Three Arrested After Five Day Man Hunt

A five day, two county man hunt came to an end on Sunday, with the arrest of three illegal alien fugitives. Carlos Gutierrez Alamillo, Ramiro Ramos-Hernandez, and Jose Alfredo Gutierrez, all of Mexico, evaded lawmen for the five days, traveling across ranches in Edwards and Sutton Counties. The suspects, who have been transferred from the Sutton County jail to Edwards County are facing several charges, including Attempted Capital Murder.

The incident started late Tuesday, March 13, when the vehicle the men were traveling in refused to stop for Edwards County Sheriff Don Letsinger in Rocksprings. The truck traveled three miles down Texas Highway 55 before coming to a stop. Six illegal aliens, including 4 women, a 13-year-old boy and an old man, were captured in the vehicle, but the three men managed to get away.

Following their escape, the three are reported to have stolen a Chevrolet Blazer in Rocksprings, but ran out of gas before getting too far. It appears that the men stayed the night in the "Camp 55" Hunting Camp located on the Canyon Ranch. Clothes found at the scene led the police to believe that one of the suspects could possibly have been a woman. This was later proven incorrect.

It was on Wednesday that Burlington Resources employee and Sonora resident, Emilio Pacheco was accosted by the trio and consequently shot in the arm by a stolen hunting bow. Pacheco was working at a lease sight located near camp 35 when he heard something behind him. The men, armed with the hunting bow, instructed Pacheco to lie down. A confrontation then took place and as Pacheco ran toward the pickup to escape he

Pacheco fled the scene and notified Sutton County that he was coming to town in need of medical assistance. In order to drive, Pacheco had to remove the shaft of the arrow by pulling it from his shoulder. The arrow tip remained imbedded in his bone.


Pacheco was treated at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital, and was later transferred to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo, where he underwent surgery to remove the

The trio surfaced again on Thursday when they were seen breaking into a Creek Swabbing and Roustabout Truck on Canyon Ranch. They headed north toward Sonora, traveling at a high rate of speed through fences and brush. A second Creek crew was notified by radio that the truck was headed their way. Backing a road maintainer across the roadway, the crew was able to stop the stolen vehicle. The three abandoned the vehicle and fled the scene by foot.

Law enforcement agencies from Crockett, Schleicher, Kimble, Edwards, Tom Green, and Pecos counties were called in to assist Sutton County in the hunt, as well as the Sonora Police Department. Helicopters from U.S. Customs in San Angelo, Del Rio Border Patrol, and Lubbock and Midland DPS assisted the search by air. Warden Brad Casal with the Texas Department of Corrections in Ft. Stockton came with mounted patrolmen and tracking dogs. Local citizens were also horseback assisting in the hunt.

Powers chased the three down and ordered them to the ground, where he kept them at gunpoint until the Sheriff's Department and Rangers arrived to make the arrests.

School Board Discusses Redistricting Plan

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District was held on Monday, March 19, 2001 in the board room at the Administration Building. President Tom Payton called the meeting to order and Mrs. Donna Hill gave an invocation.

County Tax Assessor, Rex Ann Friess, reported that 97% of the current tax levy had been collected, and that the 1999 bankruptcy claim had all been collected as well.

The cafeteria report was given by Mrs. Dora Gonzales. She reported that they had made one purchase of a new stove for the Middle School. The old one was purchased 21 years ago and had been pieced together long enough.

Technology Director Craig Hudson reported that room to room connectivity at the Intermediate School had been completed and that the wiring should be completed this

Approval of the past minutes and current bills was completed and Diane Jacoby reviewed the Quarterly Investment Report.

Mrs. Jacoby explained the Budget Amendment in the areas of donations and grants. A motion was made and seconded to approve this amendment.

Sara Ortiz gave the Curriculum Report concerning the library at the Elementary School. The library has purchased \$5,542 in new library books, and \$2,237 in AR tests to add to the current selection. These funds include federal, state and local budgets as well as a donation from the Sonora Schools PTA. The current circulation in the library is about 4,000 books per month.


Ortiz reported that the library made \$2,267 during last years book fair and made \$1,600 on the first of two book fairs this year. The next Book Fair is scheduled for April 2-6 at the Elementary Library.

