New York City Paramedic Frank Riboni came to town to personally say thank you to the Sonora students and the community for all their overwhelming kindness that was expressed in the "Shoeboxes of Support" program.

Sonora Middle School teacher, Marlyn Young was the ringleader for Sonora, helping to get over 500 boxes made, collected and delivered to the Sunset Mall in San Angelo. From there the boxes were delivered to rescue workers in New York who were tirelessly working in the destruction after the September 11th terrorist attacks.

Riboni's day started with an escort in to town from all of Sonora's finest, who met him and his traveling companions at the edge of town. He was taken to the Sonora High School gym, where he was greeted Bronco style. All Sonora students and half of the town were waiting for him as he was led in to the Red, White and Blue decorated gym.

"Just A Letter From Home"

As our nation ights the War on Terrorism, place our lives

and liberties in the hands of the brave men and women fighting on the front lines. These individuals risk their lives every day to preserve our freedom and safety. While we attend holiday parties and decorate our trees, our troops find themselves alone in foreign territory. Now, more than ever, it is paramount that we rally behind our troops and show our support.

When I think of our troops away from home over the holiday season, I am reminded of a story I heard many years ago. During the Vietnam War, Sgt. Billy Thompson sent a simple holiday request to news columnist Abigal Van Buren. He suggested that "just a letter from home" would make a wonderful Christmas present. This resulted in the holiday letter writing campaign

called "Operation Dear Abby."

For 17 years, American citizens sent letters and cards to servicemen deployed away from home. These cards served to boost morale and spread holiday cheer to thousands of military personnel.

Many years later, during Operation Desert Storm, a new letter-writing campaign was born. Rather than focus only on the holiday season, "Any Servicemember" aimed to promote troops morale year round. During operations in Bosnia, the campaign continued to grow and brought joy to many members of armed services.

Unfortunately, recent threats of Anthrax and biological warfare, have made delivering large amounts of mail to our troops unsafe. The Department of Defense was forced to announce that both of these highly successful campaigns would be indefinitely suspended. In the midst of a new kind of war, we must find new means of supporting our servicemen and women.

Broncos: Quarter Final Champions

Bronco Express Rolls On, Next Stop: Celina

In Sweetwater this past Friday, the Broncos, encouraged by a large crowd and an ever insistent Bronco Express Horn, totally dominated the Quanah Indians for the opening two quarters of play.

Both teams were able to touch the football four times in the first

The only difference was; that the Broncos scored four touchdowns and the Indians were only able to score once. The second half proved to be a different story; as the Indians scored once and the Broncos had trouble crossing the mid-field stripe. Irregardless; the Broncos advanced to the next round and the Indians are playing basketball this week.

Winning the coin flip; the Broncos elected to receive the opening kick-off.

It did not take long for the Bronco faithful to see who the better team was. On the opening Red Hosses drive, the Bronco Express covered the sixty-three yards needed in three and a half minutes to

William Renfro and Sean Fields found gaping holes produced by the offensive line to advance the ball to the twenty-eight yard line of the Indians. At the Quanah twentyeight; the Indians forced the Broncos into a fourth and six situation. Without hesitation; the Bronco coaching staff called for a screen pass. Scottie Moore dropping back, lofted a touchpass to his half back Dustin Martin.

Martin, catching the pass at the twenty-eight, and following excellent down field blocking, sprinted to the Quanah two; where he was forced out of bounds by a Quanah defender. One play later, William Renfro, behind the Power I blocking, would score the Red Hosses first touchdown.

With eight minutes and twentyeight seconds showing on the game

clock, Stetson Hall would boom the PAT through the uprights to give the Broncos a seven point advantage. Broncos 7 - Indians 0.

On Quanah's first possession, the Indians would experience what the Broncos three previous play-off opponents had witnessed. A Bronco defense with a single purpose in mind - limiting their opponents to minimal yardage and the fewest points possible.

