
"I'm real excited that her best

Reading receive Renaissance Model Classroom certification, teachers must demon-


strate that their students receive a minimum of sixty minutes of reading practice time daily. In addition, teachers must be actively working with individual students to meet Institute-recommended standards





Since we did not have any questions this week I thought you might like to take a walk down memory lane to May of 1929.

Devil's River News, May 17,

Headlines this week read Orient Ry. Granted Permission to Extend Rails to Sonora. It seems that in Washington the Interstate Commerce Commission had finally granted permission of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railway to construct 65 miles of road between San Angelo and Sonora on the conditions that construction begin by January, 1930, and be completed by December 1, 1930.

E.M. Kirkland has let the contract for a twenty-five room boarding house to Scott and Knapton to be located in the southeast part of town. This structure will be of stucco and sheet rock inside and will contain modern conveniences and should be ready for occupancy the middle of July.

Scott and Knapton have workmen busy tearing away the old Sonora Motor Company sheet iron building which adjoins the Tourist Hotel, preparatory to the construction of a brick and tile building 100 feet wide and 60 feet deep which will be divided into three store

Vander Stucken Co., Inc. you could purchase a 12 pound sack of American Beauty Flour for 57 cents, a 24 pound sack of Purity Flour for 97 cents, a no. 2 can of blackberries for 15 cents, and a gallon can of blackberries for 63 cents. Nine large cans of Borden's or Carnation Milk were \$1.00 and 18 small cans of Borden's or Carnation Milk were \$1.00.

Boer Goat School Scheduled

The American Boer Goat Association has scheduled 5 schools which will be under the instruction of P.B. Botha and Lucas Burger who are respected Boer breeders and judges in the Republic of South Africa. Students will receive hands on training in the evaluation of bucks and does of various ages as well as classroom instruction. The schools are open to anyone who is interested in learning about the Boer Goat. Successfully completing level One and Level Two are required to become an ABGA Approved Boer Goat Judge or Inspector.

Four of the schools will be Level One which covers basic fundamentals including history of the breed and breed standards. Pen work will instruct participants in the visual evaluation of animals as individuals as well as how to rank a group from the best to the least desirable. This course is limited to 40 students per class.

At the conclusion of the two day course, a test will be adminis-

tered for those who wish to be considered for certification as a judge or inspector and those who want to continue their education by enrolling in a Level Two course. The test is not mandatory if you are taking the course for your own personal growth or information.

Locations and dates for Level One schools are as follows: June 12-13, Goldthwaite, TX; June 18-19, Umatilla, OR; June 27-28. Fayetteville, NC; July 7-8, Ozona, TX. Fees for Level One are \$100 for ABGA members and non members

Upon successful completion of Level One, students are invited to participate in the Level Two course which has been set for July 10-12 in San Angelo, TX. This three day course has more in-depth instruction and more opportunity for individual contact with the instructors as enrollment is limited to 25 students. 

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
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
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NONCITIZENS RECEIV- Cub Scout "Mom and Me" **ING SSI HAVE 90 DAYS TO** PROVE ELIGIBILITY

Noncitizens will have up to 90 days from the date they receive a notice to submit proof of U.S. citizenship or eligible alien status to continue receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. Social Security recently notified more than 895,000 individuals whose records do not show that they meet the new SSI immigrant citizenship or eligible alien status requirements established by recent welfare reform legislation. To get SSI, individuals must be either a U.S. citizen or national or a legal alien in certain categories.

If you receive a notice and are a U.S. citizen, you need to let us know. You will need to bring us evidence of citizenship, such as certificate of naturalization or your U.S. passport.

If you meet one of the eligible alien categories, you should bring us an unexpired Immigration and Naturalization Service document listed in the notice. You will need to bring us the original document to establish your eligibility. Social Security does not accept photocopies of documents.

People who submit proof of eligibility on time will receive a notice informing them of the eligibility category they meet, and the proof we used to make our decision. If you do not contact Social Security or submit proof of your eligibility, you will receive a second notice informing you that we plan to stop your SSI payments in August or September. The notices will explain your appeal rights and what you should do if you become a citizen or your alien status changes and you think you are eligible for SSI.

If you have any questions about the notice, you should contact your local Social Security office right away.

EMS and TDH remind Texans that "Nothing is Soft at 200 mph-Practice Air Bag Safety"

Sutton Co. EMS and the Texas Department of Health remind you and your family that the air bag in your car that saves your life could seriously injure or kill a child.

According to Patrick Campbell, EMS Administrator, "Air bags have saved an estimated 1,700 lives and have reduced fatalities by 30 percent in head-on crashes. But an inflating air bag can also severely injure or kill an unrestrained or improperly restrained child."

To ensure that all children an adults ride safely, you should follow these guidelines:

* Correctly restrained in the back seat is the safest place for children of any age to ride.

* Never put an infant (up to 20 pounds and less than one year old) in the front seat of a vehicle with a passenger-side air bag.

* Infants must always ride properly restrained in the back seat facing the rear of the vehicle.

* Make sure children are properly restrained and in the back

seat. Children in the seat are particularly at risk for being hurt or killed by an air bag.

* Everyone should wear both the lap belt and shoulder belt in the vehicle.

* Move the vehicle's front seats as far way from the air bag as you can without hampering control of the vehicle.

