October is Breast Cancer Awareness
Month

Survey Shows Widespread Confusion
About Breast Cancer Risk

Some Have Unreasonable Fears; Others a False Sense of Security
In a recent nationwide survey, the American Cancer Society found that many women are misinformed when it comes to understanding breast cancer risk.

According to the survey, nearly half of the respondents thought that women in the United States have a 30 to 50% chance of developing the disease, while two thirds believed that the risk is greater than 20%. These misconceptions about how often breast cancer strikes, can lead to unreasonable fears about the disease. In fact, according to the American Cancer Society, the average lifetime risk for breast cancer is approximately 11%.

Women who were surveyed also thought that the risk for getting breast cancer is greatest between the ages of 30 and 49, when in reality, that risk increases with age. This could lead to a false sense of security for older women—in their 50s, 60s and 70s—if they mistakenly believe breast cancer is a disease of

younger women and neglect getting regular mammograms themselves. According to the Society, 77% of new cases and 84% of breast cancer deaths reported between 1994 and 1998 occurred in women ages 50 and older.

Death Tolls Still Too High
While the risks are much lower than what the women in the survey understand them to be, breast cancer death tolls are still too high. By the end of this year, 192,000 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer and 40,600 women will die of this disease.

"This important research shows there is a lot of information out there about breast cancer risk, which women are unable to easily understand in terms of their personal risk for getting this terrible disease," said Carolyn D. Runowicz, MD, an American Cancer Society national board member. "The American Cancer Society encourages women to talk to their doctors about what breast cancer risk means to them personally."

Tell-A-Friend

A statewide campaign has been created to call attention to the importance of mammography in the fight against breast cancer. Tell-A-Friend callers are being recruited across the state to call at least five female family members, friends and or acquaintances - including at least one who has never had a mammogram and encourage them to have a mammogram.

Tell-A-Friend kicked off statewide on Monday, October 1. Calls can also be made throughout October, Breast Health Awareness month.

Organizers hope to recruit 6000 callers with a push to reach 30,000 women including 5000 for their first mammogram.

Tell-A-Friend calls will be made by volunteers in all corners of Texas. Any interested women are invited to join the American Cancer Society in reaching out with a life-saving message. Businesses and cor-

porations are encouraged to participate by permitting and encouraging employees to make lifesaving phone calls from the workplace during October.

Interested individuals can call the American Cancer Society at 1-800-ACS-2345 to receive an information and calling packet. Information on Tell-A-Friend is also posted on the American Cancer Society website at www.cancer.org.

Behavioral studies tell us that women are most likely to get a mammogram if they're encouraged to do so by a friend, physician or family member. The survival rate of breast cancer is almost 100% when detected early. Annual screening mammogram for women age 40 and older are the key element of newly revised American Cancer Society guidelines, which also include annual exams by a health care professional and monthly breast self-examination.

Broncos Deflate Blizzards At Homecoming

The Broncos ended their pre-district schedule last Friday in a Homecoming bout with the Winters Blizzards. The 2A Blizzards brought a 3 and 1 record into this inter-district match. Defensively, the Blizzards were able to do what the previous four 3A opponents of the Broncos could not do; hold Bronco speedster, William Renfro, to less than a 100 yards rushing.

Eighty-four yards to be exact. What Winters did not prepare for; was the air attack of the Red Hosses. Bronco quarterback, Scottie Moore, completed 9 of 13 passes for 202 yards and 4 touchdowns; with Bronco wide receiver, James Elliott, being his primary target (8 receptions for 165 yards and 3 touchdowns). Offensively, the Broncos had a balanced attack (202 yards passing and 231 rushing) and put 42 points on the score board. Defensively the Big Red Machine limited the high powered Blizzard offense to 264 total yards (161 yards passing and 103 yards rushing) and 21 points.

After the pre-game ceremonies were completed and the Broncos electing to defer to second half; they were led on the field by Sean Fields carrying and waving the American flag. As one spectator put it "If that does not give you goose bumps - Nothing will!"

Whether it was this action, homecoming hoop-la, or just the "Bronco Express" starting to engage the gears; the Winters Blizzards ran into a buzz saw.

