UPON NATION FOR RELIEF OF NEEDY

2 Million Dollars Is Immediate Need Of Victims

20 PERSONS DEAD

12 States Suffering As Flooded Zone Widening

By Associated Press President Roosevelt issued a proclamation Saturday asking the nation to raise \$2,000,000 as a "minimum relief" fund for flood-stricken states of the mid-west and south.

Over 280,000 persons were homeless as the nation's flood zone spread and the death list increased to 20. Rescue agencies poured supplies into 12 states to prevent disease as bitter cold added to the suffering but acted to stay the rise of waters.

The Red Cross launched a \$2,000, 000 campaign for relief. Coast guardsmen mobilized additional men and boats.

Four persons were dead in Ohio, four in Tennessee, three in Illinois, two each in West Virginia, Kentucky and Missouri; one each in Mississippi, Pennsylvania and Ark-

Property damage was estimated at \$5,000,000 and 56,000 persons were homeless in the Cincinnati area. Milk and food shortage were feared at Portsmouth, Ohio, where 20,-000 refugees need aid.

The state already has title to approximately 140,000 acres of the 788,000 acres proposed for inclusion within the Texas park. The remainder, all of low economic value, can be acquired for \$1,400,000. The Legislature should lose no time in appropriating this money so that the entire area can be deeded to the Federal Government. Congress has authorized establishments of the park just as soon as these steps have been taken. No further national legislation is necessary. The revenue from increased tourist travel would be clear profit. Development, maintenance, and operation of the park would be taken over by the Nationwould be taken over by the Nation-

but when she enters the home she consolidates or brings together all these teachings into an effective demonstration. The principles of health and hygiene are applied in the home to which the visit is made. Among such demonstrations are infamily, special diets for the sick, ventilation of rooms, sanitary disposal of waste, control of vermin

Infant care properly begins before the baby is born. We call this prenatal care. Your nurse made 80 isits to homes this year to demonstrate to prenatal mothers and urge them to keep under the close super vision of their family physician.

118 visits were made to nomes for instruction in care of infants. The nurse always leaves approved health literature on prenatal and infant

The preschool age is perhaps the most important as to training habits. The things a child learns at this age "sticks" better, and what is learned at home will more likely be carried out in actual practice than those learned away from home. The public health nurse encourages and aids the mother in informing herself o nthe correct habits and trining methods advocated by the best pediatricians and child psychologist. made 60 visits relative to preschool children in the home.