Susan Nicholas reported that they are upgrading the AR book guide. There are currently 32,766 tests available for students and they are working toward obtaining the same numbers of books and tests.

Primary School Principal, Louise Dermody presented a list of the textbooks that the selection committees from each campus had chosen for approval. The board voted unanimously to accept the list of textbooks as presented.

Intermediate School Principal, Kelley Hirt reviewed the current summer school information. The session usually runs for 4 weeks, from 8:00 to 12 noon. Mrs. Hirt advised the board to consider a new policy for Sonora ISD that will require summer school attendance

Mingo Saldivar To Visit Sonora_

The town of Sonora is gearing up for a week-long visit from master conjunto accordionist Mingo Saldivar. Saldivar will educate and entertain the entire community of Sonora from March 26 to April 2 with his special style of traditional conjunto music. During his stay, Saldivar will lead a series of workshops, demonstrations and jam sessions and will perform at sites TBA throughout the community.

This residency celebrates Tex-Mex culture and one of the classic traditions of Texas music, conjunto. A San Antonio native, Mingo Saldivar has performed conjunto music in Texas clubs and dance halls for over half a century. His style blends elements of country, R&B, and rock and roll with traditional conjunto rhythms into a sound that is diverse but unmistakably Tex-Mex. As a testament to their respect and appeal, Saldivar and his band Los Temendos Cuatro Espadas were invited to perform during President Clinton's Inaugural Reunion on the Mall celebration in 1993. Later that year, Saldivar's recording "I Love my Freedom, I Love my Texas," on Rounder Records was nominated

Sutton County Sheriff Deputy, Oscar Chavez joined the chase, attempting to block the road with his vehicle. Seeing that the car was not going to stop, Chavez backed his car out of the line of traffic.

Trooper Norbert Ortiz and Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne joined the chase and along with Officer House, caused Galindo to have to veer to the right on Crockett and head out of town on the frontage road beside the Sutton County

Galindo then swurved his vehicle toward Ortiz's car in an attempt to side swipe it. Sensing that Galindo had no intention of stopping and seeing that people's lives were being put in danger, Ranger Byrne made the decision to fire at the driver-side tire to stop the vehicle. Once the tire was hit, the vehicle came to an abrupt stop on the side of the road. After a short confrontation, Galindo was arrested and transported to the Sutton County Jail where he was charged with Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon, Evading Arrest and Driving While Intoxicated.

Historical Society

They all had a lot of fun and enjoyed the great donuts and Little Debbie snacks from Town and Country in the morning and delicious pizza from Pizza Hut at lunch time. All the food was washed down with lots of Coke products donated by Coca-Cola in San Angelo. We deeply appreciate all these businesses and their generosity.

It looks like we will need one more work party on the 31st and then we will turn the building over to the carpenters and roofers and let them start the renovation. Also everything will get moved out of my house and I will get two rooms back when the offices are ready. We deeply appreciate all the volunteer help thank you all so very much. And last but not least a very special thank you to my husband Rick who has worked at this for over 2 1/2 months now. Not too much longer dear and you can watch T.V. in peace again.

Q. When did Miss Clara Alli-

son die?

A. Devil's River News, February 11, 1971 - Miss Clara Allison, 80 died at 9:45 a.m. on February 7, 1971 at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. Miss Allison, a daughter of pioneer settlers, the late Mr. and Mrs. George S. Allison, was born here April 25, 1890. She attended Sonora schools.

In 1917, she and the late Miss Sallie Wardlaw, opened the Dew Drop Inn, an ice cream parlor, next to Sonora Motor Co. This was the first of its kind here. She later opened the A & W Drugstore (later Sonora Drug) on Main Street. She sold the drug store in 1938 and engaged in ranching. She moved to San Angelo in 1953 but remained in the ranching business until 1961, leasing the ranch since that time. At the time of her death she was living in Rio Concho Manor.

I did find one note in the November 22, 1919 Devil's River News stating that Misses Allison & Wardlaw have installed a modern, sanitary corn popper and peanut

roaster at the Dewdrop Inn. It is said that if J. D. Lowrey had a machine like it at San Antonio during the Masonic meeting he would not have minded selling peanuts as he could have been eating popcorn part of the time. Many of my readers remember Misses Allison & Wardlaw and their drug store.