Defensive plays by Juan Rodriguez, Thomas Bloodworth, Josh Everett, Sean Fields, and Stetson Hall would force the potent Indians to punt after five plays and only fifteen positive yards.

After an excellent punt by the Indians, the Broncos would start their second possession at their own eleven. Runs by Renfro and Fields would advance the ball out of the shadows of their goal posts to the

twenty-seven. Faced with a third and nine, Moore would roll to his right looking down field for his tight-end, Stetson Hall. The pass bouncing off of Hall's shoulder pads would be gathered in by Bronco wide receiver, James Elliott, and the race was on. Elliott, quickly out-distancing the Quanah defenders raced into the end zone to complete the seventytwo yard pass play for the Broncos second touchdown. The PAT by Hall would split the uprights to make the score: Sonora 14 Quanah 0. With a third of the first quarter clock still showing, the Indians were not ready to throw in the towel. Using the running attack of Jonathan Hill and Lucas Martinez, the Indians began to move the football down the field. Aided by a questionable pass interference call, Quanah would move into Bronco territory at the Sonora twenty eight. The Bronco defense respecting the play action, failed to detect the back out of the backfield. Jonathan Hill, slipping through the offensive line, found himself wide open for the pass from Jeff Ward.

Hill catching the pass at the Bronco fifteen would easily get into the end zone for the Quanah touchdown.

Daniel Tyler, Quanah's placekicker would cut the Broncos lead in half with seventeen seconds showing on the first quarter game clock. Sonora 14 - Quanah 7.

The Bronco's third possession of the first quarter would start at their own thirty-four.


Clock management - eleven seconds showing - and the Bronco offense is able to get two plays off. The first, a thirteen yard pick-up by Renfro; the second, a forty four yard pass play: Moore to the man of the hour, Dustin Martin. With no time showing; Martin would extend the catch and run to the Indian nine yard line. At the nine, the Indiandefense would stiffen. The Bronco Express would need three plays and a minute and a half of the second quarter to get their third touchdown. Three straight runs by Renfro, with the third being a four yard power play for the score. Hall staying perfect would add the PAT to give the Broncos a fourteen point lead. Broncos 21 - Indians 7.

The Indians, still not feeling intimidated, took the ensuing kickoff and proceeded to march down the field. Starting at their own thirty-three; they went back to the run-

ning attack of Martinez and Hill. The defense led by Everett, Bloodworth, Rodriguez, and Fields gave up yardage grudgingly. At the twenty-one of Sonora; the Indians thought they would catch the Bronco secondary asleep.

Ward, trying to get the ball to the back out of the back field, did not see the Broncos safety, James Elliott. Elliott stepping in front of the intended receiver; would intercept the ball at the Bronco fifteen and return it to the forty-seven. If it works - Keep doing it. Alternating between Renfro and Fields, the Bronco Express chewed up the



Ask the Historical Society

Congratulations Broncos keep up the good work! I'll keep the lights on to greet you when you come home and try to stay awake to wave. I fell asleep in the chair about 2AM the last two times but woke up with a smile when I heard all your horns tooting at the well lit Bronco banner as you went by. I just couldn't move fast enough to get out the door and wave before you had all gone by.

Q. What were all those men doing behind the Miers Home Saturday?

A. The tiers, of what was supposed to be grassy areas between the seating areas of the amphitheater, have eroded very badly over the years. This erosion has caused quite a bit of damage to the surrounding rock work. This weekend a wonderful group of men that have volunteered for several of our work projects, spent from 8 AM to 6 PM moving over 10 yards of chat and gravel, by wheelbarrow, from beside the old Sonora Police Dept. building to the amphitheater. They then spread the chat, packed it, sprinkled 10 bags of cement on and then topped it all with a layer of small gravel. They made containment areas at the sides to keep it from shifting or eroding as all the old top soil did when most of the grass was killed by foot traffic. They leveled and raked the whole area and it looks wonderful. We hope to repair the rock work at a future date when it is a little warmer and better weather for working with mortar mix. They even helped move the iron beds from the Old Jail back into the Miers Home Museum and put the fire place surround that had been donated by the Pharis Hurst descendants back where it belonged in the Miers Home. I kept three coffee pots going and tried to help keep them warm on the windy, bitter cold day with lots of coffee, hot chocolate, spicy apple cider, donuts, Little Debbie snacks and a devil's food cake with lots of chocolate frosting; changed all the burned out light bulbs on the amphitheater and

