

### **Bianca Rose' Sentena**







1929? In The Devil's River News of May 24, 1929 we found that at a regular meeting of the Eastern Star on Tuesday night, May 21, new officers for the coming year were elected as follows:






### Walker picked for San Angelo Center San Angelo -- Dr. John W. Walker has been appointed resident director of the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center here
