The cold snap was deadly to many newly sheared goats County. Ranchers who were unlucky enough to have sheared just before the little storm, lost many goats to the cold. Jerry Don and Mary Adele Balch were among those surprised by the cold, wet weather. Their goats were not shorn slick, but even with tops on them,
there was some loss. Many goats were also lost by ranchmen when their goats tried to pack into sheds. They pack in so tightly that they smother each other. Many ranchers are lamenting the fate of a goat raiser. Goats just seem to be looking for a place to die.

Weather is not the only problem for ranchmen now. Dry weathe and low prices are a problem, but predators are gaining a foothold in Sutton County. It is serious factor in trying to ranch. Coyotes, bobcats, and mountain lions are being seen quite often in the pastures Exotic hogs that have been brought into game ranches have crossed with javalinas and domestic hogs. They go through fences and end up
in many pastures where lambs and goats become their prey. One rancher in the eastern part of the county has trapped almost 200 hogs in the last two years. Two hundred hogs can eat a lot of lambs and kids. It is a continuing problem that will probably get worse. Wolves and bears are being protected in the Big Bend Park. It is possible that we may have them in our back yard in a few years.
Our house still has a strong skunk odor, and I have not been able to spend a night there since the skunk visited us during the icy day of early February. Dean is still working on the problem. He is an optimist and still expects us to be able to get rid of the odor. I am not so ily, but none have eliminated it

His message is a plea for help, but was also a firm resolve to fight even though they were outnumbered by Santa Anna army. The message on that flag is "VICTORY OR DEATH". The flag and green. The white field was lettered 1824 The Texans were at that time fighting for the Constitution of Mexico of 1824. Santa Anna had declared himself dictator or emperor. He had abolished the Constitution of 1824 . The Texans were not willing to live under dictator. They came to Texas expecting the government to abide by the Constitution of 1824. They were not willing to give up their free dom. When the men and women took refuge in the Alamo on February 23, 1836, Independence had not been declared Independence was declared on March 2,1836 in a blacksmith's shop Anna at bay for 13 days. The modern Battle of the Alamo is still being waged and this time the attacker is not Santa Anna, but George Will, a news commentator.
About a year ago, he made a remark on the the TV show, This Week with david Brinkley. He said that he was quoting Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois who said, "The reason that there was so much heroism at the Alamo is that there was no back door." He of course made the comment, not as a mistaken idea of Simon's, but something that he believed. I realize that people in other states do not study Texas history the way we do, but I always believed that American history was required in all states. It would be difficult to teach american history and ignore the Battle of the Alamo. The Texas Revolution is consid the west to exploration, added huge amounts of land and natural resources, and made the quest for freedom a solid belief of Americans wherever they live. The Battle of the Alamo bought the time needed o bring the Revolution to a successful conclusion. Even people educated in Illinois, or wherever Will was educated must have been taught the importance of the battle to the U.S. Will and Simon did not understand what was happening in San Antonio in 1836.
The whole point of the Alamo story is that there was a back door it was open and inviting. There was a side door and a front door. all scaled on both side. Anyone who wanted to leave could go. Couriers took messages out and brought messages back to the defenders. What is remarkable about the Alamo is that all of the men stayed, except one. They could have escaped, surrendered, or just made a break for the prairie. The Mexican rifles were not very accurate, except at close range. Thirty-two men form Gonzales arrived and came into the Alamo to help with its defense. They certainly were not trapped with knowing that victory was probably hopeless, freedom knowing th
everything.

## Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital Adopts Patient Records Policy

## In recognition of and respect for patients' rights, Lillian M.M

 Hudspeth Memorial Hospital historically has adhered to established policies and mechanisms to safeguard patients' confidential health care information. Beginning January 1, 1996, a new Texas law clarifies that confidential health care information may be released only ipon written authorization of the patient or his legal representative or a specific legal exception is metSen. Frank Madla (D-San Antonio) was the author of the legislawhen releasing patient health care inforas hospitals to follow when releasing patient health care information. Senate Bill 667, cerning release of their health care information, including assuring patients access to their own medical records. The law requires hospitals to obtain the written authorization of a patient or legal represenative to release information relating to the patient's medical history, eatment, diagnosis or prognosis.
In general, patients may choose what types of information may be disclosed and designate to whom disclosure is allowed. The and requests for information from family, friends and others are handled. The law allows unauthorized disclosure of health care information to specified people or entities, such as to those caring for the patient, to third-party payers for purposes of hospital reimbursement, to governmental agencies as authorized or required by law, and to a court, upon court order or court subpoena.
A hospital may acknowledge an adult patient's presence and provide a one-word condition or status report without written consent.
However, patients have the right to request that no information or imited information be released, and these requests must be honored. Under the new law, all patient information, including that related to public figures and those involved in matters of public record, is treatunder certain circumstances, such as rape, sexual abuse, child or elderly abuse, chemical dependency and attempted suicide. No information is provided on inmates in the Texas Department of Criminal
Justice or those in protective custody Lillian M Hudspeth Memorial
ility to keep the citizens of Sonora and Sutton County informed of hospital activities. However, protecting a patient's privacy and maintaining confidentiality of health care information is of paramount importance. More information about this new law and the hospital's policies is available by contacting the hospital business office at 915
