knickerbocker

Last Thursday morning, J.N. Powers was found dead about 600 yards from his house, situated about 5 1/2 miles west of Knickerbocker, with five bullet holes in his body, one being in the head. It was reported that his wife says he left his house at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning on foot and unarmed, to bring up the horses that were hobbled nearby, and that was the last she saw of alive; a few minutes after he left the house she heard two shots and looking out of the house saw two men ride off over the hill; she did not pay any more attention to the shots, it being nothing unusual to hear shooting in the neighborhood. After awhile the wife became uneasy at his continued absence, a search party was organized and the body found as above stated. The circumstances surrounding the killing indicate that he was waylaid and murdered.

Deceased has two brothers living in Barnett County. An inquest was held on the body by Justice W.F. Holt. Sheriff Shield and Justice White left yesterday noon for the scene of the tragedy. No clue has been attained as to who committed the crime.

Q. I thought Black Jack was killed in 1897 not 1901?

A. You are correct and so is Ms. Richardson.

There were two men who went by the name of Black Jack. The first was believed to be a man named John McDonald that was killed about April of 1897 in Grant County, New Mexico. He was shot from his horse by Sheriff Higgins' posse and his body was taken to Clifton, fifteen miles distant. This Black Jack's gang members were Tom Anderson, George Musgrave, Cole Young, Sid Moore, and Bob Hayes. Cole Young was killed thirty miles west of Albuquerque during an attempted train robbery on October 2, 1896. Bob Hayes was shot in a fight near Silver City and an unknown member of the gang was shot and killed at Peach Spring, Arizona by a Wells Fargo messenger. At the time of this Black Jack's death

only Anderson and Musgrave remained at large. Now don't confuse George Musgrave with his brother Van. Van also went by the alias of Bob Lewis and there was a warrant for him in regards to cattle stealing in Deming. Van was thought to have joined up with his brother who it was thought would take over the gang.

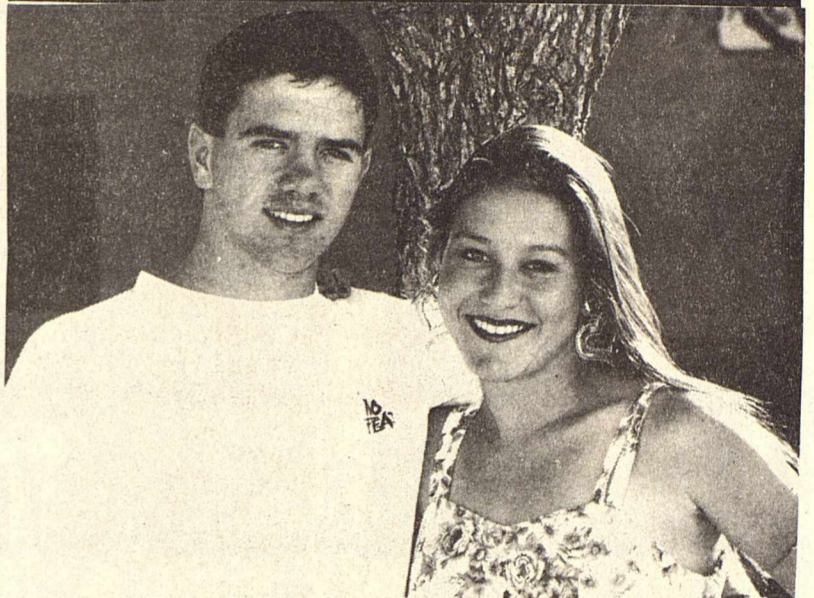
One columnist wrote that this Black Jack was "of the lower order of the genus homo, though possessed of all the cunning of an Apache Indian."

It has been written that the second Black Jack looked a great deal like the first, had a similar personality and was some times taken for him so he started using the name Black Jack too.

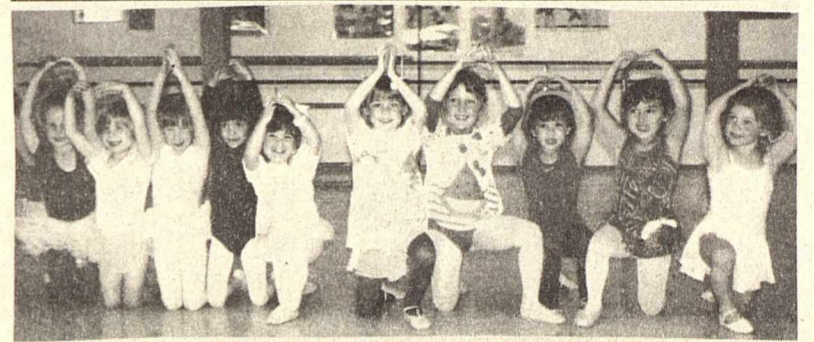

SHS SPORTS BANQUET HELD

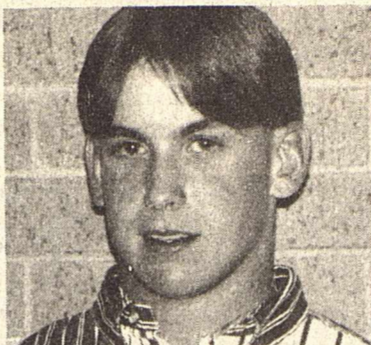
