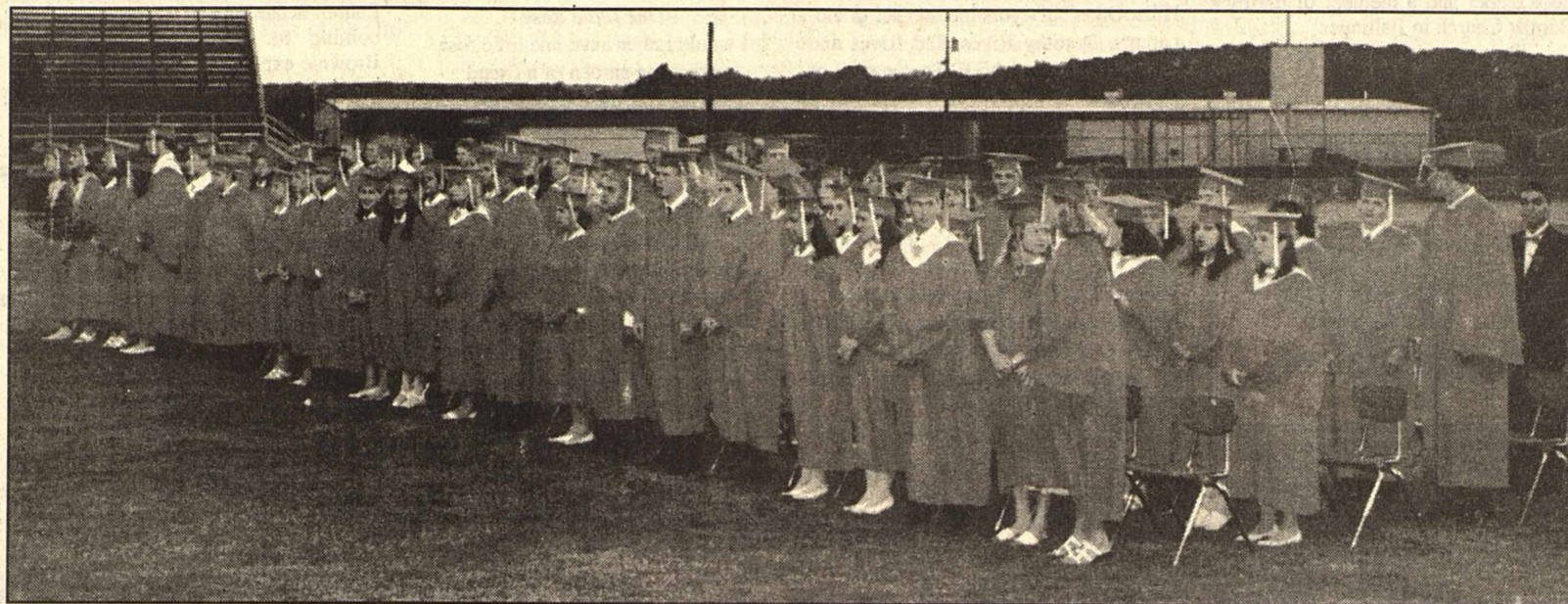
### 4-H Horse Project

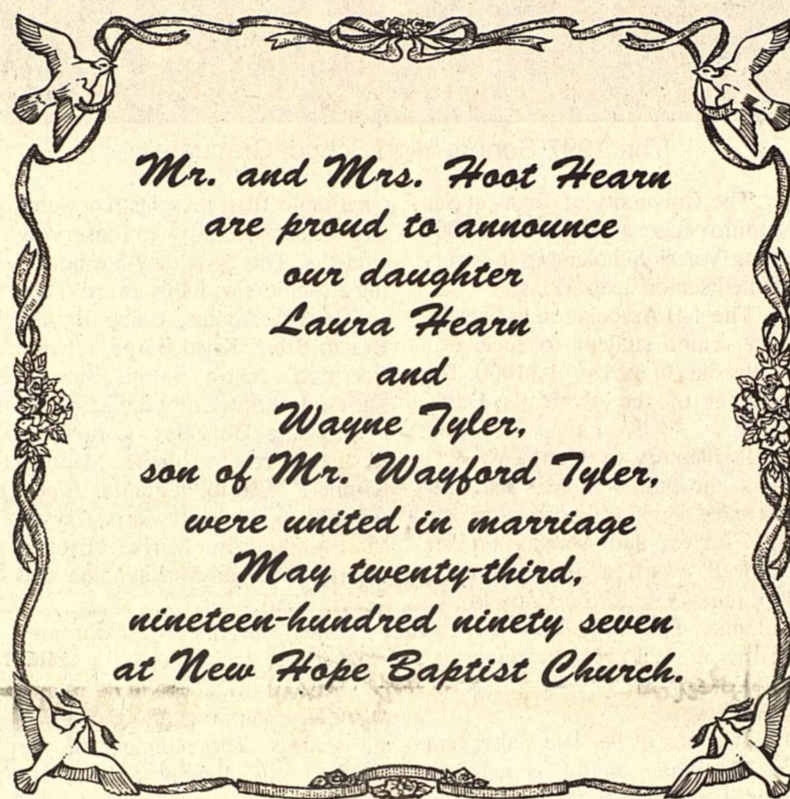

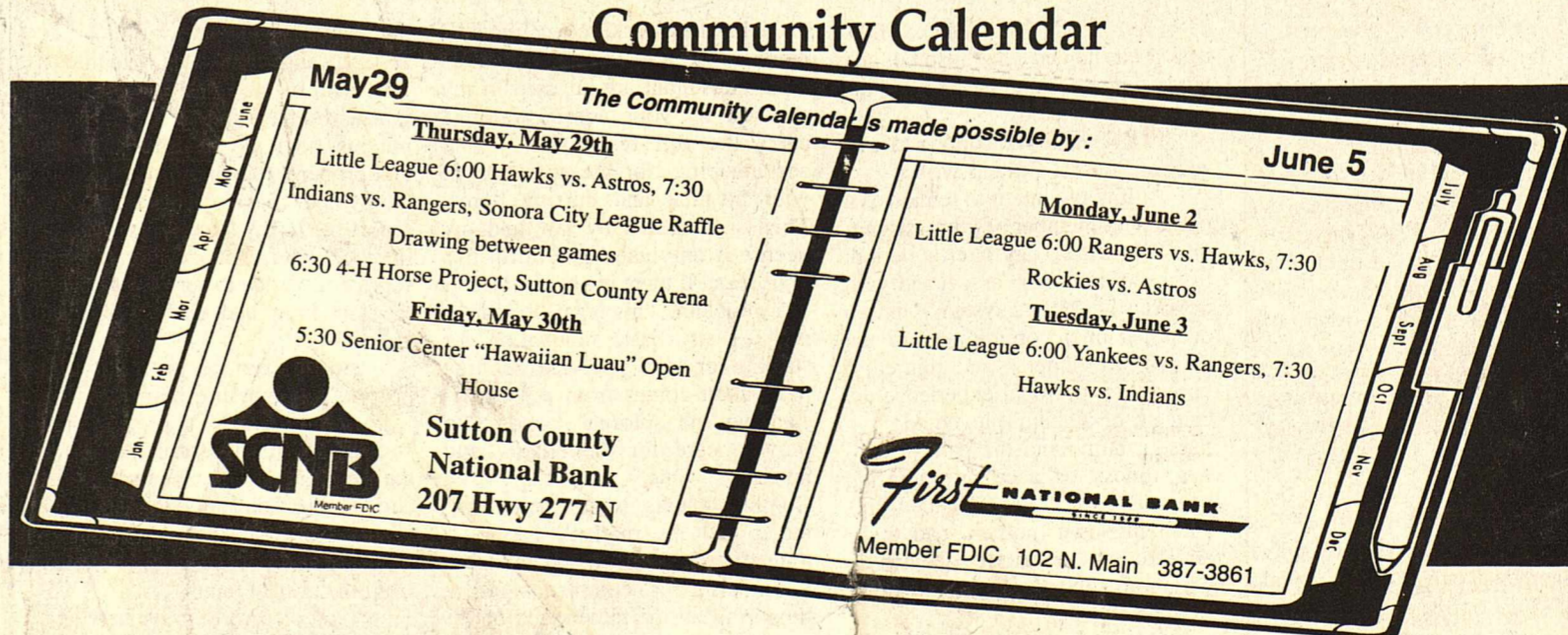

Who was elected to office in the OES in 1929?

In The Devil's River News of May 24, 1929 we found that at a regular meeting of the Eastern Star on Tuesday night, May 21, new officers for the coming year were elected as follows:

Lucille Hutcherson, W.M.; Joe F. Logan, W.P., Laura Odum, Associate Matron; Mayme Awalt, Assistant Conductress; Edith Babcock, Secretary; Bertha Eaton, Treasurer; Juliet Driskell, Ada; Bonnie Glasscock, Ruth; Stella Keene, Esther; Della Logan, Martha; Guila Lowrey, Electa; Jean Westbrook, Warden; Ellen Lowrey, Chaplain; Dona Stites, Organist; Estelle McDonald, Marshall; John Lowrey, Sentinel.

