

There is dissatisfaction with Bovina school system. Dissatisfaction will always exist, regardless of how the school is operated, but there are definitely ways that criticism can

Members of the school board and citizens have abandoned the roles each is supposed to play in running the school

First the board is supposed to represent the people of the school district, while conducting school business. They are to know what is going on at the school, why things are being done as they are and have a good idea of the general health and welfare of the entire school situation.

Citizens of the school district should also know what is going on and why. If some practice is adopted by the school which is contrary to their ideals, citizens should meet with the board, both privately and at regular meetings to present their case.

Both parties involved have failed to do an important thing that would ease tension in the present situation and would prevent other tension from building up so rapidly.

Citizens haven't taken the direct wholesome interest in the school that they should, until some controversy is begun. The school administration has not publicized its meetings well enough for citizens to make plans to be there.

It would be a good idea for the board to make known its meeting times and the agenda of business for the next meeting so that anyone who had an interest in the meeting could be there and participate.

A Healty Sign

It is a healthy sign to have such a large voting turnout for an election that contained no distinct issues or serious controversies. It is very easy to stay at home on election day, especially if voting is for a local issue. The large turnout should stimulate the new mayor and the



Diseases took an estimated \$147 million bite out of the 1959 Texas cotton crop, according to 15 cotton specialists located throughout the state. This loss occurred, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, even though 1959 growing conditions were generally good and near record yields were harvested in many areas. Major diseases were bacterial blight, root rot, verticillium wilt and seedling disease.
