

Texans Honor Fallen Heroes Memorial Day

On Memorial Day, Texans join who died in the Korean War. The Texas State Cemetery in

the Capitol grounds to honor Texans achieved the nation's highest office. In Tom Green County we can relive the past at historic Fort Concho, a

to the American military men and women who sacrificed their lives so that future generations might live in freedom. Since the Revolutionary War, 1.1 million Americans have ۲ died in more than 64 military encounters, most of them in far away places with long forgotten names.

We will not, however, forget the supreme sacrifice made by those brave men and women. More than 21,000 of them were Texans, and 3,172 of that number were from counties that are wholly or partially in Senate District 25.

Honoring the dead, especially those who fought and died for freedom, is an integral part of our culture. Texans are especially aware of the sacrifices that so many of their brothers and sisters made in the name of liberty.

In their honor, we have preserved battle sites, established parks, restored forts and cemeteries, and erected memorials. The 74th Legislature, for example, authorized the construction of a Memorial on

Austin where some of Texas' most notable sons and daughters are buried recently underwent a \$4.7 million restoration and renovation. Competed in 1997, the cemetery includes a museum that offers visitors a glimpse of our state's glorious history.

Texas' most famous memorial is in San Antonio where more than 2.5 million people annually visit the Alamo. There, in 1836, a small band of Texans held out for 13 days before giving their lives for liberty. The Alamo has stood as a symbol of courage for generations of Texans who fought for freedom, such as Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz.

Exhibits in the Admiral Nimitz Museum and Historical Center in Fredericksburg tell the story of the town's native son, tracing his life from childhood through his military career, including his distinguished service in the Pacific in World War

Also in Gillespie County, the Lyndon B. Johnson State Historical Park honors a native Texan who

Many Memorial Day ceremonies will be held at military posts, bases and cemeteries throughout the 25th Senatorial District and all of Texas. Fr. Bill was born Dec. 25, 1929 in San Antonio to William Robert Du Buisson, Jr. and Louise Fox Du Buisson. He attended St. Anthony School in San Antonio from First Grade to Seventh Grade. When his father was transferred to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma to open Tinker Air Force Base as Assistant Superintendent, Fr. Bill attended John Carroll School for the Eighth Grade.

For High School and Junior College, Fr. Bill attended St. Anthony Seminary in San Antonio. In preparation for his religious life, he attended St. Peter's Novitiate in Mission, Texas for one year. At the end of the academic year, Fr. Bill pronounced his First Vows as an Oblate of Mary Immaculate on May 31, 1949.

That fall, Fr. Bill entered De Mazenod Scholasticate (now Oblate School of Theology) in San Antonio, Texas for his philosophical and theological studies. He pronounced his final vows on May 31, 1952. Besides his regular studies, during the summers he attended St. Mary's University and Notre Dame University for courses in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Education. On September 8, 1955, Fr. Bill was ordained a priest in St. Mary Church, San Antonio, Texas.

After finishing his studies, Fr. Bill returned to teach General Science, Biology and Chemistry at St. Anthony Seminary from 1956 to 1964. In 1963 he was appointed Treasurer of the Seminary. He volunteered to teach at Notre Dame Seminary in Cotabato City, Philippines from 1964 to 1968. There he taught English, Speech, U.S. History, Algebra and Geometry. He also taught a course in Religion at University of Notre Dame, Cotabato City. He was instrumental in helping Notre Dame Educational Association in revamping courses in the sciences and mathematics.



After three years, he was also given the responsibility of St. Ann, Sonora. In 1997, another pastor was assigned to Ozona so that Fr. Bill is only pastor in Sonora. He has been active in civic affairs by serving on several local committees.

In addition to his parochial duties, Fr. Bill serves on the College of Consultors, the Presbyteral Council and the Tribunal of the Diocese of San Angelo. He was presented with the Papal Medal " Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" in the spring of 1996 for his work for the Catholic Church. He is currently Adjutant Judical Vicar for the Diocese. Over the years as an Oblate, he has been District Superior several times.

Wear Your Skin Well **Year-Round**

Do you take your skin for granted? Do you participate in outdoor activities without protecting your skin? Do you strive to achieve a golden tan? If you don't practice sun-smart habits, you may be one of an estimated one million people to develop skin cancer this year, according to the American Cancer Society.

The American Cancer Society recommends avoiding midday sun between 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. when the sun is at its strongest. When outside, protect your skin by wearing protective clothing, including a hat and using a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a skin protective factor (SPF) of 15 or higher that will block both UVA and UVB type rays," says Dr. Ramsdell, MD, spokesperson for the American Cancer Society.

Those most at risk for skin cancer are people with light skin, fair hair, light color eyes and those who burn easily. However, darker-skinned people can also develop skin cancer, including malignant melanoma.


