Elementary Receives Award

A monetary award in the amount of \$1500 was made to Sonora Elementary School as part of the Texas Successful Schools Awards Program, Superintendent Charles Russell recently, announced.

The school is being recognized for gains in student performance in indicators that are part of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), more commonly known as the state's school report card.

The Sonora ISD school is

among 1,236 cash winning schools statewide receiving awards for exemplary or recognized performance and 401 schools receiving awards for recording gains in their

performance over last year. The awards are based on schools' spring performance on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) Test, which measures performance in reading, writing, and mathematics. Schools also had to meet performance standards for dropout and attendance rates.

SWC Library Association Receives \$5,000 Grant

The Sonora Woman's Club Library Association is the recipient of a \$5,000 grant from Burlington Resources/Meridian Oil Foundation. Contributions are made available to non-profit, tax-exempt organizations.

According to the grant application's guidelines, the Foundation administers a consistent contributions program in recognition of the company's opportunity to support and improve the general welfare and quality of life in communities it serves.

The grant money will be used for the purchase of furniture for the new library building.

City Council Held Meeting Tuesday

Tuesday, November 21 in regular session. The Sutton County Appraisal District reported tax payments collected for October in the amount of \$17,807.71 or five percent. Sutton County National Bank was selected as the depository of operating funds for a two year period. Three planning and zoning cases were approved. Also approved were annexation procedures requested by Frank Wamble on land located at the end of Hillside Street.

Discussion was held regarding the FFA proposed site for a tract of land owned by Jimmy Powers, just east of the City's sewer treatment plant, to be used for animal projects. The school requested permission to access the site through the City property and place a gate to the property

The City Council met between the sewer plant and Judge Garner requested that an the landfill. City Manager, Kelly Carta, advised the council that several issues are of concern. These being a 150' buffer zone around the sewer plant, private roadway between sewer plant and landfill, site security, flood plain, fecal runoff, and utilities. Carta stated that some of these concerns could be resolved locally and some by the state. Access was granted by the council.

A lengthy discussion was held regarding the fee schedule for the Sinaloa and Loma Alta additions. Carla Garner, County Judge, and citizens from these additions expressed their concern over the differential garbage rates for customers in the two additions as compared to inside the city. According to the minutes from the meeting,

additional rate increase not be given to those customers, due to the fact that they had received a \$5.00 increase in October and she felt that any additional charges would be a tremendous hardship. Garner also asked that those customers be given a free Friday trash pick up or a free landfill gate admission once a month, as customers do within the corporate limits. The council set all residential garbage rates, inside and outside the city, at \$15.00 per month and add \$5.00 to all commercial rates per dumpster, inside and outside the city. These rates are effective December 1, 1995. Also included in the motion was to allow all garbage utility customers one free Friday pickup or one free gate entry at the landfill per month. The vote carried three to two.

The Council also made revisions to the fee schedule as follows: landfill gate fee, all allowable wastes: \$1.00 per linear foot; no fee for building security checks and house watching done by the Police Department; classification for sewer rates for professional laundries and dry cleaners, per month, each fixture set \$13.00; utility late payment fee after 10 days of the due date, 1.5% of bill; and new sewer tap and connection - 4" tap or less -\$200.00, 6" to 8" tap 10" or greater tap both set at cost +

After an executive session. the council reconvened. Mayor Cascadden opened the meeting to the public. The council voted three to one to accept the resignation of City Manager, Kelly Carta. His duties will cease on December 22, 1995.

The people were Taken out of the Jeep. Officer Humphery immediately recovered a loaded .22 caliber pistol from under the seat where he had







Q. Can you give me any information on an E.R. Hill, who lived in Sonora when the town was first founded?

A. Elbert Regan Hill was born on October 5, 1860. His parents were Pharoah Hill (1825-1901) and Susan Rebecca Middleton Hill who were married on October 9, 1851. E.R. Hill had nine brothers and sisters. We know the names of only six of these, John Reed Hill, George Washington Hill, Sally Hill, Mary Alice Hill, Arminta Hill, and Pharoah "Fad" Hill.

E.R. Hill's father, Pharoah H. Hill served in Company G, 4th Regiment, Arizona Brigade at Brownsville, Texas in the Civil War. We have a copy of a letter he wrote to his wife, Susan, from Camp Hood, Cameron County, Texas, on January 10, 1865, where he tells about the Yankees being about 20 miles from him at a place called Brazos Santiago. He tells how the Yankees appear not to be very hostile and he don't think they have closer than they are now." He also tells her "what a glorious thing it would be if we could only have peace again."

E.R. Hill married a woman named Emma and they did live in Sonora. In The Devil's River News of November 8, 1890, we find that Barfield & Hill's wagon yard, next to the Traweek House (note this was on South Main Street) is about ready for business. On December 20, 1890, E.R. Hill has purchased T. C. Barfield's

interest in the Hill and Barfield wagon, feed and livery yard. There is an advertisement in the same issue for E.R. Hill, Feed, Wagon & Livery Yard, in connection with Traweek Hotel: Teams properly cared for. Satisfaction given. Sonora, Texas. In the January 3, 1891 issue we find the following: Born on Dec. 26th, 1890 to Mr. and Mrs. E.R. Hill, a 11 pound boy. In the April 11, 1891 issue, P. Hurst and M. Parker bought the wagon yard from E.R. Hill last week and in the April 15, 1891 issue we find mention of E.R. Hill, the ex-livery man returning last week from his trip east.