Next time there is a celebration the Miers Home Museum Memorial Complex/Cauthorn Building, no one will get muddy feet or have to jump puddles when using the amphitheater. Members of the Sutton County Historical Society and volunteers from the community have been working at least one weekend every month on improving things in the historical area around the Courthouse Square for some time now. We are building new offices, cleaned all the weeds and most of the trash from a large lot that had been let go over the years filling a commercial size dumpster; cut trees off the Depot and pruned all the bushes on the grounds filling 4 dumpsters; cleaned the Depot, Miers Home Museum, Old Jail and washed all the windows in them. If we can raise enough money we would like to be able to paint the interior and exterior of the Depot and the interior of the Old Jail and get a new light

timer for the Depot security lights. Q. Aren't they working on the new offices anymore, work seems to have stopped?

A. As soon as the walls went up

on the archival storage area, measurements were taken so that specially fabricated roof rafters could be ordered. These rafters are constructed from a special fire retardant material and were not available locally, also the fire door on the room had to be ordered in. As soon as the rafters are in work will start again. The rafters and storage room walls will go up and the rear door be put on. The old roof will be torn off, that area reinforced and new roof put on the entire structure. Once the new roof is on and there is no longer any danger of water damage the interior work will begin, decorative rock work added to the rear, sidewalks poured, top soil hauled in and grass planted. The day you see trucks backing up to my front door loading up 2 rooms of 11 years of research and all the boxes of the Eaton collection you will know we are almost ready to have a grand

I think Eddie Sawyer and Al Elliott deserve a big thanks for all the hard work they have been doing over the years to preserve the history of Sutton County. They are kind of quiet types that stay in the background but get a great deal done for us. Without their constant efforts to secure a building for offices, research center and archival storage and obtain the funding to make the same happen the dream could not have come true. These two men in their own quiet and unassuming ways are constantly trying to improve the Sutton County Historical Society and make our research more available to the public. Without their encouragement and help we could never have collected all we have or been able to maintain and preserve it all.







Daniel Anderson and Shannon SportsMed Score for Local Athletes

He is easily spotted on the sidelines of Brady football games. When basketball season rolls around he will be equally visible courtside. Is he a coach or maybe a player? No, he is the Shannon SportsMed athletic trainer, Daniel Anderson, and you can't miss him.

Anderson covers all varsity football games, both home and away; home sub-varsity football games; and as many basketball games as is possible with the boys' and girls' teams often traveling to different destinations.

As a service of Shannon Health, Shannon SportsMed provides the services of its athletic trainers, free of charge, to area schools. Anderson, as the trainer for the Brady ISD athletic department, provides injury evaluations, consultations and follow-up visits for injured athletes.

"As an athletic trainer I evaluate the injury, determining whether the injury is serious enough for a doctor's evaluation or if ice, rest and an exercise regimen will suffice,' Anderson said.

In his evaluation, Anderson takes the injured athlete through a series of specially designed tests to determine the extent of the injury. He then formulates an individualized exercise program to treat, strengthen and improve the range of motion. His assessment can also determine if there is a need for further treatment by a physician.

Anderson said that Dr. Tom Reid, SportsMed medical director and orthopedic surgeon, is available on Saturday mornings for a free consultation to injured athletes.

A 1999 graduate of Angelo State University, Anderson holds a double major in kinesiology and business. His training as a licensed athletic trainer included a three-year internship with the Angelo State University athletic program.

