The third time proved to be the charm for the school building proposition on the school district's three-part bondelection last week.

Voters favored, by a scant majority, building the new sixclassroom elementary building while they again turned thumbs down on improvements and additions to athletic facilities.

Providing funds for the new classrooms will be a boost to the crowded school system. The "for" voters were glad to see this part of the ballot carry. Disappointing, of course, was the failure of the voters to go for improvements to the present football field and a new field house in connection with it.

Frankly, we were of the opinion that the once-popular idea of being too intellectual for sports was dead here and we thought the athletic portions of the bond election might also carry. The money voters were deciding on for these two propositions was only \$56,000, which is a the overall investment the conducted. school district has. The savings in taxes on this amount couldn't proposed 10 per cent tax increase. If our understanding is correct, taxes will now need to be raised eight per cent instead of the pre-election proposed 10 per cent.

The athletic improvements were voted down eventhough there is almost unanimous agreement among the citizenry here that our facilities are by far the poorest in our district, 3-A. Other district members include Farwell, Sudan, Springlake-Earth and Kress, Why, we continue to wonder, can't we afford facilities which are as good or better than those places?

The answer is that we can afford facilities as good or better than those school districts. It's just that a majority of our school district voters isn't yet ready to pay the minute increased price for them.

Continuing Bovina High School's football program with the present facilities will be like a Parmer County farmer using a two-row tractor. It can be done, but it's not the best way.

An analysis of the school bond election is hard to make. At least, that's true in our case.

Our first impression was that the voters in favor of the expansion plan turned out in greater numbers. And they did. That, however, is not the complete answer because those voting against were also greater in number than when the same election was held in December. Maybe the election of last week indicated that a majority of voters didn't want to increase taxes, not even a little bit, to pay for athletic facilities.

That doesn't mean they're against athletics or better facilities for them. So, if that is the case, and it's just as good a guess as any, it's possible the facilities to which the community, and its young people, are entitled, could be provided via an alternate route . . . . . .



Heavy machinery caused necessity of flagging the crossings, Agent Dean Hastings said, Machines were used to do different jobs. One removed old ties which needed replacing. Another put new ties in place. Then the ties were fitted snugly up against the rail, new spikes driven into place, and finally another machine packed ballast rock under the ties to give necessary support. Still other machinery realigned and levelled the track. The procedure is almost opposite of that of the first railroads, when the bed was laid first, then the ties and finally the rails attached by the spikes. In present times, crews work on the tracks from the top down, according to Hastings.





According to the author, cheating particularly exists among the sponsor. "better" classes. And according to experience, it also occurs among the "best" students. What triggers this action? Mainly, too much emphasis on

"When parents stress grades above character, integrity and other values, they seem to be literally telling their child to get these grades any way he can. Sometimes teachers are also guilty of putting grades above achievement," says the author.

Then, quoting from college professor Jerome Ellison, who wrote the following for the Saturday Evening Post, "The reason for cheating most commonly given is that the pressure to succeed, reinforced by the fear of failure, overwhelms considerations of honor."

Students should be made to feel it is more honorable to pass with a lower grade he earned himself than to be at the top of his class "any way he can."

Teachers, the article continues, should make it so difficult for a student to cheat that he will quit trying after a time or two -and should be consistently punished when caught.

\* \* \* \* You don't believe your child would cheat? What some of the teachers could tell might "curl your hair."

True, there are some students with enough integrity in every class that would turn down the opportunity if handed to him on a silver platter. But a large number will take advantage of every opportunity available -- at all age levels and in all grades.

Another tragedy is that so many parents are concerned with the grades of others outside their own family.

What difference does it make, as long as their own is doing his or her best? It seems to be a rat race to some kind of social status for our

children to be in the top grade bracket. I'm not knocking good grades -- they are fine when earned.

But instead of asking "What grade did you make?" we should be asking "What did you learn?"

It's the answer to the last question that will get them to the top of the ladder when they are adults.

What is money? In our case, metal coins and paper currency. To others, it might be trade tokens, furs, pearl buttons, caribou teeth, blankets, sea shells or

That was the situation in our 49th state - Alaska - until shortly before World War II, and years before it joined the Union.

"Alaska had no conventional coinage for most of its history," notes Ken Bressett, numismatic editor at Whitman Publishing Company, Racine, Wis. "During early years, there was no legal currency as such, and commerce was conducted on a barter or exchange basis. Trade tokens were issued later, but money as we know it is a fairly recent development in Alaska.'

Alaskan Indians and Eskimos prized animal skins, beads, animal teeth and sea shells as mediums of exchange. Large copper shields were symbols of tribal wealth. After the coming of the white man, blankets, beads and pearl buttons became favored as

Later on, various trading companies issued trade tokens. These were designed for use as small change, to stimulate commerce. Tokens, or "bingles" as they were commonly known, became the standard currency of Alaska for



TEXAS FARMERS COMMENT

ON SOIL TESTING -- In a recent survey, 720 Texas farmers, who had at least one sample of soil analyzed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's laboratory at College Station during the year, answered the questions asked. Out of the 720, 95 per cent said they understood the information sent back to them from the lab; 98 per cent said they read the explanation sheets returned with the soil test results; 80 per cent said they used the recommended amounts and kinds of fertilizer and 97 per cent said the use of fertilizer had been profitable. Many said that fertilizer use is a must in today's agriculture and indicated they'd like information on how to use more and also test reports for secondary and micro-nutrients.
