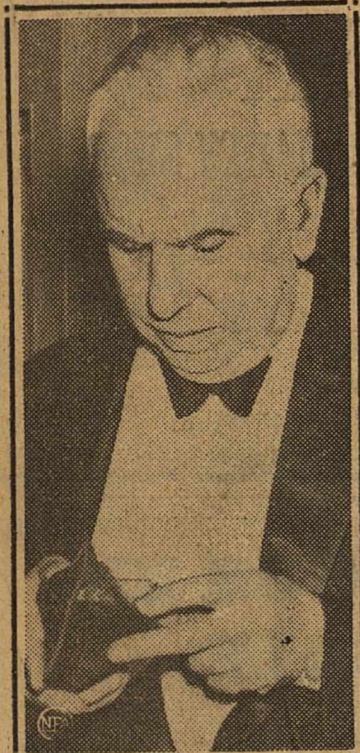

ASK COUNTRIES TO HALT VOLUNTEERS IN SPANISH WAR

Replies Expected To Outline Joint 'Front'

ARMS LEAVE U. S.

Embargo Not Passed Soon Enough To Halt Ship

Great Britain sought "constructive" German and Italian answers today to a plea to stop volunteers to the insurgent armies in Spain. Replies were expected to outline the joint Italo-German front, these two Fascist powers having joined in accord on European problems.

England, with one-seventh of her fleet in Spanish waters, is capable of enforcing a blockade should the step be deemed necessary. In Washington, the Spanish arms embargo was jammed through congress to keep millions of dollars in war shipments at home, but a technicality held up the president's signature. It may permit munitions dealers to keep getting plans and arms on the seas.

Time and a technicality thwarted Congress today in its race to stop munitions shipments to Spain. An administration embargo against such exports streaked through both Houses at the fastest pace since the emergency banking legislation of 1933.

Even faster, however, was the departure from New York of a Spanish steamer laden with airplanes to the Spanish Socialists by Robert Cuse, Jersey City broker.

A last-minute technicality also threatened to prevent President Roosevelt from signing the embargo into law until Friday, by which time further shipments may be made.

Richard Dineley, San Francisco munitions dealer, told reporters that \$4,507,000 airplanes and arms which he wants to send to the Madrid government could be gotten out of this country in 24 hours. He said he had to wait, however, for the arrival of Spanish officials, delayed by bad weather on a flight here from Mexico.

JULIANA, HEIR TO THRONE, WEDDED TO PRINCE TODAY

Commoners Wed At Same Time After Royal Grant

NATION JOYFUL

Country Celebrates Marriage of Its Next Queen

THE HAGUE, Jan. 7. (P)—Netherlands' Crown Princess, Juliana, was married today to Prince Bernhard zu Lippe-Biestefeld, heir to the principality of northwestern Germany.

At the same time Petronella Vandersmiers, commoner, married Martinus Vanstijn, canal boatman. They were given royal consent to wed today because they were born at the same time as the princess. Usually other marriages are banned on such occasions.

There was much rejoicing among the 2,000,000 inhabitants as the wedding took place.

The new husband of the princess will not take the historic title of "Prince of Orange," but will be "Prince of the Netherlands."

The historic palace of Soestdijk, in which the royal newly-weds will live, was given to them by the nation as a wedding present. The princess has had 200,000 florins a year in her own right, since the marriage she will receive 400,000 florins (\$217,000). The prince was voted 200,000 florins a year by parliament, effective today.

ONLY MUD SHOWS IN ANDREWS WELL DRILL-STEM TEST

No Oil, Gas Present In Hannigan 1 Logsdon

William Hannigan et al No. 1 Logsdon, wildcat in northwestern Andrews county, showed 45 feet of mud and no oil, gas or bottom water when a 15-minute, drill-stem test was taken from 4,426 to 4,654. Plans of operators were not revealed, but the test will probably be carried deeper. Cored intermittently through the lime section, the Hannigan well showed oil stains from 4,570 to 4,586 and from 4,600 to 4,616. Cores from 4,628 to 4,645 were barren. The wildcat is located in the center of the southwest quarter of section 5, block A-32, public school land. Bottomed at 4,433 feet in lime. (See OIL NEWS, Page 2)

COMMUNISTS IN SHENSI PROVINCE ARE UP IN REVOLT

American Reported To Be Playing Big Part

SIANFU, Jan. 7. (P)—Authoritative sources said today that communists in Shensi and Kansu provinces were in revolt against the Central Chinese Government as a development in the Marshal Chiang Hsueh-Liang rebellion in which Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek was held prisoner for two weeks. It was reported Agnes Smedley, American deported from India where it was alleged he conspired to provoke nationalist uprisings, was playing an important role in the campaign to establish a communist empire.

