Replies Expected To Outline Joint 'Front'

ARMS LEAVE U.S.

Embargo Not Passed Soon Enough To Halt Ship

By Associated Press Great Britain sought " construcive" German and Italian answers today to a plea to stop volunteers to the insurgent armies in Spain. Replies were expected to outline two Fascist powers having joined in accord on European problems. England, with one-seventh of her fleet in Spanish waters, is capable of enforcing a blockade should the step be deemed necessary.

In Washington, the Spanish arms embargo was jammed through congress to keep millions of dollars in war shipments at home, but technicality held up the president's signature. It may permit munitions dealers to keep getting plans and arms on the seas

Time and a technicality thwarted Congress today in its race to stop munitions shipments to Spain. An administration embargo against such exports streaked through both Houses at the fastest pace since the emergency banking legislation