The most common warning sign of cancer is a change in a • pre-existing mole or the appearance of a new mole or growth. Non-melanoma skin cancer may appear as pearly, flesh-colored bumps or scaly bumps that may bleed. Melanomas look like moles with irregular coloration

(various shades of black, brown, white, or blue) and ragged uneven borders. They may be flat or elevated. If any of these conditions exist you should visit a dermatologist.

"Early detection is the key to surviving skin cancer, especially malignant melanoma which can spread quickly if left undetected. When found early and with proper treatment, localized malignant melanoma is highly curable- up to a 96% survival rate," Dr. Ramsdell says. "If the cancer spreads to distant parts of the body, survival rates can drop to 12%.'

Storm Season

Lightning is the second most common cause of weather-related deaths in Texas, following only flooding. Many people are not aware of this, since it tends to strike only one or two victims at a time, and doesn't always make front-page headlines. Still, numbers add up and everyone's level of concern needs to remain high, especially as we move into spring and summer.

There are several types of lightning discharges. Most discharges occur inside the storm-from the storm into the air, or from beneath the storm into the ground. But, stronger, brighter and more powerful bolts can also strike from the side or the turret of the storm, reaching the ground several miles away from the storm itself. These cloud-toair and within-cloud strokes can be seen from 20 to 30 miles away or more. At this point, watch closely to see if the storms are approaching. If you can hear thunder, or can see a stroke to the ground, you are within 10 to 15 miles, and in a high danger zone. You must have a safer location in mind and be ready to move to it quickly. If you are with a group, alert them to this threat and make sure everyone knows how to get to safety without delay.

You can estimate the distance to lightning by watching for the flash and counting the number of seconds until thunder is heard. For every five seconds you count, the lightning is one mile away. Scientists estimate that lightning can travel at these safety rules until the thunaround one mile per minute. You derstorm has dissipated or need to allow plenty of time to moved well away. get to safety. If you are with a large group that reacts slowly, the safety time required may be 10 to 15 minutes. If you are close to shelter and can move quickly, you may need only five


minutes. But this is only an estimate. If the lightning is extremely intense, bright and frequent, you should begin to move earlier.

Lightning primarily tends to strike tall objects as well as metal objects, and can travel through moist soils for dozens of feet. To select the best shelter, move into a sturdy building and stay away from windows and doors. For increased protection, avoid electric appliances or metal plumbing. Stay off the telephone.

If you are outside, the interior of a car, truck or bus is relatively safe from lightning. To be safer, do not touch metal on the inside of the vehicle. The outside bed of a truck is a deadly and dangerous location. Other vehicles are safer since their outside shells spread out the lightning charge, weakening it and leaking it to the ground. It is not because thin rubber tires are grounding them.

If you are outdoors with no shelter available as lightning approaches, stay low. Move away from hills and high places, and avoid tall, isolated trees. Do not touch metal objects, such as tennis, rackets, baseball bats, and golf clubs. Do not ride bicycles, or lean against fences or metal shed. Do not lean on a car or truck- get inside quickly. If you feel your hair suddenly on end, it means you may be a lightning target. Crouch low on the balls of your feet and try not to touch the ground with your knees or hands. Avoid wet areas that can conduct the lightning charge.



Young people in summer jobs in which tips are involved should be aware that tips may require special reporting for Social Security credit, according to Fredi Franki, Social Security manager in San Angelo, Texas.

"If you work at a job where you make \$20 or more per month in cash tips, that income is covered by Social Security," Franki said. "That means you and your employer are required to pay Social Security and Medicare taxes on this income. And, reporting tips and other income will mean more Social Security benefits for you and your family later when you retire, or if you become disabled or die."

Franki said when you earn tips, you must keep a daily record of the tips you receive. This includes tips received in cash directly from customers or from other employees and tips added to a credit card charge. If your tip income totals \$20 or more in a month, you are required to report the amount to your employer. Your employer is responsible for reporting the correct tip and wage nformation to the Social Security Administration and the Internal Revenue Service.


To make sure you receive credt for all your earnings, you should request a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement from Social Security at least every three years. When you get your statement, check it to be sure it's right. If you find an error, call the special toll-free number listed on the form to get your record corrected.

To get a statement request form, all you have to do is contact the nearest Social Security office or call our toll-free number: 1-300-772-1213. Ask for the Request For Personal Earnings And Benefit Estimate Statement (Form 7004). Or you can download an application from Social Security's Internet website at www.ssa.gov.

