Sutton County Jr. Livestock Show This Weekend

The annual Sutton County Jr. Livestock Show will begin the first weekend in January. All Angora goats and swine must be in the 4-H Center no later than 7:00 p.m. on Friday, January 3. The Angora goat show will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday January 4. This division of the show has really grown over the past few years and will have the largest number of entries and participating exhibitors again this year. It is anticipated that there will be approximately 175 Angora goats exhibited by some 40 Sutton County youth. The quality of the show is exceptional and this is the largest county Angora goat show in Texas. The judge for this year's show will again be Mr. Roland Trees who has judged shows all over Texas, in Canada and Australia.

Immediately following the

Angora goat show, the swine show will begin with a total of 17 market gilts entered in this year's show and an exhibition class of seven barrows. This is always a fun part of the show and has become very competitive as well. The judge for the swine show will again be Mrs. Misti Spiller from Miles, Texas. Mrs. Spiller is an accomplished livestock judge who was an outstanding 4-H member in Gillespie County where she exhibited swine as well as other livestock species.

Everyone is encouraged to come to the 4-H Center on Saturday, January 4th for the first weekend's show activities. These young people have worked very diligently throughout the year and would really enjoy having you see their projects.

School Board Rejects Examiner's Decision

Last month, the TEA appointed examiner, John Rheinschild, for the Sonora Independent School District / McNaughten hearing ruled the board "failed to meet its burden of proof" in the six reasons the board gave for terminating McNaughten's contract.

At a meeting held Monday, December 30, board members listened to summarizations from attorneys, Morris Reece, representing McNaughten, and

Stephen Moss, representing the board.

Moss encouraged members to consider each allegation: the use of profanity in an educational setting, falsifying grades, changing courses to provide credits to students who had not earned them, discouraging teachers from exercising their right to grieve, verbally abusing teachers, and failing to conduct teacher evaluations in a timely

manner.

Mr. Reece stated Dr. McNaughten admittedly made mistakes. He reminded the board the hearing examiner was an independent, unbiased observer who determined the evidence regarding the allegations did not add up to good cause to terminate his contract.

After a lengthy deliberation, the board rejected the examiner's decision.

West Texas Rehab Center Plans Rehab 97

January 11, 1997. That's the date for West Texas Rehabilitation Center's prime time telethon, Rehab '97 -- the night Rehab puts its best foot forward and launches its yearly funding program, with lots of help from celebrity friends, volunteers and viewers.

And January 11th is the date Sonora volunteers, led by Johnny and Beth Snyder, will conduct Sonora's Rehab '97 phone bank at the First National Bank. Residents are urged to call 387-3861 between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m. or go by the back and leave their donation in person. Also, advance donations may be made to the coordinators or left at the back prior to the telethon.

Twelve state-wide television stations,

including KLST-TV in San Angelo, will televise this 27th annual show which originates live from the Abilene Civic Center, beginning at 7 p.m. Headliners Lee Roy Parnell and Suzy Boggus will share the stage with Peter Marshall, Rex Allen, Rex Allen Jr., Bill and Susan Hayes, Anacani, Arthur Duncan and Brad Maule.

Viewers of KLST-TV will be able to see the network stage show as well as local interviews and Concho Valley phone bank reports from WTRC-San Angelo hosted by Pat Attebery, local television host and WTRC board vice chairman.

For those in outlying areas with satellite receiving dishes, the event may be viewed on Galaxy IV, transponder 11.

Another popular segment of the telethon is the auction which features retail merchandise and hand-crafted items donated by businesses and individuals—ranging from saddles and silrinos to trips and treadmills. Major auction items and a toll-free bidding number will be publicized prior to show time.

"As in the past, we certainly hope to top the \$1 million mark on Rehab '97 because it's going to take more than \$9 million next year for the Center to do its job of serving disabled children and adults," said Jim Pethis, WTRC president. "Approximately, 15,000 people are counting on all of us, and with the help of supporters and volunteers, I'm confident we'll be successful on January 11 and all year long."

Graveside services were held at 3 p.m. Thursday, December 26, in Fairmount Cemetery with the Rev. Monte Jones of Sonora officiating. Arrangements were by Johnson's Funeral Home.

