The TEA will continue their investigation by interviewing board members Wednesday, May 15 and will have complete a report within three to eight weeks.




Toby was preceded in death by a brother Tommy Burkes and step-sister Jeri Todd-Burkes.







Sutton County Courthouse

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Q. What kind of documentation do they have on file for the recent recognition given to the Sutton County Courthouse by the Texas State Historical Commission.?

A. Documenting the Sutton County Courthouse is not a difficult task. The building was discussed in many of the County Commissioners Meetings and reported in detail in the Devil's River News. The Sutton County Historical Society also has a great many pictures on file that show the changes in the square through the years and we have done several articles on the building in this column.

In the Devil's River News of February 14, 1891, it was reported that the County Commissioners Court met on February 10th and 11th and accepted the plans of Oscar Ruffini, of San Angelo, for a court house. The plans call for a two story building, 80 feet front by 68 feet deep all built of rock, to have four fire-proof vaults for records, four entrances and halls, and eight rooms on first floor and five rooms in second story. To cost about \$28,000. Ruffini is to receive the sum of 3 1/2percent upon the cost of the building, payable to him when the contract has been let and was requested to he superintend the construction of said building and issue certificates thereon for compensation of an additional 1 1/2 percent.

\$27,706, Thomas Lovell \$29,015 and Chance & Kinney \$31,330. They voted unanimously to award the contract to Gafford. In subsequent issues we find a warrant for \$949.71 as payment for services in preparing plans and specifications for court house building to Oscar Ruffini, architect.

There are reports on the plot of ground, known as court house square, same being 300 feet square, except amount reserved for well and water purposes, be accepted as a gift from R. W. Callahan, T. B. Birtrong and J. Q. Adams. L. J. Dunagan was appointed to select the site for court house and jail on plat of aforementioned ground.

Devil's River News May 2, 1891 reported that Z. D. Gafford and August Belfanz the contractors for the courthouse had arrived Thursday and will commence operations Monday morning. Devil's River News of May 9, 1891 reported that W. B. Brackien, the freighter, is proud of the fact that he brought to Sonora the first load of lumber to be used in the Sutton County Courthouse. He arrived last Saturday, May 2, 1891. In subsequent issues we found mention of J. B. McInteer and Wm. Stephenson, stone masons from Coleman and 8 other stone masons, including E. Mazinke, being at work on the building. A. S. Grant a painter, glazier, and decorator had the contract to paint the courthouse and Charles Nichols was the boss carpenter. In the November 7, 1891 issue it was reported the first story is complete and in the

December 12, 1891 issue it was reported that the stone work was nearly done.

Commissioners Court awarded a contract to F. Wyatt to supply the water to the courthouse on February 20, 1893. On July 5, 1893,, A. S. Grant was allowed \$935 for material used and work done in painting the courthouse and contractor Z. D. Gafford received a balance due him of \$444.71. The court then approved and accepted the building.

On April 15, 1899, a courthouse fence was built by B. F. Bellows. On February 21, 1936, it was reported that the fence will be torn down, the water trough done away with and a rock wall would be built around the complex as part of a WPA project. Motorized drilling equipment and dynamite were used to remove the old stone retaining wall at the front of the building. G. W. Archer was supervising the work of the Mexicans and other men employed on the job that was reported as keeping at least 8 men employed for the next several months.

We also have on file reports on the Sonora Woman's Club planting trees on the square as part of their city wide beautification project and reports of damage to the building in the 1902 fire. Now if one of my readers can give me the year the roof was renovated, iron work removed, and roof line changed to present state, major repainting of interior, I will go down and pull that information from the commissioners' reports and dig out any related stories in the back issues of the Devil. I think with this information added we will have

Disaster Facts and Figures

The use of interesting and compelling disaster statistics can increase interest in preparedness messages among your key audiences. Use the fads and figures below as appropriate in your outreach to the media or in presentations to community groups or local businesses. If possible, research disaster statistics for your community to localize your materials.