Smedley conducts radio propaganda for new recruits.

GIVEN 5 YEARS IN EXTORTION PLOT

Sailor Who Sent Notes To Ginger Rogers Is Sentenced

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7. (P)—Federal Judge Albert Lee Stephens sentenced James F. Hall, 20, U. S. navy sailor, to five years in the federal prison at McNeill's Island Wednesday on his plea of guilty to sending extortion letters to Ginger Rogers, film star.

Hall stood before the court atired in dungarees. This morning when he came before Judge Stephens, he wore his naval uniform and the judge deferred action, saying he did not want to sentence a man in uniform. On the second of two identical counts, Hall was placed on probation.

NECESSITY OF HAVING LAW DRAFTED TO AID LIVESTOCK RAISERS VOICED AT CATTLE, SHEEP RAISERS' MEETING

The necessity of having a law drafted whereby the administrative part of it is governed by the moral force of the livestock raisers, more especially the small livestock associations, was voiced at a meeting of cattle raisers and sheep men of this section in the county courthouse here Wednesday afternoon. The meeting having been called by L. W. Anderson of Pecos, chairman of a committee representing cattlemen's protective association in Midland, Reeves, Ector, Andrews, Jeff Davis, Ward, Winkler, Loving, Gaines and Tom Green counties. Approximately 50 cattle and sheep men from a dozen counties attend-

ed the meeting. County Judge E. H. Barron of Midland is secretary of the group with the legislative committee being composed of L. W. Anderson, Pecos; H. G. Bedford, Midland; E. B. Curry, Seminole; Frank VanCourt, San Angelo; Mack Kyle, Loving county; John Gist, Odessa; W. J. Underwood, Andrews; Charles Miller, Barstow; C. O. Finley, Pecos; and George Jones, Ft. Davis.

That more stringent legislation is needed in order to cope with cattle thievery, especially by truck and trailer, was voiced by the group. It was reported at the Wednesday meeting.

MERCURY STANDING AT 21 IN THE CITY

Icy blasts of winter hit Midland last night, the mercury falling from a maximum of 71 degrees yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock to 21 degrees this morning at 8.

The full blast of the approaching cold struck the city at 12:15 a. m. At that time the mercury was standing at 58 but in less than an hour had fallen 7 degrees. From that time it dropped approximately 5 points per hour, hitting the minimum figure at 7:45 a. m.

The temperature has remained at 21 since dropping to that figure according to readings at the Southern Ice and Utilities Co., the army airport and the West Texas Gas Co. Generally, the mercury at the airport shows a slightly lower figure than those in the city but all have checked today. A slight mist falling during the day froze as it fell, trees all being coated with ice on the windward side. Water in some streets had a thin coat of ice. Many cars left parked outside today had the water in their radiators frozen up, none of them being frozen hard, however. A few snowflakes fell over the city, as did light sleet at intermittent periods. The Dallas weather bureau has predicted a hard freeze for this area tonight and possibly rain. No cessation of the cold is expected Friday.

HOPE TO SETTLE AUTOMOTIVE AND WORKER STRIKES

Differences Narrow Between Leaders Of Factions

Conciliators heartened today with signs that the employer and worker braches were narrowing in the automotive and maritime strike. At Detroit, Governor Frank Murphy said the prospects were "good" for opening direct negotiations in an effort to avert a general walk-out in the General Motors Corp. The governor conferred with company officials and representatives of 50,000 striking employees.

An authoritative source said evaluation of the plants occupied by "stay in" strikers was the obstacle to settling the General Motors strike. United Automobile Workers union leaders have insisted on assurance equipment would not be removed from plants before ordering striking workers to withdraw.

Four peace conferences between ship operators and unions involved in the Pacific coast tie-up were launched at San Francisco.