Both team's defenses ruled the first quarter. Neither team could generate enough offense to sustain a drive. Mid-way through the first quarter, the Broncos had an excellent opportunity to put points on the board. After a short punt by the Blizzards, the Broncos found themselves in Blizzard territory at the Winters forty-eight. Staying predominantly on the ground, the Broncos began to move toward the Blizzards end zone. Runs by William Renfro, Sean Fields, and Brandon Adkins as well as a pass from Moore to Elliott would get the pigskin to the Blizzards fourteen. At the fourteen, a holding call on

the Broncos would force a field goal try. The try by Stetson Hall would be wide and Winters defense held. Starting at their own twenty, the Blizzards would end up losing yardage. One play for minus three yards and three procedure calls would move the ball back to the Blizzard eight. At the eight, Winters running back, Eric Lopez, would loose the handle, and Bronco safety James Elliott, would recover the loose pigskin at the Blizzard eight yard line. Threading the needle between two Blizzard defenders; Scottie Moore would find Emmanuel Lopez in the back corner of the end zone for the Broncos first score of the game. With no time showing on the first quarter game clock, Stetson Hall would drill the PAT to give the Broncos a seven point advantage: Winters 0 - Sonora 7.

To begin the second quarter, the Bronco defense did not let up on the Blizzards. Defensive plays by Dustin Martin, Juan Rodriguez, and James Elliott, plus a holding call would force the Blizzards to punt after gaining only two positive yards and using three and a half minutes of the second quarter. An overly aggressive Blizzard defense would force the Broncos to punt after three plays and only one positive yard gained. With seven minutes and twenty-one seconds left in the second quarter, the Blizzards would set up shop at the Bronco forty-two. Taking a cue from the Red Hosses, Winters only needed a minute and three plays to put points on the board. A forty-two yard scoring bomb from Shane Colburn to Rusty Jackson with Jeffery Oats adding the PAT would tie the ball game with six minutes and twenty-four seconds left in the second quarter. Winters 7 - Sonora 7. The Bronco offense not to be intimidated would take possession after the ensuing kick-off at their own thirty-four. Using the fullback, Sean Fields as the main mode of transportation, the Broncos aided by a major face mask penalty, advanced the football to the Blizzard twenty on six plays. At the twenty, the Express (William Renfro) would sprint untouched into the end zone

Commissioners Approve Wild Animal Ordinance

At the meeting of the County Commissioners on Monday, September 24, 2001 it was approved to allow the EMS department to put up a flag pole in front of their building. Pat Campbell made the request and informed the Commissioners that Cleve T. and Lolabeth Jones had agreed to donate the pole that was in front of the old Post Office building. Sheriff Fincher stated that they too would like a flag pole and would be looking for one to be donated.

The Commissioners approved a Wild Animal Ordinance in Sutton County prohibiting wild animals being kept as pets.

County Judge Carla Garner submitted a request by Coach Johnny Creek for the County to assist in the cost of putting a sprinkler system in at the Baseball field. Garner told the Commissioners that Creek has raised all but \$1000 for

the system and was going to ask the school to split that remaining cost with the County. The Commissioners agreed to pay the \$500.

Garner advised the Commissioners that they would have to adjust the DPS budget because of some electrical wiring that had to be done when the breathalyzer was moved from the old Police Department to the Sheriff's office. The Commissioners agreed to pay the bill at this time, but advised that no such changes be made in the future without prior approval.

The Commissioners approved for the advertising for bids on two (2) pick-ups for the Road and Bridge Department.

The Commissioners then went in to executive session with the County Attorney.

