FALL ON VALENCIA AS REBELS ATTACK

Insurgents Strive To Separate Loyalists

FALL FORESEEN

Capture of Madrid, Valencia Said Imminent

(By Associated Press) Planes dropped incendiary bombs on Valencia today as insurgents battered toward a separation of Valencia, Spain's temporary capital, and Barcelona.

Hadrid defenders attacked to the northwest and west of the city and General Gonzalo Quiepo de Llano, insurgent commander roadcast a "personal conviction" that Madrid would fall March 2. A bloody struggle raged Monday

night in the streets of Oviedo, Alcazar of the Asturian minelands. Paced by reckless dynamiters, brawny miners who light dynamite fuses from their dangling cigarets and then throw them, 10,000 government militiamen were said by President Juan Antonio Aguirre of the Basque regional regime to have seized eight streets east of the Oviedo North Station.

President Aguirre said the plight of the decimated insurgent band, bottled up inside Oviedo for three nonths, was critical.

Other Government troops pushed n offensive southward on Leon, fifty five miles away, to prevent help from reaching the Oviedo in-The Basque Asturian militia cut the road to the insurgent base at Grado, west of Oviedo, for a second time. 



In applying pressure upon individual members in the congress he is pre pared to be ruthless, in order to gain votes necessary to put through his so-called court reform. Let us see if the attack upon the Supreme Court is fair. During the entire existence of the U.S. Supreme Court, it has held unconsti tutional, either in whole or in part less than one-tenth of one percent of more than 50,000 laws passed by the congress of the United States. That is a far better record than tre presidents can claim on vetoes. So, let's have facts and less