From deed records at the courthouse we know that E.R. Hill owned two pieces of property in Sonora. One of these properties was the livery stable and the other was residential lot 10, Block W34 which is over near Menard and First Street. E.R. and Emma had a total of nine children but only four of them survived infancy. Two of the infants are buried in Baird, Texas next to the grave of their uncle, John Hill. We know that E.R. Hill had a District Court Subpoena from Callahan County, issued in September 1890, requesting the Sheriff or Constable of Sutton County to locate him and deliver him to them to testify in the trial regarding the murder of his brother. After the 1891 article on his returning from the east, E.R. Hill disappears from the records of Sutton County.

After he left here according to family records, E.R. Hill ran a saloon in Sayre, Oklahoma and then was in

Kiowa, Oklahoma. If anyone has knowledge of the Hill family history, or would like to work with someone who has done extensive research on them, they should contact E.R. Hill at 45126 Vanderbilt Ct., Indio, CA 92201. Mr. Hill spent several days here in Sutton County going through our files and those at the Courthouse Annex. We traveled around town finding the lots his family had owned at one time and took him on a tour of the jail and depot. He asked me to extend his sincere appreciation to all the people in Sonora who were so kind and helpful to him in his search.



Dale Caddell, Sonora High School FFA sponsor, recently announced the results of the District Leadership Teams '95_ competition.



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Proposed Rules Could Rein in Horse Infection

For supervising inspector John Bryan of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), this workday is emotionally draining. He's traveled to a nearby ranch, to explain the regulations and procedures for handling a horse infected with Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA). Afterward, John chills a branding iron in dry ice, then disinfects and shaves a small. square area on the horse's left shoulder. He pushes the icy brand hard against its skin. then pulls away, and an indelible "74A" appears. Another day ... another horse infected with EIA, known as swamp fever" or "Coggins."

Last fiscal year, John Bryan and other TAHC animal health inspectors identified 442 EIA-infected horses to alert producers or potential buyers to the animals' condition. Most of the cases are in far northeast Texas and along the coast in southeast Texas. The horses that are positive on EIA blood tests aren't allowed to compete in shows or participate in trail rides and events.

EIA-infected horses are quarantined to their premise and branded with Texas' livestock code number "74A." Until the infected horses are removed, all other equine on the premise also are restricted. The list of approved options for handling infected animals is short: they can be put to sleep (euthanized), sold for slaughter, or sent to a research facility. After the infected animals are removed or euthanized, the remaining equine, which are considered to be exposed to the disease, must be held another 60 days and tested negative before being released.

EIA drops on neighborhood like a web. The TAHC requires testing of equine exposed to infection because they share a premise or are in contact with an infected horse. Horses on neighboring pastures also must have blood samples drawn for recommend locating and

testing the other entrants.

No vaccine--and no cure exists for this cruel, contagious disease that strikes horses and other equine, such as mules, donkeys, and zebras. Some EIA-infected animals develop the obvious symptoms of fever, swelling around the legs and chest, depression, and weight loss. Acutely infected equine may die suddenly. More frustrating for owners are the "unapparent carriers," infected animals that look and act perfectly healthy, although they test positive on the "Coggins," and CELISA blood tests. These equine pose the greatest risk for spreading infection, because no one suspects a problem, unless they look at test results.

The EIA virus is spread through blood-to-blood contact between "clean" equine and infected horses that are "viremic," meaning the virus is circulating in their blood stream. Biting flies are a major culprit, since they can carry the blood and virus on their mouth parts from one horse to another. The virus can also be on blood contaminated needles, syringes, and other medical instruments. Spraying for flies, disinfecting or sterilizing equipment, and avoiding contact with infected equine are important management tools for preventing infection.

For years, regulations for controlling EIA have been controversial, because there are no national guidelines for states to measure against. Several new rules to enhance Texas' program are consideration commissioners of the TAHC, the state's livestock health agency. The commissioners welcome public comments prior to voting on the rules at their spring 1996 meeting.

Proposals include: *establishing a definition for horse herds, and herds at "high risk" for infection even if they are not located on the same premise or adjacent to an infected equine.

*requiring equine to have had a negative EIA test within the past 12 months if they undergo a change-ofownership, or enter a show, fair

or exhibition. Events would include interstate (involving out-of-state entrants) as well as intrastate (in-state) shows. The EIA test record would be acceptable proof of testing. At public auctions, an accredited veterinarian could draw blood samples for the test, but until test results were available, animals would remain in Texas under quarantine.

*requiring equine dealers to keep records for two years on animals bought and sold. Records would assist TAHC inspectors when they trace exposed or infected equine. Cattle and swine dealers operate under similar rules. TAHC regulations

currently require an EIA test for equine going to an interstate show (involving outof-state entries), only if any equine are to remain on the grounds longer than 48 hours. No change-of-ownership tests are required, and there are no rules for maintaining dealer records. Both current and proposed regulations require Texas horses entering a parimutuel race track to have had an EIA test within the past 12 months, and a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within the past 45 days.

Unweaned foals from test-

negative dams are exempt from testing requirements.

Other proposals involve: *requiring infected equine to move directly to a slaughter plant, to a diagnostic or research facility, or to a market on a day when only slaughter animals are sold. (Before leaving their premise, infected equine must have a permit issued by the TAHC or USDA. This rule is intended to keep EIA-infected equine away from livestock markets, where they may pose a threat to healthy equine.)

*allowing exposed equine to be identified with the "74A" then to be sold to slaughter through a livestock market, provided they are isolated in quarantine from other horses.

Presently, both infected and exposed equine may move under permit to a livestock market to be sold for slaughter.
