It is yet too early to estimate the damage to fruit; oats and corn were damaged in many sections. Amarillo reported approximately .25 of an inch of snow during the week end cold spell. Total precipitation over the Panhandle-Plains during the last three days ranged from one and a half inches to half

Temperature over the area was below freezing all day Sunday and 20 degrees was expected in Am-At Dallas, heavy showers fell Sunday and the temperature neared the freezing mark late in the day. The airport bureau reported that most of the state was overcast and cold with heavy rains in spots and cool weather extending south to the



Woman Remains In Coma Fourth Day

Helen Wills Love, in a mysterious coma for more than three days, showed no signs of awakening this morning in time for sentencing on a second degree murder charge.

Lying motionless on a jail hospital cet, the 31-year-old woman showed no indication of rousing from the deep sleep into which she drifted last Thursday night.

All organic functions of her body, breathing and blood circulation excepted, have ceased. Dr. Benjamin Blank, jail physician, administers, intravenous solutions of glocose and normal saline in continuing forcible

"She is not simulating this condition," said Dr. Blank. "It is impossible to say just what the outcome of her coma may be.'

Shortly after she was convicted of fatally shooting Harry A Love, 43, she told jail inmates: "I can make myself die whenever I want to." Faltilling her threat, she was in a coma vigil last Friday when she was scheduled to go to court. She may be sentenced to seven years to life imprisonment for second degree

Alan Fraser of Alpine, district attorney, was expected to arrive in San Angelo, where Russell Bell is in a hospital recovering from a bullet wound and other injuries, to serve a warrant on him. Cody Bell is in a Texon hospital suffering from a shotgun

wound in the hip. The condition of Russell Bell, called critical by doctors Saturday night, was reported improved today. Cody Bell also is reported to be respond-

ing favorably to treatment. James Horton, 18, Big Spring, an employe of Cody Bell, and the only participant in the fight who was uninjured, and Russell Bell have made statements to officers. 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WOULD TAKE AWAY LAND OWNERS' RIGHTS

Representative Coke Stevenson's bill No. 579, introfuced in the house at Austin, is a serious threat to ownership of state lands, if passed. Land Commissioner Bill McDonald Saturday issued some pertinent statements to show just what the bill would do to many West Texans who are still paying out their state lands. Midland land owners and interested citizens should immediately file protests against passage of the measure. McDonald said:

Thousands of citizens are buying state school land in West Texas. These men have improved the land, have built homes, are rearing families and are playing an important part in the development of our great state. But many of these purchasers have fallen behind in their payments because of worldwide depression, combined

with duststorms and drouth.

"Under the provisions of the Coke Stevenson bill, the power to throw all these families off the land if they were behind as much as a single interest payment would be placed in the hands of an appointive school land board consisting of three members of the State Board of Education. This is not to say such a board would be harsh and arbitrary but certainly there is no assurance the members would be familiar with the economic and climatic problems of West Texas and therefore they might lack a sympathetic understanding of the situation of these

"The present law vests authority in these matters in the hands of the Land Commissioner, who is elected by the people and is familiar with conditions in West Texas and is desirous of seeing these purchasers save their investment of money and effort by retaining possession of the land so long as they make every reasonable endeavor to carry out the obligation.'

McDonald asserted the Stevenson bill would require the owner of forfeited land to obtain reinstatement in six months whereas there is no time limit under the present law, provided rights of third parties have not intervened. The commissioner said the owner would have to pay all past due interest and all past due principal to get reinstatment under the Stevenson bill but that, under the present law, only the interest would have to be paid.

"Only the owner would have a right to reinstate under the Stevenson bill while the law now permits the heirs to reinstate if the owner dies," McDonald said. "Also as is now is, the owner of forfeited land can transfer his equity to someone else and thereby salvage something from his toil and investment but under the Stevenson bill no authority is given to the owner to transfer his interest in forfeited land and therefore he would see all the savings of years swept away.'
