Sales Tax **Holiday Set** For August 2-4

(AUSTIN) - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently announced that the annual Sales Tax Holiday is coming up August 2-

"Start making your shop-ping list for school clothes for the kids and new clothes for mom and dad," Comptroller Rylander said. "During the Sales Tax Holiday, most clothes and shoes priced under \$100 are exempt from state and local sales taxes."

Rylander estimates Texans will save \$42 million in sales tax during the three-day Sales Tax Holiday, including \$33.2 million in state sales tax and \$8.8 million in local sales taxes.

"I believe Texans will once again take full advantage of this well-deserved tax break to make their dollars go farther as they shop for a new school year," Rylander said. "During the Sales Tax Holiday, shoppers save about \$8 for every \$100 they spend on qualifying clothing and footwear."

The savings from Texas' three Sales Tax Holidays thus far total approximately \$108.2 million, including an estimated \$85.3 million in state sales tax and an estimated \$22.9 million in local sales taxes.

"That's \$108 million that Texans have been able to keep in their pockets for their families' priorities," Comptroller Rylander said.

Examples of items that can be purchased tax-free August 2-4 include Baby clothes, Bathing suits, Belts with attached buckles, Boots (cowboy, hiking), Caps/hats (baseball, fishing, golf, knitted), Choir robes, Coats and wraps, Costumes, Diapers (adult and baby), Dresses, Gloves (generally), Gym suits and uniforms, Hooded shirts and hooded sweatshirts, Hosiery, Jackets, Jeans, Jerseys (baseball and football), Jogging apparel(such as bras, suits, and shorts), Neckwear and ties, Pajamas, Pants and trousers, Raincoats and ponchos, Robes, Shirts, Shoes (sandals, slippers, sneakers, tennis, walking), Socks (including athletic), Shorts, Suits, slacks, and jackets, Sweat suits, Sweatshirts, Sweaters, Swimsuits and trunks Tuxedos (not rentals) Underclothes, Work clothes and uniforms as long as the items are priced under \$100 each. Items that-can not be pur-

tax-free chased include Accessories (generally- barrettes, elastic ponytail holders, wallets, watches), Backpacks, Baseball cleats and pants, Belt buckles (without belt), Boots-(climbing, fishing, rubber work boots, ski, waders), Buttons and zippers, Cloth and lace, knitting yarns, and other fabrics, Dry cleaning services, Football pants, Golf gloves, Handbags and purses, Handkerchiefs, Hard hats, Helmets (bike, baseball, football, hockey, motorcycle, sports), Ice skates, Jewelry, Laundering services, Leather goods-except belts with buckles and wearing apparel, Pads (football, hockey, soccer, elbow, knee, shoulder), Personal flotation devices, Rented clothing (including uniforms, formal wear, and costumes), Roller blades and skates, Safety clothing, glasses, Shoes-)bicycle (cleated), bowling, golf). "I asked the last legislature

to expand the Sales Tax Holiday to include backpacks, school supplies, baby car seats, bicycle safety helmets and other safety gear for our most precious resource - our children," Comptroller Rylander said. "I also want to extend the Sales Tax Holiday from three days to five days. Texans don't need a three-day traffic jam. This must be a priority in the next legislative session.'

No Texas community has opted out of the Sales Tax Holiday this year. To opt out, a city, county or other local taxing entity must notify Comptroller by March 31.


Cook-off Committee Donates \$2500 to EMS

SONORA - A Basic Rangeland Management course for beginning ranchers is scheduled for Aug. 8-10 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora.

The course begins with a history of grazing on the Edwards Plateau. Participants will explore the resources available on the ranch in an outdoor environment, learning about the many different plants, how they grow and why grazing management is important. Also highlighted will be the types of animals that graze pastures, livestock and including wildlife.

Participants will learn to use tools that will help them evaluate the current condition of their pastures and will be introduced to "The Grazing Manager," a software program that assists the manager to plan and monitor the grazing on their



Outrageous Pledge Of Allegiance Decision Shows Need For Conservative Judges

Washington, DC – "The judges on the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco have taken complete leave of their senses," said Traditional Values Coalition Chairman Rev. Louis P. Sheldon today. "By declaring that the words 'under God' in the Pledge of Allegiance are unconstitutional, these robed tyrants have shown just how important it is for us to have conservative judges appointed to the federal bench-and how important the November elections are!"A federal appeals court ruled Wednesday that the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S. flag cannot be recited in public schools because the phrase "under God" endorses religion.

Rev. Sheldon is responding to today's announcement by the 9th Circuit Court that it had ruled in favor of a Sacramento atheist parent who protested having his daughter reciting the Pledge of Allegiance in school.

'It doesn't matter that at least 95% of Americans profess to believe in God," said Rev. Sheldon, "or that our nation was founded on Christian principles. Our Constitution and Bill of Rights are built upon the premise that God rules in heaven and that our rights come from Him—not from government. Why should the rights of the 95% be violated by a minority?" Rev. Sheldon notes that the Declaration of Independence has 10 references to God in it. "The Declaration includes such and 'Creator.' Heart Texas' **Doctors** Fear Athletes' Use of Dangerous Dietary **Supplements - Ephedrine**

With two-a-day football taken at the recommended drills less than a month away, Texas cardiologists are calling on Texas news editors, sportswriters, parents, coaches, and the University Interscholastic League to sound an alarm about ments containing ephedrine the drug ephedrine.

George Rodgers, MD, FACC, acting president and governor of the Texas chapter of the College American Cardiology, worries 'ephedrine is a dangerous drug, is easily abused, and has killed people. We're concerned about anyone, including athletes, taking over-the-counter substance that can have serious cardiac

consequences." Student athletes mistakenly may take ephedrine as a shortcut to increased performance on the field. What they don't know is that severe adverse reactions can happen even on their first or second dose of ephedrine and even

dosage.

More that 90 percent of adverse events reported to the FDA occur at recommended doses or less. Dietary supplealkaloids are marketed for unapproved indications and used by lay people who may have unknown underlying medical conditions.

The NCAA took steps last year to address the problem by allowing voluntary workouts for incoming student athletes and by providing them with education about the risks of taking dietary supplements.

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
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
