

Searchers Seek 7 Victims of Wreck

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11 (P)-The bodies of seven victims of the crash of the Los Angeles-San Francisco plane in San Francisco bay Tuesday night were sought today as investigators determined that at least four of the 11 victims were alive after the liner fell. Only four bodies have been recovered and these were shown to have been drowned, not killed by the crash.

Searchers grappled for eight missing passengers in water from which the wrecked ship, containing its three dead crew members was lifted Wednesday.

Coast guardsmen last night recovered the body of Mark Fontana, millionaire San Francisco food manufacturer, from the bay bottom near where the plane sank. They said it bore evidence Fontana struggled desperately to escape.

Concessions Made By Both Factions In Gaining Peace

PLANTS TO OPEN

Strikers To Be Back On Jobs 'As Soon As Possible'

DETROIT, Feb. 11 (AP) -The costliest strike in the American automotive industry ended today with an agreement between the General Motors corporation and the United Automobile Workers of America union. The agreement was reach-

ed as the strike, estimated to have cost \$1,000,000 daily in wages alone, entered the fortyfourth day. Shortly before, the corporation announced a five-cent hourly wage increase for all em-ployes, estimated to aggregate \$25,-000,000 annually.

The corporation agreed to recognize the union as the collective bargaining agency for employes be-longing to the union and promised to resume operations in all plants "as rapidly as possible" and to show no discrimination against strikers. The union agreed to efacuate all plants occupied by strikers and to call no other strike or interfere with production pending negotiations. Both agreed to commence collec-

She exclaimed, "Oh my, no! This country is full of baronesses. But whether I am good or not, there is only one Luli Deste."


