Tom "Black Jack" Ketchum was born on October 31, and was hanged on April 26, 1901.
-by Jo-Ann E. Palmer Q. Did Black Jack Ketchum have any family come see him
before he was hanged? A. On page 122 of "My Nine A. On page 122 of "My Nine
Years as Governor" by former Governor Otero of New Mexico we found the following:
One day Tom's oldest brother, Berry Ketchum came to visit him but Tom declined to see him. He said "Berry is my good brother.
He is a Christian and belongs to the church. I will tell you how it all happened. He showed both Sam and me how to hold up a train. The three of us held up a train in Texas and secured about $\$ 100,000$ in cash. Berry was the oldest, so he took the money and became a real Christian gentle-
man, and Sam and I had to rustle for a living. Once in a while, he would give us a horse and a few dollars, but believe me, the dollars were very few. He had taught us just how to hold up trains and get the money so we kept it up. He
worried every time we visited him, fearing we might give him not wish to see him." Berry came over to see me and seemed to be a quiet and pleasant gentleman. He said Sam and Tom were always wild and would not follow his advice to settle down and go to
farming. He said he had promised to buy each of them a good farm if to buy each of them a good farm if
they would work it, but they

he wanted such as peanuts, candy, cakes, and pies, as he was very fond of sweets. At the same time he asked the warden not to tell Tom what he had done. On page 325 of the same book we found another interesting note about Black Jack. It seems that President Theodore Roosevelt had been to New Mexico on a visit and before he left for Arizona--wel et's have Governor Otero tell you his own words:

Before the President left fo Arizona, I presented him with he would always keep it as momento of his wonderful trip to anta Fe. I also presented him with the rifle, formerly belonging to Tom Ketchum (Black Jack), the in robber and killer.
Ketchum, were the sons of Berry Ketchum were the sons of Berry
Ketchum, Sr. and Temperance Ketchum, Sr. and Temperance
Katherine Wydick Ketchum There were also two sisters. Berry Ketchum, Sr. died on October 28, 1868 and Temperance died in 1873. Tom was only five when his muther died and grew up without posedly a honest and responsible man in his early years. Sam married Louisa Greenlee in San Saba on February 4, 1875 and they had a daughter Laura and a son William Berry. When William Berry was about three years old, Louisa left Sam and took the chil-
dren to Cleburne, Texas. knows why, but it was said that Sam was gone for long periods of time, working as a ranchhand on the Half Circle Six and many other ranches in New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle, too long for her. Tom was charged with the Knickerbocker on December 12, 1869 and Sam and Tom went on
the run. On June 10, 1897 they
killed Mr. Herzstein from Liberty, TX when Herzstein was pursuing them with a posse after they had robbed his store and the post
office. This time they were guilty of killing a man. You see the first murder, that of John Powers wa found to have been committed by his wife and her lover. They had set up the well known "wild" Ketchum boys and were believed for quite some time. It took over a ear for the Ketchum boys to be
cleared of this murder and Mrs. Powers and her lover to be legally charged. By then I guess Sam and Tom figured as long as they were getting blamed for everything wrong they might as well do it. Anyway after Tom was captured in 1899, Sam took over head of the Ketchum gang and tried to rob the same train his brother had
held up near Twin Mountains, held up near Twin Mountains, occasions. Sam was shot in the arm by train conductor Frank Harrington and fled to a nearby ranch, where a cowboy did a utcher job of amputating his arm. ly afterward.
Tom and Elzy Lay were captured on July 11, 1899. Tom was tried and convicted of train robbery and hanged at Clayton, New Mexico. on April 26, 1901. This was a spectacular hanging
because someone had miscalcubecause someone had miscalcu-
lated and Tom Ketchum was lated and Tom Ketchum was
decapitated. The undertaker sewed his head back on and he was buried in Clayton's Boot Hill Cemetery. On September 10, 1933, Tom Ketchum's body was disinterred and moved to the new Clayton cemetery. Thus ends the tale of another of Will Carver's
friends. Another went wrong and paid for it in the went wr
end.

Many communities across the country who meet the current clean air rules will not meet the new standards. Just when more American cities have cleaned up their act, the EPA wants to send as many as 75 percent of our nations counties to the federal doghouse. In Texas alone, 34 counties, urban and rural, would fall out of compliance under the new standards. This means that new highway construction funds could be lost, car pooling could be mandated and small businesses could face expensive, burdensome new reg-
ulations. Even lawnmowers, barbecues ulated under the EPA's plan!

Despite public protests and doubt ex

No one knows these answers yet, and until they do, the EPA should not be allowed to push ahead
The American people have every right to demand that continued investments in reducing air pollution will produce real benefits for the environ-

skeptical. The American people are reasonable. If the EPA has a convincing case, they ought to be able to show it with honest facts and real benefits. We're still waiting.