"Air bags and seat belts should be used together to protect you and your family if you are ever involved in a crash. Children in car safety seats should never be placed in front seat of a car with passengerside air bags and children under age of 12 should always ride in the back seat," Patrick Campbell said. "Motor vehicle safety plays an important part in our efforts to educate the community about injury prevention. We want people in Sutton County to remember that practicing air bag safety could save not only the adults' lives, but also children's lives."

Basic Trauma Life Support Course

A Basic Trauma Life Support Course was held at the Sutton County EMS Training Facility on the weekend of April 19 and 20, 1997. The course was an intense, two days of lectures and skill stations and was held from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on both days.

The classes were attended by 23EMS personnel from Sonora, Eldorado, Iraan, and Odessa, one fireman, and three nurses. From Sonora, the class was attended by 13 Sutton Co. EMS members, one Sonora Fireman, and two nurses from Hudspeth Hospital.

The instructors were from the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, Department of Emergency Medicine of El Paso. The Texas Department of Health awarded Texas Tech a grant to provide rural and frontier areas with EMS courses to certify personnel, for continuing education and train- Richter

ing, and to enable EMS personnel to upgrade and advance their personal certification.

A major focus of the BTLS Course is the identification of severe trauma conditions that require immediate care and transport. In order to be certified, the students must be taught by instructors in the International Basic Trauma Life Support Organization. The certification requires a successful completion of a written and skills evalua-

Mexican-American Foods Can Fit

From a nutritional standpoint, a traditional Mexican-American diet offers many advantages, but some ingredients cause people to become overweight, making them more susceptible to diabetes, says a registered dietitian. not things parried

"The Mexican-American diet reflects Spanish and Indian influences--mainly vegetarian, based primarily on maize, beans, and squash," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, a nutrition specialist and professor with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "It is high in complex carbohydrates and emphasizes the consumption of fruits and vegetables rich in vitamins A and C, which is just what the USDA dietary guidelines recom-

The two drawbacks of the

Mexican-American diet are the liberal use of added fat, particularly lard, and a preference for high-fat meats. A contributing factor is stovetop cooking, such as stewing or frying with liberal amounts of oil and lard, instead of baking or broiling. Most foods, including meat, beans, tortillas, rice and potatoes, are fried.

"When a person's diet consists of mainly fried foods, added fat and other high-fat products, this could lead to obesity," said Bielamowicz, a member of the cultural diversity committee of the American Diabetes Association-Texas Affiliate. "As a result, this individual could end up with hypertension, heart disease, diabetes mellitus or a combination of these illnesses." According to the American Diabetes Association, more than one million of the estimated 22 million Hispanics in the United States have diabetes-- one in every 10 Hispanic adults. Also, population studies among Hispanic women with diabetes show significantly higher death and complication rates during pregnancy.

Only a few steps need to be taken to cut down on fat, sodium and sugar in the diet, Bielamowicz said. Meals and recipes can be modified by following these steps:

* Increase carbohydrate intake up to 55 percent to 60 percent. Eat more servings of breads, cereal, pasta, fruits, and vegetables. Continue to serve sopa de arroz (Spanish rice), sopa de fideo (a similar noodle dish), potatoes, tortillas, or beans with each meal.

*Use corn tortillas instead of flour tortillas. Make tortillas from ingredients using whole wheat flour and margarine made with unsaturated fat such as canola, corn, soybean, and safflower oils. Include beans daily to maintain high levels of soluble dietary fiber consumption. Increase intake of fresh fruits and vegetables.

* Incorporate sweets such as pan dulcet into a mixed meal that includes protein and fat only if diabetes is controlled and body weight is reasonable. Account for calories in the total meal plan. Use no added sugar in drinks such as licuados and agues frescas.

* Eat the appropriate amount of protein. daily protein intake for the average man would be equivalent to that in 8 ounces of red meat or two cups of beans. For woman, the

* Reduce oil used in preparing sopas. Prepare frijoles cocidos (boiled beans) instead of frijoles refritos (refried beans). Prepare meats asadas (grilled) instead of fried. Chill and skim fat off broths and stocks when preparing caldos. Use skim, one percent or low fat mild instead of whole milk or cream. Avoid high-fat cheese using partskim milk queso fresco instead. Bake corn tortilla chips to replace fried chips. Rather than frying tortillas, heat in foil in an oven, in a heavy pan for a short time on each side, or in a microwave oven.

* Restrict egg consumption to less than there a week. Eat Chorizo (sausage) and menudo only on special occasions. Instead, select some the new, light sausage available on the he market toady. Trim fat from fried Chorizo, and trim visible fat from meats. Avoid using lard in cooking. Use polyunsaturate doils or olive oil instead.

*Replace sweetened carbonated soft drinks with water or diet sodas. Use artificial sweeteners in bever-

*Taste food first before using salt. Minimize consumption of salty snack foods such as chips, chicharrones (fried pork rinds) and dips. Instead of salt, use lemon in drinks or on fruits such as melon. Add flavor to foods using onion, garlic, cumin, oregano, cilantro and other spices.

Nearly any recipe can be modified for a more healthful meal, Bielamowicz said. For example, instead of having refried beans with Mexican sausage, eat boiled d beans with chili sauce made with lean meat.
