The prisoner lost a great deal of blood but is expected to recover. In Huntsville, General Manager Ellison said that he would conduct an immediate investigation into the mutilation episode at Harlem prison farm to determine why William H. Shoemaker, 19, had cut off his foot.



Insect Damage Likely

To Increase From

Only Light Shower In Midland; Benefits Are Light

By Associated Press Soaking rains fell over most of Texas yesterday and today, helping crops generally but increasing the menace of insect damage.

The CCC work companies will wage their battle against this rare ree disease under the direction of the forestry service in the Prescott Coconino, Tonto and Sitgreaves National forests in Arizona and the Gila National Forest in New Mexico. CCC work companies have aided in stemming the twig blight in national forests since the inception of the corps in 1933.

This little known disease made its first noticeable appearance in the Prescott forests as early as 1917. Plant pathologists making a study of its action on trees have described as being similar to the 'white plague' of tuberculosis on human beings. They say it is not known elsewhere in the world.

CCC workers are controlling the spread chiefly by cutting off and burning infected twigs.

Research has shown that the fungus enters the needle shed area of the twig leaving a resinous de-posit. Numerous infections result complete girdling of the twig vith the final result-death of the wigs, limbs, and finally the tree.