Duncan was born July 9, 1925, in San Antonio to D.C. Ogden and Frederice Poole Wilson. Duncan's mother was born in Manchester, England, and married his father, Ogden, after World War I. Other ancestors were Elizabeth Cox and Capt. Duncan Campbell Ogden, who came to Texas in 1838. Capt. Ogden was a captain in the Army of the Republic of Texas. His son established the Coralina Ranch near Fort McKavett in 1885. The ranch passed to his nephew, D.C. Ogden Wilson, the son of Cora Ogden Wilson and Nathan Taylor Wilson, in 1916, and has remained in the family for more than 100 years.

As was the custom at the time for ranching families, Duncan was educated at San Antonio Academy and Southern Arizona School for Boys.

He graduated from the Texas Military Institute in San Antonio in 1942.

In 1943, during World War II, he entered the service as an aerial gunner in a bombardment squadron of the U.S. Army.

After the war, he went to the University of Texas, where he was a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. He received his bachelor's degree in geology in 1950 and his master's degree in 1951. Upon graduating, he went to work for Gulf Oil Co. in Marfa, Fort Worth and finally Amarillo.

On August 31, 1957, Duncan married Patricia Hope of

Marfa. They began their married life in Amarillo where their son, Cam, was born in 1958. They moved to the ranch in 1960, and their daughter, Hope, was born the next year.

He was equally well known for his credo, "Watch the pennies and the dollars will take care of themselves." His quality Angus cattle and pecan orchard are widely respected in West Texas.