Other news that week included: R.J. Metcalf, who was charged with transporting intoxicating liquor, arrested here almost two years ago when officers seized four hundred gallons of alcohol, was given one year in the penitentiary

here last week in district court. The case of Maurice Mata, charged with theft of goats, was dismissed on account of death of the defendant. Eli Hill, charged with assault with motor vehicle was given 30 days in jail and fined \$25.

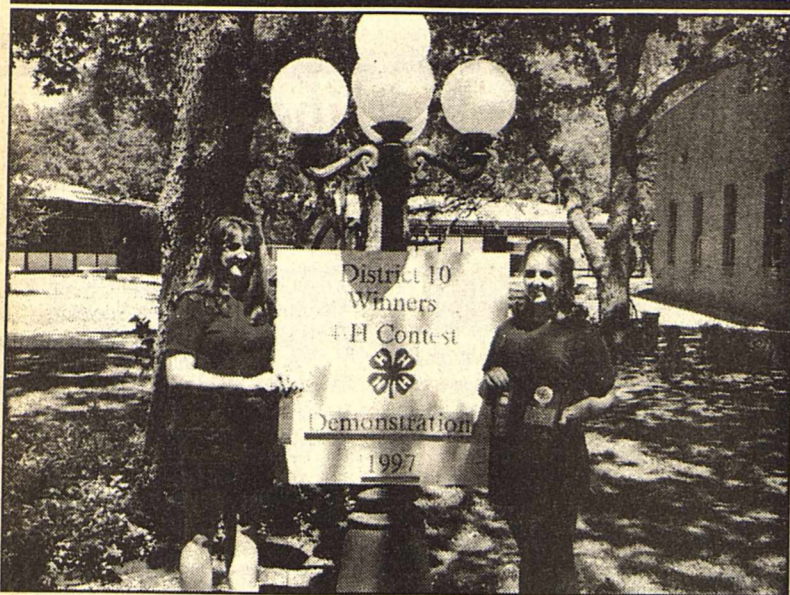

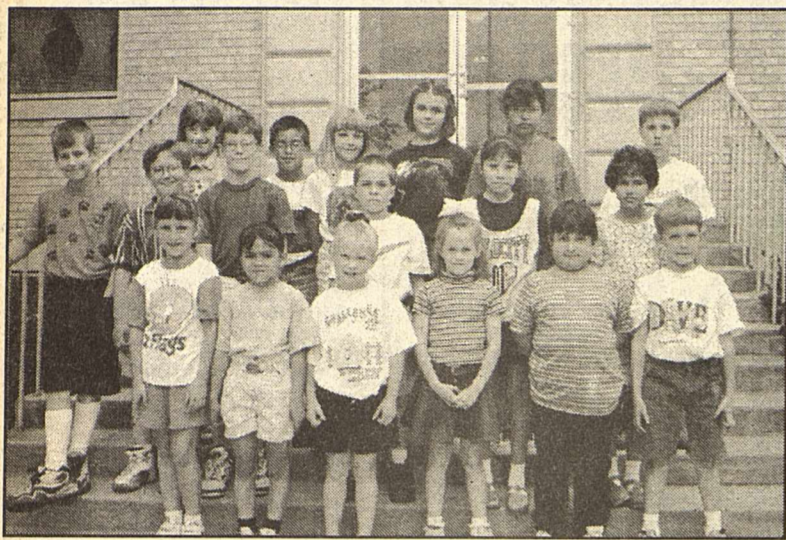

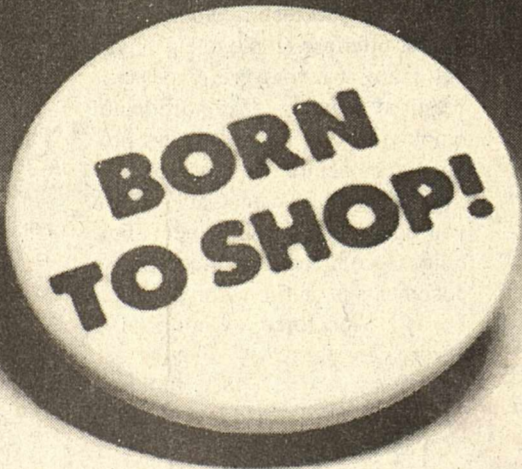