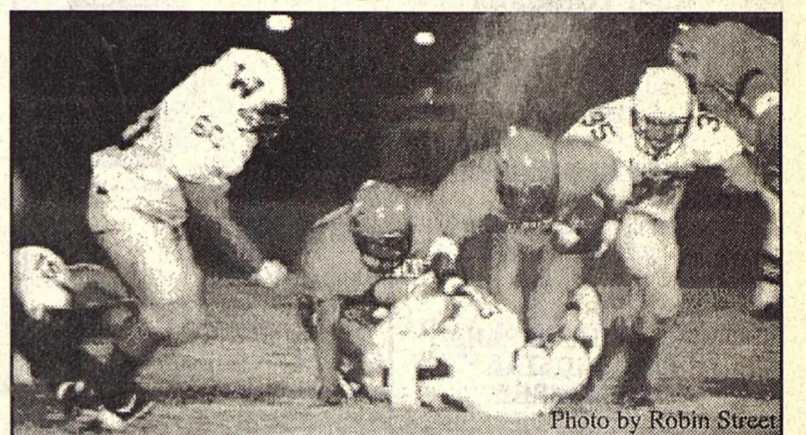

on a cross buck draw. Hall would just inch the ball over the cross bar to give Sonora a 14 to 7 lead. The Red Hoss defense led by Chance Armke, Thomas Bloodworth, and Stetson Hall would really increase the pressure on the Blizzards; forcing Winters to punt after three downs. Taking over on the Blizzard forty-seven, the quick strike offense of the Broncos would only need two plays and thirty seconds to break the back of the Blizzards. A nice gain by Renfro on a direct snap from center would be called back due to a holding penalty and with a minute and forty-seven seconds on the clock, Moore would loft up a touch pass to Elliott, who would haul it in for a forty five yard catch and run for the Bronco touchdown. This time Hall would boom the kick through the uprights for the PAT to give the Broncos a fourteen point advantage. Winters 7 - Sonora 21. Trying to get back in the game, Winters would go to the air on eight of ten plays; but to no avail, as the Bronco secondary would cover the receivers like a glove and the Red Hoss defensive line would put tremendous pressure on the Blizzard quarterback and force them to turn the ball over on downs with eleven seconds left. Being in Blizzard territory at the forty-one, the Broncos still had time for a shot at the end zone. A twenty two yard pass play from Moore to Sean Fields would move the ball to the Blizzard twenty-seven. With just seconds left on the clock, the Broncos called time out and the Bronco coaching staff elected to try a forty-four yard field goal into the wind. Bronco place-kicker, Stetson Hall, hit it solid and just missed however, the Broncos would take a 21 to 7 lead to the dressing room.

To start the second half, the Broncos would start at their own thirty. Pass plays to James Elliott and Douglas Yochum along with excellent runs by William Renfro, Sean Fields, and Dustin Martin would move the ball to the Blizzard

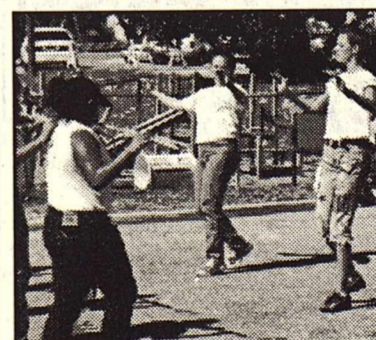

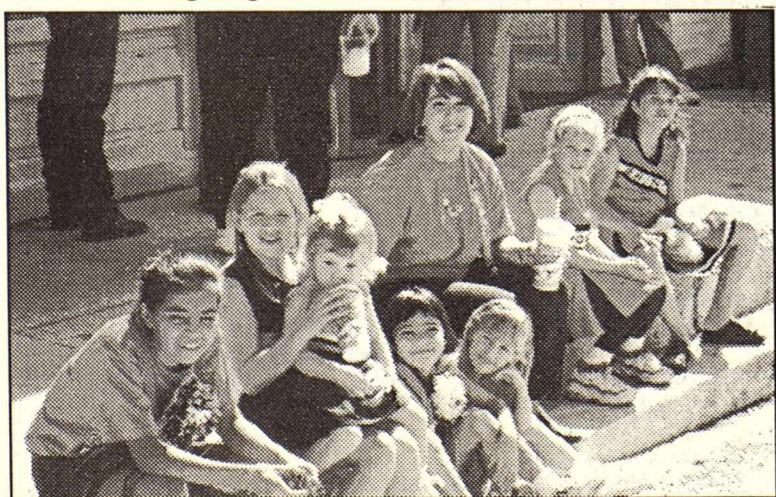

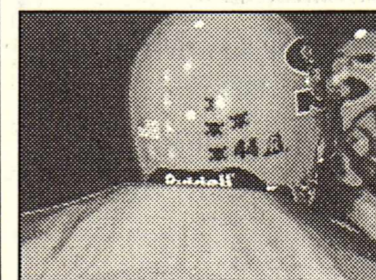