In his second year as the trainer for Brady ISD, the Sonora native has found his career niche in athletic medicine. "I love it," he said. "I love being able to be outside, watching sports and helping young athletes stay healthy."

As an athletic director, Anderson works under the direction of Shannon SportsMed manager, Connie Whitman. With colleagues, Floyd Daughters, covering the Mason athletic program and Jeff Pulley, working with other area

schools, Anderson seeks to provide for the training needs of high school athletes.







Sonora Bronco Football Preview

Celina Bobcats

The Bronco Express rolls on to Stephenville this Friday night for a Division II 2A Semi Final matchup against the Celina Bobcats. The Bobcats (14 - 0) are the defending 2A Division II Champions. They will be facing last year's defending 2A Division I Champions. Sonora is 6 - 0 in semi-final games in Bronco football history.

Celina returns seven starters on offense from last year's team. On this side of the ball, they are led by senior running back Adam Harvey (6-2, 205, 4.6). After their area game against Hamilton on Thanksgiving, Harvey's season totals were: 202 rushes for 1,358 yards and 21 TD's. In his junior year, he rushed for 1,674 yards and 29 TD's. Jordan Martin, a wide receiver last year, moved to quarterback this season and is having a good year. As of the ninth game of this season, Martin (6-1, 160) was 68/119 with 1415 yards, 21 TD's and only one interception. As a side note, Martin runs the 300 hurdles and was 6th at the State UIL meet last May. Martin is also not afraid to run with the ball if his favorite receiver, Ross Roby is well-covered. Roby (6-1, 160) had caught 24 passes for 639 yards and nine TD's as of 3 November. Josh Sharrock (5-10, 170) also runs the ball for Celina and has 20 touchdowns. In the playoff game against Italy, in their 35-0 victory, the Bobcats used four different QB's and players were put in positions they normally didn't play.


Celina's offensive game plan is usually to try to run the big tailback right at you until you have success stopping him. If you can, then they will mix in the play action pass. They can run the I formation, wish bone, and the shot-

The Bobcat defense only had two returning starters (Sharrock and Nic Prosser) at the start of the season. Their 14 - 0 record indicates head coach G. A. Moore has effectively filled those holes from the undefeated JV team and elsewhere. In the region playoff game against Italy, the Bobcat defensive coordinator ran a controlled blitz the entire game that kept the Italy QB and RB in the backfield most of the time. When Italy tried to throw, the Italy QB threw into a combination man to man coverage that was mixed with some zone defense. The Bobcat quarterback also plays defensive back. His brother, Jacob Martin, a sophomore weighs 190 pounds and plays linebacker.

Celina prefers to put "nine men in the box" and try to bull -rush you into making mistakes. They blitz often and dare you to throw as they use man to man coverage. Their nose guard is C. Clearman who weighs in at 277. Their guards weigh 210 and 230. Their defensive ends are fast and weigh 155 and 180.

There will be a sendoff starting at the fieldhouse at 11:45. The team bus will proceed past the elementary school and the middle school. The main sendoff area this week is at I-10 Exit 404 (Ft. McKavett exit) east of town. Kickoff is 7:30 Friday at Tarleton's Memorial Stadium.

This game has all the makings of a bonafied WAR! Celina with their size, speed, and tradition (55



Rangeland Workshop Slated For Jan. 10-12

SONORA - The Academy for Ranch Management will host a basic rangeland management workshop here Jan. 10-12 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora.

The two-day course will provide information on developing strategies to meet the resource goals for each individual, said Ray Hinnant, one of the instructors for the academy and senior research associate with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Basic information on rangeland ecology, plant identification, grazing strategies, wildlife/livestock interactions, nutrition and habitat restoration will be covered in detail," Hinnant said.

Participants will tour the Sonora Experiment Station to

observe the effects of grazing and burning treatments first hand. The course is a prerequisite for the advanced rangeland management America has scheduled its Annual and burning classes taught during the year.
