

Chicken Corn Chowder

4 slices bacon 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves tablespoons flour 3 cups half and half or milk 1/2 cups cubed cooked chicken (10 ounce) package frozen whole kernel corn medium potato, diced 1/2 cup chopped red bell pepper 2 cups water 2 tablespoons Wyler's Chicken Flavor Instant Bullion or 6 Chicken Flavor Bouillon Cubes 1/4 teaspoon pepper In saucepan, cook bacon until crisp; remove and crumble. 



Q. How did the Dry Devil's River get its name? Why is it called a river when it is dry all the time?

A. After looking at old maps going back to the early 1800's, I am even more confused than when I started looking up a concise and correct answer to this question.

Before 1846 the Devil's River was called the San Pedro River. I then find old maps showing the San Pedro River from Del Rio north to Beaver Lake where it changes to the Devil's River and an unnamed at that time draw that runs to Howard's Spring. On several old maps of trails, we find the San Pedro changed to the Devil's River to its source, north of Sonora. Then what had been Ft. McKavett

Lowrey Draw, and Meckel Draw is still in existence. The current map of Sutton County shows the Dry Devil's River running up into the city limits and then further north lists Meckel Draw and Lowrey Draw. How these changes came about, and how the names were changed, except for the 1846 change from the San Pedro River to the Devil's River, we don't know. You would have to ask Austin why their people labeled the draws the way they did in the 1930's when they came out here and started putting signs in the ground.

In 1890 articles in the Devil's River News, Mike Murphy tells of sitting at his table in his tent and writing his column with the Devil's River roaring in the canyon outside. So in 1890 he refers to the Dry

and will refer you to Austin. Mike's tent was set up at the corner of Main and Concho where Westerman Drug now stands, so he was definitely talking about what is now labeled as the Dry Devil's River.

Now we will address why it is called a river. The water table has fallen greatly during the years. Many old timers have said that there was always a trickle of water at least in the now called Dry Devil's River but that as the springs dried up so did the water. Since early days the placid little now dry draw has turned into a roaring broad river. There have been many times it has overflowed its banks and since the bridges were erected it has been up over the top of them. Don't be fooled by these dry little washes around here; pay strict attention to the high water signs put up in them. Inattention could cost you your life.

There are articles telling of people putting up dams alongside the river and creating water holes and stock pens. There had to be water running most of the year to enable them to do this. One man even made a pond alongside the river and had paddle boats in it and a small restaurant. In these articles, it is again called the Devil's River. I can easily understand why there is so much confusion regarding the name after looking at all these maps and reading articles that refer to the town of Sonora on the banks of the Devil's River. Since this is a historical society, and we don't guess we will refer you to Austin for clarification.

Now for a personal note. Rick and I would like to express our sincere appreciation to the

Sonora Police Department for the excellent job they did on house watch while we were away on vacation. The only thing different when we got back was the grass. From the looks of it you had quite a bit of rain while we were gone. We had a long trip to Idaho, Washington, and Oregon. The Menard team is heavy and big this year and has more experienced players than at this time last year.



October 12, 1951 **Broncos Take First Win Of Season** From San Angelo Kittens, 18-13

The small but well conditioned Sonora Broncos defeated a much larger squad of San Angelo kittens by a score of 18-13 Friday night in Bronco Stadium.

A crowd of about 500 watched the last minutes roll by as the San Angelo eleven threatened to reverse the win but somehow just couldn't reach paydirt.

Statistics showed the teams evenly matched on the field throughout the game. Sonora made 11 first downs to the Kittens 12. The Broncos gained 149 yards to the Kittens 156. Sonora completed eight passes for 80 yards while San Angelo completed four for 45.

The Broncs tried six other passes and the Kittens tossed five incomplete aerials. Sonora outkicked the Kittens with each team punting twice. San Angelo gained 35 and the Broncs 65. But the Kittens evened the score by losing four yards from scrimmage while they

forced the Broncos to lose 31 yards. Both teams were even on fumbles, five each. The Kittens drew two five-yard penalties of

off-side while the Broncos received four, two backfield in motion, one for illegal formation, and one for off side.

The Sonora team opened the game by returning the Kittens kick-off from their own 20 to the 46. The first play found Bobby Scott running off the Broncos single wing going around left end on a handoff all the way for a touchdown. The try for the conversion failed.

Late in the first quarter a lucky break in the form of Sonora captain, Herb McKee recovering a Kitten fumble on the Kitten 35-yard line let Bobby Scott take a left end run over for another touchdown. The conversion failed.