Field Lab held at TAMU **Experiment Station**

Association - Curry Campbell, Be on The Lookout For **Kleingrass Problems in Sheep** and Goat Pastures

Ah, with the good comes the bad. Recent rains across much of Texas have been a godsend to farmers and ranchers. But according to a range researcher here, those same rains could trigger problems for sheep and goats grazing kleingrass pastures. Dr. Darrell Ueckert, with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at San Angelo, warned producers that now is a critical time to be on the lookout for problems in sheep and goats grazing the grass. "Kleingrass (Panicum coloratum) can be very toxic to sheep and goats, especially after spring rains that stimulate a flush of new growth like we're seeing now," said Ueckert. "Summer rains can also stimulate growth of new leaves that can be very toxic. We haven't had much problem in the past several years due to dry weather, but this year is shaping up to be a bad one.' Ueckert said the toxic substance

in kleingrass acts to reduces the animal's ability to eliminate a compound of chlorophyll (the green pigment in growing plants) from the blood. This compound accumulates in the skin, making it very sensitive to sunlight. Animals essentially get a severe sunburn and the skin on their ears and faces sloughs off.

The sunburn symptom is accompanied by severe swelling of the ears and heads. This swelling gives the malady its common name of "swellhead"

"Animals with swellhead usually die," warned Ueckert. "Early recognition of the symptoms helps. Affected animals should be moved to deep shade or a dark barn for a contact Ueckert at (915) 653-4576.

week or two. These animals should only be given feeds with little or no chlorophyll such as concentrate feed with dry hay. The safest manage-

ment practice is to never graze sheep or goats on kleingrass pasture." Kleingrass is an imported grass from South Africa. It quickly gained

widespread favor across much of West Central Texas in the 1970s and '80s due to its drought tolerance and high forage production rates. Extremely cold weather in the winter of 1983 decimated thousands of acres across the state. Since then, the grass has not been as popular, but a vast amount of acreage still remains. "Old timers in the sheep and

goat business are well aware of the swellhead problem," said Ueckert. "They leave the kleingrass to the cows in wet years. Unfortunately, there are a lot of new meat goat producers who have never seen or even heard of the malady, but they sure may this year.

"Kleingrass toxicity is closely related to soil moisture. Moist soils and good growing conditions increase the toxicity, while dry soils and poor growing conditions lessen the toxicity. Older leaves in the tops of kleingrass plants have only a low concentration of the toxin, but sheep and goats will look for the young, tender new leaves at the plant's base.

Ueckert noted that kleingrass hay is also definitely toxic to horses. Cattle appear to have no problem with kleingrass hay or the growing plants. He said other plants that can cause swellhead in sheep and goats include sacahuista, lecheguilla and kochia. For further information,

Don't Throw Brush Control Dollars Out Window By Spraying Too Soon

Whoa! Not so fast. Sure, it's starting to rain and temperatures are bumping 90, but range experts say it's still too early to leaf spray mesquite and control prickly pear.

"It's not time to effectively spray either of these pests," said Dr. Darrell Ueckert, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station range researcher.

Ueckert and Dr. Allan McGinty, local Extension range specialist, are the fathers of the popular Brush Busters techniques that tout individual plant control using the most effective, safest and most economical methods available. In Texas last year, Brush Busters was the method of choice for mesquite control on over 600,000 acres of rangeland and pastures. "I've been getting a lot of calls from ranchers just itching to start their brush control projects now," said Ueckert. "It's obvious that some have forgotten the all important 'window of opportunity' that can make or break a brush control project."

For leaf-spraying mesquite, whether by hand or plane, he said, that window starts once all the mesquite leaves turn a dark green, and the soil temperature is at least 75 degrees at a foot to 18 inches deep.

"Any time before that and you're wasting money -- if you're or McGinty at (915) 653-4576.

Ueckert said now is also the

worst time to control pricklypear with herbicides, because the plants are moving carbohydrates upward to produce new pads and flowers. Herbicides applied too early won't be carried down to the crowns and roots, a necessary step for good cactus control.

"The best time to aerially spray pricklypear is in the late summer through fall after the new pads are mature and the fruits turn dark red," said Ueckert. Hand spraying pricklypear with Brush Busters methods can be done year round, but it's most effective with late summer to early fall treatments.

"It is a great time to treat cedar (juniper) using the Brush Busters cedar leaf spray or cedar soil spot spray methods," said Ueckert. "These treatments can be used yearround, but they are most effective if some rainfall is received within two or three weeks after treatment. May and June are normally our two best rainfall months in this area.

"If you're after mesquite or pricklypear," he said, "better wait until the time is right or you may well be throwing good money out the window, and I'm sure it won't be the window of opportunity either."

ecause of the possible link between severe sunburns in childhood and greatly increased risk of melanoma in later life, children, in particular, should be protected from the strong Texas sun. The American Cancer Society predicts 2,900 new cases of melanoma in Texas for 1999. third behind Florida and California.

What you can do to protect your children and yourself:

O Use a sunscreen with an SPF (solar protection factor) of 15 or higher.

- Limit or avoid exposure to the sun's strongest ultraviolet rays O during 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.
- When outdoors, cover as much skin as possible with a hat that shades the face, neck, and ears, and a long-sleeved shirt and long pants.