Q. When did Manuel Vasquez

A. Devil's River News, July 22, 1971 - Mr. Manuel Vasquez, 88, died July 16, 1971, in Hudspeth Memorial Hospital following a long illness. He had lived here for the past 23 years and had worked for the late John Cauthorn as a ranch worker. He was born November 5, 1882 in Mexico.

Q. When did W. P. McConnell die?

A. Devil's River News, April 9, 1970 - W. P. McConnell, 69, died at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital on April 5, 1970, after a long illness. He was buried April 7 in the Sonora Cemetery. He was born February 20, 1901 in Memphis, Tennessee and married Estelle McDonald in 1930.

He was a retired employee of Humble Oil Co. A member of the Alpha Omega Fraternity, Masonic Lodge, Shrine, Eastern Star, Mr. McConnell was also a member of the Episcopal Church. Survivors included his wife, and two sisters, Mrs. Z. A. Bratten of Winterhaven, Florida and Mrs. Charlotte Larke of Memphis Tennessee and a cousin Mrs. Arcadia Johnson.



At Home Hardware and Furniture on Main Street you could get a 5 piece dinette set for \$52.50 or a Spanish dinette set for \$149.95. A 22 inch black and white T.V. was \$225.00 and a portable 8 track tape player was \$34.50. You could get an early American couch with orange vinyl cover for \$149.95 or a Kelvinator refrigerator for \$199.95. A three piece bedroom suite Spanish style was \$132.50.

Other listings included the following: The Ruth Shirley Jewelry, Elliott Butane Co., Ratliff - Kerbow Funeral Home, The C. A. Lucketts Chuck Wagon Grocery, Jo and J Neville at Neville's Your Complete Department Store, Elliott Chevrolet, Jim Hugh Richardson Drenching Service, Tommy & Guggle Thorp of Thorp's LaunDry and Web Elliott Insurance Agency.

We were asked about the statements made in the paper about cleaning up properties and removing old vehicles and junk in yards. Someone wanted to know why they were doing this and said it was never done in the old days. Looking it up we find that there have been laws on keeping Sonora clean and making a better impression on our visitors since the earliest days of the town. Rules were passed that yards be maintained properly and junk be

removed to stop infestation by rats, mice and snakes. Out houses had to be maintained properly to keep down odors and disease. Animals had to be penned or restrained so they didn't wander all over town. It seems at one time pigs, cows, chickens and geese wandered all over Main Street and the ladies had a time crossing the street without soiling their shoes and clothing and the stores were constantly having to clean the floors and fight the flies. Cleanups of the town to keep it a safe, healthy and pleasant place to come to have gone on for over 100 years. They are not "something new." They are good laws that help make a much safer, healthier and pleasant environment for the people that live here.



for students who fail one or more TAAS tests. The purpose of required summer school would be to help students meet state standards and to make sure they are on track to pass the EXCET TAAS test in order to graduate from high school. Mrs. Hirt explained that this will not go into effect until the 2001-2002 school year. The board requested that this local policy be prepared for next months meeting and the board would act on it at that

The board discussed the additional transfer students and moved to accept them as presented.

All of the principals are working on their proposed budgets for their perspective campuses. Each principal gave a short report on their status and plan to have their budgets turned in within the next few weeks.

Mrs. Hill presented information regarding redistricting. The water district and hospital district were both asked if they wanted to share the costs with the school, for the Redistricting plan to be formulated and submitted to the U.S. Justice Department. The cost for the school and the hospital district would be \$5,250.00 each. The water district declined to share this cost. The contract will be presented at the next board meeting.

In the Superintendent's report, Mrs. Hill reported that enrollment was down six from February. As of the end of Feb. enrollment was High School- 261, Middle School-211, Intermediate School- 218, and Primary School- 242.

Middle School Principal, John Berry informed the board that the School Calendar would be determined after the state legislature makes a decision on the start and end dates for schools across the state. Region XV wants the calendar to be consistent across the region. The site base committee meets on March 22 to work on the school calendar.

Mrs. Hill reported on CHIPS which is a Children's Health Insurance Plan. There will be a meeting on March 28th for parents to sign their children up for this program.

The board members concurred with the Elementary Facilities Committee and plan to meet with the Committee on Monday, March 26th in the board room, at 6:30 p.m. to discuss the next plan of action for the facilities.

