





# Hospital Board Adopts Travel Expense Policy

The regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District Board of Directors was held on Monday, May 10, 1999. The following Directors were present: Alvis Johnson, Jr.-President, Sherrill Dannheim, Virginia Epps, Claire Richards, Lewis Allen and Paul Chevalier. Also present were Joe Hendrus- Administrator, Kathy Knight- Board Secretary, Carolyn Lara, Beverlee Williams, Vickie Cook, Ram Perez and Apryl McDonald and Richey Oliver of Oliver, Rainey and Wojtek, CPA firm for the Hospital District.

Dr. Johnson called the meeting to order. Motion was made by Paul Chevalier, seconded by Lewis Allen, to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of April 12, 1999 as written. Motion carried.

Rex Ann Friess, Chief Appraiser for the Sutton County Appraisal District was unable to attend the meeting and the Appraisal Board has not met recently.

Motion was made by Virginia Epps, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to re-elect Alvis Johnson, Jr., as President and Ray Smith as Vice-President by acclamation. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Lewis Allen, seconded by Virginia Epps, to reappoint Kathy Knight as Board Secretary and Carolyn Lara as Alternate Board Secretary. Motion carried.

Discussion was held regarding the policy for continuing education, travel and use of the Mastercard. It is the consensus of the Board that the Hospital District will pay for only the minimum continuing education required for the Hospital to stay in compliance and for the staff to keep their licenses. Motion was made by Lewis Allen, seconded by Claire Richards, to develop a travel policy, which would pay mileage at 31¢, allow \$25.00 per day for meals and \$80.00 per night for hotel rooms. If a motel room could not be obtained for \$80.00 pre-approval for a higher rate would have to be obtained from either President or Vice-President of the Board. Motion carried with Paul Chevalier voting "no". Employees will also be asked to ask for the "government" rate when making room reservations. Discussion was held regarding continuing education and the Board asked for written statements from Department Heads on required meetings for the rest of 1999, to be presented at the June Board meeting. Motion was made by Paul Chevalier, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to table any action on continuing education until June. Discussion was held regarding the Hospital's Mastercard. Motion was

made by Claire Richards, seconded by Virginia Epps, to limit usage of the Mastercard for necessary Hospital expenses only, with receipts for purchases to be turned in and the card will not be used for any personal expenses. Motion carried. Motion was made by Paul Chevalier, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to include a copy of the Mastercard statement in the Board members' packets each month, along with the break-down that is currently being done. Motion car-

Apryl McDonald, representing Oliver, Rainey and Wojtek, CPA firm for the Hospital District, presented graphs showing a comparison of the accounts receivable for 1997 and 1998. Ms. McDonald recommended that monitoring of the accounts receivable should be done regularly by upper management. Discussion was held regarding write-offs which should be done immediately and how to recognize "charity" patients when they present to the Hospital for services. The procedure for collecting from patients who have no insurance was also discussed. Kathy Knight stated that due to the hard work of Vickie Cooke and Pete Samaniego, working together on insurance, the accounts receivable has been reduced quite a bit since December 31, 1998. Monthly report of aging of accounts receivable will be given to the Board members from now on.

Bad debt write-off list in the amount of \$14,303,35 was presented. Motion was made by Claire Richards seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to approve the bad debt write-off list. Motion carried.

The Hospital Quality Assurance Plan was presented for annual review and approval. Motion was made by Lewis Allen, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to approve the Quality Assurance Plan. Motion car-

Mr. Hendrus reported that after the budget of 1999 was approved, Medicare made changes at the beginning of 1999 in the way lab tests were "bundled" and changes in reimbursement, which will result in considerably less revenue for the laboratory department. Also, the Hospital has decided not to pursue Home Health due to a reduction in reimbursement from Medicare. Mr. Hendrus is recommending that the budget be adjusted to reflect these changes. Deleting Home Health from both revenue and expenses would zero out that cost center on the budget. No action was taken on changing the laboratory revenue figures. Motion was made by Paul Chevalier, seconded by Sherrill




Leslie Ann Carrasco received her Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from the University of Texas School of Law May 23, 1999.



Dannheim, to zero out the Home Health figures in the budget. Motion carried.

Vickie Cooke gave the status report on the Accounts Receivable. For the month of April, \$113,590.39 was collected on the A/R. Bad debts totaled \$24,979.85, part of which will be written off to charity, indigent care and uncollectable trauma. The balance will be turned over to the collection agency. In the month of May, \$46,657.65 has already been collected on the A/R. A/R on May 1, 1999 was \$470,789.23. Again, the Board requested a monthly aging report for accounts receivable.

Monthly Nursing Home report was given by Beverlee Williams. There were four incidents that required a report to the TDHS. The current census is 29 residents. Mrs. Williams reported that the state surveyors are expected to visit the nursing home at any time for the annual survey

Mr. Hendrus gave an update on legislative issues. One bill that was a concern to the Hospital District was related to the Indigent Health Program, which could have impacted the Hospital District financially. The bill has been amended, related to "mandated services" to be delivered by a Hospital District, and changed to "recommended services." Lewis Allen also gave an update on RCHS. Mr. Hendrus presented information on an article from the Dallas Morning News, related to Medicaid payments to nursing homes.

Mr. Hendrus gave an update on grants that are currently in process. Mr. Hendrus presented suggested goals for the remainder of 1999 for the Board and Management.

Dr. Johnson reported that Mr. Hendrus has submitted his resignation, effective June 2, 1999. Mr. Hendrus reported that he is resigning due to family concerns and feels that he must move nearer to his parents. Motion was made by Lewis Allen, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, to accept Mr. Hendrus' resignation. Motion carried. Discussion was held regarding methods of obtaining names of candidates potential Administrator. A list of questions for candidates for the position will be compiled and when a list of possible applicants is compiled, a special 'called' Board meeting will be held, probably in the next couple of

Mr. Hendrus gave the financial report for March 1999. The nursing home showed a loss of \$14,214.00. Year-to-date loss is \$73,000, which is below the budgeted loss. The hospital showed a loss of \$58,000, compared to the budgeted loss of \$38,000. Other revenue was \$25,000, compared to a budgeted figure of \$18,000, for a net loss of \$32,000, which was higher than the budgeted net loss of \$19,000. Yearto-date, loss is \$475,000, compared to budgeted figure of \$399,746.15, not including interest for May, in CD's. There is a CD maturing tomorrow and it is not needed at this time and will be rolled over to mature again in October.

Upon motion by Claire Richards, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, the Board approved the April, 1999 expenditures.

# Agriculture Survey

What lasting effects will the drought of 1998 have on Texas Agriculture? Will Texas cattle ranchers be able to rebuild herds in 1999? How many acres will be planted to cotton? How will Texas' dry spring planting conditions affect 1999 production? To gather reliable, objective information on Texas and U.S. Agriculture the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will begin surveying farmers and ranchers for the June Agricultural Survey on May 26th.

There is always speculations about each new crop season, and farmers and ranchers are the best and most important source of the facts. "With farmers' and ranchers' help in answering the survey questions about the 1999 crop season, we can reduce uncertainty in the agricultural marketplace," says Robin Roark, Texas State Statistician.

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be conducting the survey for Texas, and those farmers and ranchers selected for the survey will be contacted between May 26 and June 16. This survey is particularly vital because it will provide the first clear indications of the potential production of major commodities in 1999.

The information gathered is widely used. Producers rely on the data to reach valid production, marketing, and investment decisions. Industry analysts, extension agents, and farm organizations use the information in a variety of ways that benefit farmers.

We safeguard the confidentiality of all survey responses," Robin Roark says. "Information from individual operations is combined with other responses to provide the needed data. We work with farmers and ranchers to provide meaningful, accurate, and objective statistics that help keep Texas and U.S. agriculture informed."

The 62nd Annual Wool and Mohair Show and the 39th Annual National 4-H Wool Judging Contest are set for June 15-17. Activities for both events will center on the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company Warehouse and the Sutton County 4-H Civic Center.

Range Judging participants will leave from the Sutton County 4-H Civic Center

### **Turner Adds Ag Processors - Tax**

In last minute legislative maneuver, State Representative Bob Turner, D-Voss, added an amendment to a bill providing sales tax cuts for Internet access to give a two-year tax exemption to agriculture processors. Turner's amendment allows agricultural processors to quality for the two year exemption by either locating or expanding a processing facility in a rural county or a county with above average unemployment and below average income. The processor must also make a minimum capital investment of \$250,000 on an expansion and \$750,000 in building a new facility to qualify for the exemption.

Turner said the minimum capital investment criteria were added to ensure the agricultural processor made a significant investment in creating new jobs to justify the sales tax exemption.

"One of my main goals this sesdevelopment," said Rep. Turner, "My amendment provides rural communities with a carrot to offer agricultural processors to create jobs in our small towns." Earlier this session, Rep. Turner had filed legislation, H.B. 2737, to give processors both sales tax exemptions and franchise tax credits. He chose to allow

this bill to remain in the House tax committee because the major franchise tax credit bill for this legislative session, S.B. 5 by Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, already included franchise tax credits for Ag processors. However, on the last night for the House to vote on Senate bills, S.B. 5 was killed on a violation of legislative procedure called a "point of order.'

'When S.B. 5 died, I knew our tax credits for Ag processors did as well," Turner continued, "My staff and I quickly decided on a plan to amend S.B. 441 and resurrect some tax incentive for investing in rural areas." The resulting amendments was unanimously adopted by the

Rep. Turner says Comptroller Rylander, R- Austin, estimates the Turner amendment will provide a minimum of over \$45 million in tax cuts over the next five years.

S.B. 441 in now back in the sion was to help rural economic Texas Senate waiting for approval on the House amendments. It is expected that the bill will go to a conference committee for some negotiations between members of the House and Senate. However, senators and representatives who will likely be on the committee have expressed support for the Turner amendment.

furic acid from a car battery to the inside of your toolbox after determining that your battery is dead as a doornail, just as you thought. TROUBLE LIGHT: The mechanic's own tanning booth. Sometimes called a drop light, it is a good source of vitamin D, "the sunshine vitamin," which is not otherwise found under vehicles at night.