Thunderstorms and Lightning

Severe thunderstorms can be the source of a variety of dangerous weather conditions, including heavy rains (which can cause flash flooding), strong winds, hail, lightning and tornadoes. It is a myth that lightning never strikes the same place twice. In fact lighting often strikes the same site several times in the course of one storm. On average, the U.S. has 100,000 thunderstorms each year. Deaths from lightning (the most serious danger during a thunderstorm) average between 150 and 200 each year.

Tornadoes

The United States has more tornadoes than anywhere else in the world, with sightings in all 50 states. Most injuries or deaths from tornadoes are caused by collapsing buildings, flying objects or attempts to speed ahead of a twister in a car. Tornadoes can produce wind speeds as high as 320 miles per hour, travel farther than 20 miles and be as tall as 40,000 feet above ground. On average, 1,000 tornado sightings are reported in the United States each year. Tornadoes result in approximately 100 deaths in the US each year.

Floods

Floods are the most common and widespread of all natural, disasters and can occur nearly anywhere in the United States. The sheer force of one foot of swiftly moving water can knock people. off their feet. Cars are easily swept away in just two feet of moving. water. Flooding has been responsible for the deaths of more than 100,000 people since 1900. Property damage attributable to flooding now totals more than \$1 billion each year.

Flash Floods

Flash floods can occur with little or no warning -- and can reach peak within minutes. In a flash flood, rapidly rising walls of water generally are accompanied by a deadly cargo of debris. Flash flood waves move at incredible speeds and can roll boulders, tear out trees, destroy buildings and obliterate bridges. Walls of water in flash floods can reach heights of 30 feet or more.





Ranchers' Lamb Extends Stock Sale

The Board of Directors and Organizers of Ranchers' Lamb of Texas, Inc. announces the extension of stock sales until June 3, 1996. The first subscription period was a success in that it raised \$3.75 million dollars in stock sales. The goal of the Directors is to raise enough money to build the plant debt free. Cost projections individual, and Justin was fifth high individual. are estimated at \$4.2 million dollars to construct the plant. Templeton Construction of San Angelo has been selected as general contractor for the construction of the plant. Plant blueprints have been approved by USDA to process sheep, goats and veal calves. Construction will begin June 1, 1996 three miles east of San Angelo on Hwy. 380 adjacent to the city of San Angelo waste water treatment plant.

The construction of a new processing facility is crucial to the survival of the sheep and goat industry in Texas. Closing of the Monfort plant created a void which the new facility will fill. At present lambs are being trucked approximately 750 miles to be processed. With the new local plant, freight costs and shrink will be drastically reduced, returning more net profit to Texas sheep and goat producers.

It was the belief of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Task force, which began meeting approximately one year ago, that producers must design organize, invest and assist in the operation of a vertically integrated business which would allow the producer an opportunity to participate in value-added processing. To insure success of the plant, Ray Ellis of San Angelo has been retained to manage the new facility. Ellis has 30 plus years of packing plant and meat sales background with Swift, Armour, Monfort and Superior. In addition, the directors have secured investments from ranchers, feedlot operators, by-product processors and brokers and meat brokers which creates an alliance from the producer to the end user. The board of directors of Ranchers' Lamb of Texas is as follows: A.H. Cape Mohair Sale Report submitted

According to Sonora Wool & Mohair, Cape Mohair reported selling 2,520 of 2575 bales offered, or 98% sold. The report stated there was a lot of competition at today's (5/13/96) sale, resulting in rapid price increases for all qualities of hair. Adult was effected the most by the rising market, prices rose sharply throughout the sale and closed fully 25% higher. Strong young goats parallel the adult, and prices were 20% higher, while fine younger goat qualities rose 10%.

Kids saw better demand than in recent sales with average kids rising 5% and fine kids closed 7.5% to 10% higher.

Short carding types were once again in good demand. Prices for the finer qualities were 10% higher and up to 25% higher for the stronger types. Stained hair followed a similar pattern as prices rose some 15% to 20%.

The final sale of the summer season will be held the 4th of June with approximately 2,400 bales offered.

It has not been determined how this will effect the Texas prices, however the attitude is optimistic.


Hill Country Cattlewomen Meet submitted