Tammy Favila extended a big congratulations to Coach Lowe and Coach Marshall and the Lady Broncos and Broncos for their Academic Achievements during the recent Basketball season.

After meeting in executive session regarding evaluation of professional staff as presented by their administrators, it was announced that all current contracts for staff members would be renewed.

replace the heating and cooling unit in the house, with the funds coming from the Capital Improvement Account. Lenora Pool seconded the motion and the motion carried. Butler then informed the board that there was a family interested in renting the house and he was investigated ing a fair rental price.

Butler advised the Board that the Family Medical Leave Act coverage is required if you have over 50 employees. He stated that when the Nursing Home was open it fell under those requirements. With the Hospital District having less than 50 employees at this time, the District is no longer covered by FMLA. Butler went on to say that in the new policy under leave of absence, "employees will use all accrued PTO and EIB benefits (if absent for eligble reason). The Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) provides no coverage for this employer." Butler advised he is in the process of going over the personnel policies and it will address the length of time an employee may be gone from their job. He explained to the Board, at the present time the employees accrue vacation, holidays and ill days each year. Butler would like to change to a Paid Time Off (PTO) policy, which consolidates both the vacation and the holiday time into one pool of time, and the sick days would fall into an extended illness bank (EIB). The accrual would change from a % accrual basis to a per pay period basis. The first 3 days of any illness has to come out of the PTO time, after that three days, then it will trigger the EIB bank. This will reduce administrative time in keeping up with vacation, holiday, and sick time. Only full time employees are affected by this policy. The accrual per pay period will occur by the number of years of service. There will be four categories as outlined in the policy. There will be a maximum accrual on the EIB which will be 640 hours (16 weeks), which at the present time there is no maximum.





After 112 Years, Union Stock Yards Livestock Division Closes_

San Antonio-A long and colorful era of San Antonio and Texas history comes to an end on April 18 when the Union Stock Yards-established in 1889- will hold its last livestock auction. All livestock operations will cease April 20,

Mark A. Judson, president and general manager of Union Stock Yards, said the closure will occur due to a combination of factors: the long decline in volume of livestock nandled by the Stock Yards, increasing operating costs and fundamental changes in how livestock are marketed.

"Back in 1950, we had approximately one million head of cattle, sheep, goats and hogs come through the Stock Yards," he said. "That number declined to about 450,000 head by 1970, and by the end of last year (2000), the number had dropped to not quite 82,000 headand all of those were cattle. We haven't handled hogs, sheep or goats since 1998.

There were dramatic changes in this business, especially in the last half of the 20th century," Judson said. "In 1950, approximately 35 percent of the population was involved in agriculture, but today that number is more like two percent. These days, instead of livestock being brought to a few central points-like the Stock Yards-for auction, they are now sold in a variety of ways, including one-day sales held in smaller venues, direct sales, Internet and video sales.

This is like a death in the family for us," Judson said. "The Union Stock Yards were established by a group of ranchers back in 1889, just 12 years after the railroad came to town. Almost immediately, San Antonio became one of the major

livestock market and shipping points in the nation. The Stock Yards have been an integral part of San Antonio and South Texas history for more than a century, but times have changed and this simply is no longer a viable business.

In the Stock Yards operation, 19 hourly employees and three management positions will be affected by the closure of the Livestock Division, Judson said. Also affected will be the four commission companies and their employees as well as other agribusiness interests.

"This has been a very tough decision to make, and we want to thank all of our employees, commission companies, buyers and most of all our customers for their loyalty and support through the years," he

Judson said that the company will concentrate on turning the area, comprising of approximately 34 acres, into warehouse, office and industrial uses.

"We already have a number of office/warehouse operations around the Stock Yards," he said. "We expect to begin building more warehouses to take advantage of the industrial district at the Stock Yards. The Stock Yards, in their day, were ideally located for shipping and receiving of livestock. Today, they are ideally located for the shipping and receiving of other goods-and we believe the opportunities for us are good as the NAFTA treaty continues to increase trade with Mexico."

Judson said the Livestock Exchange Building will continue to operate as an office building and the existing warehouses will continue to be leased by their present tenants and the Stock Yards Cafe will continue to serve breakfast and lunch as