STOVE EXPLOSION PROVES FATAL

Another Near Death In Paris Accident Last Night

PARIS, Jan. 7. (P)—Mrs. Welon Henshaw, 22, Mrs. Florence Allen, 17, and her nephew, Weldon Henshaw, 4; were dead and two other were burned in an explosion at Reno, near here, caused by pouring oil on embers in a stove last night. Tenley Henshaw, 31; is in a serious condition and Katherine Henshaw, 2; suffered minor burns.

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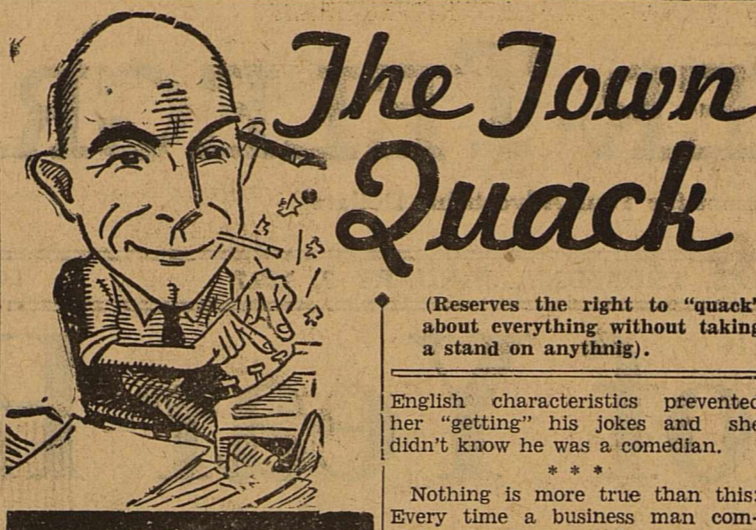

Location is in the center of the northwest of the northeast of section 15, block A-45, public school land. Farther north, in Gaines county,

Ward Well Treated
Treated yesterday with 3,000 gallons of acid under water load, Finley & Cherry No. 1 Sealey Estate, test in northern Ward county four miles west of the O'Brien pool, has swabbed fluid down to within 200 feet of bottom. Oil is coming in at the rate of four barrels an hour. Swabbing is still in progress. Total depth of the well is 3,203, with liner cemented at 3,070 to shut off sulphur water encountered above

the pay. It is in the northeast corner of section 54, block F, G. & M. M. B. & A. survey.

In the O'Brien pool, Gulf No. 77 O'Brien flowed 619 barrels through casing in 24 hours after shot. It was shot with 355 quarts of nitro from 2,547 to 2,737, ten feet off bottom.

In the Estes pool of south Ward, Eastland No. 3 Hathaway flowed 963 barrels in six hours and was assigned a daily potential of 3,853 barrels. It topped pay at 2,470, reached a total depth of 2,644, and was shot with 380 quarts.

Gulf No. 9 Estes, in the same pool, flowed 1,278 barrels on six-hour test, rating 5,114 barrels a day. Plow was through tubing and casing, with 7,514,000 feet of gas.

Mrs. Bodine, who had an arm amputated following the wreck, is rapidly gaining in a Colorado hospital but will be forced to remain there for a while yet, reports said.

It had been shot before completion some months ago, and would flow 100 barrels a day through one-inch choke when opened up. Its oil was being sold to Lubbock refineries, but the well has been shut in lately.

day meeting that a prominent attorney has been engaged and that a bill to give better protection to livestock growers of Texas is being drafted and will be presented to the State Legislature shortly.

It was recommended at the meeting that a law should be passed authorizing the citizens of one or more counties, not to exceed four, to organize into an association for the purpose of preventing theft of all classes of livestock and poultry and to see that all such laws are enforced. Each association will name its own cattle inspector.

The sanitary livestock laws of New Mexico, with changes to fit the Constitution and conditions of Texas, was recommended by the group for adoption in Texas.

All livestock and poultry associations of the state, including the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, will be enlisted for support in the movement.

It was brought out at the meeting that the maximum penalty now prescribed for the punishment of domestic livestock thieves is four years, and it was the general opinion that the penalty should be raised to ten years.

A finance committee was appointed by Chairman Anderson to raise funds with which to secure proper legislation. The committee is composed of:
