tions regarding the proper display - and respect for the United States Flag. We are printing the follow
ing parts of the Federal Flag Code ing parts or readers better understand the rules: custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on build-
ings and on stationary flagstaff in the open. However when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may
be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness. (b) The flag should be hoisted briskly and flag should not be displayed on
days when the weather is inclement, except when an all flag should be displayed on all days, especially on New Year's January 20; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12; Washington's Birthday, third Monday in
February: Easter Sunday Mother's Day, second Sunday in May; Armed Forces Day, third

(half staff until noon), the last Monday in May; Flay Day, June
14; Independence Day July 4; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Constitution Day September 17; Columbus Day, second Monday in October; Navy Day, October 27; Veterans Day, November 11; Thanksgiving Day,
fourth Thursday in November; Christmas Day, December 25; and such other days as may be pro-
claimed by the President of the United States; the birthdays of States (date of admission); and on be displayed daily on or near the main administration building of every public institution. (f) The flag should be displayed near every polling place on elec-
tion days. (g) The flag should be displayed during school days in or near every schoolhouse.
Sec. 3 that the flag, when carried in a procession with another
flag or flags, should be either on flag's own right, or, if there is a
line of other flags, in the front of the center of that line. (a) The flag should not be displayed on a float in a parade except from a staff; or as provided in subsection (i). (b) over the hood, top, sides, or back
of a vehicle or of a railroad train - or a boat. When the flag is disshould be fixed firmly to the chas-
sis or clamped to the right fender. (c) No other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the flag of the United States of America, except during church

States should be hoisted first and lowered last. No such flag or pennant may be placed above the flag of the United States or to the

When the flags of two or more nations are displayed, they are to be flown from separate staffs of the same height. The flags should be of approximately equal size.
International usage forbids the International usage forbids the
display of the flag of one nation display of the flag of one nation
above that of another nation in time of peace. (h) When the flag of the United States is displayed from a staff projecting horizontaly or at an angle from the window ing, balcony, or front of a build-
ing, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half staff. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending
from a house to a pole at the edge from a house to a pole at the edge
of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out, union first, from the building. (i) When displayed horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. flag should be displayed in the same way with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street. (j) When the flag is dis-
played over the middle of the played over the middle of the
street, it should be suspended vertically with the union tot the north in an east and west street or to the east in a north and south street. (k) When used on a speaker's plat-
form, the flag, if displayed flat form, the flag, if displayed flat,
should be displayed above and behind the speaker. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the flag of the United States of America should prominence, in advance of the honor at the clergyman's or
speaker's right as he faces the audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed on the
left of the clergyman or speaker or to the right of the audience. (l) The flag should form a distinctive
feature of the ceremony of unveilfeature of the ceremony of unveil-
ing a statue or monument, but it ing a statue or monument, but it should never be used as the covering for a statue or monument. (m)
The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and than lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak
before it is lowered for the day. before it is lowered for the day.
On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon only, than raised to the top of the staff. (We suggest you contact your local VFW for a precise

should never be displayed with should never be displayed with
the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property. (b) The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the
ground, the floor, water, or merground, the floor, water, or mer-
chandise. (c) The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free. (d) The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery. It should never be fastened, drawn back, nor up, in
folds, but always allowed to fall free. Bunting of blue, white, and red, always arranged with the blue above and the white in the middle,
and the red below, should be used and the red below, should be used
for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform, and for decoration in general. (e) The flag should never be fastened,
displayed, used, or stored in such displayed, used, or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any
way. (f) The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling. (g) The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark,
insignia, letter, word, figure, insignia, letter, word, figure,
design, picture, or drawing of any design, picture, or drawing of any
nature. (h) The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything. (i) The flag should never be used for advertising pur-
poses in any manner whatsoever. poses in any manner whatsoever.
It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising
signs should not be fastened to a signs should not be fastened to a
staff or halyard from which the flag is flown. (j) No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform.
