Lightning is the second most common cause of weather-relat-
ed deaths in Texas, following ed deaths in Texas, following
only flooding. Many people are only flooding. Many peopie are to strike only one or two victims at a time, and doesn't always make front-page headlines. Still, numbers add up and everyone's high, especially as we move into spring and summer.
There are several types of
lightning discharges. Most dislightning discharges. Most dis-
charges occur inside the storm-charges occur inside the storm-
from the storm into the air, or from beneath the storm into the ground. But, stronger, brighter and more powerful bolts can also strike from the side or the round several miles away from the storm itself. These cloud-toair and within-cloud strokes can be seen from 20 to 30 miles away or more. At this point,
watch closely to see if the storms are approaching. If you can hear thunder, or can see a stroke to he ground, you are within 10 to 5 miles, and in a high danger zone. You must have a safer
location in mind and be ready to move to it quickly. If you are with a group, alert them to this hreat and make sure everyone knows delay.
You can estimate the dis for the flash and counting the number of seconds until thunder sheard. For every five seconds you count, the lightning is one
mile away. Scientists estimate that lightning can travel at around one mile per minute. You need to allow plenty of time to get to safety. If you are with a
large group that reacts slowly, thie safety time required may be 10 to 15 minutes. If you are
close to shelter and can move

report the amount to your employer Your employer is responsible for reporting the correct tip and wage information to the Social Security Administration and the Internal Revenue Service.

it for all your earnings you should request a Personal Earnings and
Benefit Estimate Statement from Social Security at least every three years. When you get your state-
ment, check it to be sure it's right. If you find an error, call the special you find an error, call the special
toll-free number listed on the form to get your record corrected. To get a statement request
form, all you have to do is contact the nearest Social Security office or call our tol-free number: $1-200-$
$772-1213$. Ask for the Request For Personal Earnings And Benefit Estimate Statement (Form 7004).

Don't Throw Brush Control Dollars Out Window By Spraying Too Soon

Who Whoa! Not so fast. Sure, it's starting to rain and temperatures are bump-
ing 90 , but range experts say it's still too early to leaf spray mesquite and control prickly pear.
"It's not time to effectively
spray either of these pests," said Dr.

Ueckert and Dr. Allan McGinty,

year, Brush Busters was the method of choice for mesquite control on over 600,000 acres of rangeland and pastures. "I've been getting a lot of
calls from ranchers just itching to calls from ranchers just itching to
start their brush control projects start their brush control projects
now," said Ueckert. "It's obvious that some have forgotten the all
important 'window of opportunity' important 'window of opportunity'
that can make or break a brush control project."

cows in wet years. Unfortunately, there are a lot of new meat goat producers who have never seen or even heard of the malady, but they sure may this year.
"Kleingrass toxicity is closely related to soil moisture. Moist soils
and good growing and good growing conditions
increase the toxicity, while dry soils and poor growing conditions lessen the toxicity. Older leaves in the tops
of kleingrass plants have only a of kleingrass plants have only a low
concentration of the toxin, but sheep and goats will look for the young, tender new leaves at the plant's base."
Ueckert noted that kleingrass
hay is also definitely toxic hay is also definitely toxic to horses.

with kleingrass hay or the growing plants. He said other plants that can cause swellhead in sheep and goats
