AUSTIN, Feb. 18 (P)—Attorney General McCraw filed suits for confiscation of 1,732,311 barrels of oil allegedly produced in East Texas in excess of allowables fixed by the railroad commission.

McCraw said the suits were the result of information from commission agents concerning alleged ex-cess crude stored in Gregg, Smith, Rusk and Upshur counties; adding that approximately 150 defendants had been named.

McCraw and C. V. Terrell, commission chairman, issued a joint statement that the suits place "virunder jurisdiction of court, thus preclaimants of the oil trying to move

WOULD SERVE AS BUFFER AGAINST CROP FAILURES

Storage System For Surpluses Also Advocated

COSTLY PROGRAM

Estimate 100 Million Would Be Needed For Start

WASHINGTON. Feb. 18. (AP) President Roosevelt recommended to congress today the adoption of a crop insurance system to provide farmers with a buffer against disastrous failures.

The President said that the insurance, coupled with a storage system for crop surpluses in good years, 'would assist in providing a more nearly even flow of farm supplies stabilizing farm buying power and contributing to security of business

Under the program an insured farm would be protected against natural hazards to 75 percent of the normal yield.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, chairman of the committee which planned the program, said "it would have the effect of storing reserves of wheat in years of large crops and releasing them on the market in years of failure.'

Federal officers estimated over \$100,000,000 would be needed to set up the plan.

The president recommended that insurance be extended to wheat for the crop year 1938 and advocated legislation authorizing similar programs to other commodities.







Resume of Play Given by Mrs. Heath

A play in three acts by Maxwell

Towering above the city of Haverstraw and overlooking the Hudson River, stands a magnificant headland bearing the old celtic name of High Tor. A small cliff-like hill adjoins it. Both of these land marks have been well known to the river folk ever since Hendrick Hudson first sailed the "Half Moon" up the Topen Tee. Some years ago a trap rock company purchased the smaller part of it, and since that time the greater part of it has been removed, leaving only a falses front facing the Hudson. The story of the play deals with the possibility that High Tor may meet with the same fate.

With this situation as a background, the author has fashioned the most whimsical and delightful play that has come from his pen since "Saturday's Children" was produced. The main character in the play is Van Doon, young heir to High Tor, who is about to lose his rights there to a double-dealing firm of rascally real-estate men.

Van Doon has met Judith, who wants to leave High Tor and live in the city where his income will be more certain, but this he does not wish to do. Complications arise from a bank robbery at Nanuet and the appearance of the robbers on High Tor. This state of affairs is then further complicated by the introduction of the Dutch crew of Hendrick Hudson's last ship "Onrust" with the resulting dual of wits between the conflicting groups.

In this new play, written in the same verse as "Winterset", Mr. Anderson has displayed his unusual understanding and insights into the motives actuating the courses and decisions of the very human characters portrayed and has presented a rare study of character development as affected by the economic demands of present day conditions.