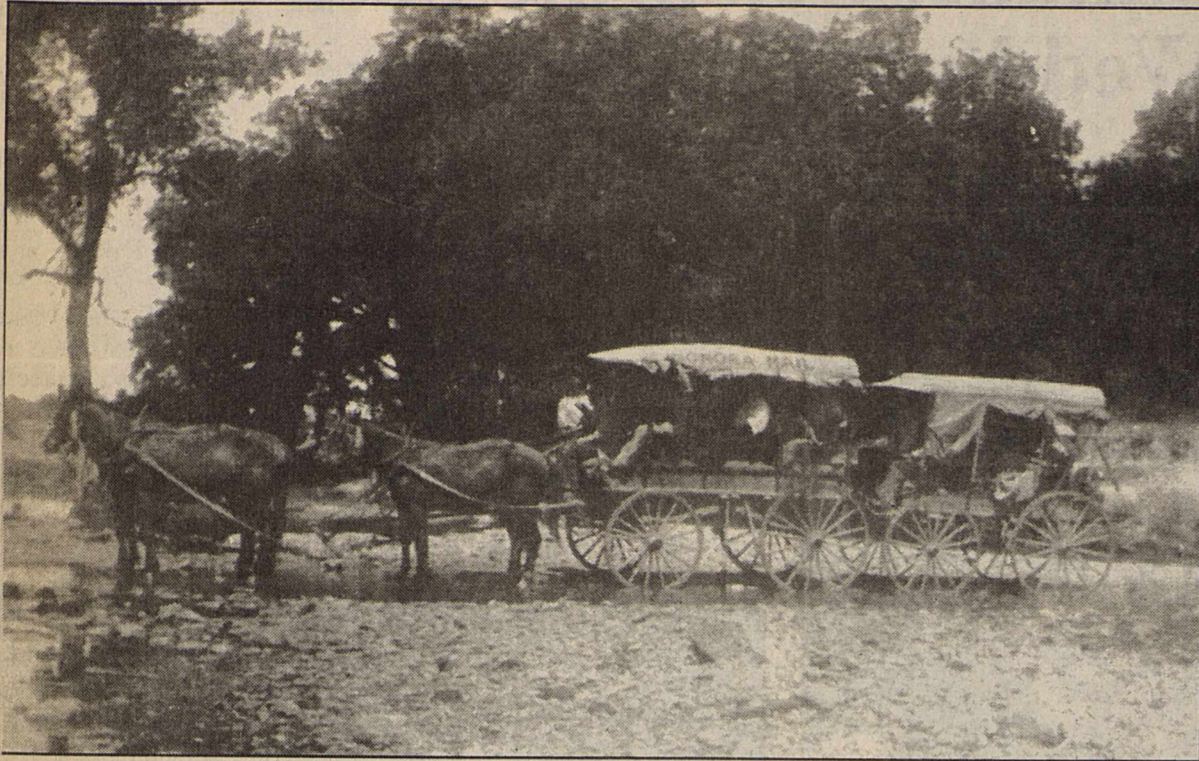

The Sonora San Angelo Mail, Express & Passenger Line

Q. Do you have any information on the early years of the Sonora Stage Line?

A. In the 1890-1891 issues of The Devil's River News we find the Sonora & San Angelo Stage and Express line listed with J.R. Holman as proprietor. A single trip is \$5 and a round trip is \$8. The stage left Sonora and San Angelo every day except Sunday at 7 a.m.; the trip was made in one day. Parcels were also carried for a fee. P. Hurst was the agent in Sonora and R.E. Harris & Bros. the agent in San Angelo.

In the 1896 Devil's River News we find the Sonora and San Angelo Mail, Express and Passenger Line listed with A. J. Savell & Sons listed as proprietors. Schedules and fees listed are the same as in 1890 and 1891.

From 1899 to 1901 we find the Sonora and San Angelo Mail, Express and Passenger Line listed with Tom and Will Savell as proprietors. A single trip is \$4 and a round trip is \$6.50. The schedule is the same and tickets are on sale at T.L. Benson's in Sonora and Harris' Drug Store in San Angelo.

In the 1905 Devil's River

News we find the Sonora San Angelo Mail, Express & Passenger Line listed with Bob Lowe as proprietor. The stage left Sonora at 4 a.m. to make connection with the Santa Fe train in San Angelo. The stage left San Angelo after the train arrived and got back into Sonora at 9 a.m. The fare was \$4 one way and \$7 round trip; with each passenger allowed 25 pounds of baggage free. Ticket agents listed are: Mrs. Laura Decker, Sonora; J.S. McConnell's Livery Stable, The Elder Hotel, Eldorado and Con Cunningham, Christoval.

In 1908 we find company name and fees are the same, but E. R. Ames is now the proprietor. The stage leaves Sonora at 10 p.m. to make connection with the Santa Fe at San Angelo. It leaves San Angelo after the train arrives and reaches Sonora at 3 a.m. Mrs. J. C. McDonald is the agent in Sonora.

In the February 20, 1909 issue of The Devil's River News, we find a major change in the Sonora and San Angelo Mail, Express & Passenger Line. Clendennen and Robbins are proprietors and there is now listed automobile or stage service.

The stage service fees are the same; auto fare is \$7 one way and \$10 round trip. Automobile runs left Sonora and San Angelo daily except Sunday at 7 a.m., arriving in San Angelo and Sonora the same evening. The stage left Sonora on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 7 a.m. and arrived in San Angelo that night. It left San Angelo Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 7 a.m. and arrived in Sonora that night. Mrs. J. C. McDonald is listed as agent in Sonora.

In November of 1909 we find the fees and schedules are the same but Allison and Wardlaw are listed as the proprietors with tickets sold at their office at the Corner Drug Store.

The Sonora Stage was not a heavy Concord Stage with padded seats like you see in many westerns on television. It was a converted wagon with seats put into the back and a tarp cover. There were side curtains made of canvas to roll up or

down when necessary. The trip to San Angelo was not a comfortable one. Many times passengers had to get out and help push if the stage got mired down in bad weather or stuck crossing a swollen draw. In dry weather you were liberally covered with dirt and dust all the way. During times of heavy traffic a second wagon was attached to the rear of the first and extra horses added. I think this covers our early stage runs from their beginning to the start of automobile travel to and from Sonora and San Angelo.

I would like to wish all my readers a Happy New Year! Thank you all so much for your cards, calls and letters while I was ill. It will take about 4 to 5 months more before I am totally well so if I miss a column now and then please bear with me. Two surgeries in two months takes a lot out of you. Thank you!
